

It is with a feeling of real sadness we greet our friends from Watford this evening. Unfortunately, we are to lose them at the end of the season. Yet it was only three years ago we joined them in promotion to Division 2. The final League positions that year were as follows:

The results of the two clubs were almost identical, except by virtue of a slightly better goal average Watford were declared the League Champions. How quickly the cycle of fortune has changed. We have very deep feelings for the Directors of Watford, men whom many of us have known since the resumption of football after World War I. That feeling is even more sincere, because we in Swindon had the same experience in 1965 after only two seasons in Division 2. Our great hope is they will quickly return. They, like us, have embarked on various schemes to develop their ground at Vicarage Road. This setback must cause them much concern, but we are sure they will still go forward with their various buildings. Football management is one long struggle, but we know Watford will continue in their efforts, and we wish them every success.

Season 1968/69 was, of course, the year for Swindon. The League Cup was won in March, but the battle for promotion con-

tinued almost to the end of the season. When Watford, then in top position, visited the County Ground, Swindon were in second place, and both clubs had 49 points each. Most of us thought a win for Swindon was imperative, whilst others considered a draw sufficient to hold our place. As was expected the game proved to be very hard and fast, with rather a lot of big kicking. Neither team had any great advantage, but Peter Downsborough brilliantly saved a penalty in the first half. In the last fifteen minutes Swindon maintained almost complete control, but four minutes from the end a breakaway produced a goal scored by Endean, Result: Swindon 0, Watford 1, A bitter blow to Swindon, and one which appeared to jeopardise our chances of promotion, but this as we all know proved quite false. The gate that evening was 28,898, and the teams were - Swindon: Downsborough: Dawson, Trollope: Butler, Burrows, Harland; Thomas, Smart, Smith, Noble, Rogers. Watford: Walker; Welbourne, Williams; Eddy, Lees, Walley; Scullion, Hale, Garbett, Endean, Lewis,

Last season we drew 1-1 at home on Tuesday, 1st September, 1970, and the following week we defeated Watford 4-2 in the second round of the League Cup, but the result was in doubt right to the final minute. The away fixture was the last but one of the season, resulting 2-1 in our favour.

As I sit in the New Stand, and look around the ground, I am amazed at the progress the Club has made, as I reflect on past seasons and the many difficulties.

When football restarted in 1946 the County Ground was covered with huts and concrete slabs (it had been a prisoner-ofwar camp). However, with much diligence and tremendous effort the pitch was made playable, and most of the terracing and stands made reasonably safe. The reaction after the war created great interest, and gates were very high for four or five seasons (ranging between 25,000 to 30,000). With more settled conditions interest began to flag in the early fifties, although Swindon enjoyed a great Cup run in 1951/52. Gradually the whole position worsened, and at one time the Club was in great danger of closing down. Swindon Town was really saved from extinction by a few determined men. What they did for the Club will never be known, but they did it willingly and unselfishly.

Although we continued to play in the Third Division (South) many economies were carried out, especially in regard to the number of staff, and in seasons 1955/56 and 1956/57 Swindon had to seek relection. Fortunately in 1956 the Small Lotteries Act was passed, and due in no small measure to one member of the Board, a very successful competition was organ-

Mike Walker

Mike was signed by Watford in September 1968, having previously played with Reading, Shrewsbury and York City. On several occasions he represented Wales at Under-23 level, was in the squad for the Home Championships for last two seasons and toured New Zealand and the Far East with the Welsh party during the last close-season. He has made 131 first team appearances for Watford.

Derek Edmonds

Signed in May 1970 from Leeds United, with whom he spent five years. Derek was born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and during the latter part of last season made 11 first team appearances.

Duncan Welbourne

Duncan is in his ninth season with Watford, having joined the Vicarage Road staff in November 1963 from Grimsby Town. The longest serving member of the Club, Duncan has made 353 first team appearances.

David Butler

Like John Farley, David was born in Stockton and played for Workington before being signed by Watford in November 1970. He had not missed a game from then until the end of last season.

Larry McGettigan

Born in London, Larry was apprenticed with the Club before signing as a professional in December 1970. He has yet to make his first team debut, but was included in the party which went to Czechoslovakia.

Keith Eddy

Born in Barrow, Keith played for the local club before signing for Watford in July 1966. He has made 227 first team appearances and has been on the last two close-season tours with an F.A. party.

John Farley

Born in Stockton, John played for his home town team before signing professional forms in July 1969. He made his first team debut last season and made 11 appearances in all.

Tom Walley

Tom has been with the Club since March 1967, having previously played for Arsenal. So far he has made 208 first team appearances, has represented his country as a skipper of the Welsh Under-23 team and was in the Welsh F.A. party for the Home Championships last season.

Walter Lees

Walter was signed from Kilsyth Rangers in June 1968, and has made 95 first team appearances.

Colin Franks

Colin signed professional forms at the beginning of the 1969/70 season, after being with the Club as an amateur. His first team appearances to date are 23.

Roy Sinclair

Formerly with Liverpool and Tranmere Rovers, Roy travelled south to become a Watford player in March 1969.

Terry Garbett

Formerly with Middlesbrough, Terry joined Watford in August 1966. So far he has scored 51 goals in 221 first team appearances.

Ray Lugg

Ray was also a Middlesbrough player before going to Watford in November 1969.

Bill Jennings

A former amateur with the Club, Bill signed professional forms in April 1970. He has represented England Youth at Amateur level on several occasions.

John Pearce

After serving the Club several years as an amateur, John became a part-time professional in July 1969.

Ron Wigg

Ron joined Watford in June 1970 from Ipswich and proved his worth to the Club with 17 goals in 45 first team appearances.

Charlie Woods

A junior with Newcastle United, Charlie made his debut with that Club in 1960/61. He then had service with Bournemouth, Crystal Palace and Ipswich before going to Watford in June 1970.

John Williams

John was an apprentice with Watford before signing as a professional in September 1964. So far he has made 264 first team appearances.

Michael Packer

After serving an apprenticeship with Watford, Mike became a professional in April 1968 and has so far made 34 first team appearances.

Ken Owen

Born in Bangor, Ken completed his apprenticeship and was signed by the Club as a professional in November 1970.

History of Watford Football Club

Seventy-one years ago a dream was born. It was a vision created by necessity and couched in optimism. The year was 1898 when the committee members of the West Herts and St. Mary's football clubs agreed that, with the advent of professionalism to the game, amalgamation was the only possible course.

The result was the formation of Watford F.C., and the reverses, trials and tribulations in the subsequent years were such that a fiction writer dare not attempt to conjure for fear of losing the credibility of his reader.

It is questionable whether the pioneers of the Town's team would have pressed their cause with such urgency had they known of the crisis-torn years which lay ahead. Fame, if not football glory, is an adequate assessment of Watford F.C.'s history. But for the determination of the Chairman, Mr. R. E. Thorpe, in those early

days, it is doubtful whether the Club would have survived.

It was he who was the first of many to dig deep into his own pockets until eventually the Club survived the formative years and moved into a new era as a public company.

The history of Watford F.C. is crammed full of 'new eras'. It had to be. As the Club stumbled on from one crisis or disappointment to the next, only optimism backed by finance kept the flame burning. It is easy to lose count of the times the supporters came to the aid of the Company. In the crisis during the 1914/18 war, the late twenties and early fifties public subscriptions kept the wolves from the door.


The managers have also played a prominent part. First came that old International and one time member of the 'Old Invincibles' (Preston North End) John Goodall,


- (1) Catching the Luton defence unprepared, Arthur Horsfield gets his head to a low near-post cross, which was well saved by the goalkeeper.

who as player-manager manager brought Watford out of the depths of the Southern League (Division Two) in the first decade of this century. Then there was the enigmatic Harry Kent, who by judgment and shrewd use of the transfer scene, kept Watford from liquidation. Without a ground and no one to play against, the Club technically ceased to exist during the First World War.

Still Watford struggled on to the dawn of vet another new era and the move to Vicarage Road in 1922. Re-election in the late twenties and near-promotion almost a decade later were the highspots as Watford, founder-members of Division 3 (South), settled on an even keel. There was rarely a dull moment but the successes were few and far between. Perhaps relegation to Division 4 proved the turning point. Two years later, in 1960, the Club which had been known as the Wasps, Magpies, Brewers, Blues and Golden Boys, emerged as triumphant Hornets to become a power to be reckoned with in Division 3. At the end of last season the dreams and endeavours of past and present players and officials were realised - the so long elusive promotion to Division 2 of the Football League was achieved.

Ken Furphy and his men stood at the summit of the Club's history. They had realised the dream which was savoured in 1898. History had been perfectly rounded off. Their 50th year as members of the Football League was celebrated with Watford's debut in Division 2.
