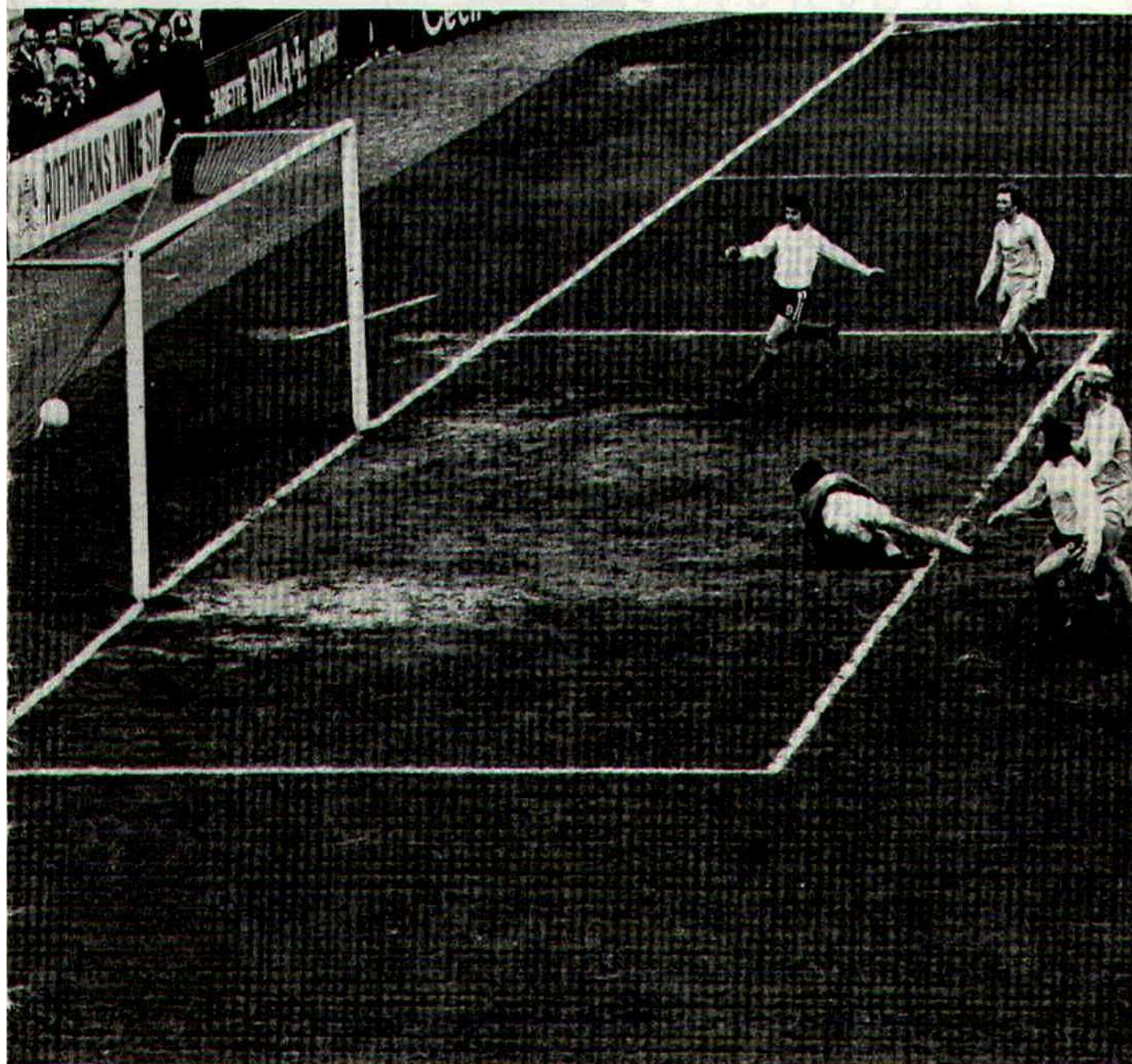

Swindon, who caused a soccer sensation when as a Third Division club they beat Arsenal 3-1 after extra time in the 1968-69 League Cup final at Wembley, have not won away for 10 games, including a 2-0 defeat at West Brom in the FA Cup.

They completed the double over us last season, although we have already taken a point off them this time with a 2-2 draw in December. Swindon's

leading marksman is former Charlton striker Ray Treacy, who has scored 14 goals. Today he meets a former Charlton colleague in our own, Paul Went. It should be an interesting meeting.

the League Cup-winning side's survivors and has
played over 250 games.

How Ted became a soccer legend

Ted Drake became one of the greatest centre forwards of all time by seeing a football for just 90 minutes a week.

Arsenal hid the ball from Ted, our reserve team manager, during his days at Highbury.

Explained Ted. "All we did was run and exercise during the week. So when we saw the ball on Saturday we went mad to touch it. Perhaps that is what clubs should do today."

Ted offered this advice during a "Football Forum" meeting held at Craven Cottage on Thursday, April 12.

He was one of a panel that answered soccer questions fired by members of Fulham's Thameside Pools scheme — an organisation run by Fulham for local clubs. We offer insurance, kit and advice to make their club better run.

Over 80 secretaries and treasurers turned up at the meeting held in the Riverside Stand.

Manager Alec Stock, coach Bill Taylor, chief scout Terry Medwin, skipper Alan Mullery and Ted Drake all took their turn in replying to topics ranging from George Best to the televising of football. Bob Oxby a sports journalist from the Daily Telegraph, was the chairman of the meeting.

"This meeting can only do good," said George Noyce, Fulham's commercial manager who organised the evening. "It brings us all closer together. A great success and we hope to have another forum next season."

The ever present

Goalkeeper Peter Mellor has been touching wood and stepping gingerly this week. Nothing was going to stop him playing today and becoming the only Fulham player to have a 100 per cent record for appearing in home matches this season.

Peter has, in fact, not missed a game for Fulham since he joined us from Burnley last February.

"Players get great personal satisfaction out of being able to play throughout the season", says Peter. "After today, I've got four games left to complete only my second full season."

His other 100 per cent record was in his first season of League football in 1969-70 when he had a full sheet with Burnley in the First Division.

"Our match against Santos gave me most pleasure. When you do well against top class players you still think you are good enough to play at the highest level. I hope to get this wish with Fulham next season."



FOCUS

on Alan Mullery

Fresh-faced and with the arrogance of a 15-year-old, Alan Mullery walked into the Fulham dressing room before a Combination match against Birmingham.

Alan had made a name for himself in the youth team and promotion had quickly followed to the reserves.

Ken Craggs, our youth team manager who was playing centre half, remembers the day vividly.

"When a player of talent suddenly emerges, it sticks in your mind.

"We had an experienced side out — players who had been through the mill. So at least he'll be looked after I thought. Still, I'll keep an eye on him.

"Would you believe it! Within a few minutes Alan was ordering us all about. Even then he had the stamp of authority."

So Alan Mullery arrived in 'big time'. We recall this incident because this is our last programme of the season and Alan is due to make his 550th League appearance in one of the remaining away games of this season.

By a strange twist of fate, this will be at Orient and where, as a Fulham player, Alan made his League debut on November 5, 1959.

Alan's total of League games would have been much higher but for a pelvic injury 18 months ago that kept him out of the game for almost a season when he was at Spurs, the club he left us to join in 1964.

Alan played 312 League games for Spurs. He rejoined us in the summer and today's match will be his 236th League match for Fulham.

He is a born leader on the field and a model for any soccer-minded youngster.

Fred Callaghan leads the tribute from the players with:

"Alan's secret is that he knows who to order about and who to leave alone. I know my game has improved since he came back.

"Alan is the skipper but he wants 11 captains when we are playing. He encourages us all to have our say."

Manager Alec Stock says: "I hope Alan will be around at Fulham a long time and later have a greater say in running things."

So here we are near the end of another season. It's rather unfair to pick out a star Fulham player, but if you twisted my arm I think I'd plump for John Cutbush (left).

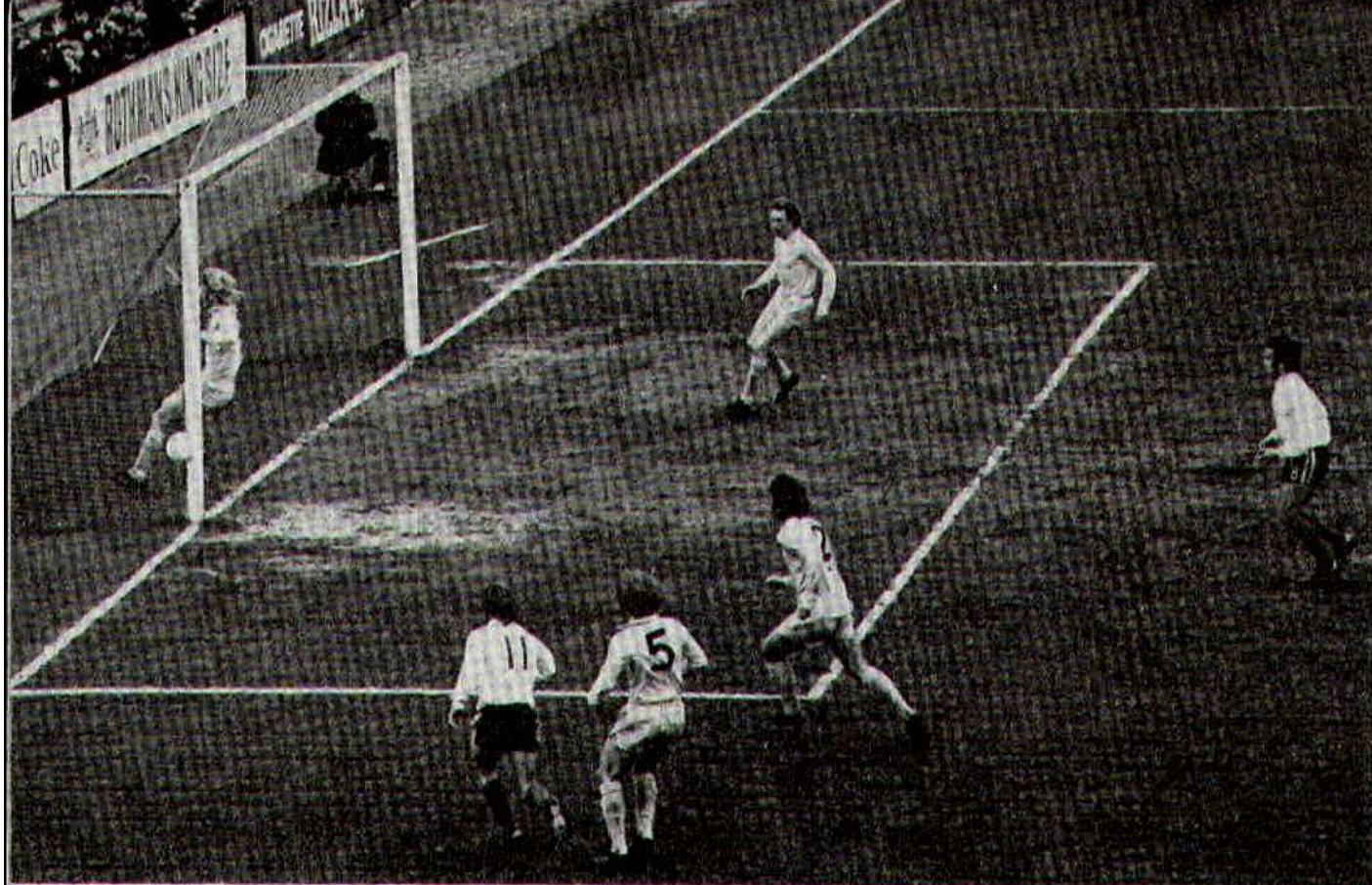
A high spot in the season for me was the moment (below) when Pele and Alan Mullery met before our match against Carlisle.

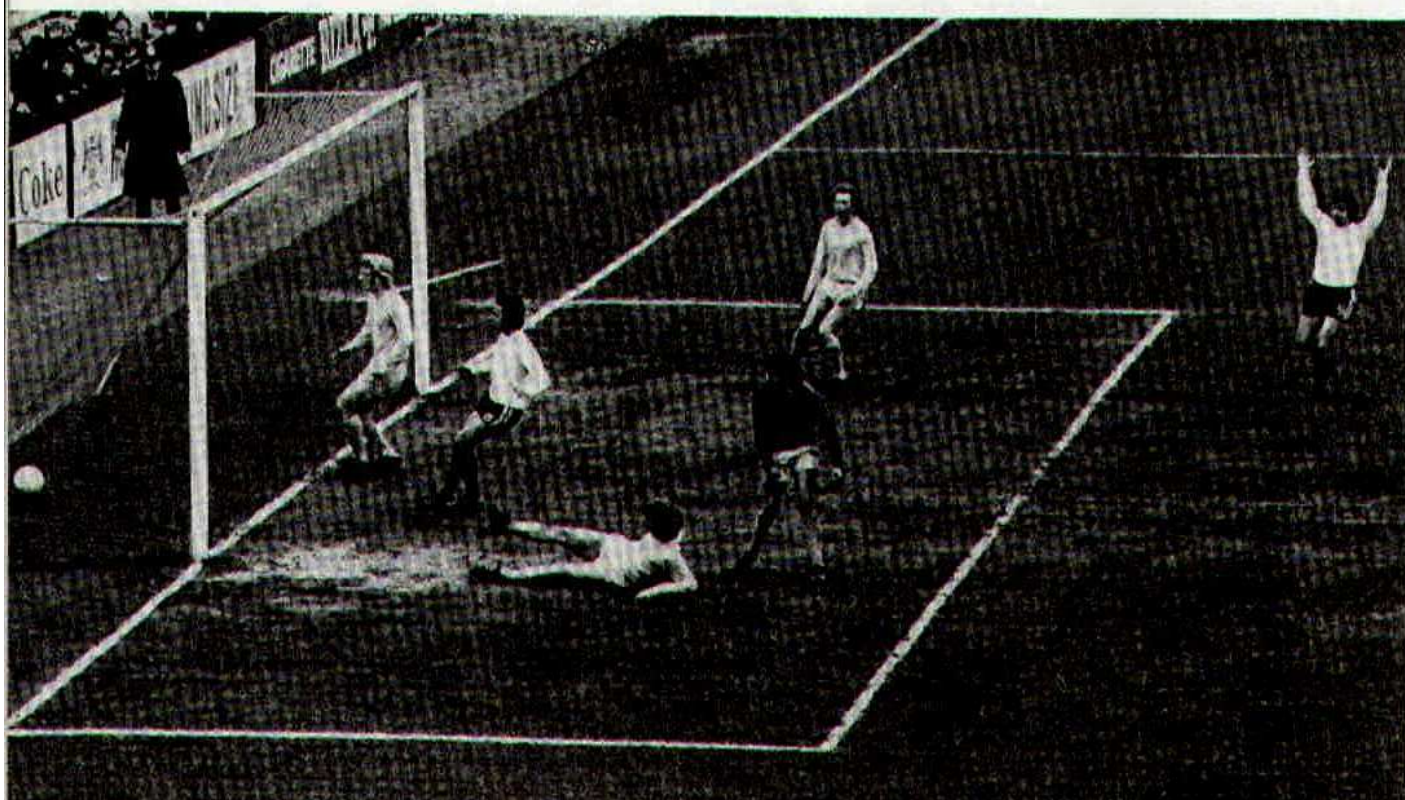






Action from the Oxford match

A trip down memory lane— and the Director who ate on the pitch

Those were the days for Fulham — and this photograph taken over 60 years ago gives us a glimpse into the club's glorious past.

Fulham players and officials pose at the end of the 1908-1909 season with a shield and a cup — the "Award of Merit Trophy".

Two years earlier we had won the Southern League championship and were elected to the Second Division of the Football League.

In our first season in the League we were only four points away from promotion to the First Division and reached the semi-final of the FA Cup.

John Dean, grandfather of current Fulham director Tony Dean, is shown in the middle row, fourth from the right of the picture, which was sent to us by Mr. J. Prior of Cannon Hill Lane, West

Wimbledon.

The following year John Dean bought out the shares of Henry Norris, pictured wearing the bowler hat, and became chairman of Fulham.

Incidentally, Mr. Norris, — later knighted — stayed in football and became a director of Arsenal.

John Dean's love for Fulham has become folk lore. On good days he would have his lunch on a table on the centre spot and then would spend the rest of the afternoon weeding the ground. There was even talk he sacked his own workers to pay the wages of the players.

Recalling the past makes us mention another former player who visited the club recently. He is Alf Wood, now 83, who played for Fulham as an inside forward in the season 1911-12.

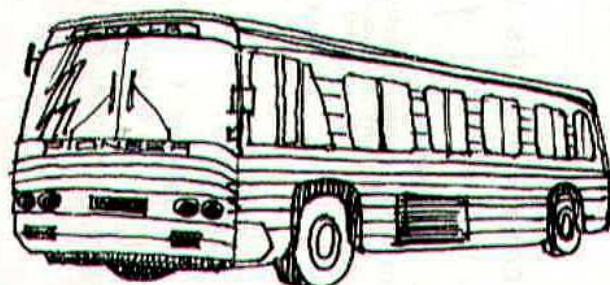
