### Town will be in the running next season

-SAYS FRED FORD

A few years back, when the Football League consisted of the First, Second, Third Southern and Third Northern divisions, each season the Third South used to play the Third North in a representative match.

Should a representative side be selected from the Third Division at this present moment, Swindon Town would have more players in the team than any other single Club.

They have the highest-priced individual player in the Division, their average gate is around 2,000 above the next best supported side. They have three Internationals in the side, and during the past two seasons, they have had two excellent Cup runs in which they beat opposition from the First and Second Division.

Why are they not in the top two positions at the moment? Statisics show that their away record is one reason.

I think another reason is the bad start to the season. When winning promotion, a side can have only one bad patch. If the period is in the first dozen or so games, as Swindon's was, then there is no scope for another lean spell.

But this is what happened. In the last six or seven away games they have averaged points well



enough, but six out of the last seven home matches have been drawn.

I spent nearly six months with Swindon Town this season. They are a good Club. The Directors, knowledgeable men in football matters, give a lot of spare time in the running of the Club.

The manager, Danny Williams, was the best uncapped wing-half of his playing time.

Mel Nurse, captain of the side and many times capped for Wales, and his very experienced players, are as much mystified, and certainly as disappointed, as their supporters over why they are not in the top three or four at the present time.

The team are a footballing side who play it clean. And one thing is certain-Swindon Town will be in the running for promotion again next season.

culty of survival.


