Good Afternoon—

There was great jubilation in the United camp following the team's fine victory over Derby County at the Baseball Ground and for good reason. The away points maintained the team top of the Second Division and clear favourites for the return to Division One. "Another four points could do it—six would" says the ever cautious Manager Joe Harvey and with five games still to play the task should be well within the scope of his players.

After this afternoon's encounter with the lowly Swindon Town whom United slammed 6-1 in the November away game, United have to battle against Bolton Wanderers on Good Friday and Manchester City on the last day of the season. Away they travel to play Crystal Palace and Bolton on Easter Saturday and Monday. Bolton Wanderers must still be rated a danger to suggest the Good Friday Gallowgate attraction one to pack the terraces to provide first class holiday soccer and maybe clinch the promotion bid by United.

Bolton with a game in hand on Wednesday night were seven points behind United and Northampton. They have faltered in the final fling for promotion to leave United and Northampton clear favourites. If United can win their home games, and remember only one has been lost to date, then they should be home and dry. A good win this afternoon over Swindon, who lost at home to the Boro last Saturday, followed by a GOOD Friday at the expense of Bolton is the target.

Every man wearing United colours is alive to the need to give his best until the issue is decided. Promotion brings with it a rich reward for all. All opposition must be treated with the greatest respect and that includes Swindon Town, who, by virtue of their dangerous League position that spells relegation, can be expected to provide tough opposition. Bottom of the table Swansea proved the point when they recently visited Gallowgate. It should also be noted that Swindon have won eleven home games with an amazing success run that brought them wins over Charlton, Coventry, Crystal Palace, Derby, Huddersfield and Northampton. With such a record the low League placing must be ignored for it shows an abundance of ability. Away from home Swindon have been moderate. Only two games have been won and a couple drawn. They defeated Leyton and Manchester City.

Opportunity, however, knocks for United not only to strengthen their leadership grip but to add to what is already the lead in goal average that could, should it prove to be a photo-finish in the end, make the difference between promotion and another spell in Division Two. Fortunately Norwich City have floundered to narrow the issue. The City are out of the battle seven points behind United and Northampton. Yes, it is a three team race now with United and Northampton neck and neck at the table top and Bolton still placed to strike.

Spotlight on Swindon Town . . .

Swindon Town was founded way back in 1881 by the Rev. W. Pitt for youngsters on his parish. They became a professional club in 1894 when they were admitted to the Southern League where they stayed until 1920. Then they became one of the original members of the League Division Three.

Many names are attached to this club for they are spoken of as the Moonrakers (from the Wiltshire legend) the Robins from their colours and like Crewe The Railwaymen. The play on the County ground that boasts a top gate of just under 30,000.

Many famous men have managed the club including B. Head, S. Allen, N. Harris, M. Lindley, L. Page and E. Vizard. The League career reads Division Three 1920-21, Three (South) 1921-39; 1946-58; Division Three 1958-62 Division Two 1963—.

One of their best seasons was in 1926-27 when they netted 100 goals in 42 matches. Highest League score was set up when they defeated Luton 9-1 in 1921. In 1926-27 D. Morris was top scorer in Division Three with 47 goals.

Notable transfer deals include the signing of J. Murphy from West Brom, J. Gauld from Plymouth Argyle, and the selling of N. Uprichard to Portsmouth in 1952.

Honours include semi-finalists F.A. Cup 1910 and 1912; quarter finalists 1911, 1924. 5th round 1929 beating Newcastle United 2-0 and Burnley 3-2. They reached the last 16 also in 1913 and 1952. They were champions of the Southern League in 1911 and 1914. They met Manchester United for the F.A. Charity Shield in 1912 losing a high scoring match 8-4.

Norman Oakley—*Goalkeeper*—Born Norton on Tees. Joined the Club from Hartlepoons United in March, 1964.

John Trollope—*Left Back*—Born Swindon. A local boy who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. Was selected for the First Team at the beginning of the Season 1960/61 when he was 16 years old, and was ever present during that season and season 1961/62. Maximum appearances in the League side during 1962/63/64.

Keith Morgan—*Right Half*—Born Trowbridge. Team Captain. A strong attacking wing-half, who joined Swindon as a youth player from Westbury. Made maximum appearances during 1962/3/4.

Tom Hallett—*Centre Half or Left Half*—Born Glynneath. Signed from Leeds United July 1963. Fast and tenacious player.

Ken McPherson—*Centre Half*—Born West Hartlepool. Signed from Newport County in August, 1961, he is a player with a reputation for hard work. Originally a Centre-forward he has proved he has the ability to take over in defence.

Roger Smart—*Wing Half*—Born Swindon. Another local born player who joined the Club direct from the Swindon schoolboys' team. At 17 he made the Centre-forward berth in the Reserve team his own, later converted to a Wing-half.

Owen Dawson—*Full Back*—Born Hatfield. Signed from Portsmouth, June 1962. Was a former Youth International.

Wilfred Shergold—*Forward*—Born Swindon. Another product of the Swindon youth policy. He is fast and can play in almost any position in the forward line.

Mike Summerbee—*Outside Right*—Born Cheltenham. He is another product of the Swindon Youth policy. Formerly played at Centre-forward, but has now made the outside-right berth his own.

Ernie Hunt—*Inside Right*—Born Swindon. Joined the Club's ground staff from school. A member of the first team at 16 years of age, he is a player of outstanding ability, for whom the Club has had many offers. A local boy, he was top goal-scorer 1960/61 and 1961/62. Capped for England Under 23's during 1962/63.

Bill Atkins—*Inside Forward*—Born Solihull. Joined Swindon from Aston Villa at the end of 1958/9 Season. A strong, ball-playing forward. He played several representative matches while in the Army. Since his demob, has quickly made the inside-left position his own.

Frank Large—*Forward*—Born Leeds. Signed from Northampton March, 1964. A very strong forceful player.

Donald Rogers—*Forward*—Born Paulton. A much sought after player. An England youth player who it seems is destined for further honours.

Bernard Griffin—*Wing Half*—Born Merthyr Tydfil. Joined the Club August, 1963. Strong attacking Wing-half.
