Part 12 - Season 1931/32

High-spending Portsmouth have not finished their First Division build-up by any means. Now that their latest signings Paul Went (signed from Fulham for £155,000) and Malcolm Manley, a £45,000 buy from Leicester, are settling down, manager John Mortimore is getting down to more long-term plans.

Soon there will be a clear-out at Fratton Park to make way for the up-and-coming youth players. Pompey reintroduced a reserve team this season, after operating for several years as a one-squad team, but the problem is that the second team contains most of the players who can no longer hold their places in the Second Division side.

If Portsmouth are to have the strength in depth, so necessary for a club with First Division ambitions, they must first build a younger, and stronger, reserve team. That is Mr. Mortimore's next priority.

While Portsmouth are intent on buying, Fulham may continue their hectic search for cash to keep their bank manager happy. It was with regret that manager Alec Stock had to sell two of his star players — Paul Went's departure followed quickly upon Steve Earle's £80,000 move to Leicester.

Bobby Charlton has been very active in the transfer market in his short spell as manager. His latest recruit to Preston is Swindon's Republic of Ireland international striker Ray Treacy, a £30,000 fee being involved. Treacy now joins new boys Nobby Stiles (from Middlesbrough), Frances Burns (Southampton) and David Sadler (Manchester United) at Deepdale.

ORIENT SUCCESS IS NO SURPRISE

Orient have been described as one of the surprise teams of the season. Yet their position so near the top of the table has come as no surprise to manager George Petchey who has pieced his delightfully entertaining team together with the care, and disregard to frustration, of an artist building a model ship in a bottle.

Ironically, he has achieved success with a nucleus of the players whom Malcolm Allison considered were "bad players" at Crystal Palace. In the opening couple of months this season, Petchey — a former Palace player and coach — signed that outstanding goalkeeper John Jackson plus defenders David Payne and Bill Roffey from his old club.

Jackson, who had been Palace's goalkeeper for nine years, cost a £30,000 fee. Payne, a former England under-23 international, had also been a Palace regular for several years while Roffey had come through the junior teams to make his debut last season.

Payne has been playing on both sides of the defence, while Tom Walley, Phil Hoadley, Derrick Downing and Bill Roffey have all been appearing in the back four.

Walley won full and under-23 caps for Wales. It was with Arsenal, in 1965/66, that Tom won his way into League football but, though he was usually a reserve player, he won the first of his four under-23 caps

before transferring to Watford in 1966. For almost five years he was a Watford regular, winning a full cap against Czechoslovakia in 1971. Orient signed him two seasons ago.

Hoadley is yet another former Crystal Palace player. A former England youth international, Phil had not been holding a regular place with Crystal Palace so he was glad of the move to Orient two seasons ago.

Downing joined Orient from Middlesbrough last season. He made his first senior appearances for the Ayresome Park club in 1965/66 and completed 200 games before his transfer.

Peter Allen, Terry Brisley and Ricky Heppolette are the most likely midfield players though Bobby Fisher could find a place.

Brisley and Allen are both Orient discoveries, Brisley getting his chance in the League side three seasons ago. Allen has been in the team since 1965/66 and has made over 300 League appearances for the club.

Ricky Heppolette, the only Anglo-Indian in League football at the moment, developed with Preston and joined Orient for £40,000 last season. Fisher is another of Orient's own discoveries who made his League debut this season.

All three strikers have been scoring regularly.

Gerry Queen represents a further connection with Crystal Palace. A most experienced player, Queen has proved good value for the club record £70,000 Orient paid for him last season. Gerry opened his first-class career with St. Mirren in 1962/63 and spent over three years with Kilmarnock before joining Palace for £40,000 in 1969. Queen has scored 10 goals so far this season.

Micky Bullock opened his League career at the age of 16 with Birmingham. He later led Oxford's scorers when they won the Third Division championship in 1968. Two years later, when Orient won the same divisional title, Mike was their top scorer, too. With 13 goals, he is now one of the Second Division's leading marksmen.

Barry Fairbrother, last season's top scorer, has scored 10 times this term. He rose to Orient's League team four seasons ago.

Manager George Petchey has spent his entire soccer life with London clubs. He started off with West Ham where he had five years as a professional. But it was after moving to Queen's Park Rangers in 1953 that he really began to make progress. He made 214 appearances for them.

His next move was to Crystal Palace in 1959. As a wing-half he

played a large part in lifting them out of the Fourth Division and then into Division Two. By the time they made their most sensational rise into the First Division he had retired to take over as chief coach.

When he took over Orient last season, he proclaimed: "If I did not think Orient could return to the First Division I would not have accepted the appointment."

Mr. Petchey admitted to a feeling of pride when his team was recently voted by Daily Mail writers as the most entertaining team in Division Two.

"I would like to think that our style is linked with entertainment ... that we play open attractive football pleasing to the eye," he said.

"Of course the object of any match is to finish winners but on the other hand we have a duty to the game and its followers to provide an emphasis on skill and entertainment. The balance between the two has often been difficult to gauge."

"The type of football I encourage here is what is often called one-touch football. That is to say quick inter-passing between players. An illustration is boys who learn their football in playgrounds and streets and use a wall to play the ball onto and run for the return.

"When they get older they realise that another player can act as the wall. They give him the ball and he immediately returns it to him further upfield.

"When in full flow this kind of football is hard for opponents to counter as a player is only in contact with the ball for a very short time. And to watch a fast, accurate and skillful inter-change perhaps from one end of the field to the other, can be a great sight."

The Orient club was formed in 1881, turning professional in 1903 when the name was changed to Clapton Orient. Four years later they were elected to the Second Division of the Football League.

In 1929 they dropped into the Third Division for the first time, remaining until 1956 when they began the improvement which, in 1962, was to take them into Division One. They remained for only one year and by 1966 they were back in Division Three.

Looking back, it could be argued

that promotion to Division One marked the beginning of a decline which almost led to ruination for Orient. They had looked an outstanding team in Division Two, as they chased Liverpool at the top.

But they never got their First Division programme off the ground. They struggled from the opening day and, though they occasionally showed flashes of their old brilliance, they couldn't sustain it and they were doomed to quick relegation a long while before the season ended.

Orient regained their Second Division place in 1970 and they continue to produce some outstanding players from their pool of apprentices. In this way they can raise cash.
