Club Gossip

We experienced a mixed week-end's football. First, a win at Torquay, our bogey ground, where we had only won one game previously since the war. But after this tonic result, which gave us five points from three games since Cliff Holton was signed, we ran into a three clear goals defeat at the County Ground on Monday by unbeaten Bournemouth. And, unfortunately, this reverse had to happen before our biggest home crowd this season.

All clubs get these set-backs, just as we imposed on Crystal Palace the other week when winning so decisively on their ground before a very big crowd. But it was unfortunate this defeat should come at this stage, just when the team seemed to be turning the corner after an unlucky start, in which it had played much better than its results.

There is one thing to do, though. We must fight back again. And on the general form this season the side should do so, if only it gets an even run of luck. We have badly missed Jim Moran these last few games. Just when we had settled the inside-right problem by signing Cliff Holton, we found another at inside-left because Jimmy was hurt. Now he is in training again, and we must hope he will rapidly regain full fitness and form.

At Torquay we were a goal down in four minutes. But the team fought back well and Pat Terry put us on terms by the interval. During the second half Cliff Holton fired in a great goal that put us ahead. Soon afterwards Derek Leck got the ball in the net again, and although it was disallowed for offside, it was a very near thing.

Terry and Holton were leading figures in this game. They offered a considerable threat to the Torquay defence, and collaborated effectively in many raids. Norman Coe enjoyed an excellent game in goal, with some splendid saves. The defence, as a whole, was not quite so sound as in most earlier games, and this left Norman with a fair amount of work. But he got through it all skilfully. Although the defence was

not quite up to normal standard, it still held on well enough to restrict Torquay to one goal.

The Bournemouth match saw us concede a goal after two minutes. It was an unlucky move for us, because when Bumstead, the visitors' right winger shot, the ball cannoned off a defender and spun awkwardly high into the air. It dipped coming down and deceived Norman Coe. For the next 13 minutes our forwards tried really hard to equalise. They made four or five worthy attempts that were all saved by the opposition goalkeeper, David Best, or deflected outside by defenders.

Then Bournemouth scored again in a breakaway, and that goal had an enormous effect on the game. Bournemouth were greatly encouraged and played some good football. We held on without conceding another goal until the last five minutes when Dowsett, the Bournemouth centre-forward, intercepted a pass and scored. There were long periods when both defences were on top, but as Bournemouth had the lead they were content with the position.

We must congratulate Bill McGarry and his team, which included our former back, Arnold Woollard, on a very capable performance. It indicated how they still hold an unbeaten record. It must now be our aim to gain revenge on Wednesday when we visit them. After our wins at Crystal Palace and Torquay, we will tackle the job with full enthusiasm.


