# PUGH talking....



To everybody, it must have been obvious that the problems confronting the Town when the economic situation demanded that they should sell Malcolm MacDonald to Newcastle, were tremendous.

Tp me, on the homeward journey from Hull, the coach, Jimmy Andrews, spoke of some of them and outlined the way in which it was attempted to overcome them.

Said Jimmy, "It was a tricky situation because, while we had a defensive record on which it was difficult to improve, it was hard to see where the goals would come from.

"After all, the departure of MacDonald was like taking 30 goals out of the side but, failing the arrival of a replacement which, of course, was constantly expected, I felt that the answer could lie with Anderson and Busby.

"Always I have had a lot of faith in Anderson whom I felt at the end of last season, was on the point of breaking through, and this has now come about."

Jimmy went on to say that the main hope was that Busby would take MacDonald's place as chief scorer and it was unhelpful when he was injured just when he was beginning to regain confidence.

Continuing, Jimmy said, "With MacDonald, we relied a lot on the long, through pass but, with him gone, it was necessary to shorten the pass and also to change the midfield men.

"With MacDonald's pace missing up front, we had to have it in midfield, so we brought Slough and Givens in there, hoping to re-adjust the balance, and it paid off.

"Of course, the fear was that, by attacking more in midfield, we would concede more goals, but the defence has held well.

"For one thing, Shanks has come in to do a good job, so that the soundness of the back four

was not disturbed by the changes.

"Wainwright was brought in at centre-forward and, although he helped us retain possession and improved the football, it still was not the answer.

"However, Anderson improved with every game and then, coinciding with the arrival of Halom, with whom he struck up a quick understanding, the goals began to come.

"I expected a tough patch at the start and, really, the back four have been tremendous. I feel that John Moore deserves special mention because he is an old head and a true professional and, is playing better than ever.

"Nicholl is also having a fine season, while Shanks has been little short of a revelation.

"Shanks is the modern full-back, sharp, quick and safe. In view of the alteration in policy, John Ryan has had to change his tactics because the responsibility for much of the attacking he used to do, has been given to Slough.

"So has an alteration been necessary in the game of Mike Keen, who has been handed a "holding" job in the middle so that Slough and Don Givens can show more attacking intent."

Givens, Jimmy described as "a quiet professional, most effective, who looks as if he has been in the game for years, though he is only 21."

Jimmy also paid tribute to the way in which Halom is taking the weightand, at the same time, since his arrival, goals have come the way of Anderson and Wainwright, and Jimmy Ryan's skill has also helped.

Finally, to sum up the season so far, he said, "With the problems we faced, and having had to change the whole thing around, I feel we have done well to lose only one game in 10.

"We have shown a steady improvement, are in the hunt again, and all of us feel that things can only get better."

Goals are the best tonic for any player! In Peter Anderson's case they have convinced him that the only place where he will be happy from now on is up front.

Peter, who has nursed a bruised hip since being K.O.'d from the Fulham game "The first time I touched the ball" celebrated his return as a striker with three goals in recent games against Millwall and Middlesbrough.

How does he feel? "It's my most enjoyable spell since I came to Kenilworth Road last February."

"I only scored once last season. But since I had the last ten minutes in attack against Birmingham it's revitalised my enthusiasm to get among the scorers again.

"It's a good job too! It's just about made up for the one I robbed Vic Halom of against Birmingham. I have taken some "punishment" from the lads for accidentally heading Vic's "winner" clear when he thought he was certain to score."

Peter was disappointed that he was ruled out of a Luton XI which played Hendon last Monday. "It was too much of a risk. But I was longing to play because I had a very enjoyable career at the club and I owe a lot to them."

## SUMMON

Swindon Town captured the imagination of the Wiltshire football public when they signed up Dave Mackay this summer. They also had a new £350,000 stand — giving them an extra 5,000 seats — to meet the Mackay-inspired clamour for season tickets.

Certainly, enthusiasm was as high as when Swindon stunned the world by collecting the Football League Cup and promotion to the Second Division in the 1968-69 season. But there was a snag to all the whipped-up hopes for this team ... the Football League computer which arranges the fixtures.

Of their first nine matches, no fewer than six were away from the County Ground — a burden which understandably caused manager Fred Ford to utter a few bitter comments. At a time when Swindon needed a reasonable share of home fixtures to assist the tactical re-organisation demanded by Mackay's introduction, they were constantly referring to travel schedules for the next away match.

Swindon's haul from this batch of away trips was only four points out of 12 and including just one hard-earned victory at Cardiff a fortnight ago. They were even unlucky in the draw for the League Cup and the resulting 4-1 slump at Colchester was another hazard to their confidence.

The travelling operation got off to a wretched start on the first day of the season when not even mighty Mackay could do anything about a 4-1 defeat at Blackpool. Goalless draws at Carlisle and Watford perked up Swindon's ambitions, but since then, they have also been beaten at Sunder-

land and Hull. In all, they have scored only two goals in half-a-dozen away engagements.

As a result, Swindon have been unable to ignite any promotion talk around the town and this was reflected in a worrying slump in their gates for the first three home matches. The average was 14,835 — a good 4,000 below the figure needed for Swindon to meet their day-to-day running expenses — and follows a falling trend which set in last season.

It is all very disappointing for the wellorganised Swindon management — especially when a thumping 4-0 win against Fulham was watched by a crowd of just under 13,000. But, when one considers that Swindon complete the first third of their away programme today, you will understand that there is every reason for them to start an upward climb when they get into more regular action on their own ground.

Swindon have been one of the more prosperous smaller-town clubs over the last decade. They first captured the national headlines when they soared out of Division III in 1962-63 with a blend of home-reared talent gathered by Bert Head, now the manager of Crystal Palace. He was inevitably nicknamed the "Head-master" when his Swindon starlets clinched runners-up place behind Northampton Town. That side included future stars like Mike Summerbee, sold to Manchester City for £35,000, Ernie Hunt, transferred to Wolves for £45,000, and Bobby Woodruff, also snapped up by Wolves for £35,000.


At the time, a 17-year-old England youth player by the name of Don Rogers was just coming on to the first-team scene, Things looked bright for Swindon with Rogers soon in the £100,000 class, but after two seasons, they were relegated — and had to start building up again. Their next promotion season, in 1968-69, was plotted by Danny Williams, who proudly saw Swindon take the League Cup at Wembley before going to Sheffield Wednesday.

Swindon's next manager was 52-year-old Fred Ford, who managed both Bristol clubs before checking in at the County Ground two years ago. Mr. Ford, a fitness fanatic who still joined in training sessions when other men of his age sought the comfort of their armchair, had instant success. In his first season, they were only three points away from reaching the First Division, but any disappointment was quickly dispensed by Swindon's success in winning the inaugural Anglo-Italian Tournament.

Most of the players involved in Swindon's two seasons of high success are still first-team regulars, but the arrival of Dave Mackay has required alterations to the methods. Mackay has naturally gone into the back-four and this has meant former skipper Stan Harland pushing up into midfield.

Swindon have also added a couple of promising youngsters from the First Division in Steve Peplow, of Liverpool, and Ray Bunkell, of Spurs. Other youngsters are emerging from Swindon's successful policy of developing local schools players and, clearly, they have the nucleus of a potential promotion side. It was just unfortunate that the fixture list placed such a strain on the team in the opening weeks.

Dave Mackay has become a legend in his own lifetime. Two broken legs failed to deter him. He has been declared "finished" on numerous occasions and, by all normal standards, his playing career should have been over a long while ago. But Mackay is Mackay. And he's playing on as determined, and as effectively, as ever.

Dave learned his rudimentary skills kicking a ball around the streets of Edinburgh. Usually those impromptu "matches" found Mackay facing bigger boys than himself and he had to develop his toughness to survive. Hearts, the team he had always supported, signed him as a part-time professional at £10 a week. He entered their first-team in 1953/54 and thus began his unique record of achievement. He was capped for Scotland at schoolboy, under-23 and full international levels, won Scottish League Cup and Scottish Cup medals plus a Scottish League Championship medal with Hearts. Later, at Spurs, he won English League and Cup medals.

Mackay has also played for the Scottish League against the Football League and for the Football League against the Scottish League!

Spurs paid £30,000, then a record for a half-back, to get Mackay on their books in 1959 and he was one of the vital cogs in that fine machine which won the League and Cup double in 1961 and won the F.A. Cup again the following year.

Injury kept him out of Spur's success in the final of the Cupwinners Cup and the following season, in the same competition, he broke his leg playing against Manchester United. They thought that was the end of Dave Mackay. But, of course, he came back.

When Dave Mackay believed his days as a First Division player were numbered, he decided to join Derby County and he helped to revitalise Derby and take them back into Division One after an absence of 16 years.

Last season, when his job at the Baseball Ground was completed, Derby agreed to release him. Instead of fading into retirement he took on an even tougher task — trying to repeat his Derby feat and take Swindon into the First Division!






# Vic's first BIAL and VIC TORY!

# Talking to

Eire International Don Givens, who cracked eleven goals for Luton Town last season, plus those for his country, is ready to relinquish his striker's title for a midfield role. With the arrival of Vic Halom from Fulham, the impressive new scoring form of Peter Anderson and the glittering promise of Robin Wainwright reviving the memorable scoring sorties of last term, Luton's fire-power has gone through a major re-shuffle.

The result of fresh forward-line combinations organised by Alec Stock and Jimmy Andrews could now cement Don Givens into a position in which he will have no regrets or dispute in accepting.

Dublin-born Don, who arrived at Luton last year in a £35,000 package deal which brought three other players from Manchester United, was a ready-made recruit for the "Stock conversion" after first playing in midfield for Luton last year.

"I had six games for the senior side at Old Trafford, one of them in midfield. Wilf McGuinness preferred me up front in those days, obviously with the thought of getting the best results out of my speed," remembered Don after his vital part in the 2-0 defeat of London neighbours, Fulham last week.

Speed has always been one of his biggest assets, a part of his make-up which earned him early stardom as a schoolboy. From a local schoolboy side in Dublin, Don made his first trip across the Irish Sea for Eire Schoolboys as a winger when he played against England at Northampton. It was there that Joe Armstrong, Manchester United's chief scout — who has just retired — watched him on the recommendation of United's Irish contact, Billy Behan.

"After that game, I was approached with offers from Coventry, Liverpool and Swindon. But United asked me if I would come over on a fortnight's trial. It didn't take me long to say 'yes'. Manchester United is a legend in Ireland. Everybody seems to support them."

After the trial period, Don signed on the

dotted line as an apprentice professional and later graduated to become a full member of the Old Trafford squad. "I'll never forget those days when I jumped out of schoolboy football to train amongst some of the greatest footballing names in the world. I got on particularly well with Dennis Law and he helped me a lot during my early days.


Don progressed through the same soccer channels as Brian Kidd, Francis Burns and Steve James. But the collection of experienced and prospective talent got a little overcrowded during the 1969-70 season and, at the end of that term, Don, a little surprised, nonetheless, was transfer-listed. "It was with some remorse that I left Old Trafford, for no youngster could have possibly joined a finer club for a fantastic start to his career. But even though I didn't make it there, I know it helped me a great deal towards my first International cap against Denmark in 1969."

Altogether, Don has now made 14 appearances for Eire, principally as a front runner. Now, if he settles down for a long run with Luton as one of the midfield goal poachers, there is no reason why he should not carry his new role through to benefit his Country.

"Undoubtedly, Vic Halom's arrival has been the reason for my switch and I shall now follow up behind instead of leading the raids. In one sense, I have had my nose pushed out of the attack by Vic's arrival. But of course, it's happened for the best, because I think I can do a better job in my new spot.

We asked Don if he could pin Luton's new thirst for goals down to any particular aspect. "Certainly!" said Don. "Vic has taken most of the weight up front better than I managed. He has blended in just great and while he's up there making his presence felt, the rest of the lads have more time and room to operate. I THINK WE ARE IN FOR ANOTHER FINE SEASON AT LUTON NOW WE HAVE DISCOVERED OUR TASTE FOR GOALS." THAT WAS DON'S CONFIDENT MESSAGE FOR THE FANS.



### ROUNDUP OF DIVISION 2

Bob Hatton joined CARLISLE UNITED for £10,000 from Northampton Town a little over two years ago. Now, if the Cumbrian club decided to sell, Hatton's value would probably be ten times higher. Crystal Palace were one big-spending club to take a look as he approaches 50 goals in around 100 League and Cup appearances for Carlisle. His form this season has been better than ever. He scored in six of Carlisle's first nine League games and also popped two past Sheffield Wednesday in the League Cup. Figures which no doubt spell out "regrets" for his previous clubs, Wolves, Bolton and Northampton.

While Hatton's name is a regular feature on the Second Division scoresheet, 16-year-old SUNDERLAND apprentice, Jimmy Hamilton, got on the list for the first time when he snatched the winner against Preston after coming on as substitute with only ten minutes left. It was a remarkable introduction for the young Scot who left his school desk only three months before.

Judging by the number of goals in recent games, it seems as if Second Division marksmen are appreciating extra freedom gained from the referees' clamp-down. One man enjoying himself is 20-year-old BIRMINGHAM CITY centre forward **Bob Latchford**, who notched his second hat-trick in the space of three home games. His second treble helped topple Watford 4-1.

Hat-tricks are a rare commodity for BURNLEY'S Arthur Bellamy, who had scored only six goals in the previous four seasons, but he changed all that with three goals in the 6-1 pounding of Orient. Paul Fletcher, Burnley's £60,000 signing from Bolton last term, also scored his first goal of the season in that game.

BRISTOL CITY were so pleased with the success of wing half John Emanuel that they went back to his Welsh club, Ferndale, to sign Eddie Woods on full professional forms this week. Woods was top scorer in the Welsh League with 30 goals last season. The Ashton Gate club are to show their appreciation to Ferndale by sending a team to play them later in the season.

John Craven, who cost Crystal Palace £37,000 when signed from BLACKPOOL, believes that his transfer to London could be traced to an incident with Manchester United's Pat Crerand in the last game of the 1970-71 season. As a result, the Blackpool skipper was suspended for 14 days, Glyn James successfully took his centre forward job this August, and Craven, when he came back, was either substitute or in the reserves. Hence Blackpool's readiness to take a sizeable offer. Incidentally, Craven is the 15th player to leave Bloomfield Road since Bob Stokoe became manager less than a year ago.
