

MATCH SCENE

During the close season Swindon made an excellent signing in the form of Dave Mackay. The old Spurs warhorse was released at the end of last season by Derby County — for whom he had performed wonders during the time he was there.

He was signed when the Rams were struggling at the wrong end of the Second Division table and he left them when they were in ninth position in Division One. However, when Colin Todd and Terry Hennessey had settled into the Derby style of play and were, indeed, playing wonderfully well, Mackay decided it was time to move on to pastures new. He was still playing as well as ever, but he felt it wrong to stand in the way of a younger professional, especially when he could still give a Club, like Swindon, two or three years service by dropping down a division.

Ironically, Dave Mackay completed 42 League games in a season for the first time last season during his long and distinguished career.

Other personalities in the Wiltshire side include local lads **Peter Noble** — born in Sunderland — and **Arthur Horsfield** the former Middlesbrough player.

Swindon, over the past few years, have been THE giant-killers in Cup Competitions. They shocked the soccer world two years ago by beating the mighty Arsenal 3—1 in the League Cup Final with Don Rogers having a superb game. One year later they won the Anglo-Italian Trophy. They shocked the pundits and made the "experts" stare in disbelief. Tiny Swindon had done it again!



Unfortunately, for most of the spectators at the Final against Naples, the match had to be abandoned when a lunitic fringe of the 50,000 crowd started a riot.

However, Swindon were awarded the trophy they had fought so hard for, even though only 79 minutes play had been possible!

Last season Swindon finished just above

ourselves on goal average.

Manager Fred Ford, who succeeded Danny Williams when he moved to Hillsborough to take over the Sheffield Wednesday managership, has remained loyal to the nucleus of the side that won promotion and the League Cup double in 1969. He reasons that this set have proved themselves over a long period and they deserve the chance of trying to give Wiltshire First Division football.

One of today's most interesting battles on the field will be between **Bobby Kerr**, who has been in such excellent form lately and **Peter Noble**, who compete in midfield.

PERSONALITY PROFILE DENNIS TUEART

Ever happy Dennis Tueart is another of our bright young stars that we brought to Roker Park from Newcastle. Dennis came to Sunderland as an amateur from Manor Park School in Newcastle.

He was another avid supporter of the Magpies — like today's reserves personality, Keith Coleman — but again Dennis preferred to come to Wearside. He first signed for the club, as an amateur, in June 1965 and signed full professional forms a year later Dennis says: "I only came to Roker Park because it was the only Club that would have me! but seriously, I was so impressed with the youth set-up here that I couldn't go anywhere else.

"It was great to play in such a talented youth team as when we won the F.A. Youth Cup by beating West Bromwich Albion. The run we had in the competition was fantastic and I shall always remember the quarter-final game we played against Manchester United when we won 2—1. I had a particularly good game that night — that's why I remember it — making one goal and scoring another."

Dennis first came to Roker as a promising inside-forward, but was switched to the wingers position by the then Sunderland Manager, Ian McColl. "I think I am more benefit to the side playing on the wing than inside," adds Dennis. "Although I don't see as much of the ball on the wing I enjoy it more. Some people reckon the game I played against Orient was my best ever for the Club, if it was, then fair enough, but I think I can play better!"

Since coming into the first team Dennis reckons that Peter Storey of Arsenal is the hardest defender he is likely to come up against, while he has tremendous admiration for the Everton inside-forward, Alan Ball. "He is one of the best midfield players in the country and he is so professional at his job." says Dennis.

As part of the Tueart keep fit plan, Dennis plays a lot of sports. In the summer he plays cricket for Whitburn — a canny all rounder, so he tells me! — and he also plays a lot of squash. While he keeps a strict watch on his weight by eating plenty of salads.

Must be one of the fittest wingers around!

local football. A fearless agile player who has
done much to strengthen the Towns defence.
Regular member of promotion winning side
of Season 1968/69, played in Football League
Cup Final winning team of Season 1968/69.
Played in League Cup Winners Cup winning
team of 1969.

JOHN TROLLOPE (left-back): Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon Ground Staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old, and was ever present during that season. Together with his partner that year, who was also 16, they were the youngest full backs ever to appear as a pair in League Football. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning Team of 1968/69.

OWEN DAWSON (right-back): Born Hatfield. Joined the Club from Portsmouth in June 1962. He was a regular first team player until he was unlucky to lose his place through injury. A fast tenacious player, he was a former Youth International. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69.

ROD THOMAS (full-back): Born Glyncorrwg. A former youth player with the Wiltshire Club. He was signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Has gained Welsh Under 23 Caps and Full Welsh Caps. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final Winning Team of Season 1968/69.


JOE BUTLER (full-back): Born Newcastle, Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the Swindon Junior Team. A tenacious player whose speed and ability amply make up for his lack of inches. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69.

DAVE MACKAY (defender): Born Edinburgh. He commenced his professional career with the Scottish Club Hearts in 1951. Was subsequently transferred to Tottenham Hotspur in 1953 and left them to join Derby in Season 1967/68. He was capped 26 times for Scotland and is the holder of a Scottish League Cup Winners medal, the Scottish Football Association Cup Winners medal and the England Football Association Cup Winners medal. In addition he is also the possessor of a European Cup Winners medal which he obtained with Tottenham. He is probably the only player who has played both for the Scottish League Team and also the English Football League Team. Signed by Swindon in May 1971. His experience and ability is expected to do much for the Town in their quest for First Division status.

FRANK BURROWS (centre-half): Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the Club from Scunthorpe United for whom he played 3 seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning team of 1969/69.

CHRIS JONES (centre-forward): Born Altrincham. A hard working centre forward signed from Manchester City. Played in Anglo-Italian Inter Club Competition Winning Team Season 1969/70.

Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning Team of Season 1968/69.

ROGER SMART (inside-forward): Born Swindon. Another local player who joined the Club direct from Swindon Schoolboys Team. At 17 he was appearing regularly at centre-forward in the Reserve Team, but he excels as a deep lying inside forward. A versatile player who is able to play at wing-half. PETER NOBLE (inside-forward): Born Sunderland. Joined the Club from Newcastle in January 1968 from whom he played for four years. Prefers to play an attacking role. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final Winning Team of Season 1968/69.

DON ROGERS (outside-left): Born Paulton. He was signed by Swindon when only 15 and quickly came to the fore. Gained many England Youth International Caps and subsequently played in the England under 23 International Team. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69.






