NEWS and VIEWS

Well it has happened again! While we travelled to Nottingham full of hope, few of us really thought we should return in the evening, still in the Cup Competition.

The game itself, did not produce such excellent, or entertaining football, as that at West Ham, nevertheless our nine thousand follows (and what wonderful support, over nine thousand travelling something over one hundred and thirty miles, to watch their team—a team given no chance by all the experts) were quite happy with the result, and look forward to this evenings game with great interest and expectation.

Prior to last Saturday we had only previously met Nottingham Forest once in the Football Association Cup. That was in season 1925-26, when the organisation of the competition was altered. It was the year when we had to enter the 1st Round Proper. (The present 3rd Round was originally the 1st.) Swindon went into the hat with quite a number of nonleague clubs, and were drawn away to Farnham United Breweries a team playing in a Surrey League. No doubt Mr. Bert Davies (for many years our assistant secretary), remembers this game very well. Mr. Sam Allen, that doyen of football managers was cross about the whole re-arrangement, in fact he made a very strong statement to the Press, in which he referred to this "Cain and Abel" business. His instructions to the team just prior to the kick-off was - "Just go out and show them just what a farce this whole affair can be". Result, Swindon 10 Farnham 1. In the second round we were drawn home to the Kent League team Sittingbourne. Result, Swindon 7 Sittingbourne 0. In the next round the clubs from Divisions I and II were included; yet strangely enough, we were drawn against an amateur team - Clapton a well known team, which played

in the Isthmian League, the Senior amateur league in the country. This tie caused tremedous interest in the East End of London, and eventually the game was played at Upton Park, the home of West Ham United. Incidentally, this was the first association of the writer of these notes had with that famous club and ground, but which has continued ever since right up to that famous occasion a few weeks ago. I well remember Frank Richardson (Swerver, still in football with Reading. He was present when we played Grimsby) at centre-forward scoring against Clapton, and much later seeing Willie Millar, charged into the spectators standing on the lower terracing. The result of the game was 3—2 in Swindon's favour, and so we went into the hat for the next round, this time away to Nottingham Forest, where we were defeated 0—2.

Younger supporters of Swindon who followed the fortunes of the club since the war, will remember the fine sides, which represented Nottingham in seasons 1949/50 and 50/51. In the former year the results of the two fixtures were wins by the Forest 2—1 at Nottingham, and 5—0 at Swindon. Many supporters still consider the Forest match at Swindon, one of the best they have ever seen. The next season, the year Nottingham gained promotion, they again won both games 2—1 at home and 3—2 at the County Ground.

Nottingham Forest, enjoy a great reputation among all league clubs. We thought their organisation last Saturday was excellent. Well posted notices gave full instructions, crowd control both inside and outside the ground was first class. The police certainly did a wonderful job. Did you notice how after the crowd charged forward behind our goal, a number of people were taken out of the ground, for quite a long time, almost up to half-time? There was, however, no more charging forward or swaying, and a gangway was kept open throughout the game. A number of police must have been

posted on the terraces among the crowd. Did you notice also no banners, (they obstruct the view of the people in the rear); no toilet rolls, and above all, no one encroaching on the field of play after the game. A fine example of crowd control and behaviour. This could have affected the game, because it was played in the right spirit throughout. There were a few fouls, and maybe one or two hard tackles (both teams), but we did not have one unpleasant incident, a tribute to both teams. After all spectators pay to see a game of football, not a

serious unpleasant situation.

A word of credit to the referee (who rarely gets, and never seeks praise - he receives mostly all the kicks, and none of the thanks). We thought Mr. Hamer, was in complete charge throughout, quietly and efficiently - no showmanship, no dashing up and down the field, but a firm word, spoken at the right time and in the right way. Just one comment on this matter. On Saturday 47,500 spectators paid over £11,000, yet the man at the helm, received a full 10 guineas. Surely, with all the physical effort, and mental strain, involved, apart from the tremendous responsibility the man is worth much more. In my opinion (my own personal one) a referee in such games should be paid something like fifty or one hundred guineas. How many of our spectators would have liked to referee Everton v. Liverpool?

GEOFFREY HUDSON BALL (Full back) 5ft. 9ins, 10st. 11lbs.
Born (2nd November) Nottingham, joined the club following impressive displays in local junior soccer in the city. He soon attracted the attention of a Nottingham Forest scout, and signed for the club in February 1963. Due to the consistency of the more experienced full backs on the staff, his senior appearances have been somewhat restricted to date. He made his Nottingham Forest debut in the County Cup competition against Mansfield Town (away) in January, 1964, but his actual Division One debut was against Arsenal at Highbury on 3rd October, 1964. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 3.

JOHN BARNWELL (Inside forward) 5ft. 7ins. 11st. 9lbs.
Born (24th December) High Heaton, Co. Durham. As an amateur with that outstanding North Eastern combination, Bishop Auckland, he attracted the attention of many clubs but finally threw in his lot with Arsenal in November 1956. He remained with the "Gunners" until 10th March, 1964, when he was transferred to the Forest. Whilst with Arsenal he made 138 senior appearances and played for the England "Under 23" side v. West Germany at White Hart Lane in March 1961. Made his debut for Forest against Sheffield Wednesday at the City Ground on 21st March, 1964. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 86. Goals: 16.

JOSEPH HENRY BAKER (Centre forward) 5ft. 8ins. 11st. 8lbs. Born (17th July) Liverpool. By the time he was 19 years of age, he had made over 100 appearances for his first senior club, Hibernians, and scored nearly the same amount of goals, including nine in one game v. Peebles in a cup-tie in 1961. His best season was 1959/60 when he scored 42 goals in 33 league games. In May 1961, he joined the Italian club, A.C. Torino, for a reported fee of £73,000 but after only twelve months was back in English football, this time with Arsenal who paid something in the region of £70,000 to secure his services. He netted nearly 100 goals in their colours and won several English honours before joining the Forest for a club record fee in March 1966. Was included in the England World Cup initial party of 40 players in May 1966. Made his Forest debut v. Burnley at City Ground on 8th March, 1966. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 14. Goals: 5.

JOHN CHARLES BRIDLEY (Centre half or full back) 5ft. 8½ins. 11st. 11lbs.

Born (29th May) Nottingham. Came to the fore with the Nottingham Schoolboys' team and then played for the England Schoolboy side against Wales and Scotland in 1961. In July 1961 he joined the Forest staff as an amateur and quickly won his way into the Football Combination side as centre half. He has won several England Youth "caps" and was a member of the national side that played in the Final of the "Little World Cup" in April 1965 when they lost to East Germany. Made his Forest league debut v. Stoke City at Stoke on 25th September, 1965, as a full back, a position that he seems as equally at home in as he does at pivot. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 4.

ROBERT DENNIS CHAPMAN (Inside forward) 5ft. 11ins. 12st. Born (14th August) Walsall, Was playing in junior soccer in Walsall when first recommended to the Forest in March 1962. Spent a short period on the ground staff before becoming a professional on 14th August, 1963 — his 17th birthday. When he made his league debut against Stoke City at the City Ground on 18th January, 1964, he was then the youngest ever inside forward to figure in the senior attack. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 12. Goals: 4.

PETER MALCOLM GRUMMITT (Goalkeeper) 5ft. 10ins. 11st. 1lb. Born (19th August) Bourne, Lincs. As an amateur with his local side Bourne Town, he was offered and played in trials for Birmingham City and Notts County, but neither club considered him good enough! He joined the Forest amateur staff in January 1960 and became a professional in May 1960. Made his first senior appearance against Bolton Wanderers at the City Ground on 12th November, 1960 — at 18 years of age, the youngest ever goalkeeper to play in the senior side. Has several "Under 23" caps, his first against Holland in Rotterdam on 27th November, 1961. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 254.

BERNARD JOHN WINFIELD (Wing half) 6ft. 11st. 11lbs.
Born (28th February) Draycott, Derbyshire. Joined the club's ground staff straight from school in May 1959, and became a professional player on 9th May, 1960. Made his League debut against Blackpool at the City Ground on 3rd February, 1962, scoring a goal. Several times on the fringe of England "Under-23" honours (called upon as a reserve) he has been as unlucky in his selection for his country as he has with his club, insofar as he has had to vie with strong competition for a senior berth due to the consistency of other players. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 81. Goals: 3.

COLIN HALL (Forward) 5ft, 8ins. 10st. 11lbs.

Born (2nd February) Wolverhampton. Didn't play much soccer at school owing to the fact that he received a private education! However, whilst playing for a Youth Club he was recommended to the Forest whom he joined in the summer of 1964 as a 16-year-old. Won three England Youth "caps" in 1965/66 season as an amateur and immediately after his last honour joined the professional staff in April 1966. He was top scorer with 20 goals in the Midland Intermediate League side that were runners-up in both League and Cup. Showed much promise in several appearances in the Combination side last season but hadn't made his League debut prior to 1966/67.

TERRY WILLIAM HENNESSEY (Wing half) 6ft. 11st. 5lbs.
Born (23rd April) Llay, Wales. Was "capped" for Wales as a schoolboy and later won Youth International honours also. Joined Birmingham City in 1959, and went on to win "Under 23" and full International honours, the first of which was against Ireland in 1962. At the end of the 1965/66 season he had played for Wales over 20 times. Joined the Forest from Birmingham City for a club record fee for a wing half on 19th November, 1965, making his League debut against Blackpool at the City Ground the following day. Has now taken over the captaincy of the club from Bobby McKinlay at the latter player's request. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 24. Goals: 1.

PETER HINDLEY (Full back) 5ft. 11ins. 12st. 10lbs.

Born (19th May) Worksop. He was recommended to the club by a Forest scout as a centre forward in October 1960, and it was in this position that his father had played for the club before the Second World War. He became a professional on 5th June, 1961, and was soon found to have great potential as a defender when switched to the centre half position with the Reserves. Made his initial senior appearance in a F.A. Cup-tie at The Hawthorns against West Bromwich Albion on 5th March, 1963, and his League debut came against Everton at Goodison Park four days later. Gained a regular first team place as a full back in October 1964 and is now a first choice in this position in the side. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 94. Goals: 4.

RAYMOND ALWYN BRIDGETT (Full back) 5ft. 10½ins. 11st. 8lbs. Born (5th April) Walsall. A Forest representative recommended this promising youngster to the club in 1963 and he eventually joined the staff as a professional in 1964. Was a mainstay in the Forest Midland Intermediate League defence last season when they were runners-up in both League and Cup competitions. Has made no senior appearances up to the start of the 1966/67 season.

ROBERT McKINLAY (Centre half) 6ft. 12st. 1lb.

Born (10th October) Lochgelly, Fifeshire. The longest-serving player on the staff, he made his League debut in the Second Division against Coventry at the Highfield Road Ground on the 27th October, 1961, and is now the only player on the staff to have played for the club in that Division. He was recommended to the Forest by his uncle who was a pre-war Forest player and signed as a professional in October 1949. Has played in more senior games than any other player in the long history of the club but, despite the fact that he has given many years of excellent service and was regarded by many as one of the finest pivots in the game, he was never called upon by his native Scotland for any kind of representative game at all. Had a unique record in the whole of the Football League until 23rd October, 1965, when he missed his first League game for over six consecutive seasons. Played for the Forest in their Cup winning side of May 1959 when they beat Luton Town at Wembley by two goals to one and enjoyed a testimonial game (v. Glasgow Celtic) in April 1965 after 15 years of service wearing the Forest colours. Now manager (part-time) of a garage business in the city. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 551. Goals: 8.

ALAN HINTON (Winger) 5ft. 10ins. 11st. 10lbs.

Born (6th October) Wednesbury, Staffs. Joined Wolverhampton Wanderers straight from school and after a period on their ground staff became a professional on 8th October, 1959. During his stay with Wolves he made 77 senior appearances and scored 29 times, also winning two England "Under 23" honours. Came to City Ground in an exchange deal which took outside left "Flip" Le Flem to Molineux in January 1964. Made his first senior appearance against Mansfield Town at Field Mill in the County Cup competition on 25th January, 1964, with his League debut coming against Bolton Wanderers at Burden Park one week later. Won two full England "caps" in 1964 as well as further "Under 23" honours. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 97. Goals: 25.

IAN STOREY MOORE (Wing forward) 5ft. 9ins. 12st. 4lbs. Born (17th May) Ipswich, Last season he finished as the most outstanding forward in a not-so-good attack, and proved to be very versatile with appearances in four different forward positions. Was recommended to the club by a Forest scout while playing in Scunthorpe junior football in August 1961. Made his League debut against Ipswich Town at City Ground on 10th May, 1963, on the wing, but in the last few games of last season did quite well in the inside positions. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 56. Goals: 16.


HENRY NEWTON (Wing half or full back) 5ft. 8ins. 11st. 4lbs. Born (14th October) Nottingham. Whilst playing for the Nottingham Schoolboy side he was a much sought after player and eventually joined the City Ground staff (in company with the Nottingham-born England Schools player, David Pleat, who is still his close friend) in January 1960. Became a professional player in June 1961 and made progress through the club's teams to make his League debut against Leicester City at the City Ground on 8th October, 1963. He has seldom missed a game (save through illness or injury) since that time and won England "Under 23" honours against Rumania and Czechoslovakia in 1964. Midway through last season with the signing of Terry Hennessey coinciding with a full back problem arising, he offered to play in this position and continued there with great success throughout the remainder of the season. Total senior appearances prior to 1966/67: 119. Goals: 4.

FRANK WIGNALL (Centre forward) 5ft. 11ins. 12st.

Born (21st August) Blackrod, Lancs. Attracted the attention of several Lancashire clubs whilst playing with Horwich R.M.I. in the Lancashire Combination and eventually joined Everton in May, 1958, playing his first game and scoring against Burnley on 22nd September, 1959. He played 33 times for Everton (scoring 15 goals) before he eventually joined the Forest on 13th June, 1963, making his debut in their colours against Aston Villa at City Ground on 24th August, 1963. 
