news & views

We head this column 'News', but we didn't realise how much it makes news. We are quite used now to being quoted by various reporters and commentators in our own area, but now we have appeared in the National Press, and here we quote: 'Behind the ruthless countenance of British professional football, a truly human heart still beats. The other day Swindon Town fired Fred Ford as their manager. On Saturday, in their programme, came this touching epitaph. "All supporters will know of the departure of Mr. Ford, a grand fellow held in esteem throughout the football world. He deserved a better fate".' Glad to know I have a human heart, even if that old organ is now a little wearied and worn. It is surely sad to lose ones friends and colleagues. Although professional football is real hard business, there still exists kindness, tradition and even sentiment amongst clubs and players. The hospitality of clubs makes the hard grind worthwhile to many directors. Yes, I hope I shall always have a heart and sympathy towards all my friends in football, because there are more ups and downs in this game than in any other walk of life.

Unfortunately there has been another departure from the County Ground, namely Stan Harland. I cannot recall any player who has made such an impact on a team. He was possibly the best captain Swindon has ever had, especially since World War II.

He certainly has some great memories to look back on: leading the Club to win the Football League Cup; the Italian Cup-Winners Cup; the Anglo-Italian Competition; and promotion to Division 2. We wish him every success with his new club, but doubt if he will repeat the Swindon saga.

We now appear to have turned the corner. After two draws, at Oxford and home to Preston, came the fine victory at Burnley. Four points from the last six and two away games.

Today we face top-of-the-table Norwich, always an attractive team at Swindon. The games between the two teams have always proved most entertaining and usually produce a number of goals.

Since season 1946/47 we have met in thirty-six League games with the following results: Swindon's home record: played 18, won 7, drawn 8, lost 3, goals for 27, against 22. Swindon's away record: played 18, won 2, drawn 6, lost 10, goals for 23, against 35.

It will be seen Swindon has won twice at Norwich, and lost three games at home. Our opponents have scored 57 goals, and Swindon 50. Perhaps the most significant results happened in season 1956/57. The game at Swindon produced a 1–1 draw, while we won 4–2 at Norwich; and that season both clubs had to seek re-election to Division 3 (South). Norwich finished in 24th place with 31 points, and Swindon 23rd with 36. Directly above us with 37 points were

Gillingham and Exeter City. Times have changed.

Last season we lost the away game 0-1, but the return match, played on 16th January, 1971, was a splendid game. Swindon was leading by two fine goals scored by Burrows and Rogers, but Norwich came back in good form, and equalised in the seventy-fifth minute. Noble scored a grand goal five minutes before the end of the game, to win a fine match 3 goals to 2.

Mr. Ron Saunders is quite a young manager, yet he has served a good apprentice-ship for the post, first as manager at Yeovil, then Oxford United and finally Norwich, which he took over in July 1969. He readily admits to learning much from managers under whom he served as a player – Mr. Cliff Britton, George Smith, Freddie Cox, Bill McGarry and Ken Furphy.

Success has increased gates at Carrow Road from an average 13,000 at the beginning of the season to almost 25,000.

Norwich has never been in the First Division of the League. Will they do it this season? They have made a splendid beginning, but it is a long road, with many other clubs striving with the same ambition.

Norwich City

Terry Anderson

Born Woking. Previous club, as apprentice and full-time professional, Arsenal (1961/65). Signed for Norwich, February 1965, for what was then the Club's record fee for a winger. Former youth international. Has operated mainly in midfield in recent seasons. League and Cup appearances to end of last season 177, goals fourteen.

Albert Bennett

Born Durham. Signed for Norwich, February 1968, from Newcastle United for a reported £25,000 fee. Previously with Rotherham; former England Under-23 international. Handicapped by injury last season, at end of which he had made sixty League and Cup appearances, with sixteen goals.

Trevor Howard

Born King's Lynn. One of several former apprentices who became full-time professional in July 1967. He made his full first-team debut against Blackpool in April 1968 and, fitting well into a midfield role (though he has developed a reputation as a 'play anywhere' man) he finished last season with sixty-eight League and Cup appearances, six goals.

Max Briggs

Norwich-born. Signed as a full-time professional in 1967/68 after playing for City as an amateur. A midfield man or winger, who made his League debut in 1968/69 and has since become a regular member of the first-team 'pool'. League and Cup appearances to end of last season fifty-six, goals two.



Geoff Butler

One of the most expensive players in the Second Division, he was signed by City from Sunderland in October 1968, for a reported £30,000. He was previously with Middlesbrough and Chelsea and was twice transferred for a £60,000 fee. Born Middlesbrough, he had made sixty-nine League and Cup appearances for City to the end of last season.

Stephen Govier

Born Watford. Young defender who joined City as an apprentice in September 1967, and signed full-time forms in July 1969. Made the step up last season from Combination to League line-up, his debut coming at Swindon last January. Finished the season with four League appearances.

Clive Payne

Born at Aylsham, and one of City's own discoveries. A former apprentice, he signed full-time forms in March 1968, and made his League debut in 1969/70. Last season he established himself in the League side and ended the programme with fifty-seven League and Cup appearances to his credit.

David Stringer

Born Gorleston. Capped for England Youth as an amateur, signed full-time forms for City in May 1963. Made his League debut for City at Coventry in April 1965, and by the end of last season had made 269 League and Cup appearances for the Canaries, scoring four times in the process.

Duncan Forbes

City's 1970 Player of the Year. Born Edinburgh and signed from Colchester in September 1968. Joined City as a utility player, but soon settled into the No. 5 berth, where he has been the kingpin of the Club's defence. Had made 111 League and Cup appearances (three goals) to the end of last season.

Kevin Keelan

Calcutta-born goalkeeper who joined the Canaries from Wrexham in July 1963. Previously with Aston Villa, Stockport (on loan) and Kidderminster. Signed by City for a 'moderate' fee he has established himself as regular first-team 'keeper in recent seasons, despite a broken arm that kept him out of the game for many weeks in 1970/71. At the beginning of the season he had made 280 League and Cup appearances and was the Club's longest-serving player.

Graham Paddon

Joined City as a teenager from Coventry in October 1969 for a fee of about £25,000. Born Manchester, he joined Coventry at the age of fifteen and had several games for them in the First Division. Quickly established himself in the League side at Carrow Road and at the end of last season had made seventy-six League and Cup appearances, scoring three goals.

Doug Livermore

City's only major signing last season; signed from Liverpool, his home town, November 1970 for a reported £20,000-plus fee. Young, clever midfield player who had a number of First Division outings with Liverpool to his credit. Soon settled well at Carrow Road, making twenty-five League and Cup appearances and scoring three times.

Ken Foggo

Born Perth. Clever and direct winger who joined City in October 1967 from West Brom for a reported £15,000 fee. Soon became a firm favourite with the Carrow Road crowd, and is the club's reigning Player of the Year, a title he also held in 1969. Top scorer for the past two seasons, he had made 153 League and Cup appearances, and scored forty-three goals, to the end of the 1970/71 programme.

Alan Black

Scottish full-back, formerly with Dumbarton, Black was ex-manager Lol Morgan's first major signing, from Sunderland, in September 1966. He made his League debut for City at Northampton the same month and in all, to the end of last season, he had made 137 League and Cup appearances.

Mervyn Cawston

Another of the Canaries' young discoveries. Joined the club as an apprentice and after showing great promise in goal signed full-time forms in the 1969 close season. League debut last season in home game against Watford, then made three further first-team appearances.

Peter Silvester


Born Wokingham, and signed by Ron Saunders from Reading in September 1969 for a reported £20,000 fee. Former Reading schoolboy, who scored twenty-five goals in the seventy-five League and Cup appearances he made for City in his first two seasons with
