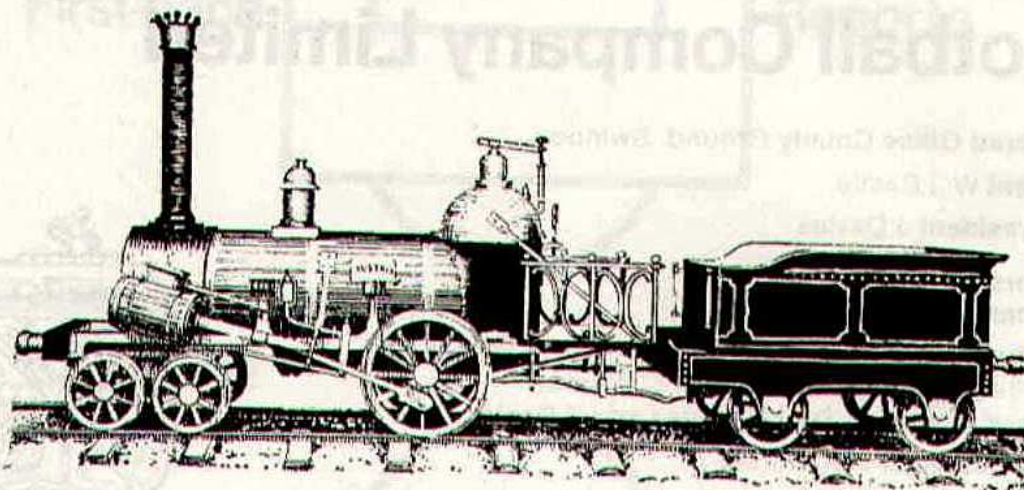

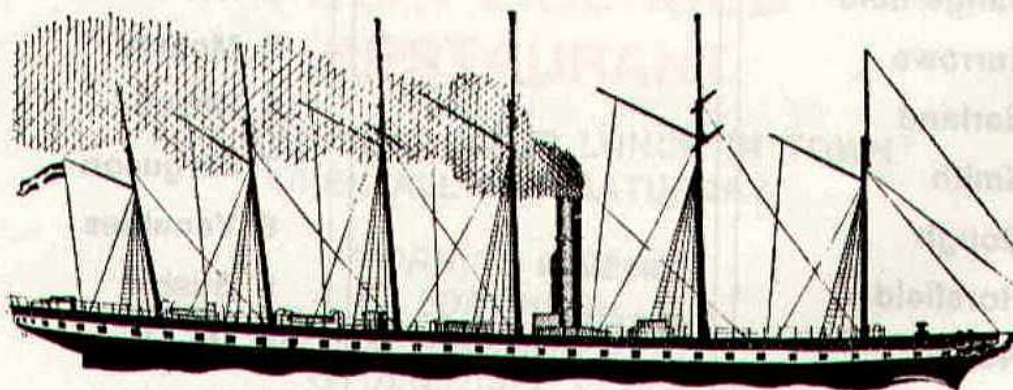

news & views

For the second week running we play a team which accomplished the great feat of going right through from Division 3 to Division 1 in two seasons. Charlton Athletic did just that in the mid-1930's and Queen's Park Rangers in season 1966/67 gained promotion to Division 2 and the following season, 1967/68, went into Division 1. Unfortunately they remained only one season in that Division but have maintained a good position in Division 2. They did of course, like Swindon, win the League Cup in the same season as they won promotion from Division 3, so we have much in common.

Games between the two clubs are invariably hard fought, and last season was no exception. Early in September 1969 we visited Loftus Road and were defeated 0-2, both goals (one a penalty kick), scored by Clarke. The home match was played on 10th January, 1970, when we began to have visions of promotion to Division 1, thus emulating the great feat of our visitors in 1968.

It was a grand, fast, hard fought game on a muddy pitch, no goals resulted, but spectators really enjoyed the match.

The Reserves returned to winning form last Saturday, defeating a very strong Crystal Palace team (many

with Division 1 experience) by two goals to one. It is good to see several of the young players back after injury. Porter and Bailey have been off several weeks, but both brought much life to the team.

Porter seems to increase his speed each game he plays, and that left foot shot! The young goalkeeper improves every game. Swindon are fortunate to be able to retain his services.

The injury list is now very short, and it is good news that Smart is back in training and will soon be doing all that running and chasing. It is amazing how attitudes change in football. Two or three years ago, had we drawn to play Liverpool in any competition, we should have had thousands clamouring for tickets – possibly more than we should have had available. At the time of writing – a couple of days before the game – many tickets are still unsold. When the draw was announced, there was a certain demand, and while there will be a good sized crowd, it would appear, it will not be a capacity gate by any means. Such is the result of success. Once having enjoyed excellent seasons supporters want continued victories, etc. It is not just as easy as that. Football form runs in cycles, and human nature being what it is, cannot go on for ever.

We trust that the team came back to its true form, as victory over Liverpool means we go forward in what is now an outstanding competition – the League Cup. Despite competition from European mid-week games, the League Cup is firmly established, almost on a par with the Football Association Challenge Cup.

Martyn Busby

Signed professional forms during the close season after being an apprentice with Q.P.R. He emerged as a great prospect towards the end of last season, although only 17 years of age possesses tremendous knowledge of the game and is very forceful. Can play either midfield or inside-forward. Made his first team debut away to Leicester in April 1970.

Ian Gillard (Full-back)

Signed as a schoolboy for Tottenham but was released when he wanted to become a professional. After a trial for Fulham he was invited to train at Q.P.R. and signed professional forms in February 1967. Before joining Tottenham he played with the Pathfinders Boys Club at Slough and played for England against Wales in the Boys Club competition, scoring once in England's 3-2 defeat. He made his first team debut at home to Nottingham Forest in 1968 and has made 21 first team appearances up to the end of the 1969/70 season, scoring one goal.

Ron Hunt (Half-back)

After leaving school he joined West Ham but left after 3 months. After a year at college playing as an amateur for Reading, he joined Q.P.R. and turned professional at the age of 17. He played his first senior game in 1965. Since then has made 175 appearances up to the end of the 1969/70 season. Was a member of the League Cup winning team at Wembley.

Mike Ferguson (Forward)

He joined Accrington Stanley in 1961 and was with them until they dropped out of the League in 1962. He made 49 appearances, scoring 2 goals. Blackburn Rovers signed him and he stayed there 6 seasons, playing 250 League games scoring 32 goals. In the summer of 1968 Aston Villa paid £55,000 for him but he only made 38 League appearances, scoring twice. He joined Q.P.R. in 1969 and so far has made 24 appearances up to the end of the 1969/70 season, scoring once.

Tony Hazell (Full-back)

Joined Q.P.R. as a 15-year-old eight seasons ago from High Wycombe. When he was 17 he played for the England Youth against Spain and played for England in the Junior World Cup in Yugoslavia. He made his debut in the first team in 1964. He has played in more games than anyone else in the Club, at the end of the 1969/70 season he had made 231 appearances - scoring 5 times and had played in 66 consecutive matches.

David Clement (Full-back)

Born Battersea. As a schoolboy he played inside-forward for London Schoolboys and then signed apprentice forms for Q.P.R. four seasons ago as a centre-half. In this position he represented England Youth XI in the Junior World Cup in 1966. He played in his first senior game in 1967 at home to Scunthorpe. Up to the end of 1969/70 season he had played 97 games and scored 7 goals - 6 of them last season.

Ian Evans (Half-back)

Born Egham. 18 years of age. 6ft 1in. Signed professional forms in the close season after being an apprentice professional with Q.P.R. Made 24 appearances last season scoring 2 goals.

Mick Leach (Forward)

Born London. 6ft. Played for Walthamstow schoolboys before starting training with West Ham. Joined Q.P.R. at the age of 16 and played for England Youth team. He played his first senior game for Q.P.R. against Colchester in 1965 and scored on his debut. Up to the end of 1969/70 season he had made 113 appearances and scored 26 goals.

Mick McGovern (Half-back)

Age 19. Made his first team debut away to Plymouth at Christmas 1967. Has played a handful of games in the first team whilst at Q.P.R. Still developing, could be a regular of the future.

Vic Mobley (Half-back)

Played as an amateur for Oxford City before moving to Sheffield Wednesday in 1961 at the age of 17. He won 13 Under 23 Caps and was selected for the full England team in 1964 but had to drop out because of injury. After playing 187 League games for Sheffield Wednesday, scoring 7 goals, he signed for Q.P.R. in 1969 for £55,000. In his first season he made 27 appearances.

Alan Wilks (Forward)

Joined Q.P.R. from Chelsea. Scored on his debut against Brighton in 1965 and also holds the Club's goal scoring record with 5 goals in a match against Oxford City in the League Cup in 1967. So far he has made 52 appearances scoring 19 goals.

Ian Morgan (Forward)

The twin brother of Roger Morgan who was transferred to Tottenham. Ian Morgan is 24 and joined Q.P.R. as a junior 8 seasons ago. Up to the end of last season had played 153 games for Q.P.R. and scored 22 goals.

Phil Parkes (Goalkeeper)

One of the Club's close season signings from Walsall. He was highly regarded by many Division 1 clubs and is well in the running for an Under 23 International Cap. 6ft 3in. 14½st. Aged 20.

Rodney Marsh (Forward)

Born London. 6ft. Made his debut for Fulham in 1963 against Aston Villa and made 63 appearances for them scoring 22 goals. Q.P.R. signed him in March 1966 for a fee of £15,000. In 1966/67 he was the highest goalscorer in the country and set up the Q.P.R. goalscoring record of 44 in a season. He has made two appearances for the England Under 23 XI, played 164 games for the Club up to the end of last season and is the third highest scorer in the history of Q.P.R. with 91 goals.

Steve Tom (Defender)

Age 19. Signed full professional forms last season after being an apprentice with the Club. Played 32 games in the Reserve side last season.

Frank Sibley (Half-back)

Joined Q.P.R. at the age of 15 after playing for Middlesex Youth side. He made his debut for the first team at the age of 15 in a League Cup game in 1963. In spite of a series of injuries he had played 145 times for Q.P.R.'s first team by the end of last season, scoring 5 goals.

Alan Spratley (Goalkeeper)

Came to Q.P.R. from the Pathfinders Boys Club at Slough. At the age of 18 he became too old for the youth side so was loaned to Guildford City whilst still training with Q.P.R. After one season with Guildford he became the regular Q.P.R. reserve goalkeeper. Made his debut for the senior side against Aston Villa in the Cup in 1969. So far he has made 29 appearances for the first team.

Terry Venables (Captain)

Joined Chelsea's ground staff at the age of 15. Represented England at Schoolboy, Youth, Amateur, Under 23 and full international levels, the only player ever to do so. In 1966 he went to Tottenham having played 202 League games and scoring 26 goals for Chelsea. With Tottenham he won an F.A. Cup Medal and was with them for three seasons, playing 114 League games and scoring 5 goals. Joined Q.P.R. in the summer of 1969/70, he had played 42 games for Q.P.R. and scored 7 goals.

Ian Watson (Full-back)

Started his professional career with Chelsea but most of his time was spent in the Reserves, he was kept out by Ken Shellito. He played 5 times for Chelsea scoring 1 goal before being transferred to Q.P.R. in 1965. At the end of the 1969/70 season he had played 167 games for Q.P.R. scoring 2 goals, his first one after 130 games for the Club.

Gerry Francis (Forward)

The son of former Brentford player Roy Francis. He is 18 years of age but has made 12 first team appearances for Q.P.R. scoring twice. He had his first appearance for Q.P.R. in 1969 as substitute against Liverpool and scored in his first full game away at Portsmouth.

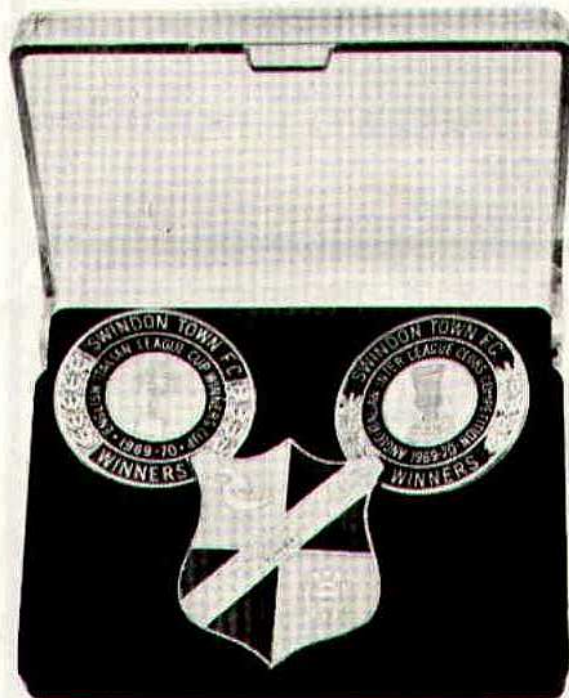


Supporters club notes

The chrome badge reproduces the silver Cup awarded when the English/Italian League Cup Winners Cup was won by beating A.S. Roma 5-2 on aggregate. The gold plated badge gives an excellent reproduction of the £2,000 gold Cup won in the English and Italian Inter League Clubs Competition, when Napoli was beaten in the Final, on their home ground in Naples, by 3-0.
