Menu

Welcome again today to the Valley after two consecutive Satur-

days with away fixtures.

We are now entering a most interesting stage of the season and entertain in the next few weeks Norwich, Millwall, Orient, Fulham and Portsmouth. These games should be full of interest and drama with the match against Millwall on Tuesday 25th April a fitting finale to the season.

Of equal interest is the Easter period when we entertain neighbours Orient on Friday 31st March (kick-off 11.15 a.m.) and next day have Norwich as visitors (kick-off 3 p.m.) Bookings from the East Anglian City are already very high so we should be in for an exciting

Easter.

Luton

Our last home game was against Luton and by winning 2-0 we recorded our third double of the season. Right from the kick-off the team took the initiative and played with great determination.

A particularly interesting aspect of the game for many supporters was the way, in the absence of the injured Dennis Bond, that Eamonn Rogers and Cyril Davies thrived on the additional work load and responsibility. Their style of play was contrasting but complementary and on the recurring theme of the youth of the Charlton team it is interesting to realise that Cyril is only twenty three years of age and Eamonn only twenty four.

Our form, particularly away from home, has been variable this season but this is, no doubt, a feature of any very young side in the maturing phase of its development. Another very encouraging feature of the Luton game was the form of twenty-one year old captain Paul Went who continued his personal habit of scoring against Luton. Last season supporters will recall his games against Malcolm McDonald when he dominated the England Under-23 striker.

Oxford

In conditions which were the worst any player could remember Oxford beat us by two slips to one slide. It is interesting to note that at the same time at near-by Abingdon a game was abandoned after six players had collapsed through extreme cold and exhaustion. The game illustrated the vagaries of the English climate as the kick-off was in sunshine on a firm pitch and at half time the pitch was under water with snow and sleet being blown down the pitch. In the circumstances all twenty two players are to be congratulated on attempting to provide a game in impossible conditions for ninety minutes.

Other prizes and awards for other finalists and local winners.


Competition open to all boys and girls who are over 8 yrs. and under 16 yrs. old on 1st March 1972, who live in the Metropolitan Police District.

Profile

"One of the best players outside the First Division". That is the accolade that most managers would give to Swindon's flying winger Don'Rogers.

In the present day transfer market Rogers would fetch a £200,000 fee but the 27-year-old Somerset born star has no wish, it seems, to play for anyone but Swindon Town.

He joined the Club as a 16-yearold in January 1961, signed as a professional in November 1962, and has been a regular member of the first team for most of the time since.

Rogers is a firm favourite with crowds wherever he plays and he is one of the few "old fashioned" wingers left in the game.

When he gets the ball he uses his tremendous speed and skill to make for goal and his lethal shooting makes him a constant menace to the best of defences.

He has scored many memorable goals for Swindon but none more important or exciting than the two in the League Cup Final, which Town won in 1969-70.

On a gruelling Wembley pitch he thrilled the crowd with his devastating runs.

Rogers, who is hoping to become a father for the first time this month, played for England at youth and under 23 level and many football fans are surprised that he has not received more international honours.

He also played for the Football League against the Scottish League in 1970.

During his career with Swindon Rogers has won a League Cup

Winners medal, an Anglo Italian Cup Winners medal, in 1970, and was in the Swindon teams that won promotion from the Third to the Second Division in 1962-63 and 1969-70.

Naturally Rogers loves scoring goals and his biggest dislike in the game is being pulled back by his shirt after beating an opponent.

His favourite ground is Hillsborough and the most difficult full back he has played against is Leeds United's Paul Reaney.

A keen table tennis and cricket player in his spare time, Rogers would like to play in the first Division—with Swindon.

If that colourful character Dave Mackay, now boss of the Wiltshire club is successful, Rogers may one day get his wish.

Peter Downsborough. Born Halifax. Signed in August 1965 from Halifax Town where he was a product of local football. A fearless agile goalkeeper.

Roy Jones. Born Clacton-on-Sea. Signed for the Club in October 1967 after obtaining his release from the R.A.F.

Owen Dawson. Born Hatfield. Joined the Club from Portsmouth in June 1962. He was a regular first team, player until he was unluckily injured.

Rod Thomas. Born Glyncorrwg. A former youth player with the Club. He was signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Welsh Under 23 and full International.

Joe Butler. Born Newcastle. Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the Club's Junior team.

John Trollope. Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon Ground Staff from school. He was selected for the first team in 1960/61 when he was just 16 years old.

Roger Smart. Born Swindon. Another local player who joined the Club direct from Swindon Schoolboys team. Excels as a deep lying inside forward.

Frank Burrows. Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the Club from Scunthorpe United for whom he played 3 season. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team.

Stan Harland. Born Liverpool. Was signed from Carlisle United in July 1966. Formerly with Everton and Bradford City. Regular choice at left half since 1966/67 season.

Don Rogers. Born Paulton. He was signed by Swindon when only 15 and quickly came to the fore. Has gained England Youth and Under-23 International caps.

Peter Noble. Born Sunderland. Joined the Club from Newcastle in January 1968. Prefers to play an attacking role. Regular member of the first team for several seasons.

Chris Jones. Born Altrincham. A hard working centre forward signed from Manchester City.

Arthur Horsfield. Born Newcastle. A close season signing from Newcastle United. Previously played for Middlesbrough. Top goal scorer last season.

Stephen Peplow. Born Liverpool. Played for Liverpool Schoolboys, and joined Liverpool from school.

Dave Mackay. Born Edinburgh. Formerly with Hearts, Tottenham and Derby. He was capped 26 times for Scotland and has won many medals during his career. Joined Swindon in May 1971. His experience and ability is expected to do much for Swindon Town in their quest for First Division status.

Approximately 253 miles from West London. Compiled by the Royal Automobile Club.


Leave London from Marble Arch via Edgware Road and proceed north to the junction with the North Circular at Staples Corner. Turn right and continue to Brent Cross Flyover, filter left onto the A.41 and follow the signs to the start of the M.1 8 miles Follow the M.1, northward to the junction with the M.18 and follow the M.18 to the intersection with the Doncaster By-Pass A.1(M) 167 miles Proceed north by the A.1(M) then the A.1 to the junction with the A.168 218 miles

Turn right onto the A.168 and continue to Thirsk. Proceed to the junction with the A.19 and turn left. Follow the A.19 to the junction with the A.172237 miles

Keep right and follow the A.172 to Middlesbrough 253 miles

Enter Middlesbrough by Marton Road (A.172) and continue ahead to the second roundabout. Take the first exit—Park Road North—then ahead to Ayresome Street and the ground is on your left (see Town Plan).

There is parking space available near the ground but the police control street parking, so watch for any signs including diversions.
