We play there on Tuesday evening against local club Vale Recreation and are due to return on Thursday.

Then we are off to Norwich for a League match with the leaders followed by another tough away game with Queens Park Rangers in the F.A. Cup. Let us hope the trip provides just the tonic.

Well, we've had the season of goodwill and the impression is that this has been going on for most of

the football season with gifts galore.

Let us console ourselves with the knowledge that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

And since it is now New Year and the time for resolutions, let us make one to reverse the policy.

At Millwall it was all so reminiscent of other recent occasions. Don't take our word. We aim for impartiality but it is sometimes difficult.

However Alex Bannister of the Daily Mail has no reason to take sides and he made his views quite clear.

In his newspaper, teams are awarded marks out of ten for what they term 'Entertainment Value'. He decided to give each team seven marks—and since winning is part of entertainment it is obvious which club he thought better to watch.

That was our impression, too. We were as good as them most of the time and better than them for much of it. Yet we finished on the wrong end of the biggest defeat of the day.

They took their chances and we did not . . and where have you heard that story before?

Our reserve team has been performing more than satisfactorily and our youth team have brought off some fine coups recently.

Their latest was to reach the final of the South East Counties League Cup by beating Millwall who have one of the best youth squads in the country at the moment.

The final opponents will be Arsenal or Chelsea at a venue to be decided by the Management committee.

DAVE MACKAY

Dave Mackay (Defender). Born Edinburgh, Began his professional career with Hearts in 1951. Was transferred to Tottenham in 1953 and left them to join Derby in season 1967/68. Capped 26 times for Scotland and is the holder of a Scottish League Cup Winners' medal, a Scottish F.A. Cup Winners' medal and an English F.A. Cup Winners' medal. Also the possessor of a European Cup Winners Cup medal which he obtained with Tottenham. Played both for the Scottish League team and also the English Football League team. Signed by Swindon in May 1971. Recently took charge of team management. Height 5ft. 10in. Weight 12st. 10lb.

Peter Downsborough (goalkeeper). Signed in August 1965 from Halifax Town. Fearless, agile. Regular member of side. Height 5ft. 10½in. Weight 13st. 2lb.

Roy Jones (goalkeeper). Born Clacton-on-Sea. Signed for the Club in October 1967 after obtaining his release from the R.A.F. Height 5ft. 11in. Weight 11st. 12lb.

Owen Dawson (right back). Born Hatfield. Joined from Portsmouth in June 1962. He was a regular first team player until he was unlucky to lose his place through injury. Fast, tenacious. A Youth International. Height 5ft. 9½in. Weight 11st. 12lb.

John Trollope (left back). Born Swindon. Joined the Ground Staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old, and was ever present during that season. Together with his partner that year, who was also 16, they were the youngest full backs to appear as a pair in League football. Height 5ft. 10in. Weight 11st. 13lb.

Rod Thomas (full back). Born Glyncorrwg. A former youth player with the Club. Signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Full Welsh International. Height 6ft. Weight 12st, 10lb.

Joe Butler (full back). Joined from New-castle United in August 1965. Tenacious player. Has speed and ability to make up for his lack of inches. Height 5ft. 7½ in. Weight 11st.

Roger Smart (mid-field or inside forward). Joined direct from Swindon Schoolboys. At 17 he was appearing regularly at centre forward in the reserves, but he excels as a deep-lying inside forward or wing-half. Height 5ft, 11½in, Weight 12st. 1lb.

Frank Burrows (centre half). Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined from Scunthorpe for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers, Strong, Has made his mark in the first team. Height 6ft, 1in, Weight 12st, 8lb.

Don Rogers (winger). One of the best players outside Division I. He was signed by Swindon when only 15, won many England Youth Caps and subsequently played in the England Under-23 team. Height 5ft. 10in. Weight 12st, 10lb.

Peter Noble (inside forward). Born Sunderland. Joined from Newcastle in January 1968. Prefers an attacking role. Height 5ft. 8in, Weight 10st, 10lb.

Chris Jones (centre forward). Born Altrincham, A hard-working centre forward signed from Manchester City. Height 5ft, 11in. Weight 11st. 12lb.

Arthur Horsfield (inside forward). Born Newcastle. Signed from Newcastle in 1969. Previously played for Middlesbrough whom he joined as a Youth Cap. Top goal scorer last season. Height 5ft, 11in. Weight 12st. 1lb.

Paul Peterson (full back). Born Luton. Signed during the close season from Leeds whom he joined from School. Played three games for the first team and regularly for the Central League side. Originally played at outside left. Height 5ft. 7in. Weight 10st, 4lb.

Ray Bunkell (wing half). Born Tottenham. Joined the Club during the close season from Tottenham where he was a regular Football Combination player. He also played for the England Youth team. Height 5ft. 9in. Weight 11st. 2lb.

Stephen Peplow (outside right). Played for Liverpool Schoolboys, and joined Liverpool from school. Made three first team appearances in season 1969/70 for Liverpool and was a regular member of the team which won the Central League for two consecutive years. Height 5ft. 9in. Weight 10st. 12lb.

# THE WHISTLE WENT 13

A player will not necessarily be penalised for being in an off-side position.

Law 11 makes a point which increasingly goes unobserved. It reads: "A player in an off-side position shall not be penalised unless, in the opinion of the Referee, he is interfering with the play or with an opponent, or is seeking to gain an advantage by being in an off-side position." The key word is 'seeking', rather than 'liable' to gain an advantage. As in so many other cases in our game intention is, or should be, the guiding factor.



Bookings can be made today at the kiosk.



# BY CAR TO NORWICH Approximately 130 miles from Fulham (Compiled by the Royal Automobile Club)

Leave by Fulham Palace Road and continue via Westway and Western 6 miles Avenue to the junction with the North Circular Turn right and follow the North Circular to Brent Cross Flyover, filter left onto the A41 and continue to the junction with the A1. Proceed north-29 miles ward by the A1 to Stevenage By-Pass A1(M) Continue by the A1(M) for 10 miles then follow the signs "Cambridge 39 miles A6141" to Baldock Turn right onto the A505 and continue via Royston to the junction with 59 miles Turn left and follow the A.11 via Newmarket and Thetford to Norwich ... 130 miles Enter Norwich by the Newmarket Road (A11) and continue to the roundabout. Take the third exit-Daniels Road-and continue ahead to the third roundabout. Take the first exit-Bracondale-and bear right into King Street. Take second on the right—Carrow Road—and the ground is on your right (see Town Plan).

There are car parks at and near the ground but the police control street parking

so watch for the signs, including diversions.

# FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

It's not often that you see nine goals in a match, but within 17 days around Christmas 1956, Fulham featured in two nine-goal extrava-

ganzas!

The first was at the Cottage on December 26th when we beat Blackburn by 7 goals to 2. Our team that day was: Ian Black; Ken Collins, Robin Lawler, Jimmy Hill, Derek Lampe, Eddie Lowe, Arthur Stevens, Roy Bentley, Roy Dwight, Johnny Haynes and Trevor Chamberlain.

Our scorers were Tosh Chamberlain with a hat-trick, Roy Bentley with two, and Roy Dwight with two.

The other nine-goal match was at Vetch Field against Swansea Town on January 12th, and we won by 5

goals to 4.

At one stage we were leading by 5—1, but with defender John Chenhall a passenger for all the second half because of a badly pulled muscle, Swansea struck back, but we held on to win.

Our goals came from Roy Dwight

(3) and Trevor Chamberlain. What was remarkable was that Roy had scored a hat-trick against Swansea at home earlier that season.

And the programme writer wondered whether any other player had scored a hat-trick against the same side in both League matches in one season.

And as a sign of the times, here's an item which appeared in the programme for that Blackburn Rovers match:

We would like to say how pleased we are that League match bonuses have been increased. Players now receive £3 for a win instead of £2 and £1 10s. for a draw instead of £1—a rise which we have advocated for some time. As Football Combination bonuses have always been 50 per cent of League bonuses we anticipate that they, too, will be proportionately increased.

## RECORD BREAKERS

Darwen hold the Football League record for having conceded most goals in total in a season.

In season 1898-99 (Division II), Darwen conceded a total of 141 goals in

34 matches, a total never yet surpassed.

They won only two games at home, beating Leicester 3—0 and Luton 4—1 and they drew one away match at Gainsboro, 2—2. They drew four games at home and lost all of their other games home and away.

They lost 10-0 twice; in 12 games conceded 5 goals or more.

#### GOALSCORING OVER THE YEARS

In season 1925-26, Millwall did not concede a goal in 11 consecutive matches in Division III South.

## ITEMS OF INTEREST

The Wanderers were in five Cup Finals in seven seasons from 1871 to 1878.

Newcastle United were in five Cup Finals in seven seasons also, from 1904 to 1911.

Teams who reached the F.A. Cup Final, whilst in Division II are:—

Notts County (1893-94) Barnsley (1911-12) W.B.A. (1930-31) Burnley (1946-47) Wolverhampton W. (1907-08) West Ham Utd. (1922-23) Sheffield United (1935-36) Leicester (1948-49)

Spurs also reached the Final, and won the Cup in 1901-2. They were then a non-League Club.

Alf Common was the first player to be transferred for a four-figure amount. He went from Sunderland to Middlesbrough for £1,000 in February 1905.

Port Vale were undefeated at home (Division III North) during season 1953-54, winning promotion to Division II.

In season 1905-06 Bristol City won 14 consecutive League games.

Preston won 14 consecutive League games in season 1950-51.
