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
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Les Allen's Column

Robins Year-by-Year

Part 8 - Season 1927/28

West Bromwich Albion goalkeeper Peter Latchford has possibly shared in a unique family achievement in League soccer. He is one of three brothers all to keep goal in the First Division!

Peter played in the First Division with the Throstles last season, of course, while brother Dave was Birmingham City's goalkeeper until they bought Gary Sprake from Leeds United. When, during last Saturday's match against Wolves, Sprake was carried off injured the player selected to take over was — Bob Latchford!

Bob is usually a prolific goalscorer but last week he proved himself a top 'keeper, too. He was not beaten in the 50-plus minutes he played in goal.

Don Rogers seems to have become almost a one-man striking force for struggling Crystal Palace. Last Saturday he scored for the third match in succession and now he has himself netted six of the nine goals scored by Palace this season. Manager Malcolm Allison was not present to see his team drop another point at Oxford (1—1) but, by all accounts, his new £110,000 signing from Southend, Peter Taylor, had an outstanding game.

Shock team Luton Town made it four wins in a row when they beat 2–1 last Saturday. The Hatters then looked back on eight unbeaten League games, their only defeat being by 0–4 at Nottingham Forest on the opening day of the season.

OXFORD NOW DESPERATE FOR POINTS

Having enjoyed so many rousing derby clashes with Oxford United, both in Cup and League, it is a little sad that today's meeting finds us both in dire need of the points in an effort to stave off relegation.

Oxford, who broke a club record by finishing eighth in Division Two last season, have won only two League games so far, at home to the Nottingham pair Forest (1–0) and County (2–1).

Oxford's major problem lies in

their scoring output. They have in Derek Clarke, Nigel Cassidy and Hugh Curran three widely experienced players, yet the goals are still not coming.

Clarke opened his League career with Walsall but was snapped up by Wolves in 1968 at the end of his first season in the senior team. Chances became rare at Molineux, though, and he moved on to Oxford in 1970.

Cassidy was Oxford's top scorer

with 13 goals two seasons ago and netted ten last term. It was with humble Lowestoft Town that he first started hitting the goals trail. Norwich signed him but he didn't make a great deal of progress until transferring to Scunthorpe in 1968.

Oxford paid a club record £50,000 to sign Curran from Wolves last September and he ended the season by topping the club's scoring list with 15 goals.

Hugh was once turned down by Manchester United and then played for Shamrock Rovers, Third Lanark and Corby Town before Millwall gave him a come-back chance. He later served Norwich and Wolves, and was capped by Scotland on five occasions.

John Fleming, John Evanson, Steve Aylott, Graham Atkinson, Ken Skeen and Bill Jeffrey are the main contenders for midfield positions.

Fleming is a local discovery who made his debut in 1971. Evanson made his first appearance in the League team in 1967/68 and has been a regular member of the squad for the past three seasons.

Aylott had sessions with Orient and West Ham without satisfying his desire for League football. Oxford gave him his chance two years ago.

Atkinson is Oxford's longestserving player. He has been with them since they were elected to the Football League in 1962. Earlier he was with Aston Villa but he didn't make the senior side.

Ken Skeen is no stranger to the County Ground, of course, for he made his bow in League soccer with us in 1964/65. A serious accident interrupted — and threatened to end — his career. After months out of the game he returned to Swindon but didn't resettle so Oxford signed him in 1967.

Jeffrey is one of manager Gerry Summers' proteges and he made his debut in the League eleven last month.

Oxford gave goalkeeper Roy Burton a free transfer three years ago but later had second thoughts and re-engaged him. He has missed few games since his League debut in 1971.

The back four has always looked solid, with Dick Lucas, David Roberts, Colin Clarke and John Shuker proving a formidable

defence. But Nick Lowe was recently brought in as a reinforcement.

Lucas is an Oxford discovery who worked his way into the senior team in 1967/68. It was to be another two years before he began to play regularly but, once established, he has not been shifted apart from the odd occasion through injury.

Roberts last season achieved his big ambition to play international football when he was capped three times by Wales. He was in the Welsh squad which travelled to Poland for the recent World Cup clash though he did not play on that occasion. Oxford signed David from Fulham three years ago.

It was at Arsenal that Colin Clarke learned his game but in those days he was never considered good enough for their first-team. Oxford gave him the chance to play League football in 1965/66 and for the past seven years he has been a fixture in their defence.

John Shuker has now long settled into the left-back spot but there was a time when he would flit about all over the team. He has filled eight different positions for Oxford and in 1968/69 he was their top scorer!

Lowe served his apprenticeship with Oxford, making his League debut last season.

If Oxford's results do not improve quickly, Mr. Summers may feel inclined to go out in search of a new player or two. But he is not a man given to panic actions as can be seen by his record of buying only one player in the past two years. That was Hugh Curran, who cost the club a record £50,000.

Mr. Summers hadn't felt the need to spend lately because the team had been doing well, last season finishing in eighth position.

Not that Oxford have a great deal of excess cash to spend, anyway. With one of the smallest average attendances in Division Two - 9,187 was last season's figure, while this season it has dropped to 8,300 - Oxford have to rely heavily upon their income from outside sources, such as pools.

Attendances are a constant cause of concern for Oxford who have made rapid strides since their election to the Football League in 1962. While the club has improved itself beyond recognition in the 11 years it has been in the League, the local public's support has been abysmal.

Indeed, Oxford are now almost back to the crowds they drew in Division Four. These are their average attendance figures for their complete League career:

DIV. FOUR: 1962/63, 7,600; 1963/64, 6,900; 1964/65, 8,744. DIV. THREE: 1965/66, 5,481; 1966/67, 7,045; 1967/68, 8,192. DIV. TWO: 1968/69, 12,500; 1969/70, 10,812; 1970/71, 10,844; 1971/72, 9,529; 1972/73, 9,187; 1973/74, 8,300.

Oxford's board of directors, deeply concerned at the trend, have recently appointed new pools promoters who aim to raise £1,000 per week, a rather ambitious figure one would have thought for an area with so little football interest.

The Oxford club has reached a cross-roads in its development. Obviously, the ultimate aim is to take First Division football to The Manor — or, rather, to the new ground they are planning — but at the moment they have scarcely the resources to contemplate promotion.

Oxford's visit last season drew a crowd of 11,712. They went away 3–1 winners, thanks to goals from Dave Roberts, Nigel Cassidy and Hugh Curran. Mike McGovern, making his first home appearance after his transfer from Q.P.R., scored Swindon's goal.
