THE greatest day Swindon football has known is summed up in one picture—on our front cover. Yet it did not make history.

Don Rogers is shown standing alone among the shattered Arsenal defence, his arms raised in triumph.

He had just scored his second goal and moments later Wembley were applauding their magnificent extra time victory in the final of the Football League Cup.

Yet Swindon were following a marked trail. Two years earlier the first Wembley final of this competition had also been won by a Third Division club, Queens Park Rangers.

We mention this in no spirit of belittlement of Swindon, rather to take the chance to recall that Q.P.R. were the most recent of our three victims in this season's League Cup.

It would thrill us to beat another former holder and maybe go on to become the third club from Division III to carry off the trophy.

Apart from the £100,000 plus gate we could expect to share there is also, traditionally, a second honour to go with such a victory.

Both QPR and Swindon completed a double in their League Cup year by also winning promotion to Division II. Rangers indeed went on to climb into the First Division with the help of our team manager Bill Dodgin.

SWINDON are still seeking First Division status but to prove our respect for them we can now mention that they have since achieved something no other club has managed.

Only five months ago they became the first winners of the Anglo-Italian tournament.

Other clubs entered included Wolves, Juventus, West Bromwich Albion, Fiorentina, Roma, Napoli, etc.

Swindon reached the final, based on goal-scoring as well as wins, then tackled a tie against the formidable Napoli . . . in Italy.

What a triumph it was when they succeeded there by 3—0. So many British teams have failed in the Napoli arena and Swindon faced a 50,000 crowd.

In fact the match never finished but because Swindon were leading 3—0 when the crowd invaded the pitch eleven minutes from time, they were awarded the trophy. A wonderfully well-deserved success.

Peter Downsborough (Goalkeeper). Born Halifax. Signed August, 1965, from Halifax Town where he was a local product. Fearless, agile. Regular member of promotion winning side of season 1968/69. Height 5ft. 10½ins. Weight 13st. 2lbs.

Roy Jones (Goalkeeper). Born Clacton-on-Sea. Signed October, 1967, after obtaining his release from the R.A.F. Played in Anglo - Italian Inter - Club Competition winning team 1969/70. Height 5ft. 11ins. Weight 11st, 12lbs.

Owen Dawson (Right Back). Born Hatfield. Signed from Portsmouth June, 1962. Regular first team player until he was unlucky to lose his place through injury. Former Youth International. Regular member of promotion winning side of season 1968/69. Height 5ft. 9½ins. Weight 11st. 12lbs.



Rod Thomas (Full Back). Born Glyncorrwg. Regular Welsh cap. Signed from Gloucester City July, 1964. Height 6ft. Weight 12st. 10lbs.



Joe Butler (Full Back). Born Newcastle. Joined from Newcastle United August, 1965. Tenacity and speed amply make up for his lack of inches. Height 5ft. 7½ ins. Weight 11st.




John Trollope (Left Back). Born Swindon. Chosen for the first team at the start of 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old, and was ever present during that season. Together with his partner that year, who was also 16, they were the youngest full backs ever to appear as a pair in League Football. Height 5ft. 10ins, Weight 11st. 13lbs.

Tony Gough (Half Back). Born Bath. Signed for Bristol Rovers from Bath City at age of 17 and subsequently returned to Bath. Signed from Bath City July, 1970, to return to League football. Height 5ft. 5ins. Weight 10st. 10lb.

Roger Smart (Right Half or Inside Forward). Another local player. At 17 he was appearing regularly at centre forward in the Reserve Team, but he excels as a deep lying inside forward. Height 5ft. 11½ins. Weight 12st. 1lb.

Frank Burrows (Centre Half). Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined from Scunthorpe United for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team. Height 6ft, 1in. Weight 12st, 8lbs.


David Dangerfield (Inside Forward). Born Nailsworth. English Schoolboy International. Signed as a professional 1969. Height 5ft. 8ins. Weight 11st. 2lb.



Stan Harland (Left Half and Captain). Born Liverpool. Signed from Carlisle United July, 1966. Formerly with Everton and Bradford City. Forceful, likes to go forward. Height 6ft, Weight 12st. 5lbs.



Don Rogers (Winger). Born Paulton, He was signed by Swindon when 15. Great match-winner. Gained many England Youth International Caps and subsequently played for England under 23's. Height 5ft. 10ins. Weight 12st. 10lbs.



Peter Noble. (Inside Forward). Born Sunderland. Joined from Newcastle in January, 1968, for whom he played for four years. Prefers an attacking role. Height 5ft. 8ins. Weight 10st. 10lbs.

John Smith (Inside Forward). Born London. Signed from Torquay United in June, 1968, and previously played for Leyton Crient, West Ham United, Tottenham Hotspur and Coventry. England Under-23 International. Height 5ft. 8ins. Weight 13st.

Chris Jones (Centre Forward). Born Altrincham. A hard working centre forward signed from Manchester City. Height 5ft. 11ins. Weight 11st. 12lbs.

John Bailey (Inside Forward). Born Oxford. Joined August, 1966, as an Apprentice Professional and signed as a Professional in August, 1968. A strong player who has appeared in many posi-

tions for the Football Combination side. Height 5ft, 11ins, Weight 12st.

Arthur Horsfield (Inside Forward). A close season signing from his home town club Newcastle United. Previously played for Middlesbrough whom he joined as a Youth International. Top goal scorer last season. Height 5ft. 11ins. Weight 12st. 1lb.

Stephen Peplow (Outside Right). Born Liverpool. Made three first team appearances last season for Liverpool and was a regular member of the team which won the Central League for two consecutive years. Height 5ft. 9ins. Weight 10st. 12lbs.






Ken Coton's picture parade

Editor's note: Glossop North End founded 1890, elected to the League, Division II, in 1898; broke up at the start of the 1914/18 war and were never reformed Dear Sir.

Also during that season the Sec.-Manager J. A. McIntyre came out against supporters' clubs. He wrote in a programme, "I can assure all supporters that whilst I am in charge of affairs at Fulham and have the support of my Chairman, Mr. J. Dean, and his colleagues, there will be no so-called supporters club here. If Fulham F.C. cannot carry on without donations, then it is about time the ground was sold for a wharf or a potato patch."

I have attended all the games with the programmes going back to school-

'So I've been playing my records a lot lately—pop of course—the Beatles, Moody Blues, etc.


'Not that I get much peace at home. How could I with two sisters aged 17 and 15 and a brother of 13.

Approximately 189 miles from Fulham (Compiled by the Royal Automobile Club) Leave by Fulham Palace Road and continue to the junction with the Great West Road. Turn left and proceed to Chiswick Flyover ... 4 miles Proceed west by the M.4 for five miles then by the A.30 via Staines By-Pass and the Basingstoke By-pass to the



junction with the A.303 ... 59 miles Continue by the A.303 via Andover, Amesbury, Wincanton and Ilminster. Rejoin the A.30 and proceed via Honiton By-Pass to Exeter By-Pass

167 miles

Turn left and follow the A.38 then the A.380 via Newton Abbot to Torquay

189 miles

Enter Torquay by the Newton Road (A.380) and turn left into Old Woods Hill. Continue ahead by Cricket Field Road to the junction with Teignmouth Road. Turn left and continue to the junction with Westhill Road (B.3198). Turn right into Westhill Road and ahead to Warbro Road and the ground is on your right. The RAC has sign-posted the route to the ground.


