# news & views

Welcome back to our friends from Preston. After only one season in Division 3 they returned to Division 2, and now hold ninth position in the League table. It seems only a little while since we saw Preston defeated 3–2 in that splendid 1964 Cup Final by West Ham. From that team only Kelly (goal-keeper) and Spavin (inside-forward) remain on the playing staff. Others, notably Howard Kendall (Everton), are still in football

Preston last visited the County Ground for a League game Saturday, 14th March, 1970, and at that time were in danger of relegation, being in 20th place with 24 points. We were rather fortunate to win by the only goal, scored in 52 minutes by Peter Noble. This defeat almost sealed the fate of our visitors, as they were relegated at the end of that season.

It is a strange coincidence that the previous visit of Preston, on Easter Saturday, 17th April, 1965 Swindon were fighting to escape relegation. We occupied 20th place with 32 points from 39 games. Everyone hoped for a home victory and we should probably have been quite safe from any worries. It seemed as if victory was assured that day when we were leading by 2 goals to 1, and enjoying most of the play, when a sudden breakaway produced an unexpected goal. Thus was lost a valuable point and, as we all well remember, we were relegated at the end of the season.

We trust it is not an omen that Preston

visit Swindon again when we are dangerously near the bottom of the table. We are in fact in 18th position with 14 points from 17 games. Fortunately, few points divide most of the teams. Portsmouth occupy 10th position with 16 points, two more than Swindon. Unfortunately, we seem to have lost the art of scoring goals.

Proud Preston, pioneers of the Football League, and the first club to win the League and Cup double. What great players this Club has introduced to football – the immortal Alex James, the man with the long knickers and later the pride of the Arsenal; the one and only Tom Finney, probably the most complete player of all times; the fiery character Tommy Docherty, manager of many clubs, and now of Scotland; Bill Shankly (Liverpool); Andy Beattie, many years Preston's Manager; and Jimmy Milne.

Their present manager, Alan Ball (father of the England player), took over his position in 1970, and in his first season gained promotion back to Division 2, and that after selling what most people thought the best player, Archie Gemmill, to Derby County for £66,000.

It is good to see our old friend Danny Williams back in football, where he belongs. One of the finest characters ever to grace football, he takes over a tough job as Manager of Mansfield, who have yet to score a goal at home. It is a real challenge, which Danny will enjoy. We wish him well, and feel sure he will succeed.

Fred Ford also made a fine beginning as Assistant Manager to his new club Torquay, who won their first game after eight successive defeats. No doubt most of our supporters enjoyed seeing Michael Summerbee score for England. Whilst the game and result was somewhat disappointing, it was good to see one of our early young players taking part in an International match at Wembley, even if he was replaced by substitute Chivers in the second half.

On Tuesday next we entertain Trowbridge Town in the Wiltshire Professional Challenge Shield. For many years we have been released from this competition by virtue of a payment to the Wilts F.A. This avoided any congestion of fixtures especially when the League Cup Competition was introduced. Apparently this season we have to enter, much to the delight of the lesser professional clubs in the county, especially as Swindon have to field the full Division 2 side. These teams often raise their game when playing against teams from a higher sphere. From the prestige point of view it is very necessary for us to win this game, and win well. Several Swindonians will appear in the Trowbridge team, among them Terry Woollen, who was the right-back in Swindon's 1963 promotion team.

### John Bird (Half-back)

A March 1971 bargain from his home town team Doncaster. Proved his worth on getting an early chance through Easter-time injuries to first-teamers. 6ft. 12st.

### Clive Clark (Outside-left)

Experienced, forceful raider who proved a good buy after an uneventful start. First choice for left-wing last season when fit. Made 32 League appearances, scored 4 goals. Formerly with Queen's Park Rangers and West Bromwich Albion. Born Leeds. 5ft 9in. 10st 5lb.

### David Hughes (Outside-right or left)

Graduated from Preston junior ranks to become useful deputy on either wing. Fast and centres well. Born at nearby Blackburn. Thirteen League appearances last season and looking forward to many more.

### Graham Hawkins (Centre-half)

Preston's most improved player last season when he established himself as an ever-present powerful defender. Constructive and an expert at heading and timely tackling. Captured from Wolverhampton in January 1968 when 21, has matured out of recognition. In F.A. party that toured New Zealand. Born Darlaston, 6ft. 11st 10lb.

### Gerald Stewart (Goalkeeper)

Native of Dundee, rose through Preston's junior ranks to become dependable reserve, but has had few chances owing to Kelly's consistently reliable form. 5ft 10in, 11st 8lb.

# Richard Heppolette (Wing-half or Forward)

Anglo-Indian, in that he was born in Bombay Province – otherwise entirely English and proud of it. Brought up in childhood at Bolton. Loved football, good at it as a boy and completely dedicated. Preston signed him when he left school and picked a winner. League debut December 1968, when 19. Tremendous mid-field worker who soon became indispensable. Gives 100 per cent for 90 minutes. Exceptionally good at heading spectacular goals. A crowd favourite through being modest in success. 5ft 9in. 11st 5lb.

### Robert Ham (Inside-forward)

More than justified his inexpensive signing from Bradford City in October 1970 by getting 11 opportunist's goals in 30 Preston appearances. A plucky little grafter who never gives up. Has played for both his native Bradford's clubs. 5ft 5in. 10st 6lb.

### Alan Kelly (Goalkeeper)

Eire's most frequently capped goal-keeper. First honoured v England at Wembley in 1957 when with Drumcondra and only 19. A 0-5 baptism did not dampen his ardour. Cliff Britton signed him for Preston in 1958. Long wait for his now long established first-team place. Ever-present 1970/71, has made 376 League appearances in eleven seasons. Helps amateur clubs and players in spare time. Likes golf and table tennis. Born Dublin. 6ft. 11st 6lb.

### Alex Spark (Right-half)

Composed young defender who has quickly developed from junior status into a regular first-teamer. Reads a game well and usually parts to advantage. League debut December 1968. Born Stenhousmuir, played for Scotland in the 1969 International Youth tournament in France, 5ft 10in, 11st 6lb.

### David Wilson (Outside-right)

Youth team product of 1960 who rejoined Preston North End from Liverpool three years ago. Attractive ball player at his best, was an England Under-23 International. Born in East Lancashire, was missed by Burnley when a boy. 5ft 8in. 11st 6lb.

### James McNab (Left-back)

Shrewd, versatile defender of vast experience. Long spell with Sunderland before his transfer to Preston in March 1967. In varied career has been effective at inside-left, left-half, centre-half and left-back. Missed only seven League games last season. Born in Denny. 5ft 10½in. 11st 8lb.

### George Ross (Right-back)

A Scot recruited from Inverness 13 years ago when 15. Fulfilled high promise shown in Preston's 1960 F.A. Youth Cup Final team. On losing side in F.A. Cup Final at Wembley in 1964. First team games exceed 400. 5ft 9in. 11st 4lb.

### Hugh McIlmoyle (Centre-forward)

Close-season (July) acquisition from Middlesbrough. Skilful, forceful leader of long experience who can both make and take goals. In Leicester's 1961 F.A. Cup Final side, has also played for Rotherham, Carlisle United (two spells), Wolverhampton Wanderers, Bristol City and Middlesbrough. Born Glasgow. 5ft 11in. 11st 6lb.

### Gerald Ingram (Centre-forward)

In junior football at his native Hull when Stan Mortensen signed him in 1967 and promptly put him in Blackpool's first team. Responded with 18 goals to become joint top scorer. North End paid a substantial fee for him a year later. Leading scorer last season with 23 goals in 39 League matches and 2 in League Cup. 5ft 10in. 10st 12lb.

### John McMahon (Wing-half)

Bright prospect who developed in the youth and reserve teams. Played consistently well after an encouraging first team debut last season. Born Manchester. 5ft 9in. 11st 2lb.

### Willie Irvine (Centre-forward)

Gained fame as slick opportunist with Burnley and Northern Ireland, Lost his scoring touch after a good start with Preston, but regained it when on loan to Brighton last season, helping to avert relegation. Born Antrim. 5ft 10in. 11st 4lb.

### George Lyall (Inside-forward)

Born at Wick. Signed from Raith Rovers in April 1966 when 17 and their top scorer. Intelligent midfield forward with a sudden powerful shot. It brought him 5 goals and many near misses in his 27 League games last season. Keen golfer. 5ft 8in. 11st 2lb.

### Alan Spavin (Left-half)

Third Division 1970/71 'Player of the Year'. Former deep-lying inside-left who adapted himself to constructive midfield role with fine skill. A masterschemer and ball artist whose potential talent was obvious when signed as a boy along with George Ross, David Wilson and Peter Thompson, All four shone when North End reached the 1960 F.A. Youth Cup Final. From his League debut in Preston's 1961 relegation season has played in more than 350 first team games, including 1964 F.A. Cup Final. Seldom a scorer despite being a good shot, but he got two goals when Preston clinched Third Division Championship in last match. Born Lancaster, 5ft 8in, 11st 7lb.


