THIS afternoon's game will bring back vivid memories among our officials, players and supporters of three meetings with Swindon Town in the League Cup semi-finals three seasons ago.

We offer our Swindon friends a hearty Lancashire welcome but at the same time let us stress that we will be out to make amends not only for our failure to get to Wembley in 1969 but also for an unexpected slip seven days ago at Watford, where things went badly in every way as I will explain.

Swindon, having won here in the FA Cup in 1948 (against a team which had played in the final the previous season) returned for League Cup semi-final battle exactly three years ago last week, the date being November 20th, 1968. They won 2-1 but we surprised them early the following month by winning by the same score at their County Ground, Frank Casper and Steve Kindon getting the goals. This meant a third meeting for a play-off at West Bromwich Albion's Hawthorns headquarters and as the sports history books now show Town got the better of us that night, winning 3-2 to make it 6-5 on aggregate and in the final they defeated Arsenal 3-1 before a crowd of 98,000.

Swindon's team in that memorable final was not much different to that we expect to face this afternoon at Turf Moor. The big change is that Dave Mackay is in the driving seat, hoping to do for Swindon what he has earlier done for Tottenham and Derby County as well as on many occasions for Scotland. Dave has been at left-half in most of the recent games but otherwise the Swindon defence is the same as at Wembley three years ago with Peter Downsborough in goal, Rod Thomas and John Trollope at full-back, Frank Burrows in the middle and little Joe Butler working so hard in that midfield engine room. Up front, the danger man is still the highly talented Don Rogers who links well on the left flank with Peter Noble and Roger Smart has been operating at inside-right again recently though he only had 17 Second Division games last season. We need to win after failure at Watford and I feel it will be a hard though not impossible task against the seasoned, skilful campaigners from Wiltshire.

Sometimes it goes for . . .

Events at Watford underlined for me the fact that football is a game in which sometimes things go for you and sometimes they go against, and there are some features of the business that you can control,

others that nobody can legislate for. I feel we can win promotion because we are in a strong position in the league table without having the kind of good fortune that has gone to some of the other teams above us, and I am the last person to make excuses, but I couldn't understand why last week's referee had to consult a linesman 45 yards away about an event which took place under his nose. This he did do . . . and the outcome was that a goal by Steve Kindon was not given. As I say, sometimes it goes for and sometimes it goes against. We were on top so much that we didn't have a goal-kick for 30 minutes! Then there was the little matter in addition of us hitting a post with a header by Geoff Nulty. The ball wouldn't go in until the last few minutes and it was a most frustrating match, a hard one to weigh up in terms of what went wrong but one of my lasting impressions was that as far as the control of it was concerned we were back to the bad old days with a lack of consistency in handling the more serious physical offences. Lack of consistency from one match to another is still a feature of the Second Division scene and this rankles when you remember that for relatively trivial offences four players (two on each side) were booked in four minutes at Preston early on in the season.

talks . . . about Soccer

Spotlight

One man who has been in the news is Bill Shankly with a number of newspapers spotlighting the player he let go – Bournemouth goal-king Ted MacDougall, scorer of nine goals in one match and bagful after bagful after joining the South Coast club from York. As I have said, sometimes it goes **FOR** and sometimes **AGAINST**. All clubs make mistakes with players like this and it happened to us in the case of Chris Nicholl, the centre-half we let go after he had played in our youth team. He is now doing well at Luton, so well that some experts rate him in the £150,000 class. It is a question of judgement and luck and clearly it is easy even for people steeped in the game like Bill Shankly to make an occasional mistake when Lady Luck is running against.

Honours

Two players on whom we hope luck will shine in the future both at club and international level are Leighton James and Dave Thomas. They were on duty this week with Wales and the England Under 23 team respectively and we are sure that with their talent they can't help but go forward to more honours which will reflect well on the lads themselves and on our club.

Cup matches

Two Tuesday dates coming up . . . next week we are at home to Manchester City in the FA Youth Cup and seven days later Southport come to Turf Moor for a County Cup game. We hope to make plenty of progress in both competitions as well as in the FA Cup which is only just around the corner.

The great Dave Mackay, 37-year-old Swindon supremo, needs no introduction to Turf Moor fans after his tremendous years of service to Tottenham Hotspur, Derby County and of course Scotland. Dave was born in Edinburgh in 1934 and started his professional career with Hearts in 1951. He was transferred to Spurs in 1953 and moved on to Derby in season 1967-68. He was capped 26 times by Scotland and is the holder of a Scottish League Cup winners' medal, a Scottish FA Cup winners' medal and an English FA Cup winners' medal.

In addition he is the holder of a European Cup winners' medal which he won when at White Hart Lane. He is the only player who has appeared for both the Scottish League and the English League teams. He signed for Town in May, 1971, and obviously they are hoping he will do the same good job for them as he has done for those he has assisted so famously in the past.

Dave is married with two sons and two daughters. He says simply: "My soccer dislike is losing. The thing I like most in the game is WINNING." He selects Johnny Haynes as the most difficult opponent he has faced, Wembley as his favourite ground and his ambition is "To keep playing and to win promotion with Swindon."

SWINDON TOWN'S visit to Turf Moor this afternoon will revive memories of past meetings in cup competitions, Town having won here in the F.A. Cup in 1948 and they were successful against the Clarets again in the semi-final of the 1968-69 League Cup.

Dave Mackay is hoping to lead his new club to happier days in the league than is the case at present because prior to last Saturday's fixture Swindon were 18th in the Second Division table, and away from their County Ground they had played nine league games, winning one, drawing four and losing four with a goal average of three scored and nine conceded.

Town's only away success was in fact at Cardiff City's Ninian Park ground on September 25th when the only goal of the afternoon was netted by **Chris Jones**, the Altrincham-born former Manchester City striker.

Think of Swindon, though, and you must also think of that wonder winger **Don Rogers** who in my book is one of the finest uncapped English flank-men of the last decade, a man who can make goals brilliantly and score them with an equal amount of verve and confidence.

Entertaining

Don, who can be such an entertaining as well as EFFECTIVE player, was born at Paulton and joined Swindon when only 15. He quickly came to the fore and gained many England youth international caps before making a splendid debut for the Under-23 team. He was of course a regular member of the Swindon team which was promoted in 1969 with Watford – this was the same season in which the Wiltshire club won the Football League Cup.

Consistent

Two of the most consistent defenders in the Swindon team over the years have been Liverpool-born **Stan Harland** who was signed from Carlisle in 1966 and **Frank Burrows**, the centre-half who is Scottish-born and formerly played for Scunthorpe United. This pair were in the half-back line of that fine side which beat

Burnley in 1969 and the line was completed by ex-Newcastle United wing-half **Joe Butler**. Joe is still going strong and his tenacity, speed and skill make up for his lack of height.

Town's goalkeeper is Yorkshire-born **Peter Downsbrough**, a consistent last line of defence for several seasons now. He is a fearless and very agile 'keeper and has figured in all his club's great moments of recent years.

Full-backs this afternoon will almost certainly be **Rod Thomas** and **John Trollope**. Thomas is a full Welsh international who previously played for Gloucester City while Trollope is a local-born player and played for Town at the age of 16 in season 1960-61.

Roger Smart was also born in Swindon and is a versatile player who can scheme or strike and **Peter Noble**, the other regular inside-forward joined Swindon from Newcastle, like Butler. Noble prefers an attack role and can be a dangerous customer on his day.

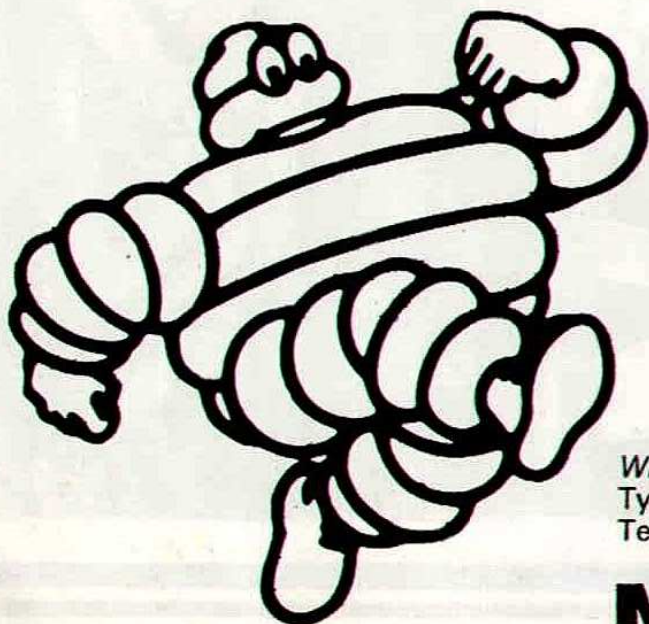

FREDERICK PETER KIPPAX

Without any doubt Burnley's outstanding amateur footballer of this century, Peter Kippax, 'The Flyer' at outside left would have been a big money player 'as a professional' in the present day game. Peter was a member of the team defeated by Charlton in the 1947 Cup Final, and promoted to the First Division in the same season. He was selected to represent England at full international level but had to withdraw due to illness.

A company director, Peter lives in St. Annes-on-Sea, where he still finds time to play squash and cricket. Some of his performances in the Lancashire League are still remembered by the supporters of Burnley C.C. He was an attractive stroke player and an outstanding fielder.

On his last visit to Turf Moor, Peter 'drew out' the numbers for the Saturday Draw, receiving a big ovation from his many fans.

Born: 17th July, 1922.

Joined Burnley: Signed amateur forms in 1939.

Honours in game: In 1946 represented F.A. XI v. R.A.F. In 1947 played for Football League v. Irish League (at Everton), and for Football League v. Scottish League (at Hampden Park, Glasgow). He also represented Great Britain in the 1948 Olympic Games. Great Britain were defeated in the Semi-Final by Yugoslavia, 3 goals to 1.

Other League Clubs: Liverpool. (Left Burnley on 6th Dec., 1948).

Age playing career ended: 33 years.

Biggest dislike while playing: Losing.

Most difficult opponent: Eddie Shimwell (Blackpool).

Advice to young players coming into game: Train hard – listen to advice. Keep 'your mouth shut' on the field of play, but always play to win.

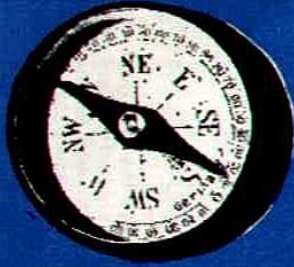
Opinion of professional game today: Too commercialised.

Suggestions for improving game: Control transfer fee limit: Continue with alteration to offside rule thereby enabling more attacking football to be played.

Present day player giving most enjoyment: Bobby Charlton – he plays the game as it should be played.
