CLUB NOTES

T is Swindon's turn to be welcomed to the Valley for this afternoon's game. They have a reputation for playing good football and they took three points from us last season. Of course, their main claim to fame in recent soccer history is their 3-1 League Cup win over the redoubtable Arsenal, after extra time.

And at that time Swindon were in the third division, gaining promotion the same year. They have since established themselves as one of the best sides in this league, finishing fifth last season.

Manager Theo Foley made a trip to Yeovil during the week and signed Dick Plumb a 23 year old centre-forward. Dick, who comes from the same club as Cyril Davies, has seen service with Swindon and Bristol Rovers. He should add punch where it is needed most-up front. Our injury list continues to grow, but when it improves there will be a real battle for places for the first time for a number of years.

In a recent Football League Review viewpoint, it was suggested that Tuesday night should be the "mid-week Saturday." In other words all midweek games should take place on that night. An idea favoured by several league managers. The Review doesn't hold with that idea.

In this writer's opinion, the present arrangements are much superior. It's bad enough clashing with our local rivals on a Saturday, without having mid-week games, too, being played on the same night.

We think that manager's, too, on reflection must stand by the present way of arranging things. It gives them a chance to watch their rivals, or have a look at a possible new player for the team.

It also adds to the gate because some fans want to watch as many games as possible in the week, without having to miss their own particular favourite side.

BACK

Dick Plumb, from Yeovil made a great debut at Birmingham, after going near in the fifth minute, he became the first Charlton player to score away from home this season. in he 52nd minute.

We were decidedly unfortunate only to come away from Birmingham with a point, finishing the game with ten men and Charlie Wright having to have his right thigh strapped which caused him to limp.

Before the team left the Valley Charlie Hall must have been the busiest man in South East London. Paul Went, Graham Moore, Brian Kinsey, Harry Gregory and a few others were receiving treatment. Then Big Dave Shipperley who had made an impressive first team appearance against Leicester also went down.

Gordon Riddick, who has had a spell at centre-half with Gillingham, took that position for this game. Fortunately Mike Kenning was able to return to the side.

Alan Campbell, who must be in the running for a full Scottish cap on his present form, set up two early chances for Alan Ellis, but desperate tackles by the Birmingham defenders prevented the youngster getting in a shot.

A long throw from Vincent caught our defence unawares, and Tony Hately's header was only inches wide of goal. But we broke away from the period of pressure, when Campbell beat two men and flashed in a drive that shaved the cross bar.

Just before the interval Hateley broke through, but Wright dived at the close range shot to make a brilliant save—and this despite his injury.

INJURED

Cyril Davies was hurt just before the interval, and Keith Peacock substituted for him. As Davies was receiving treatment, Campbell went down and the Scot could only hobble along on the wing after this.

Peacock almost immediately made the goal, the first we have scored away from home this season in a league match. He made a lot of ground on the right and from his cross Kenning's shot was blocked by Hynd. The ball came out to Plumb who with his left foot slammed it past Kelly from 20 yards. What a way to start his career with us! Campbell then limped off.

Birmingham had to come at us, and the nine men and a bravely defied them, fighting for every inch of the ground. Wright, who was hurt again, made a brave save from Hately, but he had no chance in the 71st minute, when Summerill beat him.

Next week we travel to Bolton, who are about half way in the table. We held them to a 1—1 draw in the corresponding fixture last season. Now that we have proved to ourselves that we can score away from the Valley, the lads will be a bit more confident.

The next home fixture is on October 17 when recently relegated Sheffield Wednesday supply the opposition. They were the team that bought to stay up, but too late to save them.

We are proud of our reputation as a sporting side, and we are also proud, too, that there are supporters have come in for praise from British Rail and the coach people.

In the Football League Review, we have been singled out for special mention as having perhaps the best bunch of supporters travelling to away matches. We know that you will be jealous of this honour, too, and will maintain your excellent behaviour.

In conclusion Theo Foley is particularly anxious to express his thanks and the team's thanks for the great encouragement you gave them during the Leicester game. Theo points out that this sort of support really does help the team so please keep up and extend the good work for today's game.





Swindon Town

Swindon's early form has been most disappointing to fans who were looking forward to another promotion drive this season. When the final tables were compiled last April, Swindon were seen to have missed promotion to the First Division by only three points.

Further encouragement for Swindon fans was their showing in the first Anglo-Italian tournament this summer. They reached the final of the 12-club tournament and were awarded the trophy after the final against Napoli in Italy was abandoned because of riots, when they were winning 2—0. This was their second great victory over Italian opponents—last season they defeated AS Roma 5—2 on aggregate in a challenge match between the Italian and English League Cup winners.

With all these triumphs behind them, Swindon were looking for a morale-boosting start to their League programme. But they won only two of their opening eight League games—2—0 over Sunderland and 2—1 against Portsmouth, both at home. They have lost all three away matches: at Sheffield United (1—2), Blackburn (0—1) and Carlisle (1—2).

There's still a long way to go, of course, and time for the Wiltshire men to recover. But, for our part, we're anxious to improve our fine home record against them. Swindon's only League victory here was on their first visit in 9121/22. Our League record against them is:

One of the reasons for Swindon's poor results this season has been their dramatic decline after the interval in most of their games. This is an analysis of their first and second have results up until last Saturday:

The Swindon club was formed in 1881 by a clergyman. They were one of the original members of the Southern League in 1894, later winning the championship on two occasions, and it wasn't long before they won national acclaim. In 1910 they fought their way to the semi-final of the F.A. Cup defeating First Division Spurs (3—2), and two Second Division sides, Burnley (2—0) and the divisional champions-to-be Manchester City (2—0) on thr way before succumbing to the reighning Football League champions, Newcastle United, 0—2 at Tottenham. Two years later they made a second semi-final appearance.

Swindon became members of the Third Division (South) along with all the other Southern League first division sides, in 1920. And they made a flying start to their League career, finishing in fourth place—a position they were unable to improve upon until win-

ning promotion 43 years later!

They moved into Division Two in 1963 with a star-studded team of youngsters, tmany

of whom went on to win fame with bigger clubs.

After only two seasons, Swindon slipped back into the Third Division remaining until 1969 when they won promotion and the Football League Cup in a Wembley game that will long be remembered. Arsenal, their lordly opponents, were well beaten 3—1 after extratime.

The Robins have proved to themselves over the past two years that they have a team capable of meeting the best in England and Italy. Their first priority now is to shake off those early-season blues—and set about getting into the First Division themselves.


