Today we are in the midst of three home games in a row. There can be no disputing that of the three this afternoon's against Swindon Town is the most important.

We make no secret of the fact that as far as we are concerned the Second Division means more than the Cup competitions, nice as it is to make progress in the knock-out events.

A fortnight ago we defeated Sheffield Wednesday 3-2 with two late goals which transformed the game. Swindon arrive today as our fourth League guests of the season.

Our home record shows one win and two draws. Team manager Mr. Jimmy Scoular and the players will be satisfied with nothing less than another home win today.

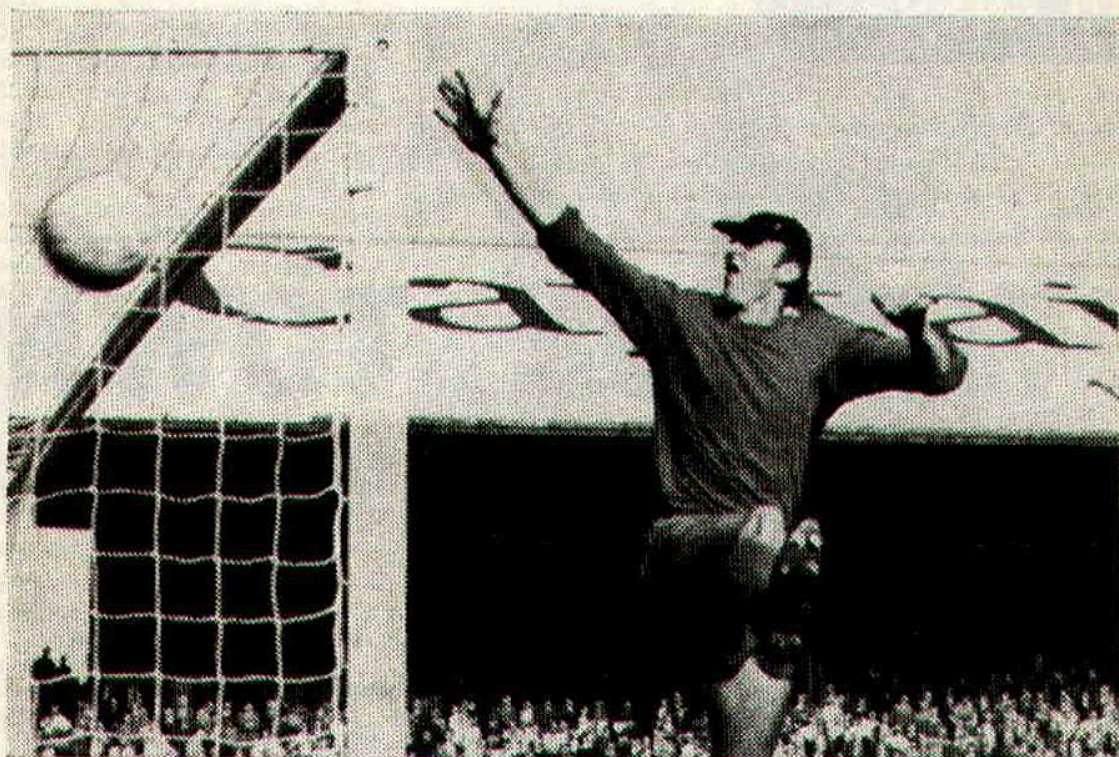
It will not be easy. Indeed no match these days is easy in the Second Division, proof of how intense the competition is throughout the Football League.

Swindon have recruited Dave Mackay from Derby since they were here last, on Boxing Day 1970 when their goalkeeper Peter Downsbrough performed wonders and helped his team draw 1-1. It was the match in which Alan Warboys played for City for the first time.

Pressure of print deadlines prevents us from passing any comment on Wednesday's Football League Cup replay against West Ham United. But we can mention next Wednesday's attractive game, the European Cup-winners' Cup return match with Dynamo Berlin of East Germany.

BOB KEEPS THE CANARIES OUT!

TEN YEARS AGO ASTON VILLA were in the First Division. They had two goalkeepers who came to them from Wolves — Geoff Sidebottom and Nigel Sims. Their third goalkeeper was a local lad called Bob Wilson.

Unable to win permanent selection with Villa, Bob came to Cardiff City for a transfer fee of £2,500 and proved himself to be a bargain buy.

HELPING

Making his City debut in August 1964, Bob appeared in 40 of the 42 Second Division games and played his part in helping the club keep one of the best defensive records that season.

All told, Wilson played in 148 matches. The one from which he was photographed in action above was that against Norwich City's Canaries at Ninian Park on Saturday, September 9, 1967.

FLYING

Wilson, flying across to protect his goal and see that a Norwich shot goes outside the net, is currently with Exeter City in the Fourth Division. Last season he missed only six of the Devon club's games.

Against Norwich in our flashback match Wilson was beaten only once. City won the match 3-1 with goals from Peter King, Bobby Brown and Barrie Jones.

Both teams have changed much since that afternoon four years ago. Peter King and Don Murray are still with City and Kevin Keelan still with Norwich.

Other Norwich players, such as Hugh Curran and Tommy Bryceland, have long since departed to new clubs. Left winger Mike Kenning has returned to Charlton Athletic although wing half David Stringer is still with the Norwich club.

SWINDON TOWN

The second round of the Football League Cup a fortnight ago offered a few startling results. None was more surprising than that from Layer Road where Colchester United of the Fourth Division showed no respect for the 1969 trophy winners, reaching out over two Divisions to win 4-1.

Perhaps it was the size of the defeat which caused so many eyebrows to be raised in surprise. Swindon Town, after all, are a club with a great Football League Cup tradition which tended to emphasise the Colchester success.

Their swift elimination from the first Cup competition of the season crowned a rather unimpressive beginning to the season by Swindon whose great difficulty appears to be their inability to win sufficient away matches.

... At home, they are one of the most formidable teams in the country. Away, however, they lose a lot more than they win — a point proved by last season's playing statistics.

EXPERIENCED WARRIOR MACKAY

Swindon lost only two of their 21 home games. Only Sheffield United, runners-up to Leicester, lost fewer at home. But outside the County Ground, Swindon won only three times although in each of the last two seasons they have drawn at Ninian Park.

The one major change from last season has been the arrival of Dave Mackay. As an experienced 'warrior' he has few peers in the modern game, a strong Scot who figured so prominently in Derby County's revival which began with their winning of the Second Division title in 1969.

Mackay, a success with Hearts and a member of the wonderful double-winning Spurs, got success everywhere he went. When Swindon signed him at the end of last season they did so in the belief that the Mackay magic would rub off on them.

The season did not start well. At Bloomfield Road, Blackpool defeated Swindon 4-1 and it was clear that a lot of hard work lay ahead for team manager Fred Ford who joined Swindon after Danny Williams had gone back to his native Yorkshire to start his brief spell as manager of Sheffield Wednesday.

WONDERFUL DOWNSBOROUGH

Mackay may be the most senior Swindon player but he is not the only experienced member of the staff. Norman Trollope, Don Rogers and Roger Smart are seasoned professionals and Rod Thomas is a Welsh international full back of some stature.

Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough had a wonderful match here on Boxing Day when Swindon drew 1-1. Peter Noble and Arthur Horsfield form Swindon's main striking force, both score a lot of goals and both are from the North-east.

Among the younger brigade is Chris Porter. A year or so ago he was playing for the Somerset club Bridgwater Town. Last season he began with such promise that he was promptly talked of as a second Don Rogers.

If Porter can help Swindon improve their away form — and there never seems to be anything wrong with the team when they play us! — then Swindon fans should have plenty to shout about this season.

Rogers — Swindon's Great Match-winner

DON ROGERS IS SWINDON TOWN'S most famous player. The left winger who has been capped as an England Under 23 but who has not yet made it to the full England team could break all records at the County Ground if he stays with the Wiltshire club throughout his career.

While such well-known players as Mike Summerbee and Ernie Hunt have gone north and to the Midlands to make their names, Rogers has made his, off the beaten track with a club which has never competed in the First Division.

Rogers, however, has had his share of the limelight, as much perhaps as Manchester City's Summerbee or Coventry's Hunt, or come to think of it, any ex-Swindon player.

He has figured in promotion teams from the Third Division to the Second. He has helped his club win the Anglo-Italian Cup two years ago, in the very first time it was competed for.

LEAGUE CUP GLORY

But the greatest achievement for Swindon and Rogers was the unforgettable Football League Cup final win over Arsenal at Wembley Stadium in March 1969.

Then a Third Division club, Swindon emulated the performance two years earlier of Queen's Park Rangers, the first team from the Third Division to win the trophy.

Rogers played a match-winning part in the slaying of Arsenal. He scored two of the goals in a thrilling 3-1 extra-time victory, a result which stunned most of the football world outside Wiltshire.

In time Rogers seems destined to break most records at Swindon. He has scored nearly 140 League goals already and at the current rate of progress the Swindon record of 204 by Ron Collins is not an impossible target.

Nor is the 443 game total of Dave Lewis, who between 1947 and 1959 played more matches than any other Swindon player. So far, Rogers's League total is around the 350 mark.

NO CITY WIN

● City have not won any of the four previous matches against Swindon since the club's promotion in 1969. Swindon have won one and drawn three of the League games against us in the two seasons since their elevation.

Today's match is the 27th between the clubs in the Football League and the full record (from City's viewpoint) is as follows:

GIBSON GOAL MEANS CITY SHARE RECORD

CARDIFF CITY NEED ONE GOAL NEXT WEDNESDAY NIGHT TO BECOME THE HIGHEST SCORING CLUB IN THE HISTORY OF THE EUROPEAN CUP-WINNERS' CUP COMPETITION. IAN GIBSON'S GOAL LATE IN THE SECOND HALF IN EAST BERLIN LAST WEEK EQUALLED THE RECORD WHICH IS HELD BY ATLETICO MADRID OF SPAIN.

Our records show that the Madrid side scored 52 goals in the Cup-winners' Cup. Gibson's goal in the 1-1 draw against Dynamo Berlin was our 52nd in the tournament.

It will be fitting indeed if we can break the record on our own ground but it will not be easy against Dynamo who fought back in the first leg to snatch a draw with the last shot of the match, bringing a goal for their centre forward, Schutze.

Incidentally, the result was the fourth away 1-1 draw for City. They drew by the same score against Shamrock Rovers at Dalymount Park in September 1967, against NAC Breda in Eindhoven two months later, and against SV Hamburg in West Germany on April 24, 1968.

A total of 19 players have scored for City since the first match in the Cup-winners' Cup, which was against Esbjerg in Denmark on September 9, 1964.

The full list of goal-scorers is printed below. City's record win in Europe is 8-0, against P.O.L. of Cyprus last September.

Interesting to point out that of those 19 players, 13 have since left the playing staff. They are Toshack (*Liverpool*), Dean (*Barnsley*), Allan (*Bristol Rovers*), Bird (*Crewe Alexandra*), Williams (*Bolton Wanderers*), Johnston (*Fulham*), Clarke (*Hartlepool United*), Harris (*Newport County*) and Lea (*Barnsley*).

Brown and Jones were both forced to make premature retirements from the game following serious injury. Farrell left the club to join Bury but, more recently he was reported to have gone to South Africa. Tapscott appeared last season for Carmarthen Town in the Welsh League.



A double dose of the Best!

GEORGE BEST is an Irishman — **CLYDE BEST** a Bermudan. One plays for a northern club, the other for a team from the east end of London. They have one thing in common season. And that is they have both been scoring goals at a high rate.
