Help us realise our dream

Today, with our good friends and old rivals Swindon Town providing the opposition, we are expecting a bigger crowd than for any of our other matches so far this season.

It is an opportune time to talk to you about recent events on and off the field and to tell you our ambitions for the club's future and how you can help us achieve them.

There have been disappointments in the early games. Frankly they were expected—a young team like our's has to learn-often the hard way. Bearing with them during their. apprenticeship requires patience.

But there have been enough signs of encouragement to suggest that Fred Ford is working along the right lines and that success is not so far around the corner.

My colleagues on the board and I are aware that Fred Ford's task would be easier if there was money to spend in the transfer market.

We believe that finding and developing your own players is a good and sensible policy for a club to follow, and not necessarily just clubs who cannot afford any other.

But we realise there are limitations and that there are times when it is desirable to strengthen a position or two by buying readymade players.

This can only be done when the funds are available. At the moment, they are not but every effort is being made to seek out ways of increasing the club's income.

These can have no real effect without a weight of support from our followers, particularly in the area of direct fund-raising.

We are sorry about the plight of the Supporters' Social Club but its pending closure will give that hard core of ardent supporters the opportunity to redirect their efforts towards the original aim of their organisation—to help the Football Club in every way possible.

Their fine record of achievement in the past is well known. There is no reason why, if given the right support, they cannot achieve as much again in the future and help us to realise our dream of bringing Second Division football back to Eastville and then moving forward to the First Division.

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Fred Ford's View

At Plymouth last Saturday we lost 3—1 after Plymouth had scored in the first few minutes and the last few minutes. But during the period when the score was 1—1 we missed a couple of chances—real chances that if taken would have put us in front and kept the pattern of the game our way.

Had Larry Taylor not been suffering from a groin injury, he possibly would have saved Plymouth's vital second goal.

Typical of us this season is a tendency to give goals away through a slackness that is not found in a good side. Until we overcome this fault, we will never keep a clean sheet.

It relates partly to skill, partly to confidence. Usually it has been an individual fault and often a different player each time. But even our most inexperienced player should be improving now and eliminating these faults.

Four players received 21 days' suspension this week for offences ranging from swearing to kicking.

Swearing, showing dissent, kicking first, retaliating . . . is there a



difference? Should the terms of the suspensions vary accordingly?

It is very difficult for the Disciplinary Committee to have a chart drawn up, ruling so many days for this offence, and so many for that. There are many different things to be taken into account in each case.

I think the real offenders should be punished hard in terms of suspensions. Fines are not the answer. Even the hard core of offending players love to play and hate being out of the game.

Make one and all play the game hard...play the ball, accept decisions, no pretence at being injured, all sporting instincts to the fore.



But Swindon come to Eastville today still boasting the best defensive record in all four Divisions.

Anchor man in that fine defence is:

PETER DOWNSBOROUGH who provided the answer to a problem spot in Town's team when he was signed three years ago from Halifax.

OWEN DAWSON lost a regular first team place through injury but regained it this season when John Trollope broke his arm at Hartlepool.

RODNEY THOMAS, signed from Gloucester City as an inside-forward in 1964, successfully switched to full-back and has full international and Under-23 caps for Wales.

JOE BUTLER, a full-back when signed from Newcastle in 1965, has found a regular place in the senior side at wing-half this season.

FRANK BURROWS, signed this summer from Scunthorpe as a replacement for Mel Nurse, has quickly made an impression. A Scot, he had a spell with Raith Rovers before joining Scunthorpe.

STAN HARLAND, one of Town's most consistent defenders, played for Everton, Bradford City and Carlisle before signing for Swindon at the start of last season.

DON ROGERS needs little introduction. Paulton-born, England Youth and Under-23 international. Town's top scorer with 28 goals last season. The most valuable player in the Third Division.

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


