

NEWS & VIEWS

Still events do not run kindly for us. Two consecutive away games, and although the national press on both occasions gave us good 'write-ups', unfortunately two defeats and no points gained.

So at the moment the League position is not very good, but there is time for an improvement. This and the falling attendances, coupled with the financial situation, certainly creates great problems.

The worrying factor to me, however is the apparent lack of interest, even apathy. When the Club passed through the most difficult period in its history in the early fifties, many of our supporters were genuinely upset. Often in some ways they hindered rather than helped, but it was only because they really had the Club at heart. They were fanatics, but they were real supporters.

Today, it appears the ones most concerned are the older supporters, many of whom stood by the Club in that very difficult period. While I would rather not mention anyone in particular, we shall never know what some of those men did for the Club in the fifties.

Now, those same people, much older, are again worried. So many I meet say, almost with tears in their eyes, 'Whatever has happened to the old Club? Can't something be done?', and 'Oh! that change of colours after ninety years'.

I must confess I rather like the new playing kit, and the stockings are similar to the ones worn when Mr. Louis Page was manager. Nevertheless, I still maintain tradition remains in football, and the colours of Swindon Town to me will always be red and white. I am not in the least bit superstitious, but many older supporters are, and they quote the season when there was a move to change to green, and what a disastrous year that was.

I shall be accused of living in the past, but I do feel for those older supporters, many of whom are quite distressed.

Football, generally, appears to be in a most peculiar situation. On the one hand we hear of outrageous sums being paid in transfer fees, and on the other, less and less spectators, loss of income, and rising costs. Many reasons have been put forward for the sudden decline – no doubt defensive football and lack of flair has contributed to the falling attendances. Judged however by the opinion of the man in the street, higher admission charges seem quite a factor. With the cost of living rising continuously, many people cannot afford to see football each week. As one man said the other day, it costs almost £1 to attend a match.

Next April clubs face another expense – Value Added Tax – when they will have to pay 10 per cent of all gate receipts. This could be a crippling blow. I well remember how entertainment tax affected clubs, and what a great relief it was when it was finally abolished in 1958, after much agitation. Now it seems we are back to those times, or even worse.

This afternoon we entertain a club with great traditions – 'Proud Preston'. At present they occupy sixth place in the League table. They have won three away games, scoring more goals than at home. Evidently in good form on opponents' grounds, it will be a hard fought game.



It is not enough to sit back and say: 'Well, it will come', because it won't unless we ourselves make it happen.

I said that I was not at the Hull City game. I was interested in a player and as a matter of fact still am, and have already put in a bid for him. I'm hoping that I will be successful this time after failing on three other players already this season.

I will say here and now that if the boys in the team are not going to get the results that I would like, I will have to get some fresh faces to try and give the team a new lease of life.

I hope for the sake of you, the supporters, that we are going to give you a game that will send you home happy because you certainly deserve it, but we will just have to wait and see. I for one am not going to predict the result. If we continue to play as we played last Saturday we can only climb up the table, which at the moment seems like a mountain.


