CLUB NOTES

You might say that was the week that was. A 3-2 defeat at home by Derby County on the first Saturday of the season; a 2-0 defeat at Swindon on the following Wednesday; then a 2-1 defeat at Swansea last Saturday.

Our Second Division baptism could hardly be called sensational.

So the first thing we have to say this evening is that, of course, everyone at Selhurst Park is disappointed at the way we have begun. And if you have been fretting and cursing over these three results, don't think you're the only one. At all levels of the club this disappointment has been felt.

In the dressing room it has been felt most acutely of all. There are personal reputations at stake, and club pride. We have not worked ourselves really hard for 18 months to clamber from the bottom of the Third Division to the top only for our labour to be frustrated in the Second Division.

Having made this point to reassure anyone who may question our ambition, we would add hastily that the season has hardly begun yet, and that in the last couple of weeks we have soundly beaten West Ham, the FA Cup holders, in a friendly, and lost to Swansea Town, last season's semi-finalists, by a paper-thin 2-1 on their own back yard at the Vetch Field.

No-one has licked us—and we are not yet playing with the drive and efficiency that urged us through the Third Division last season. No-one is pessimistic here; only doubly determined to get cracking.

It is difficult to assess, on just three matches, quite how wide is the gulf between Second Division football and Third. If we had been in our last-season form, judgement would have been easier. But Coventry's immediate success may be a pointer. They finished level with us on points last season, remember, and so far, given the tremendous impetus of a victory on the first day, they have a 100 per cent record in three matches.

The indication is that the difference is not all that much.

Clearly what we are going to see are more individually outstanding players. This evening, for instance, Swindon Town bring with them young forwards of the reputation of Donald Rogers, Ernie Hunt and Mike Summerbee. No fledgling trio has attracted more praise in the Second Division. Hunt has played for the England Under-21 team on

tour abroad; Summerbee, his great pal, could have made Swindon £40,000 profit had they transferred him; so could Rogers—and he is not yet 19. All three are products of Bert Head's now famous Swindon nursery.

The tale of Swindon's rise under their brilliant manager began as a West Country marvel, then grew to national proportions. Tonight, Mr. Head expects to have two 18 year olds in his side—Rogers and goalkeeper Hicks—and five 21 year olds.

Mr. Head's way is surely the way for any club lacking unlimited finance. It is also *our* way. Five comparatively recent graduates from our junior side have played with distinction in the first team last season and this—John Jackson, Bill Glazier, Alan Stephenson, John Holsgrove and Bill Fuller. Our reserve team that beat Portsmouth Reserves 6-1 at Selhurst Park on Saturday included only two experienced senior professionals, Dickie Dowsett and Brian Wood.

It is not only a question of finance that convinces us this is the way. To produce a team from your own nursery gives a wonderful feeling of achievement and club spirit. Also, we like to think, it gives you, the supporter, a greater feeling of having grown up with the side.

Bear with us. We are on the right track.

CLUB HISTORY AND RECORDS

One or two interesting facts which we thought you might like to know. Our ground attendance record for the Cup is approximately 40,000 v. Chelsea in 1926 and for the League, 37,774 in March 1961 v. Millwall (a 4th Division match). Our average attendance last season was 17,195. Our longest serving player is Terry Long who joined us on 12th May, 1955. He has made 347 League appearances during his 9 seasons with us. The longest serving member on the staff is Charlie Catlett our groundsman, who has been with us since October 1928. This 36 year period of service has only been exceeded by the late Mr. E. F. Goodman former Secretary/Manager, who spent 38 years with the Club. Top goalscorer last season was Cliff Holton with 23, closely followed by Peter Burridge with 21 and who was top scorer in 1962/3 with 15. The individual scoring record is held by Peter Simpson, who scored 53 in one season in the early thirties. More recently, Johnny Byrne scored 31 in season 1960/61.

Last season, Bill Glazier and Bert Howe were ever present in the League side. At the moment, we have quite a few "Dear Old Pals" here at Selhurst; Ronnie Allen, Brian Whitehouse, Billy Birch, Brian Wood, Roy Horobin and Dick Graham were all at West Bromwich together, while Eddie Werge, Don Townsend, Fred Lucas and John Sewell were all at Charlton not long ago.

There are 3 players on our staff who have appeared at Wembley in a Cup Final. Ronnie Allen in 1954 for W.B.A. v. Preston, Cliff Holton in 1952 for Arsenal v. Newcastle, and Stewart Imlach in 1959 for Nottingham Forest v. Luton.

We have two sets of brothers on the staff. Michael Griffiths and Paul Cutler are now professionals who were previously apprentices. When they signed as full professionals, their places on the Apprentice Staff were taken by Lewis Griffiths and David Cutler. We hope the two younger boys follow in the footsteps of their elder brothers. Of our total of 25 professionals a number have graduated from the Junior XI. Peter Barrett, Paul Cutler, Bill Fuller, Bill Glazier, Michael Griffiths, John Holsgrove, John Jackson and Alan Stephenson. Of these 8 lads, five have already made their League debut.

Six of our lads have played in the First Division, S. Imlach, R. Allen, C. Holton, B. Whitehouse, R. Horobin, D. Dowsett and D. Townsend, while E. Werge, B. Whitehouse, J. Sewell, F. Lucas and G. Petchey have experience of Second Division Soccer.

We have four Directors, Mr. A. J. Wait, who is the Chairman, Mr. J. R. H. Dunster, J.P. who is our Vice-Chairman, Mr. V. A. Ercolani and Mr. R. Shrager. They have been on the Board since January 1950 and Mr. Wait has been a Palace Supporter ever since his boyhood days.

This evening, on grounds all over the country, the first round of the Football League Cup is taking place.

Of the 92 League Clubs the following 10 first division teams have NOT entered; Arsenal, Burnley, Everton, Liverpool, Manchester United, Nottingham Forest, Sheffield Wednesday, Tottenham Hotspur, West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers.

The First round consists of the 24 fourth division Clubs plus the bottom 12 of the third division (taken on League placings the previous season) making 18 matches. The eighteen winners plus the top 12 teams in the third division plus 22 Second Division teams and the 12 first division teams make up the 2nd round of 32 matches. As we finished in the top 12 of the 3rd Division last season we have a bye in the first round of this years competition but for your information the draw for the 1st Round is as follows:—

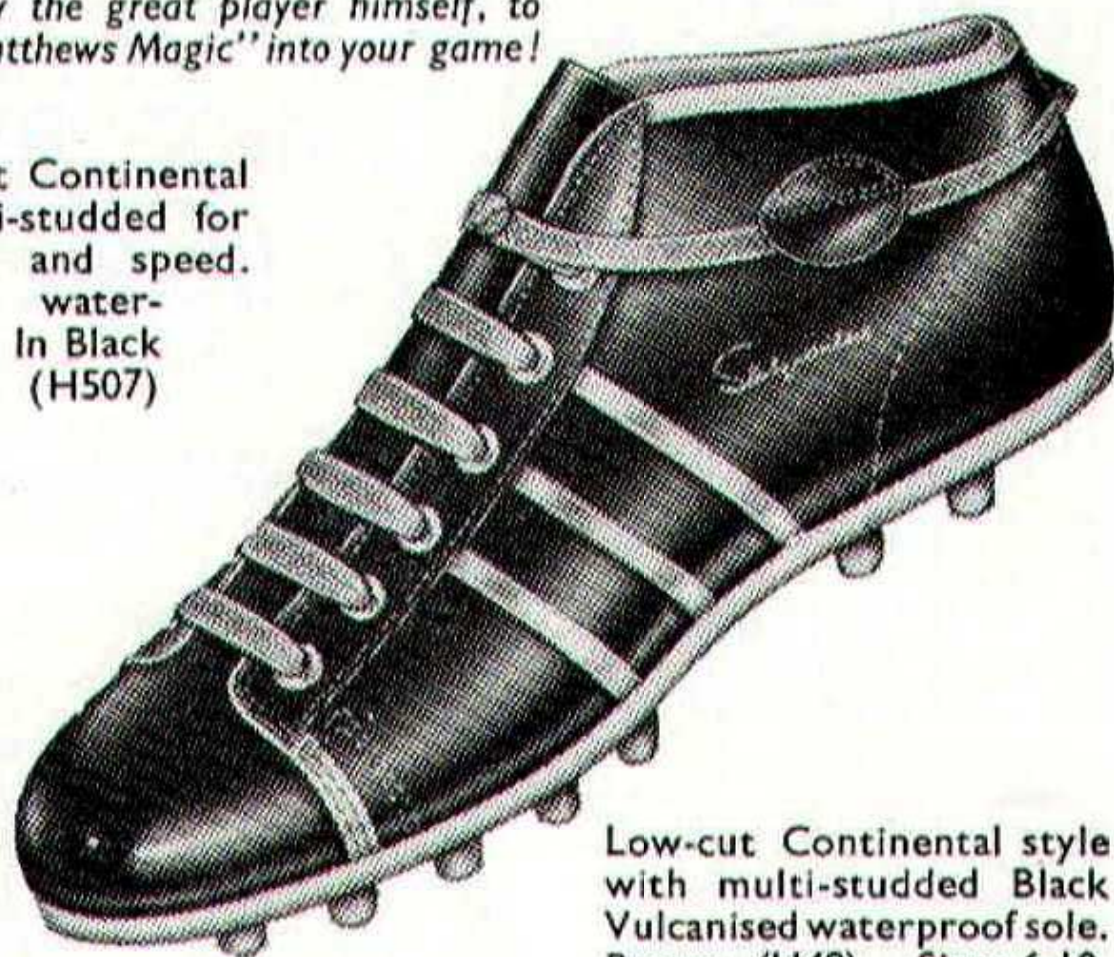
