Remember the league is very open, only two points separating the top nine teams. A win can send a team well up the league.

The Reserves brought off an excellent performance by winning at Southampton by 3 goals to two, especially as Micklewright was injured for most of the game. To date the team has only failed on one occasion to gain maximum points—the defeat at Aldershot. Edwards, Mickle-

wright and Sampson were the scorers.

The 'A' Team were hard pressed to save a point against Westbury on Saturday evening. Previously they had a 100% record, but it looked very much like defeat, until Thompson equalised from the left back position by shooting through a crowd of players. Congratulations to the young lads for their determined efforts.

Bradford City last dropped out of the Second Division at the end of the 1936-37 season and

Division at the end of the 1936-37 season and never came nearer to a return than last season when they finished in third place in the Northern Section. It was the first time in post-war football that the side had occupied a talent-money place, and the haul of 57 points was also a post-war record.

This was more like the City of old! For Valley Parade, the home of Bradford City Soccer since the club was established in 1903, has known both F.A. Cup winning and First Division days, City having won the Cup in Season 1910-11, and spent 11 seasons in the First Division from 1908-22. It has been graced by such great international players as England winger Dickie Bond, Scottish International goal-keeper Jock Ewart, Scottish International inside forward Tommy Cairns, and others. It has been the starting-point for such celebrities as George Swindin, Laurie Scott and Joe Harvey.

Harvey.

But, since the war, there has been more to sadden than to chear City supporters—including once (1949) the need to apply for re-admission to the League. Prospects assumed

a brighter look after the advent of Mr. Peter Jackson as manager in February 1954. He revised the club policy, decreeing that he would rather search for and develop junior talent than sign on ageing stars from bigger clubs. His shrewd planning has yielded rich dividends dividends.

Last season City turned down many offers for one or other of their players. But for a sudden and inexplicable lapse in goal-scoring form, the side would have chased Scunthorpe United even more relentlessly for the Third Division North Championship. But the defence never gave way—only 49 goals being conceded in 46 matches. Another strange contrast was that as many as 13 points were dropped at that as many as 13 points were dropped at home, but away City had eight victories—and they won at such top clubs as Scunthorpe, Chesterfield, Hull and Stockport.

Chesterheld, Hull and Stockport.

So City continue to depend on Youth, splashing in the transfer market only when it is really necessary and they are sure that the player is as good as his fee suggests. They have one of the youngest average-age sides in this new Third Division—a side seeking to bring back more of the lost glory to Valley Parade.

G. SMITH (Goalkeeper)—A local, from the Bradford district, who has had no other League club, having joined City from Nelson. Never missed a senior side match—either in the league or cup—for the past four seasons, when his successive appearances totalled 197. A full-time professional, he stands 6ft. and weighs 11st 7lbs.

T. FLOCKETT (right back)—Joined City in the summer of 1957 after eight seasons as a regular with Chesterfield, who recruited him from junior soccer in his native Durham. Immediately took over the captaincy of the side and was another ever present last season. Also a full-timer, stands 5ft. 11ins. and weighs 12st.

G. MULHOLLAND (left back)—Gould this

weighs 12st.
G. MULHOLLAND (left back)—Could this season, go on to create a City record in his appearances for the club. Signed from Stoke City on a free transfer in the summer of 1953, he made his first senior side outing on August 29th of that year—and has never missed a match since. This gives him, to the start of this season, 227 consecutive League appearances, plus 15 in the F.A. Cup—a grand total of 242. Only 5ft. 6ins. and 10st. 4lbs., but his biggest asset is an excellent recovery.

B. BARNES (full back)—Signed in the last week of last season from Rutherglen Glencairn a Scottish junior club which has provided City three other players. Can play on either flank and is especially useful with the ball in the air. Nearly 6ft. tall and weighs 12st. 4lbs. P. JACKSON (right half)—Dogged by injuries until last season when he had the maximum League and F.A. Cup outings. One of the twin sons of the manager, he started his career with Wrexham, and was an amateur with City until signing professional forms in 1957. Stands 6ft. and weighs 12st., and is a part-timer who follows his career as an accountant. Can also play at inside forward. M. CURRIE (centre half)—In his third season with City after being signed from Rutherglen Glencairn. His first season at Valley Parade saw him chiefly occupying the right back role, in which position he represented the Northern Section against the Southern Section. Moved to centre half last season with immediate success. A full-time player he stands 6ft. and weighs 11st. 9lbs.

J. LAWLOR (centre or left half)—Formerly with Doncaster Rovers, he had a spell out of League football following his return to his native Ireland, before City tempted him back in the early part of 1957. When with Rovers played for the Irish League and when he arrived at City was regarded exclusively as a centre half. Moved to left half last season in



W. ROBB (left half)—The number one choice for the position until a bad knee injury kept him out of football from November 1957 right to the end of the season. Underwent a successful operation and is now A.I. Formerly was with Leyton Orient, but then returned to his native Scotland and City paid Albion Rovers a four-figure fee for his services in 1955. 5ft. 9ins., 11st. 4lbs.

G. NICHOLSON (wing half)—Was signed by City from Huddersfield Town in the summer of 1957, and hails from Gildersome in the West Riding. A part-timer whose constructive play with the second team must put him in line for promotion. Now recovered from a shoulder injury sustained last season. Stands nearly 6ft. and weighs over 11st.

B. WEBB (outside right)—Now in his fourth season with City, and his first three campaigns brought 103 appearances and 32 goals—good scoring form by a winger. Stands only 5ft. 7ins. and weighs 10st., but belies this with his strong shooting. Joined City on a free transfer from Leeds United in 1955, and has also been with Walsall. A part-timer.

J. SIM (wing forward)—Was manager Jackson's first signing for the club towards the end of 1954-55 season, and was worth every penny of a four-figure fee paid to Bury, since he helped City to avoid the last two

places in the Northern Section that year, Very fast and crosses the ball beautifully. 5ft. 8ins., 10st. 10lbs. A part-time player who lives in Wigan.

D. BOYLE (wing or inside forward)—City were first interested in this utility forward when he was on Crewe Alexandra's books, but he moved to Chesterfield where he spent one season—1955-56. Placed on the transfer list after appearing in all five forward positions, he was made a tull-time professional by City. A North East native, stands 5ft. 9ins. and weighs 11st. 4lbs.

D. JACKSON (inside right)—The other twin son of the manager, and can also play on the left flank. An ever present last season—his first as a professional—he hit 11 goals. In three complete seasons with City he has never failed to achieve a double figure haul of goals. Like his brother, first came to prominence with Wrexham. Also a part-timer and is an architect. Stands 6ft. and weighs 12st.

D. CAMERON (inside forward)—Yet another player from that fruitful 'nursery' Rutherglen Glencairn. Signed at the same time as full back Billy Barnes in the last week of last season. Stands 6ft., weighs 11st. 8lbs.

R. LIVERSIDGE (centre forward)—Impressed City scouts with his tremendous shooting in a West Riding amateur game, and was made a full-time professional after only a few games as an amateur. Made his league debut in the 1956-57 season, and in the last two campaigns has hit 27 goals in 46 appearances. Can also
