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news & views

It is with great pleasure we welcome Burnley to the County Ground for the first ever League game between the two teams.

Burnley, a great club with a fine tradition, and revered throughout the football world since 1893. It is looked upon as a First Division club, although in the thirties it spent some time in Division 2. Since promotion in 1947 it has been among the top clubs, and reached the F.A. Cup Final twice, in seasons 1946/47 and 1961/62. It must have been a bitter blow for Burnley, with its new schemes and expansion to be relegated last season after twenty-four consecutive seasons in Division 1. However it is good to know that, despite this setback, the scheme for developing Turf Moor is still going forward. This is a bold step to take as we in Swindon well know. How often is heard the cry, when such plans are formulated, 'Let's have the team first'. Quite so, but football clubs know they now have to find more and more ways of producing revenue.

It has often been said 'The character of great clubs is formed by the atmosphere of the neighbourhood in which the teams play, and by the spirit of those who support the teams'. This could have been said of Swindon at one time (it was a real tragedy if we lost at home) but Swindon and its people have changed considerably in the last decade. It is however still true of our opponents today.

Burnley, with its population of 75,000 (Swindon's today is 100,000. Hope the Town Clerk, who is now a very welcome supporter, agrees with that figure) is the smallest town to support a club in the First Division (49 seasons). Perhaps nowhere in the country is there quite the same relationship between the community and the team. Seldom has Burnley F.C. delved heavily into the transfer market. They catch them young – on the moors or in the mills, home grown products – and here evolves the deep affinity; they are friends and they grow up together.

Such is Burnley – a true Lancashire club with a great tradition. In 1914 they won fame and made history when they won the F.A. Cup at Crystal Palace, beating Liverpool 1–0. Tommy Boyle received the trophy from the late King George V, the first reigning monarch to attend a Cup Final. History was made in other ways too. The winners' medals bore the inscription 'English Cup' instead of 'F.A. Cup', for the first and only time ever. Jerry Dawson, one of the greatest goalkeepers of all time, and who gave the club 21 years splendid service, did not play. He was unfit for the Semi-Final, and despite recovery insisted that his deputy Ronnie Sewell should play in the Final. What a fine act of sportsmanship.

Burnley last visited Swindon on Wednesday, 4th December, 1968 in the second leg of the Football League Cup Semi-Final. A fortnight previously we had won at Turf Moor 2–1, so everything was in our favour, but Burnley played good open football, moved very easily and were quicker than

Swindon, yet we had more scoring opportunities. The visitors went into the lead in 50 minutes, from a goal by Casper, and when Kindon scored a minute later, it looked as if they would go to the Final as the aggregate score then stood at 3–2 in their favour. John Smith brought the totals level after a corner kick thus making a third game necessary. What a match that proved to be – to some of our supporters even better than the Final. Swindon leading 1–0 until a minute from full time, then being 1–2 down after only one minute of extra time. However we fought back to bring the final score for that game 3–2, and a total aggregate of 6–5 for Swindon. A great game, played in fine spirit, well refereed by Jim Finney. What a disappointment for Burnley, but a great fillip for Swindon football.

Incidentally the second leg played at Swindon on 4th December, 1968 produced a gate of 28,000, and receipts were £8,688 13s 6d. Shall we get half that number today? I hope so, but how times have changed in 3½ years. Most of the Swindon players concerned in that game are still with us, as shown in the team lists.

John Angus

From the Northumberland village of Amble, he had a total of 436 League appearances to his name at the start of the season. His debut in the First Division was as long ago as September 1956, and over a long period he has been one of the most respected full-backs in the country, holding his own against the best of forwards. Capped by England at Youth, Under-23 and full grade, he was a regular member of the Burnley team which won the League championship in 1960.

Arthur Bellamy

Also a North-Easterner, he comes from the Durham town of Blackhill. Graduated through the Turf Moor junior teams before making a League debut against Manchester City in March 1963. Aged 29, he has played over 170 times in League matches, mostly in a mid-field role, but on occasions as a 'sweeper' and a striker. Made 24 First Division appearances in Burnley's relegation season and 19 in the season before that.

Jim Thomson

Fair-haired Glaswegian who joined 'the Clarets' for a large fee from Chelsea in September 1968. Operates in middle or on the left of the back line but can be useful in attack. Aged 24.

Alan West

Midfield star of the 1968 Youth Cup team. Comes from Hyde, Cheshire, and after making a First Division debut in 1969/70 and playing in the senior side last season, he is expected to make a bigger impact this time. Aged 19.

Martin Dobson

Club captain, he comes from Rishton, near Blackburn, Lancashire, and is aged 23. After great success as a schoolboy centre-forward, he joined Bolton Wanderers but was later given a free-transfer and went to Turf Moor. Under-23 cap for England as centre-half. An elegant, skilful player, he made a good recovery after breaking a leg in a pre-season friendly at Middlesbrough in August 1970.

Doug Collins

Joined Burnley for a substantial fee in September 1968 from Grimsby Town and quickly impressed with his great enthusiasm and ability to work the ball either in midfield or on the wing. Aged 25, he had made 41 first team appearances for 'The Clarets' at the start of this season and these include 13 in relegation season.

Eddie Cliff

Liverpool-born left-back who was a member of the Burnley side which won the Football Association Youth Cup in 1968. After good performances in the Central League side he made a senior debut at Southampton in October 1970. Aged 19.

Frank Casper

A Yorkshireman from Barnsley who was transferred to Burnley from Rotherham United in June 1967. Had played 135 League games up to the start of the season, including 22 in relegation season. Aged 26, he was leading scorer in each of his first two seasons in the claret-and-blue and was picked by Sir Alf Ramsey for the Football League XI.

David Thomas

Born near Nottingham. Aged 20, he has played for England at School, Youth and Under-23 level. A forward with all the skills who was once described by Don Revie as 'the finest prospect in Britain'. At the start of this season had reached the surprising figure, for one so young, of 109 League appearances.

Eric Probert

Former Yorkshire Schools player from Barnsley, he joined Burnley from school and made rapid progress to the first team. Second youngest player to appear for Burnley in the First Division, he was 16 when he played against Arsenal in November 1968, but this was still a little older than David Thomas was on his debut. Aged 19.

Leighton James

Native of Gorseinon, South Wales. Was one of the stars of the Burnley youth team which reached the semi-final of the F.A. Youth Cup in 1971, and his speed and skill on the left wing were a big asset. First Division debut was against Nottingham Forest in November 1970. A good cricketer, he plays in the Lancashire League for Lowerhouse the club of which Mr. Bob Lord is Chairman. Aged 18.

Steve Kindon

Lancastrian from Warrington who was an outstanding schoolboy athlete and rugby union player. Joined Burnley from school and was a great success as left-winger in the triumphant 1968 Youth Cup side. Was Burnley's top scorer in 1969/70 but fell away last season when he was dogged by injuries and marked very closely. Aged 20.

Colin Waldron

Native of Oldham, he began his career with Bury and had a spell with Chelsea before a transfer to Turf Moor in October 1967. Along with skipper Dobson is the backbone of the defence. Aged 23.

Paul Fletcher

Joined Burnley from Bolton for a big fee in March 1971, and quickly made a good impression with the Turf Moor fans. Big-hearted striker who is not all that tall but is still very dangerous in the air. Made his Burnley debut against Southampton. Aged 20.

Peter Mellor

Former England youth international goalkeeper who was with Manchester City for three years as an amateur before joining Witton Albion. Had magnificent first season at Turf Moor in 1969/70 when he was an ever-present in 50 Cup and League games. This season to remember was crowned by two call-ups for England Under-23 duty, although in both matches he was finally named as substitute. Aged 23.

Michael Docherty

Preston-born son of Tommy Docherty, he joined Burnley at the request of his father, then Manager of Chelsea. Was captain of the Burnley team which won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1968. Michael plays at right-back or in mid-field.

Geoff Nulty

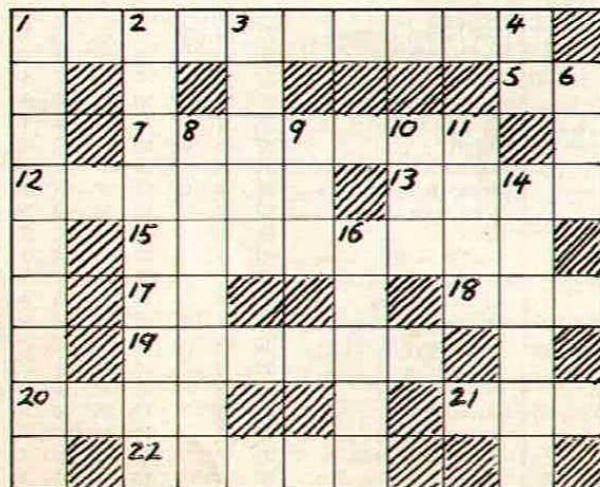
From Prescott, Lancashire, he joined Burnley on a free-transfer from Stoke City. Originally a left-back he was converted into a striker but last season his first team appearances were mostly in the back line, either as a centre-back or left-back. Aged 22.

Tony Waiters

Former Blackpool and England goalkeeper who 'retired' to become a coach but was persuaded to make a return on the playing side after three years' absence. Signed for Burnley in August 1970, when he left his job on the coaching staff at Liverpool F.C.

SWINDON'S MINI-RESERVATIONS CENTRE

The box office of Swindon Town Football Club is now a mini-reservations centre for Keith Prowse. The box office has been installed with a computer terminal which is linked directly with a central Keith Prowse computer in Shaftesbury Avenue.

All the Keith Prowse allocations of seats in theatres, cinemas, sports arenas etc., have now been programmed on to the computer.

Keith Prowse control over 40% of all London Theatre sales and have been in the business for nearly 150 years. They have, in effect, the best and widest allocations of seats of any ticket agency.

This means that the box office manager at Swindon Town has direct access to any of these seats without having to use the telephone.

All he needs to do when he receives an enquiry from a customer or an agent about the availability of a certain event is to press the relevant buttons. In a few seconds the answer is relayed via the teletype machine. If the seats requested are not available, the best alternatives are suggested. When the customer has made his decision, a sell button is pushed and within seconds the ticket printer prints out a ticket with all the information on it, as if purchased direct from the box office. The computer also automatically takes those seats out of circulation, so there is no risk of duplication.

Agents around Swindon can now make use of this new facility. It means that instead of those time-wasting costly telephone calls to London, Agents can now telephone Swindon Town and immediately find out the availability of seats. If the tickets are available, the Agent makes out his own ticket.

Highlights in the history of Burnley

One of the 12 founder members of The Football League in 1888, Burnley began life as Burnley Rovers in 1881, the second name being dropped from the title a year later. Their record is a long and proud one: twice League Champions, in 1920/21 when the club went a spell of 30 League matches without defeat, and 1959/60; runners-up in 1919/20 and 1961/62.

Second Division Champions in 1897/98, runners-up in 1912/13 and 1946/47; F.A. Cup winners in 1914, losing finalists at Wembley in 1947 and 1962.

Burnley's Turf Moor ground is undergoing considerable re-development. It once housed 54,775 spectators for an F.A. Cup tie against Huddersfield Town in 1924 and recent improvements at the ground have included the building of one of the most modern stands in the League, equipped to provide war air heating for spectators.

The present Burnley manager is Jimmy Adamson who captained the club through one of their most successful periods a decade ago when Burnley won the League Championship in 1959/60, were runners-up in 1961/62, finished third the following season and reached Wembley in 1962.

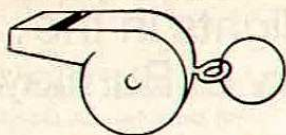
The club's record goalscorer in a season was G. W. Beel who scored 35 goals in First Division matches in 1927/28. Burnley's record victory is 9-0, recorded three times against: Darwen, Division One 1892, Crystal Palace, F.A. Cup 1908 and New Brighton, F.A. Cup 1957. Record defeat for the Turf Moor Club is 10-0, v. Aston Villa, Division One 1925 and v. Sheffield United, Division One 1929.

Club colours: Claret shirts with blue collar and cuffs, white shorts, white stockings with claret and blue hoops on the turnovers.

Officiated as Linesman in the Anglo-Italian Competition in Italy in May 1970. 1967 refereed Southern League Cup. 1970 refereed London Challenge Cup. 1970 refereed F.A. Amateur Cup Quarter Final.

Married, with three sons, he is a Company Director. Likes cricket, badminton and tennis and has a particular interest in amateur dramatics, on the administration side of which he is the Chairman of a group.

Played football up to the age of 27. Commenced as a goalkeeper but finally finished playing centre-forward, and in his final season created a record in that he scored in every match.

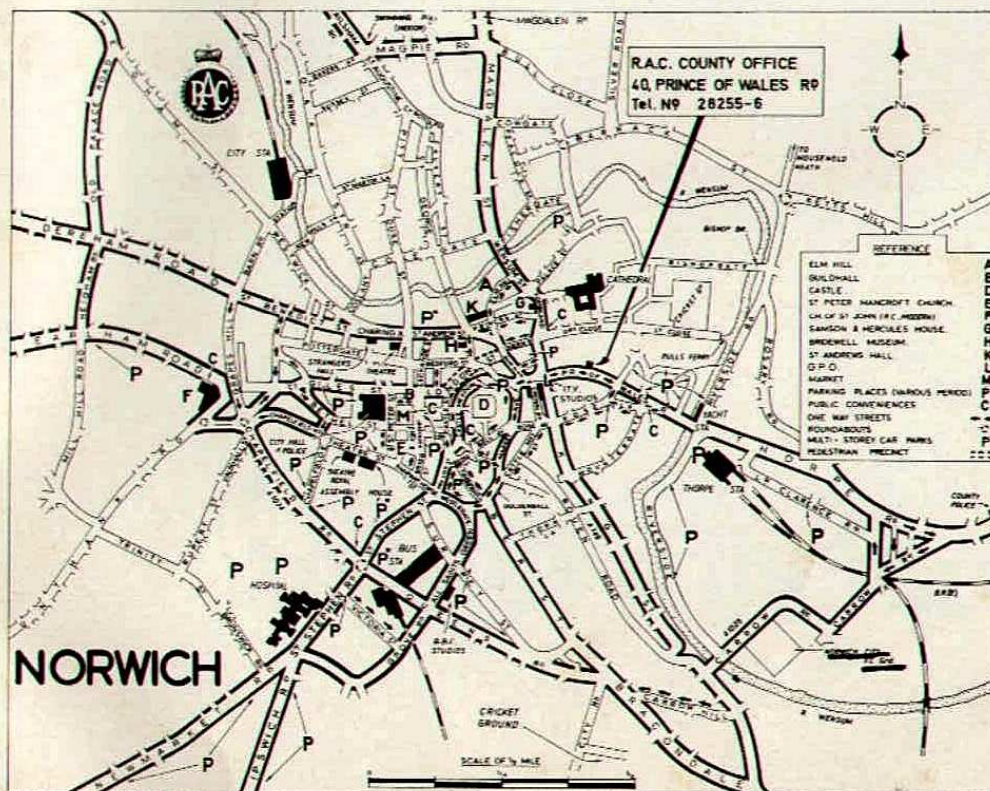
