Orient striker Barrie Fairbrother has already broken his personal best goalscoring record with a third of the season still to go. His previous best tally was 13 in his first campaign as a League player, in 1969/70, but he is now way past that figure. There is no hope of the club scoring record being beaten, though, either by Barrie or by one of his successful colleagues Mick Bullock or Gerry Queen. Tom Davies's achievement of hitting 33 League goals in 1936/37 is quite safe.

Thirty-seven years is a long while for any record to stand, but it is by no means the best preserved among current Second Division sides. Bolton's scoring record has remained since Joe Smith hit 38 League goals back in 1920/21—before the change in the offside law made scoring more difficult.

Bolton hit by injuries

Injuries to defenders Don McAllister, Warwick Rimmer and midfield man Alan Waldron have played havoc with manager Jimmy Armfield's plans to keep a settled side as Bolton struggle to hang onto the Second Division place they regained this season.

Normally the back four would line up: John Ritson, Warwick Rimmer, Paul Jones and Don McAllister.

Ritson has been in the Bolton

defence for over five years, completing his 200th first-team appearance in League and Cup last season, Rimmer, a former England schoolboy international, comes from a footballing family. His father Sid was a familiar figure in Division Third circles with Tranmere and Watford while his uncle Ellis was a Sheffield Wednesday and England star of the 'thirties.

Jones made his first League

appearance three seasons ago and was ever-present last season when the Trotters won the Third Division championship. McAllister, another Bolton discovery, made his League debut four seasons ago and has held his place for the past three years.

The injury-enforced changes led to the recall of Paul Hallows for only his third senior game in two years since fracturing his skull playing against York City. Hallows, who made his Bolton bow five

seasons ago, came in at right-back in a re-arranged defence which included young Sam Allardyce who has been introduced to League soccer this season.

Ritson moved up to replace Alan Waldron in midfield where Peter Nicholson and Roy Greaves are normally the other performers.

Waldron's first appearance in Bolton's League team was in 1970/71, which had the unhappy ending of relegation to Division Three. But Alan played a big part in helping the club back into the Second Division last season.

Nicholson was a playing colleague of manager Jimmy Armfield at Blackpool, joining Bolton in 1971.

Greaves emerged as a striker in 1967/68, topping the Trotters' scoring list that season and the next. He also has spent a considerable period of his career as a midfield player.

Top scorer is John Byrom, now well into double figures. John hit all three goals in Bolton's 3-2 victory over Stoke in the third round of the F. A. Cup. John has been Bolton's top scorer for three of the past four seasons. It was at Blackburn that he first came into prominence, winning England youth honours.

One of the best known players in the Bolton side is Peter Thompson who initially joined the club on loan from Liverpool this season. Peter opened his career with Preston, joined Liverpool in 1963 and, during a decade at Anfield he won League and Cup winners' medals and gained 16 England caps.

Scoring regularly for the Trotters this season is Neil Whatmore, who opened his League career in fine style with two goals on his debut against Swansea last April.

Garry Jones enjoyed a highly successful time last season, when he

hit 20 goals, but injuries kept him out for several weeks this term.

Ron Phillips has been a regular member of the Trotters' League team for five years and last season celebrated his 100th League appearance.

Former England defender Jimmy Armfield has quietly transformed the image of Bolton Wanderers in the 2½ years he has been manager. When he arrived the club had been relegated to the Third Division for the first time in their history but last season he led them back into Division Two as Third Division champions.

Mr. Armfield insists on loyalty and effort from his players. In return he has given them and the club similar dedication, refusing several offers to join bigger clubs.

want to make Bolton Wanderers a great club again,' he says. And, one day, when he saw a group Manchester of United supporters boarding a coach to take them to Old Trafford-a routine fortnightly arrangement for yearshe angrily barred them, maintaining that he was not having people coming to Burnden Park to see Manchester United; he wanted them to come and see Bolton Wanderers.

His latest recommendation—fully supported by the board—went a long way towards achieving that objective. Bolton helped to create history by staging their third round F. A. Cup tie against Stoke City on a Sunday, attracting the third round's largest crowd of the season (39,138) as a result.

Mr. Armfield has created his present team almost entirely from the players who had failed in their relegation season of 1970/71.

Prior to this season's signing of Malcolm Darling, Mr. Armfield had signed only three first-team players

— Henry Mowbray and Peter Nicholson, both for modest fees

from his old club Blackpool, and goalkeeper Charlie Wright who was given a free transfer by Charlton.

Mowbray and Wright have since left the club—and Darling has failed to gain a regular place—so Mr. Armfield is now almost back to square one. And that, in itself, must give him deep satisfaction for it can be argued that it is a simple matter to go out and buy a team whereas it takes skill and effort to transform 'failures' into successes.

Bolton have, of course, been for some while renowned for the quality of players raised in their nursery teams. They haven't been able to afford to spend large sums on new players. Indeed, there have been times when they haven't even been able to afford to keep some of their home-made stars!

Their main problem is financial so when they come up with a real star, like Francis Lee, it is difficult for a club in their position to refuse a £60,000 offer. That's what Manchester City paid for Lee in 1967. In Lee's case, he wanted better football anyway-and that's yet another problem. In 1966 they lost Wyn Davies to Newcastle though he was not one of their own discoveries. Four seasons ago Dave Hatton left for Blackpool, a fee of £40,000 being involved. Three seasons ago, Paul Fletcher's transfer to Burnley netted £60,000.

The loss of outstanding players naturally took its toll on the team's performances and in recent years Bolton had been struggling at the wrong end of the Second Division. In 1971 they ran things a little too close and they finally had to resign themselves to a spell of Third Division football.

With attendances showing a more healthy look in recent weeks Bolton hope they will be able to hold onto their best players now and eventually reclaim their place in Division One.

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Welcome to this our first venture into Sunday football and while repeating the view of many religious organisations, I am afraid that it is a way of life that is changing our habits and we have many sports activities which now take place on a Sunday which is very much in line with the continent.

We are all looking forward to winning our match and getting away from the bottom three places, which will give us breathing space to build for success again. I feel confident that with our present young side and the addition of a little more experience the future for football in Swindon is very rosy indeed.

We need everyone to give encouragement at a time when we are fighting to stay in the 2nd Division and the lads do respond to this kind of up lift.

Our playing surface is giving us headaches and the weather is being most unkind. As soon as our groundsman gets a reasonable surface it is cut up into a morass and the constant rain has prevented us from working on it as much as we would like. If today the centre of our pitch looks like Weston sands it will be our only outlet until the end of the season when we intend to re-drain. We have called in the experts and this is the advice,—to sand down the middle of the pitch.

We held our first 'Meet the Club' evening last week and from response and comments since, it seems that another such event in the near future would be welcome and we shall give fair notice when this will take place.

Many people were interested in viewing the dressing rooms, treatment room, referees changing quarters, and the various offices located within the North Stand. We shall be only too pleased to show any interested supporters around the premises and if during the enforced industrial lay off any one cares to take the opportunity to do this then come along by all means.

With faltering attendances all over the country, clubs are looking to every means to augment their incomes—is sponsorship another way of help?

Many Amateur Clubs are finding sponsorship a great help and that financial problems and Rothmans are leading the way in this field. Rothmans have already given their name to the Isthmian League and clubs are encouraged to play attacking football with money incentives to score five goals in any one match. Added to this Rothmans insist on good conduct and a club can only win their incentives as long as they keep a clean sheet with no names taken etc. Clubs also compete in a Sportmanship League and points are awarded and deducted according to their playing record. The records kept on the performances of the Isthmian League clubs since this sponsorship has started compared with other seasons show a remarkable improvement of good conduct. Rothmans are intending to move further into this field of league sponsorship. Will it help the professional league? Who knows. C. J. GREEN
