

news Eviews

To date we have played three League games - one win, one draw, one defeat. Three matches, three points, a good average for two away and one home. Maybe the start of the season has not been so auspicious as we hoped, but as mentioned in the first programme our opening ten fixtures were very difficult. Even before today's game we have played yet another away from home, namely at Watford last Wednesday. This afternoon we face a team right bang in form as instanced by their resounding win at Fulham on Tuesday.

Football is undoubtedly hitting the headlines, with the controversy on the directive to referees and the enforcement of certain rules. Much has been written and spoken (some comments have been quite absurd). Both managements and players are rather divided in their opinions, but one feels that once the whole business has settled down and reached its right proportions it will be for the good of the game as a spectacle. Certainly it will be pleasant to see such things as players standing at least ten yards from the ball for free kicks, and surely the stopping of protesting is applauded. I read one comment where it stated: 'Players will now have to rely more on skill and ability'. That must be right, in fact several managers have spoken in that vein, and many seem to think the strict enforcement of all rules will produce more goals. That must help. Despite the fact that spectators want, in fact demand, success, they still like to see

goals scored. One has got to be realistic as attendances are dropping, especially in Division II.

Many factors have a bearing on attendances: one, the present position in industry; two, the higher prices charged for admittance; and three, what is so called 'Soccer hooliganism'. I certainly think the latter has a bearing on attendances at certain games, but I can never agree it is the result of what happens on the field. It begins on the trains and buses, and in the towns and on the terraces long before the games begin. It is a problem which must be overcome; and here possibly the best way of coping with it at the matches is the provision of many more seats, so that spectators are not so tightly packed and everyone can see what his neighbour is doing.

The opening of the new stand, with almost 5,000 seats, is going to prove most helpful in that respect, as well as providing a wonderful view of the game.

Queen's Park Rangers visited the County Ground last season on 10th October, 1970. Swindon won by the only goal (Horsfield) scored, but were defeated at Shepherds' Bush on 17th April, 1971 by 4 goals to 2, so honours were fairly even. But today's game will be very close indeed.

It is good to see our near neighbours, Reading and Bristol City, obtaining such good results. Bristol at present occupy top position, and are on the crest of the wave. If this continues, the gate on 2nd October promises to be a bumper one. We were sorry to see the departure of Mr. Bert Bush, Secretary of that club for the past fifteen years. A very kind, helpful man to all concerned. The type of person professional

soccer can ill-afford to lose. Nevertheless, the amateur side of the game will gain, as he is now the Secretary of Dorset Football Association. We wish him well.

I read an article in a Gloucestershire paper written by a reporter on Swindon Town, its fixtures and prospects. He was very kind, but the part which interested me most was when he recalled his early visits to the County Ground by train and the enjoyment he got from seeing Swindon win. On his first visit he saw Swindon defeat Aldershot by seven goals to nil (the days of the Stephens brothers, Ithell, Lunn, Boulton, etc.).

He then continues to say 'It is difficult to equate those days with the present, but the feeling must be that Town have really had to toil for and earn the place they now hold and they will have to toil further to improve it still more. The hardest task has been shrugging off the old Division 3 (South) image – though do not let us decry the loyal efforts and services of those concerned'.

How right he is - the 'fifties especially were times of sweat, toil and stress. There is still much to be done, but Swindon Town is now established as a team with sound Division II status, and a club with ambitions for the future.

It is hoped you will still enjoy the new style programme. You will no doubt notice the teams are printed on the front cover, so one can see at a glance the name of a certain player. Also the photograph reproduced is a new one each week, although possibly not as attractive as the previous coloured covers of programmes.

### our visitors

Q.P.R.

#### **Phil Parkes**

Only 21 years of age, was one of Q.P.R.'s close season signings last year. A very promising goalkeeper with prospects of an Under-23 international cap, he has made 44 consecutive appearances for Q.P.R.

#### **Barry Salvage**

Joined Q.P.R. on a free transfer from Millwall towards the end of last season. Made three first team appearances as a winger but has yet to score. Played for Fulham prior to joining Millwall.

#### Frank Saul

A former youth international, he started his career with Tottenham Hotspur in 1960/61. He made 112 League appearances and scored 37 goals, before being transferred to Southampton in 1967. He made 46 appearances for them scoring twice, before signing for Q.P.R. during the close season last year. He has made 23 appearances for Q.P.R. so far and has scored twice.

#### Frank Sibley

Joined Q.P.R. at the age of 15 after playing for the Middlesex youth team. He made his debut for Q.P.R. against Aldershot at the age of 15 in the League Cup in 1963. In spite of injuries he has made 168 appearances and has scored five times, mostly at wing-half and inside forward.

### **Alan Spratley**

Age 22, he joined Q.P.R. from Pathfinders Boys Club four seasons ago. Has been kept out of the first team by Phil Parkes, but has made 30 first team appearances.



#### **Rodney Marsh**

Made his debut for Fulham in 1963 against Aston Villa, and made 63 appearances for them scoring 22 goals. In March 1966, Q.P.R. signed him for a fee of £15,000. In 1966/67 he was the highest goalscorer in the country. establishing a club record of 44 goals. He has made two appearances for the England Under-23 XI, and scored on both occasions. In spite of injuries, which have kept him out of Q.P.R.'s team for long periods, he has made 206 appearances so far and has scored 114 goals. He is the third highest goalscorer for Q.P.R. in 86 years of football. He is 26 years of age.

### lan Morgan

Is 25 years old, and the twin brother of Roger Morgan who plays for Tottenham. He joined Q.P.R. as a junior nine seasons ago. Plays on the wing or at inside-forward, and has so far made 171 appearances and scored 25 goals.

### **Terry Venables**

Joined the ground staff of Chelsea at the age of 15. He has represented England at schoolboy, youth, amateur, Under-23, and full international level. the only player ever to do so. He made 202 appearances with Chelsea before being transferred to Tottenham in 1966. He won an F.A. Cup medal with them, and was with them for three seasons making 114 appearances and scoring five goals. He joined Q.P.R. in the summer of 1969 for a record fee of £80,000. Aged 28, he has made 83 appearances for Q.P.R. and has scored 18 goals, mostly from the penalty spot. He plays wing-half or inside-forward.

#### Mike Ferguson

Aged 28, has been playing League football for over 12 seasons. He started as an amateur with Plymouth, before moving to Accrington Stanley. He made 49 appearances for them before they dropped out of the League. Blackburn Rovers signed him, and he made 220 League appearances for them, scoring 30 goals. After six seasons he was transferred to Aston Villa for £55,000, but after only 38 appearances he was bought by Q.P.R. in November 1969 for £11,500. He has made 56 appearances so far, and has scored twice.

#### **Gerry Francis**

Aged 19, he has already made 52 appearances for Q.P.R. and has scored 7 goals. He made his first appearance for Q.P.R. against Liverpool as a substitute in 1969, and scored in his first full match, away to Portsmouth the following season.

#### Ian Gillard

Was with Tottenham Hotspur as a schoolboy, before joining Q.P.R. four seasons ago. He is now 20 years old and has made 43 appearances for Q.P.R., scoring one goal from the full-back position. He made his debut against Nottingham Forest in 1968.

#### **Dave Clement**

Born at Battersea, and played for London Schoolboys at inside-forward. He signed apprentice forms for Q.P.R. five seasons ago as a centre-half. In this position he played for the England Youth XI in the Junior World Cup in 1966 against Italy and France. He made his debut in April 1967 against Scunthorpe United and, at the age of 23, has played 142 times and scored 10 goals, mostly in the role of attacking full-back.

### our visitors continued

#### Mike Leach

Played for Walthamstow schoolboys before starting training with West Ham. He joined Q.P.R. at the age of 16, and played for the England Youth Team in 1962/63. He played his first senior game for Q.P.R. against Colchester in 1965, and scored on his debut. He is now aged 24 and has played 140 games for Q.P.R. as a forward and has scored 32 goals. He was the leading goalscorer in Q.P.R.'s one season in the First Division with eight goals to his credit.

#### Ian Watson

After making only five first team appearances with Chelsea, he was signed by Q.P.R. for £10,000 in 1965. He has been a fairly regular member of the side as full-back and centre-half. He has made 187 appearances and has scored twice. He is 27 years old.

#### **Tony Hazell**


Joined Q.P.R. as a 15-year-old nine seasons ago from High Wycombe. When he was 17, he played for the England Youth Team against Spain, and for England in the Junior World Cup in Yugoslavia. He made his debut for Q.P.R. in 1964, and has played more games for Q.P.R. than any other current player. So far he has made 270 appearances and scored five times. He is a wing-half or full-back.

#### Ron Hunt

After leaving school he joined West Ham, but left after three months. He spent a year at College, and played as an amateur for Reading. He then joined Q.P.R. and turned professional at the age of 17. He played his first senior game in 1965, and in spite of many injuries has made 205 appearances for Q.P.R. mostly at centre-half, scoring once.



(1) A powerful drive by Stan Harland is cautiously palmed down by goal-keeper Bellotti.






