news Eviews

It is with real pleasure we welcome to Swindon this afternoon, one of the finest clubs in the country. It is always the highlight of the season to visit St. Andrew's, the home of Birmingham City, one of the very best equipped grounds of any League club, and well worthy of First Division status. The hospitality extended to all visitors is outstanding, and thoroughly enjoyed.

During the past four seasons Birmingham have suffered several setbacks, but we are sure, knowing the members of the Board as we do, they will face up to their problems, and overcome them. We should very much like to greet the 'grand old man' of football, Mr. D. F. Wiseman, Vice-Chairman of Birmingham and senior member of the Football Association. You have often heard his voice in connection with the draw for the F.A. Challenge Cup competition. His son, Mr. J. F. Wiseman, has also been a Director of Birmingham City for many years. These two are real stalwarts in the cause of football. It would be a sad day indeed if the name of Wiseman did not appear on the Birmingham Board of Directors.

Birmingham produce one of the outstanding programmes in the football world. It is in fact termed the 'Official Magazine', and it certainly lives up to that name — full of information and photographs, and well set out on good class paper.

Last season we were defeated 0-2 at St. Andrews, but won the home fixture, played on Tuesday, 31st March, 1970 by 4-1. It was a grand game, played with plenty of spirit, but in the right manner. Fast and open, with plenty of incident. Although Swindon played well, and scored some excellent goals, the score line was rather flattering. Scorers for Swindon were Butler, Horsfield, and Rogers 2 (one penalty); Summerill scored from a penalty for Birmingham. A fine crowd of 20,597 watched a most enjoyable game.

This season we played at Birmingham on 31st October, 1970 and lost 1-2. The winning goal was scored in the last minute of the game. Birmingham scored first, but Noble equalised half-way through the second half. Since Christmas Birmingham have enjoyed a fine run of success and taken 15 points from the last nine games - championship form. They are now two places below Swindon, with two points less from the same number of games - namely 29. Swindon have scored 44 goals and Birmingham 42, so this afternoon's game seems likely to provide goals. It should be a most entertaining match and keenly contested as both clubs feel they have an outside chance of promotion. Birmingham have won 3 and drawn 3 of their away games.

So our neighbours Oxford did not quite make the next round of the Cup. We are sorry, but what problems would they have faced had they met Arsenal at Oxford. Our game against them last Saturday was much brighter than the usual dour 'derby' struggle. Swindon's team was undoubtedly out to make this a victory, and break the shackles of defence. This they did, but Oxford fought very hard, despite the fact that some of their players were feeling the effects of the Cup replay. Let us not however take the praise from our team, who gave a fine display and might easily have scored more goals. Certainly it was a game enjoyed by over 17,000 spectators, many of whom stood in the pouring rain - real supporters those.

Another gratifying feature was the lack of any incidents in the crowd, so frequent in local matches. A great tribute to the Police, and the distribution of the various groups of supporters.

Our memories go back to two years ago, and that memorable League Cup victory over Arsenal. Many of our thoughts will be with Aston Villa. Can they repeat the success of two Division 3 teams – Q.P.R. and Swindon? They face a difficult task, but with the encouragement of two previous results in favour of a lower club.

Colin Green

Born Brymbo, near Wrexham and played in Wrexham Boys with Hennessy. Upon joining Everton ground staff he switched from left-half to full-back and made his Division 1 debut at Blackpool on 3rd September, 1960 – facing Sir Stanley Matthews. Joined Blues on 12th December, 1962 making his first appearance against Tottenham at St. Andrews on the 15th.

Bob Latchford

Local boy who played for South Birmingham Schools and Warwickshire County before joining elder brother Dave at St. Andrews as an apprentice in May 1967. Became a professional in August 1968 and made his first team League debut at centre-forward against Preston on 21st March, 1969.

Phil Summerill

Discovered on Aston Villa's doorstep playing for Aston Schoolboys. A left-winger who was taken on to the professional staff on 7th December, 1964 after a spell as an apprentice. Member of the England Youth Party – Yugoslavia 1966. League debut was at St. Andrews against Carlisle on 18th March, 1967.

Mike Kelly

London-born, was very successful as an amateur playing for Surrey F.A. Youth team and Wimbledon in the Isthmian League. Won an Amateur Cup winner's medal and was capped for England in 1965.

Dave Latchford

Elder brother of Bob Latchford was discovered playing for South Birmingham Schools and joined Blues as an apprentice in May 1966. Member of England party in European Youth Tournament played in Turkey in 1967.

Ray Martin

Joined Villa as an apprentice from South East Staffordshire Boys but was released at the end of 1960/61 season. After a trial he joined Blues apprentices and became a full-time professional in May 1962.

Roger Hynd

Born Falkirk and joined Glasgow Rangers from Lanark Grammar School. Spent 10 years at Ibrox Park and transferred to Crystal Palace on 21st June, 1969. Made a total of 39 appearances for Palace last season and joined Blues on 28th July, 1970.

Garry Pendrey

Former Aston Schools player who joined the Blues as an apprentice and signed professional on 13th October, 1966. Was a member of the successful youth side who reached the F.A. Youth Cup Final in 1966/67. First team debut was against Bolton 25th March, 1969.

Dave Robinson

Signed professional in May 1966. Made his debut at centre-half versus Aston Villa in September 1968 and has retained the position making 34 appearances last season.

Geoff Vowden

Hails from Jersey and was one of a number of Channel Islanders recommended to and signed by Nottingham Forest. Spent four seasons with Forest before being transferred to Blues 23rd October, 1964.

Bobby Thomson

Smethwick-born, made his debut for Wolverhampton Wanderers in the F.A. Cup versus West Bromwich Albion. Was selected for the England Under-23's whom he later captained and gained 8 full England caps. Joined Birmingham City in March 1969.

Malcolm Beard

Born at Cannock. Started soccer at St. Chad's Junior School. Played for Cannock Boys, Staffs County F.A. and Birmingham County F.A., joining the St. Andrews ground staff on the 6th May, 1957.

John Vincent

Born West Bromwich. Yet another of many former Brierley Hill schoolboys who have found their way to St. Andrews. Won a Football Combination place when only 16 and turned professional on 11th February, 1964.

History of Birmingham City Football Club

The Club was formed as Small Heath Alliance in 1875, and played its first match on the Muntz Street Ground in 1877. Professionalism was adopted in 1885 and the name of the Club changed to Small Heath F.C. Ltd. in 1888. This was a milestone in football history, as Small Heath F.C. were the first football club to be a Limited Liability Company. In 1892/93 they joined the Second Division of the Football League in the first year of its formation and became holders of the Second Division Championship Shield – but lost the Test Match for promotion.

In 1893/94 the Club were runners-up in the Second Division Championship. This time the Test Match was won, and promotion was gained to the First Division. Two seasons later they were relegated. In 1900/01 and 1901/02 the exact procedure was repeated. Once again promotion followed to Division One in 1902/03.

In 1905 the Club changed its name to Birmingham Football Club Ltd., and the following year the St. Andrews Ground was opened – the first match resulted in a 0-0 draw against Middlesbrough on Boxing Day. One season later the Club was again relegated to the Second Division and were promoted once again. The Club reached the F.A. Cup Final in 1931, but were defeated 2-1 by neighbours West Bromwich Albion F.C.

After 18 consecutive seasons in the First Division the Club were relegated in 1938/39 prior to World War II. During this season the record attendance at St. Andrews was attained, on 11th February, 1939, against Everton in the F.A. Cup – 66,844 people were present. Harry Hibbs, Birmingham's international goalkeeper, was the first professional player to receive a war-time Benefit from a football club. This event took place in 1940, on the completion of Hibbs' career.

The first international match to be played on the St. Andrews ground resulted in a win for England 2-1 over Wales on October 15th, 1941. On Wednesday, January 21st the following year, the Grandstand and dressing rooms were destroyed by fire.

The present name of the Club – Birmingham City Football Club Ltd. – was adopted in 1945 and remains to date. The Club won the Football League (South) Championship in 1945/46 season and reached the Semi-Final of the F.A. Cup the same year, losing to Derby County after a replay.

Birmingham City were promoted to Division One in season 1954/55, winning the Championship of the Second Divi-Division of the Football League in the Club's best ever performance in the First Division when sixth position in the League was attained and the Club again reached the Final of the F.A. Cup, only to be defeated by Manchester City 3-1.

During the same year a new Competition was formed in Switzerland in conjunction with F.I.F.A., namely the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup Competition. As Birmingham holds an Industrial Fair the town was asked to supply a team to enter this competition. Birmingham City F.C. undertook this job and remained in the Competition until 1962. The Club reached the Final in 1960, but were defeated by the great Barcelona (Spain) after two games on aggregate 4-1. Birmingham City were again in the Final in 1961 and their opponents were Roma F.C. (Italy), but lost on the aggregate of two games 4-2. In 1962/63 Birmingham City won the Final of the Football League Cup, defeating Aston Villa after two games on aggregate 3-1.

Relegation to the Second Division followed in season 1964/65.

In 1967/68 the Club reached the Semi-Finals of the F.A. Cup, playing West Bromwich at Villa Park, but lost 2–0. Birmingham reached this position by beating Halifax away, Orient at home, drawing with Arsenal away and winning the replay, and winning the game versus Chelsea at St. Andrews. During the following close season the Club were engaged in a tour of Switzerland.

The following season, 1968/69, the Club reached the 5th Round of the F.A. Cup. Birmingham won at home versus Lincoln City, drew in the away game versus Sheffield Wednesday and won the replay, drew at home versus Manchester United, but lost the replay at Manchester.







GREAT BRITAIN v BULGARIA
