## CLUB NEWS

After a great fight back against Southampton at the Dell the week before last, with Ivor Allchurch back in the side, it was he who grabbed a fine equaliser (his 200th goal in League football) to mark his return to the first team. He performed the same feat at the Baseball Ground last Saturday against Derby County, but unfortunately the goal was disallowed, the referee changing his mind after consultation with a linesman who kept his flag up after the score, insisting that a City player was off-side. This was a desperately unlucky decision, and although we battled bravely to equalise a 9th minute goal by left half Webster, no further score materialised and we had to return empty handed.

17 year old George Johnston, having his first League game with City had an encouraging debut on the left wing and supplied some neat touches. Our position has now worsened in the Second Division Table and every effort will be needed to draw clear of the danger area.

Two consecutive victories by our Combination side against Fulham and Crystal Palace, shows continued good form, with Bob Lloyd at inside right proving a real menace to opposing defences, Mel Charles too, like Lloyd has found the net in both games. Here's hoping they keep up the good work at Peterborough today.

Last week's visitors Abergavenny sprung an unexpected surprise against us in our Welsh League Premier Division match and scored five times without reply. They now take over the number 2 spot in the table on goal average.

With our exit from the European Cup Winners Competition, interest is now firmly fixed on winning the Welsh Cup, and another hurdle was overcome in our recent encounter with Southern League Hereford United. Bob Dennison's lads put up a creditable display, and although they lost to us 3-1 they proved worthy opponents who played fast and enterprising football. Those who saw this performance I'm sure will wish them well in their promotion bid to reach the Premier Division of the Southern League.

Our young centre half Don Murray has finally been able to accept the honour afforded him by the Scottish Selectors, and we congratulate him on being chosen for the Scots Under 23 side against young England at Aberdeen on Wednesday.

Today we extend a warm welcome to Swindon Town, a club which was founded in 1881 and which has been a member of the Football League since 1920. In season 1962-63 they gained promotion to Division II and are currently managed by Bert Head the ex-Torquay Centre-half, who last week set his side a target of 11 points from their remaining twelve games, to make them absolutely safe from relegation. On Saturday they got two of those points with an excellent 4-1 home win over Coventry, and we can expect an equally determined display from the Railwaymen this afternoon. In our earlier encounter at the County Ground on October 17th, 1964 we held the Wiltshire side to a 3-3 draw. Trailing 3-1 three quarters of the way through the second half with Barrie Hole our initial scorer, the game was notable for two fine goals from Mel Charles which enabled us to share the points.

*MERTHYR-BORN (and proud of it) Lloyd campaigned vigorously in school days for a choice of Soccer at his Rugby-playing school.*

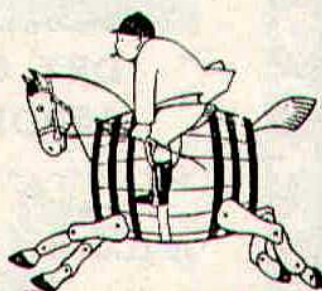

## PEN PICTURES OF THE SWINDON TOWN PLAYERS

**NORMAN OAKLEY, (Goalkeeper)**—Born Norton on Tees. Joined the Club from Hartlepoons United in March, 1964.

**JOHN TROLLOPE, (Left back)**—Born Swindon. A local boy who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. Was selected for the First Team at the beginning of the Season 1960/61 when he was 16 years old, and was ever present during that season and season 1961/62. Maximum appearances in the League side during 1962/63/64.

**KEITH MORGAN, (Right half)**—Born Trowbridge. Team Captain. A strong attacking wing-half, who joined Swindon as a youth player from Westbury. Made maximum appearances during 1962/3/4.

**KEN McPHERSON, (Centre half)**—Born West Hartlepool. Signed from Newport County in August, 1961, he is a player with a reputation for hard work. Originally a centre-forward he has proved he has the ability to take over in defence.

**ROGER SMART, (Wing half)**—Born Swindon. Another local born player who joined the Club direct from the Swindon schoolboys' team. At 17 he made the centre-forward berth in the Reserve team his own, later converted to a wing-half.

**OWEN DAWSON, (Full back)**—Born Hatfield. Signed from Portsmouth

June, 1962. Was a former Youth International.

**MIKE SUMMERBEE, (Outside right)**—Born Cheltenham. He is another product of the Swindon Youth policy. Formerly played at Centre-forward, but has now made the outside-right berth his own.

**ERNIE HUNT, (Inside right)**—Born Swindon. Joined the Club's ground staff from school. A member of the first team at 16 years of age, he is a player of outstanding ability, for whom the Club has had many offers. A local boy, he was top goal-scorer 1960/61 and 1961/62. Capped for England Under 23's during 1962/63.

**BILL ATKINS, (Inside forward)**—Born Solihull. Joined Swindon from Aston Villa at the end of 1958/59 Season. A strong, ball-playing forward. He played several representative matches while in the Army. Since his demob, has quickly made the inside-left position his own.

**PETER LEGGETT, (Forward)**—Born Newton-le-Willows. Signed from Weymouth May, 1962. He is a fast powerful player who can play in any position in the forward line.

**DONALD ROGERS, (Forward)**—Born Paulton. A much sought after player. An England youth player who it seems is destined for further honours.

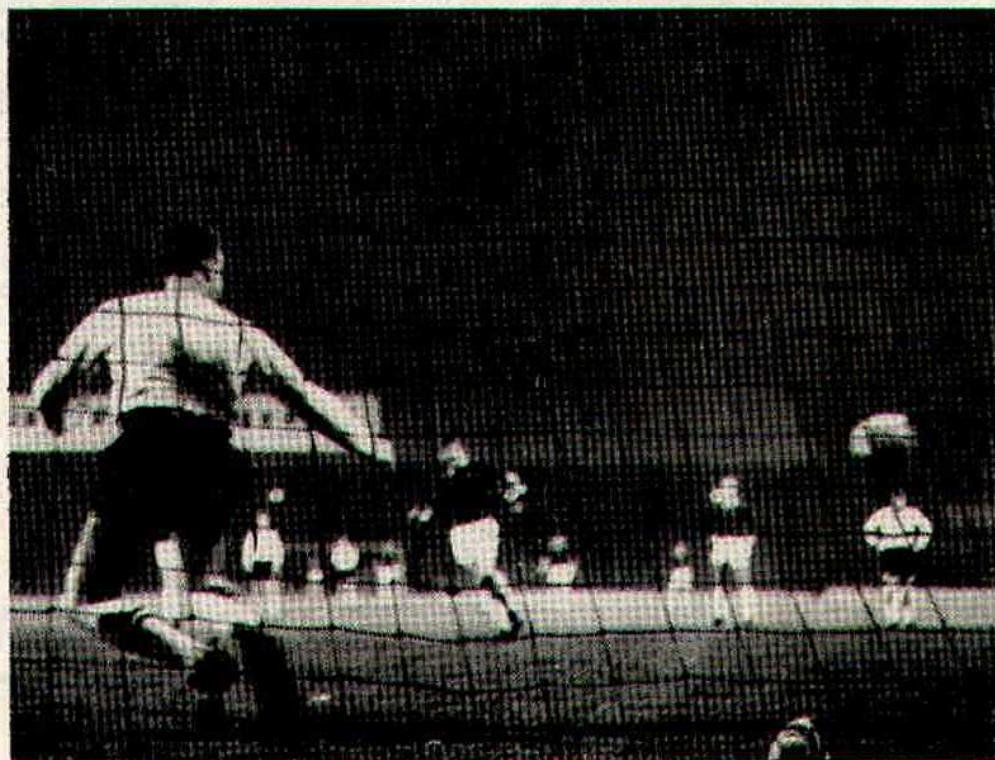

## Memory Lane

## Jimmy Jones



Ton Fentre born, this centre forward with the cannon-ball shot first played as a professional for his home club in the Southern and Welsh League sides and appeared as a guest player for Portsmouth during the First World War. He came to

Cardiff City in season 1922-23 when the Bluebirds were in Division One, and became the third centre forward, along with Len Davies and J. MacDonald, on City's books. Although only just over 5ft. 9ins. in height, he could invariably beat his opponents in the air and hit the ball with tremendous force. Jimmy's most vivid recollection of this period was when City beat Tottenham Hotspur for the first time at Ninian Park, a season later. He opened the scoring with a magnificent goal, Spurs equalised, and inside left Joe Clennell grabbed the winner, amidst tremendous jubilation from the 60,000 spectators.

This was the season (1923-24) that City narrowly failed to win the League Championship, just being pipped for the honour by Huddersfield.

At the end of 1924 Jimmy was transferred to Wrexham and played for the North Wales club for a further couple of seasons before being injured, a mishap which entailed a cartilage operation, and he was out of soccer for three months. Although he returned to the first team and scored a hat-trick on his first reappearance his injury still troubled him and he was given a free transfer by Wrexham to Aberdare for whom he played for one season before moving on to Torquay United, and it was with them that he ended his career. Jimmy believes that one of the prime requisites of a good soccer player is that he can use both feet effectively, and as for centre forwards, he says that the majority, these days, don't play the orthodox game enough and tend to wander all over the field, with the result that when the ball comes across they aren't always in position to receive a good pass.

"I like to see a centre forward having a go on his own, and bursting through the middle," says Jimmy, "Someone like Gerry Hitchens, but there don't seem to be many like him about."

Jimmy now owns a confectionery shop in Cowbridge Road East and is always pleased to welcome any of his old soccer colleagues who happen to call in.
