news & views

We make no apology for beginning these Notes by paying tribute to probably the finest ever servant of Swindon Town F.C. — Harry Cousins, now we are happy to say, recovering from a severe heart attack which forced him to spend almost a week in the Intensive Care Unit in the Princess Margaret Hospital.

Harry first became a professional footballer in 1926 when he joined Chesterfield. He has never ceased to be grateful to the manager of that club. He joined Swindon in 1932, the year Ted Vizard took over as manager from the legendary Sam Allen. Others on the staff during that period were Jack Smith, Alex Lambe, Cliff Merrick, George Morrell, Alan Fowler and Tommy Armstrong.

Harry has now been with Swindon almost forty years, and no one can say he has ever given less than one hundred per cent, whether as player, reserve and first team trainer or coach, or in the medical room. I can recall when at one period he was almost working twelve hours a day, seven days a week.

Harry, everyone sends their best wishes for a speedy recovery not only to you, but to your wife, whom we know has done so much to support and help you over the past years.

Now to another matter, referring to the accommodation of invalids at the County Ground. Because of sight lines from our new stand invalid carriages interfere with

the view of paying customers, but invalids have not been banned from the ground. At a cost to the Club of £9 per invalid per season, plus the wages of additional stewards, we are providing free seats from which they may view our matches. We have twenty-three persons taking advantage of this facility.

Unfortunately, at the Bristol City game a misunderstanding took place, but in cases like this there must be give-and-take on both sides. We are not very happy about the view taken by some newspapers on this matter. In all my association with Swindon Town (and that goes back to 1924) never have I known an incident to put the Club in such poor light.

However, our conscience is perfectly clear on that point, and our file is now closed. A wise man told me years ago: 'Never argue with the Press'. When an irresistible force meets an immovable object there is bound to be reaction.

The compilation of these Notes takes a certain amount of time and work in research of the facts and figures and tables frequently used. In fact much work goes into this, to make our programme worthwhile in every respect.

I was therefore a little surprised to find certain facts printed in the programme of 2nd October, when we played Bristol City, used by some journalists. I presume these gentlemen have offices for such purposes, and are paid a salary relative to the post. Modesty forbids me to state the fantastic figure paid to me. However, to use an old cliché, 'That is life', or is it?

Today we entertain Blackpool, present holders of the Anglo-Italian Cup, the trophy

previously held by Swindon. We still regard our visitors as a Division 1 team, and no doubt many of our supporters remember that magnificent Cup Final in 1953 when Blackpool defeated Bolton Wanderers by four goals to three.

In the opening game of this season Blackpool defeated Swindon by 4-1, so we hope to revenge that defeat this afternoon.

Blackpool last visited Swindon on Tuesday, 7th April, 1970. At that time both clubs had a chance to gain promotion as shown by the following League positions:

The result, a draw one goal each, almost ended our hopes. Actually Huddersfield and Blackpool went up to Division 1, and it is worth noting the following season Leicester and Sheffield United gained promotion. On the law of averages it should be the turn of Swindon and Middlesbrough.

The game itself was very hard fought but rather scrappy. Horsfield scored in four minutes, and Burns equalised in thirty-six minutes. The attendance that evening was 28,520, obviously because it was such a vital game.

Bill Bentley (Full-back)

Height 5ft 11½in. Weight 13st 4lb.
Joined Blackpool Football Club from Stoke City where he had considerable first team experience. Plays at left-back or half-back and is a strong, able defender. A former Schoolboy and Youth International. Played in the successful Anglo-Italian competition team.

Tony Green (Inside-forward)

Height 5ft 6¾in. Weight 11st 2½lb.
Joined Blackpool from Albion Rovers in May 1967, and was an immediate success in his first full season with the Club. Shows superb ball control and fine distribution and has an excellent turn of speed. Became a full Scottish International late last season and should command a regular place in their team if he continues to play as he did last season.

Terry Alcock (Centre-half)

Height 5ft 11½in. Weight 12st 4lb.
Went to the Club from Port Vale in 1967. Is a strong and determined player. Played regularly in the first team last season at wing-half and appears to have settled down well. Played well in the Anglo-Italian competition at centre-half.

Glyn James (Centre-half)

Height 5ft 10¾in. Weight 12st 7lb.
Born Llangollen and has represented Wales as an Under-23 and Full International. Joined the Club as a boy in December 1957 and took over the centre-half position from Roy Gratrix in the 1964/65 season. Since then he has been the regular pivot, turning out consistent displays each week.

John Craven (Wing-half)

Height 5ft 11in. Weight 13st 6½lb.
Captain. Joined Blackpool from a local youth team and became a professional in 1965. Came to the fore three seasons ago and has now established himself in the first eleven. A strong, hard and forceful player. Was made captain last season and took on the responsibility extremely well.

Alan Suddick (Inside-forward)

Height 5ft 10½in. Weight 10st 10½lb.
Signed from Newcastle in December 1966. Former England Youth and Under-23 player, he is an excellent ball player and a good shot. Was a great influence in the winning of the Anglo-Italian competition last season.

Tom Hutchison (Winger)

Height 5ft 11½in. Weight 11st 4½lb.
A Scot who joined Blackpool from Alloa Athletic in February 1968. A clever ball player who did well for the Club last season, and has settled down well with Blackpool. Has gained Under-23 International honours playing for Scotland.

Dennis Wann (Inside-forward)

Height 5ft 8½in. Weight 10st 11lb.
A local boy who played with the Blackpool Youth Team. Joined Blackpool as an apprentice when 16 years of age. Signed professional forms in 1968 on his eighteenth birthday. A keen and enthusiastic player who should make his mark with the Club. Has attended training sessions with the F.A. Youth Team. Played a number of games in the first team at the latter end of last season.

John Johnston (Inside-forward)

Height 5ft 8in. Weight 10st 4lb.
Joined Blackpool from Glentoran in the Irish League. A most able and enthusiastic player who should develop into a most useful acquisition. Is an Irish Amateur International. Now making his mark with the first team. Has been selected for the Irish Under-23 team.

David Hatton (Full-back)

Height 5ft 9¾in. Weight 12st.
Joined Blackpool from Bolton in season 1969/70 and has held a fairly regular first team position since. Was moved to full-back during last season and has settled down extremely well. A very strong player.

Peter Suddaby (Wing-half)

Height 5ft 11¼in. Weight 12st 1½lb.
Signed professional for Blackpool in May 1970, and soon showed his ability by becoming a regular player in the first team in the second half of his first season at the Club. A former England Amateur International he looks to have a promising career ahead of him. A very strong player and an exceptionally good header of the ball.

John Burrridge (Goalkeeper)

Height 5ft 10in. Weight 11st 7lb.
Signed from Workington at the latter end of last season and has shown that he has the right approach to the game with some very sound performances against the Italians in the Anglo-Italian competition.

Mickey Burns (Outside-left)

Height 5ft 7in. Weight 10st 8½lb.
Signed from Skelmersdale United in 1969. An English Amateur International with a flair for goal scoring. A tricky ball player, who is always searching for goals. Leading goal scorer last season.

Alan Ainscow (Inside-forward)

Height 5ft 7in. Weight 9st 4lb.

Joined the Club as an apprentice in July 1970. Recently signed as a full-time professional. He is a lively, forceful player who could very well be amongst the goals this season. Made his first team debut in the Anglo-Italian competition.

Fred Kemp (Half-back)

Height 5ft 8½in. Weight 10st 8lb.

A signing from Southampton at the latter end of last season. A creative player who likes to come forward. Originally hails from Wolverhampton.

Dennis Booth (Wing-half)

Height 5ft 7½in. Weight 10st 5lb.

Born in Derbyshire this player was signed recently from Charlton Athletic. A strong forceful player who should be in the first team this season.

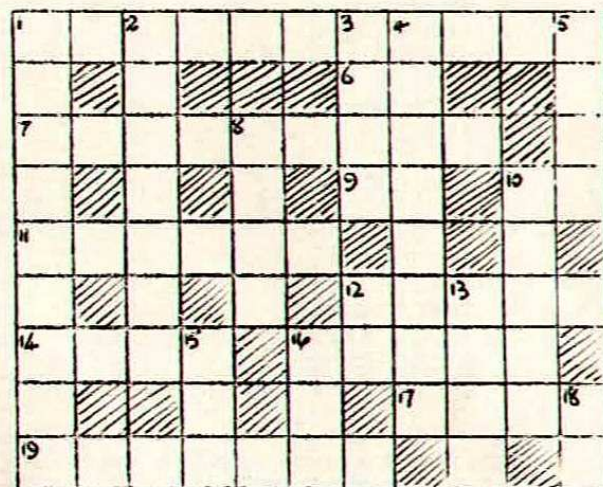

Blackpool had a great run of success after World War II under the managership of that remarkable character Joe Smith. They were beaten Finalists twice in 1948 and 1951, and winners in 1953. In League Division 1 1955/56 (2nd); 1950/51 (3rd); 1956/57 (4th); 1946/47 (5th).

It is interesting to note that one of their outstanding players, and fine servant over the past decade, Jimmy Armfield, has made a splendid beginning as manager of Bolton Wanderers, who last week defeated Manchester City 3-0 in the League Cup.

It is pleasing to note Michael Summerbee included in the England squad. Many supporters in Swindon still follow his career with great interest, especially his friends down 'The Lane'.

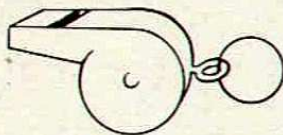

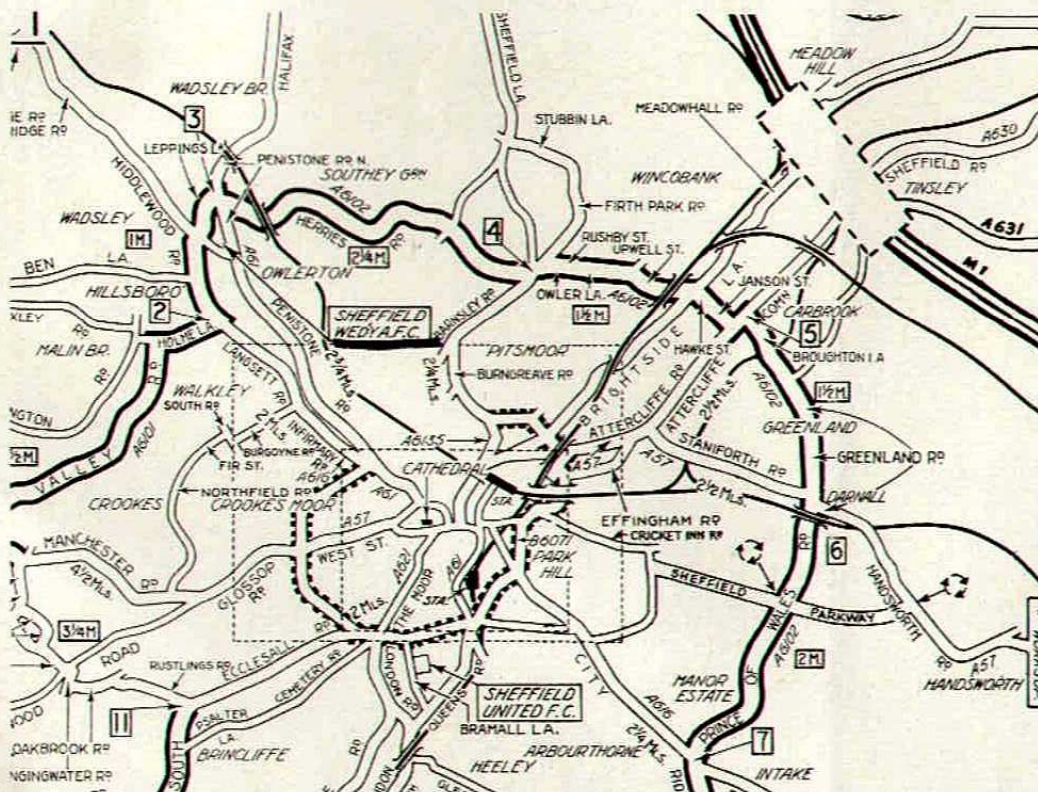
