

NEWS & VIEWS

We continue to make news with all the comings and goings at the County Ground. I doubt if we shall ever know the whole story, but all I have to say is that Swindon Town F.C. is much greater, as a club, than any individual person, be he player or Manager.

I have always maintained there still remains in football a certain amount of tradition, and there is plenty at Swindon. Players and officials change, but we are very fortunate to have a very firm hard core of personnel. There is even now at the County Ground a number of people who have remained loyal since the resumption of football in 1946. Some even go back fifty years, to the early twenties, and believe me, these people will continue to work for the former glories of Swindon Town.

Already one feels there is a spirit of optimism and determination, even a new awakening of interest. Those of our supporters who were fortunate enough to travel to Luton on Saturday last, must have noticed a real revival of wonderful team spirit. Although several of the players were not completely fit, they gave a great display. In the first half, when Luton applied strong pressure, every one helped out in defence, and it was obvious our team was capable of containing all attacks.

In the second half Swindon came right into the game, scoring a splendid goal. In the last ten minutes, with the crowd roaring them on, Luton threw everything into attack, but by calm, determined football, the game was won.

From a spectator's point of view, it was an excellent game of football, played in the right spirit. Naturally the home club was disappointed, but the officials were most sincere in their congratulations and praise of the goal. It really is a pleasure to meet such people. Had Luton won, they could have occupied second position in the League, yet there were no re-

criminations, no lessening of hospitality, even to saying: It will be an enjoyable ride back home'.

Now to other matters. It was pleasing indeed to see the great start in Division I by Donald Rogers. We hope he keeps up the high standard. One thing, whatever the praise, Donald will remain the modest character we know. Good luck, Donald!

The ties of the First Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup will be played next Saturday. A well-known manager, often in the news, has suggested that in a certain season this competition be abandoned. Apparently he knows little of the financial position of the lesser clubs. How often a run in the Cup competition (be it only three games) can be the life blood of a team, money and interest-wise. Maybe his club is involved in European Football (usually a great financial asset), but that is not the lot of many clubs, even in Division 1. The F.A. Cup competition revives interest, often when support is flagging, and gives more power to the League programme.

We in Swindon have been greatly indebted to good Cup runs in many seasons. Of course, we are not involved this year until the Third Round, due to be played on 13th January, 1973. May the fates be kind.

secretary's notes

It is our wish to be again included in the participants of the Anglo-Italian League clubs' tournament in 1973. In the light of past experience it has been decided to make certain changes in the structure of the tournament, and I think you will agree from the following extract from the first Anglo-Italian Football News, the prospects are extremely exciting.

The Other Side of the Coin

Before the start of 1973, certain Football League clubs will be invited to take part in the fourth Anglo-Italian League clubs' tournament. The clubs involved will be those no longer involved in the three major European Competitions.

In the light of three years' experience, the competition has been re-structured and, instead of taking place in the summer, it will be held towards the end of the English and Italian seasons.

The Organising Committee believe that it would be helpful, not only to the competition, but to clubs, managers and coaches, and, of course, the mass media, if bulletins were produced to keep everyone up to date with all developments affecting English and Italian clubs.

In its three years of life, the tournament has been proved to be viable, rewarding and successful. Yet, unhappily, it has occasionally suffered some criticism.

The Organisers do not complain about this. Anyone in public entertainment knows the truth of the old adage 'Any publicity is good publicity'.

At the same time, it is right that the case for the competition should be re-stated, especially at a time when it is popular to accuse football of over-exposing itself.

It may be that some clubs have been persuaded that there is little point in being involved in the competition; that their players already have too much football, and that the disciplinary and injury hazards of an extra competition are too great.

This bulletin intends to show the other side of the story.

Too Much Football?

In a recent West Bromwich Albion programme, the editor referred to a Texaco Cuptie the team had played against Sheffield United, which had attracted only 8,000 spectators. 'Many of those who gave us their support' said the programme 'might have wondered whether participation was justified from the club's point of view'.

Don Howe, the Albion manager, explained that the answer was a resounding 'yes'. 'It is a great way to keep the players in competitive shape at a time when the League is settling down to weekly soccer on Saturdays.

'At this stage last season, I was deliberately arranging friendlies to achieve just this purpose. I believe there's no practice like match practice.'

Few managers would disagree with that. When the cry goes up that the match demands on players are too great, it is conveniently forgotten that only one or two clubs – who inevitably get all the publicity – are involved in too many competitions each season.

For every Leeds, Liverpool, Tottenham or Arsenal, battling through the League Championship battle, F.A. Cup semi-finals, and European quarter-finals, there are 10 clubs with nothing left to play for.

By next March, when the Anglo-Italian qualifying matches begin, there may well be one or two clubs complaining about the pressures of success. But there will be many more wishing they had some extra incentive to keep interest alive among players and supporters.

Gary Pierce (Goalkeeper)

Born in Bury. Played as an amateur with Oxford United, Rochdale and Bolton before joining non-league Mossley. He signed from there in February 1971. Has made twelve first team appearances.

Les Chapman (Winger)

Former Chaddeton Grammar School player, he joined Huddersfield in September 1969 in a move which involved centre-forward David Shaw moving to Oldham. Has made 78 first team appearances and missed only four games last season.

Alan Gowling (Centre-forward)

Club skipper and Hudderfield's costliest signing when he came from Manchester United in the close season. Stockport born he played for Cheshire and Stockport schoolboys and was capped at junior and senior amateur levels. Signed part-time professional for Manchester United in 1968 and became full-time after obtaining an economics degree at Manchester University. Played for and captained England Under-23's.

Mick Barry (Midfield)

The Hull-born player came to Huddersfield as an apprentice in October 1968 – chief scout Roy Lambert's first "find". A former England Schoolboy Youth trialist, he signed full professional in May 1970 and has made 16 first team appearances.

Dick Krzywicki (Winger)

Welsh born of Polish parents he is a former record Huddersfield signing, joining them from West Bromwich Albion during the former's promotion season. He has both Under-23 and full international honours for Wales and has made over forty first team appearances.

Bobby Hoy (Right-wing)

Joined the club from school in 1966 and became full professional the following year. Has made almost 100 first team appearances.

Geoff Hutt (Full-back)

Born near Castleford he became an apprentice in 1966 and signed full professional in September 1967. He gained England Youth honours and has played 181 games for the first team.

Alan Jones (Full-back)

An attacking player, he was born at Barnsley. He has played 22 first team games, making his debut against Nottingham Forest in a League Cup game in 1970.

Roy Ellam (Centre-half)

Born near Castleford and a school friend of Arsenal's John Radford. Signed professional with Bradford City in 1961 where he was a regular first team player until transferred to Huddersfield in June 1966. He has made 242 first team appearances which has included a spell of over 100 consecutive games.

Jimmy Lawson (Inside-right)

Born in Middlesbrough, he played for his home club before joining Huddersfield in July 1968.

Jimmy Nicholson (Right-half)

Born in Belfast and brought up with Manchester United where he made a very early name for himself. He won his first of many full international honours with Northern Ireland when he was only seventeen. He was transferred to Huddersfield in December 1964 and has made almost 300 first team appearances.

Terry Poole (Goalkeeper)

Born in Chesterfield, home town of Gordon Banks. He was signed from Manchester United in August 1968 and made his debut shortly afterwards against Manchester City. Has made 92 first team appearances.

Graham Pugh (Wing-half)

Born at Hoole, Cheshire he joined Sheffield Wednesday as an apprentice in 1965. He played in an F.A. Cup Final when eighteen. An England Under-23 international.

David Smith (Full-back)

Born at Sheffield he joined Huddersfield as full professional in April 1969. Has played sixteen first team games, scoring several goals.

Stephen Smith (Utility player)

Huddersfield born, he has played most positions for Huddersfield but is now established in midfield. He signed professional in October 1963 and he made 199 first team appearances.

Dennis Clarke (Right-back)

Occasions are rare when Huddersfield have to resort to the transfer market to find a full-back, but this happened in the 1969/70 season because a motoring accident robbed the Club of a valuable first team player. Clarke was an emergency signing from West Bromwich Albion with whom he was substitute and played to win a Cup Final medal at Wembley. Regular first team player since signing.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

We must have your support both vocally and financially if we are to succeed. Do your best today and next Saturday to bring along your friends, and see if we can boost our gates and the morale of this our Club.

I would thank sincerely everyone who has donated a match ball. The donors have ranged from Devon, Dorset, Gloucestershire and also locally. I need three more to complete the season. How about it? For £13.75 you can donate the ball and have your name in the programme and over the tannoy.

Keep your eye on our Youth team. They are playing well and are near the top of the Midland Youth League.





Leave Swindon by A361 and head for Banbury via Highworth, Lechlade, Burford, Shiptonunder-Wychwood, Chipping Norton and Bloxham. At Banbury take A423 for Mollington, Ladbroke and Southam (B4100). Turn on to A426 for Dunchurch and Rugby. Leave Rugby by A4114 and join M1 Motorway. Follow signs 'Leicester M1'. At Leicester Forest Service Station follow signs 'Nottingham and North M1'. At Trowell Service Area follow signs 'North, Leeds, Sheffield M1'. At M18 intersection and later at A1(M) intersection follow signs 'North, Doncaster'. At end of Motorway continue north on A1 until end of Boroughbridge By-pass. Here take A168 to Thirsk. Leave by A170 for Stockton-on-Tees but turn left after 1 mile for A19 to Cleveland Tontine.
