news & views

This afternoon we play our tenth game of the season, and only our fourth home match. It is rather appropriate after two difficult away games we meet our near neighbours, Bristol City, in what promises to be a real 'derby match'. They have made a wonderful start to the season, after transferring one of their players. Incidentally, talking about transfers, we prefer, at least for the time being not to comment on recent events. It does however seem rather futile to speak of loyalty, either amongst clubs, players or spectators.

Games between Swindon and Bristol City have always been very closely contested, and today's match must fall into that category. Last season Swindon won 2–1 at home on 7th November, 1970, but lost away 1–2 on 20th March, 1971, so we finished all square.

The home match was a scrappy affair, and we were a little fortunate to win, the deciding goal being scored by Peter Noble two minutes before the end of the game. Galley opened the scoring in the sixty-sixth minute, and Arthur Horsfield equalised in the seventy-second minute. The composition of the two teams has changed very little as shown by the following line-up:

Swindon: Jones; Thomas, Trollope; Butler, Blick, Harland; Smith, Smart, Horsfield, Noble, Rogers, Sub. Porter.

Bristol City: Gibson; Drysdale, Merrick; Wimshurst, Rooks, Rodgers; Garland, Broomfield, Galley, Tainton, Sharpe.

The last named player, Gerry Sharpe, has been out of the game since January with a broken leg, and has recently undergone his fifth operation. The good wishes of all Swindon supporters go with him on his tremendous fight back to fitness and football.

Talking again of our opponents, we must applaud the action of their manager, Mr. Alan Dicks, in warning one of his players he would be fined £10 if he showed dissent in any way in future or acted petulantly. I understand the player concerned gave his best display of the season, but undoubtedly the great thing is the decision taken by the manager. If every club adopted the same attitude, we should hear little of bookings or warnings, and surely the standard of football and its entertainment value would improve. Certainly Bristol City seem to have profited by the new attitude of referees and the Football League in making their fine start this season.

It is interesting to read the story of the record of matches played between our two clubs since 1946/47, when League football restarted after World War II.

Swindon's home record is 14 6 7 1 away record 14 1 4 9 Total 28 7 11 10

So Bristol have won ten against our seven, and to date we have only won once at Ashton Gate, and that was in 1948/49 by 3 goals to 1. The goal average reads as follows:

Home: 23 goals for; 16 against. Away: 20 goals for; 36 against. One more fact, in season 1947/48 the attendance at the County Ground was 26,401. I wonder, shall we reach that figure today?

Today is Stan Harland's benefit game. He was signed from Carlisle in 1966, and has been one of our most consistent players ever.

During the past five seasons he has missed only one game, and made 270 appearances. A tribute to his fitness and devotion to training.

He is a born leader, and as captain undoubtedly had a great influence on the victory at Wembley and the winning of the Anglo-Italian tournament. We wish him well for the next five seasons.

On Tuesday, 12th October, Derby County visit Swindon for the purpose of the official opening of the North Stand. They have promised to bring the full First Team, and as at present they occupy fourth position in Division 1, the game should be a great attraction. Many will of course remember their last visit in 1968/69 when we defeated them 1–0 on our way to Wembley in the League Cup competition. The kick-off is at 7.30 p.m.

The following Tuesday Swindon play Birmingham City in the League, so our supporters should see a feast of good football, as on Saturday, 16th October, we entertain Blackpool.

Mike Gibson

Goalkeeper. Born Derby, was signed in April 1963 from Shrewsbury Town. Previously with Gresley Rovers and Nuneaton Borough. Has appeared in 319 League and 38 Cup games, including an unbroken run of 191 games before an injury in season 1967/68.

Ray Cashley

Goalkeeper. Born Bristol. Signed 12th August, 1970 as a full-back. Has played in 11 League and 1 F.A. Cup game.

Trevor Jacobs

Full-back. Born Bristol. Reverted to amateur after 1½ years as apprentice professional. Re-signed as professional in July 1965. League debut November 1966 v Rotherham United. Injury robbed him of a regular place in 1967/68. Appeared in 116 matches.

Brian Drysdale

Full-back. Born Wingate, Co. Durham. First signed as an inside-forward with Lincoln City at the age of 17. Almost gave up the game but joined Hartle-pools United and became automatic choice at left-back. Signed in close season 1969/70 from Hartlepool. Ever present for the last two seasons. 84 League and 16 Cup matches.

Richard Rooks

Centre-half. Born Sunderland. Signed for the local club as professional after apprenticeship as a carpenter and joiner. Later transferred from Sunderland to Middlesbrough. Signed from Middlesbrough July 1969.

Ken Wimshurst

Right-half. Secured in October 1967 from Southampton, for whom he had played a leading part in their promotion side. Previously with Wolves. 34 League and 8 Cup games last season.

William Menmuir

Wing-half. Another 18 year old Scot, now in his third season. Made debut at Huddersfield, August 1969.

Gordon Parr

Right- or left-half. Born Bristol. Signed part-time professional February 1957, while on engineering apprenticeship. Signed full-time after National Service. A strong tackler, reverted to full-back for eight matches in 1967/68 when three full-backs were injured. Has now appeared in 317 League and Cup games. Longest serving player.

Dave Merrington

Signed from Burnley, his only previous club, on 1st July, 1971.

John Emanuel

Born Treherbert, Wales. Signed 12th May, 1971. Made his first team debut v Bristol Rovers on May 6th, 1971, as an amateur. Gained an amateur international cap for Wales.

Gerard Gow

Wing-half. 19-year-old from Glasgow. St. Ninians Boys Club. Played for Glasgow R.C. Schools. Developed insideforward player last season. Debut 7.4.70 against Charlton. 38 League and 7 Cup appearances.

Gerry Sweeney

Midfield player. Born Renfrew, Scotland, 10.7.45. Signed from Morton on 27th May, 1971.

Geoffrey Merrick

Wing-half. Born Bristol. Captained Bristol and England boys. Signed as an apprentice professional on leaving school, and full-time professional forms August 1968, but was injured in his second match in the first team. 13 League and 4 Cup appearances last season.

Danny Bartley

Outside-left. Born Paulton. Signed professional October 1964 on his 17th birthday. Capped in 1966 (Youth) and toured Yugoslavia with F.A. Youth party May 1966. 66 League appearances.

Trevor Tainton

Left-half. Born Bristol. 23 years old. Made his League debut September 1967 v Carlisle United. 26 League and 10 Cup appearances last season.

Keith Fear

Inside-forward. Born Bristol. Former Bristol Schoolboy player and also the Gloucester Youth F.A. captain, reaching semi-final Counties Championship. Played for England Senior Schools XI v Wales 1969. Product of City youth sides and captain of side to reach F.A. Youth Cup semi-final in 1969/70. Debut 20th October, 1970 v Middlesbrough. 10 League appearances last season.

Gerry Sharpe

Outside-left. Born Gloucester. Signed March 1964. Product of Youth policy. Received a serious leg injury against Middlesbrough on January 16th, 1971, but was still voted Player of the Year for 1970/71.

Thomas Ritchie

Inside-forward, Born Edinburgh, 18year-old. Signed with younger brother (Stephen, an apprentice) during summer 1969. Previous club, Brigend Thistle.

Ian Broomfield

Centre-forward. Bristol-born, he has just completed his second season as a professional. Debut v Sheffield United March 1969. 9 League and 3 Cup appearances last season.

Peter Spiring

Inside-forward, 20-year-old from Street, Somerset. Has now completed third season as Professional. Somerset County honours at Youth and Senior level in 1967/68 season. Debut Birmingham October 1969. 6 League and 2 Cup appearances last season.

John Galley




Places on this trip can already be booked at our Match-Day Ticket Office, and also at the Rimes Travel Offices in Swindon and Cirencester.



Norman Burtenshaw

from Great Yarmouth

Started refereeing 17 years ago, graduating through the Eastern Counties League to the Football League Line in 1960 and two years later he was promoted to the Referees list. He was appointed to the FIFA list of referees in 1966.


