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NEWS&VIEWS

At the beginning of each new season, every club in the Football League has high hopes of a successful season. Not that I am going to predict, what is going to happen to Swindon Town, but to me at the moment, there is a new spirit throughout that club. An atmosphere of eagerness, and determination from the manager down to the newest apprentice.

We begin a new season in Division 3, and it surprises me greatly, that some of our supporters prefer watching games in this Division, in preference to those in Division 2.

We start with the return, not only of our old friend Danny, but the white shorts. So we are back in our rightful colours Red and White. That fact will please many of our supporters, especially the older ones. So bring out your Red and White scarves, and ties, you so proudly wore to Wembley in 1969 yes, "here we come again".

The short trip to Gibraltar, and the winning of the two games, and consequently the Cap, has given a great fillto the team, on which to begin, may the results continue in this vein. the League Cup begins on Tuesday, with a First Round Tie at home to Portsmouth. That fixture will revive memories of last season's battles in the F.A. Cup. This is one we are going to win.

This afternoon we welcome once again an old acquaintance in Bury F.C. We last played them in Season 1967-68, at the end of which they won promotion to Division 2. The match was played on Saturday 24th February, 1968, before a gate of 14,464. Bury led by two goals to nil at half-time, and guickly increased their lead to three. Noble substituted for Lowes, and scored two quick goals in a great fight back by Swindon, who unfortunately could not equalize wearing number six shirt for the visitors was a nineteen year old named Lindsay, now well known as Liverpool and England full back.

The following season 1968-69, after only one year as members of Division 2. Bury was relegated, and as we all know now replaced by Swindon after that fabulous season, with the beginnin of the League Cup, and promotion. Unfortunately Bury dropped further into the relegation zone, and eventually became members of Division 4 in 1971. Now once again they are on the upward trend and gained promotion in April of this year.

ATTACK! PAID OFF FOR BURY by Tony Pullein

Bury boss Bobby Smith achieved the rare distinction of gaining promotion in his first season as a manager when he pushed the Shakers into the fourth promotion place in Division Four with a tremendous late burst of five successive victories last season.

Right from the beginning, Mr. Smith had adopted an all-out attacking policy. It certainly paid off handsomely for Bury scored 89 goals in Cup and League with Derek Spence, George Hamstead, Billy Rudd and John Murray all getting into double figures.

Spence, a former Northern Ireland and youth international, was spotted by Oldham while playing for Crusaders. He made his League bow three seasons ago and joined Bury for a £2,500 fee in September 1972. Several big clubs wanted to sign him last season but, with promotion in mind, Bury refused to sell.

Hamstead was once on Rotherham's books and, after leaving them, he signed for York City in 1964. Two years later he moved to Barnsley, holding a first-team place for four years. After being released, he signed for Bury in 1971. He scored 13 times last season.

Rudd was a Manchester United groundstaff boy but didn't make their League team. Birmingham gave him his break in 1959/60 but it was after signing for York in 1962 that he really settled in League soccer. Grimsby signed him in 1966 and he later served Rochdale until joining Bury in 1970.

Murray began his League career with Burnley in 1966/67, transferring to Blackpool in 1970. Within a year he was on the move again when Bury signed him.

Several players are jockeying for positions in midfield, notably Jimmy Nicholson, Steve Melledew, Alan Tinsley, Brian Williams and Charlie Gisbourne.

Nicholson, who joined the club from Huddersfield mid-way through last season, is a player of tremendous experience. He won 41 caps for Northern Ireland in his Manchester United and Huddersfield days and was also picked for under-23 and "B" internationals.

Melledew, signed from Aldershot for £8,000 last season, began his career with local rivals Rochdale and in 1969 was signed by Everton. But in two years at Goodison Park, he Didn't get a first-team game and he moved on to Aldershot in 1971

Tinsley is an ex-Preston player. He had only one season in their first-team before transferring to Bury in 1970. Williams is a youngster, discovered by Bury, who has been on the verge of England youth honours for the past two seasons.

Gisbourne, another Bury discovery, came into the team two seasons ago although he has not yet won a regular place.

When Bury released former England centre-back Peter Swan at the end of last season, they sought this replacement in John Hulme, a big player who spent the past two seasons with Reading. Bolton gave him his first big chance in 1963 and he made some 200 senior appearances for them before serving Notts County on Ioan. He then moved on to Reading.

The second centre-back is likely to be David Holt, a Bury regular for almost five years now, but John Thomson ------ a defender signed from Newcastle last season ----- could come into the reckoning.

Steve Hoolicken and Keith Kennedy held down the flank defensive positions all last season. Hoolicken arrived from Oldham, where he had been only an occasional first-team player, in 1973, while Kennedy was signed from Newcastle for £3,000 two season ago.

The regular goalkeeper has been John Forrest who initially came into the side in 1967/68 and has now made well over 100 first-team appearances. When Forrest is injured, Bury have a ready-made replacement in Terry Gennoe who made his League bow two seasons ago.

Manager Bobby Smith joined Bury in the 1973 close-season as coach. His playing career had spanned ten years, starting with Manchester United. He then served Scunthorpe, Grimsby, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool.

It's now over 40 years since Bury enjoyed First Division football at Gigg Lane and we have to delve back even further to touch an era when Bury's name was revered in much the same manner as those of Leeds, Liverpool and others are today.

They gained admission to the Football League Division Two in 1894 and in their first season they walked away with the Championship of the division by a fantastic nine-point margin, a feat which has only once since been beaten ------ by Middlesborough who won by 15 points last season.

They won the F.A. Cup for the first time in 1900, beating Southampton 4 - 0 in the final. Three years later they went even better, establishing the record Cup Final victory of 6 - 0 over Derby County to take their goal record in that competition to 12 - 0. Since then, though, they have never again progessed even as far as the semi-finals.

Relegation came in 1912 but, by scraping into second position over Derby on goal average in 1924, they returned for their final five campaigns of First Division soccer during which period they finished once in fifth position and once in fourth place ---- their best achievement in League soccer.

They made one or two bold bids to regain their place at the top, but all in vain. Then after the last war they went into decline and when we wanted to find Bury's name it was usually to the bottom of the Second Division that we had to look, After some lucky escapes, they finally fell into Division III (North) in 1957 though it took them only four years to become champions of the newly-consistuted Third Division.

Then came some lightning changes of events. In 1967 they were relegated to the Third Division, twelve months later regaining Second Division status. But in 1969 they went down again and in 1971 they dropped further into Division Four.

Bobby Charlton's Come-Back

All eyes will be focussed on Deepdale today as Bobby Charlton is expected to make his come-back as a player, against Plymouth Argyle. Whether or not this decision was a wise one remains to be seen, but there can be no doubt that his presence will give a welcome boost to Third Division attendances.

It also gives him the chance to round off his scoring record. When he retired he had 198 League goals to his credit -----all in the First Division. Two more will enable him to complete his double century.

Charlton's return led to his name being eliminated from Rothmans Football Yearbook "Stars of the Past" feature. It was argued that he is no longer "of the past". Presumably, he will be re-instated when he retires again.

Hereford 'United's new manager John Sillett is surrounding himself with experience in his attempt to take the League's babes into Division Two. One of his first announcements was Southampton's former England midfield player Terry Paine, as player-coach.

Paine, who played 713 League games for the Saints, will have to continue playing for at least two seasons if he is to beat Jimmy Dickinson's record of 764 Football League appearances. Another international player followed Paine from Southampton to Hereford -----Republic of Ireland player Tony Byrne, who did not get a lot of joy in ten years at The Dell. He played only a hundred or so games in the first-team.

Yet another former Southampton man at Hereford is Fred Kemp who had spent the past three seasons at Halifax.

At one time football rarely got involved with law, yet today it is fairly commonplace to find soccer disputes being decided by the Courts. One unusual case, however, recently involved Third Division side Bournemouth.

Notts County claimed that the Cherries has agreed verbally to buy their captain Don Masson for £125,000, but then opted out of the deal. But the Court ruled that Bournemouth had not acted illegally so Notts County had to pay the legal costs.

If last term's end-of-season form is any guide, then Aldershot and Tranmere Rovers could turn out to be unlikely promotion candidates. Aldershot, who at one stage looked likely to suffer relegation, took nine points from their final six matches. Tranmere and Wrexham, who nearly made it last time, achieved similar results.

The Chairmans Column

Today we open on to a new season with all hopes and aspirations of success which inevitably every club has.

After a disastrous season last year a stranger to the town might wonder at our optimism, but we know that behind the scenes at Swindon many changes have and are taking place, which prove advantageous to the Club over a period of time.

Much has been written ans spoken about our Manager Danny, and everyone whom has had contact with him will know of the happy atmosphere that he creates in the circle that he works within, and it is this happy atmosphere that has permeated into the club dressing rooms and everywhere else, that is such a healthy sign for the future.

His ability to create a successful side on the field, he has proved, by his achievements and I only hope that our supporters will give him time to build to this end.

The management of the club, away from the playing side of things, also have been very active over the last few months. With the aim in view of trying to keep the image of our club in closer relationship with you, our supporters, we have called in the help of a professional Public Relations organisation, and already we are seeing the results of our combined efforts, with news and views in local newspapers in and around the Swindon and District. This news sheet we hope will keep people informed of the activities both of the present and future, and to reach out to our supporters whom are unable to but a local paper.

Changes are taking place at Boardroom level as have been published recently, and I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank the Directors whom have left us over the past season, for all the time and hard work that they have given to the Club over the years.

Inevitably changes take place and new ideas and enthusiasm will I am sure help the club for the future.

Our Fund raising team with Graham Drew is now becoming known to many of you, and they are doing a grand job to help the club build for the future. We hope that many more people will become regular participants in our weekly competitions, and Mr. Drew has some exciting new ideas with prizes that are also exciting.

Among the many activities that have been taking place behind the scenes during the close season has been the complete redraining of our playing surface.

We have laid drains in a herringbone design that means that the whole area is covered with drains approximately 10 feet apart. The interesting part about this new drainage system is that the drains are plastic pipes perforated that replace the old land drains used in the past. This system of plastic pipes are all connected into larger plastic pipes running around the perimeter of the ground into tanks and then pumped away.

After this draining work was completed the entire centre of the pitch running from end to end has been returfed. This again is a new venture for us, as in the past we have always reseeded. The side area of the ground which has tended to get stronger each year, has also been treated and is looking, as you will see, very healthy. The ground level is also cambered from the centre.

In the front of our stand we have been forced to take away the old seating. This has been one of the conditions laid down when our new stand was built, because of safety regulations, due to the state of the old construction. We hope to extend our seating in this area when finances permit, but obviously our priorities are on the playing strength at this moment of time.

Another very busy sector of our playing staff has been the activities of Danny and his coaches engaged in running trial games on our Shrivenham Road Ground during the close season.

This entails a tremendous amount of organisation, not only in arranging trial games, but keeping records of everyone that plays, answering letters, arranging travelling, finding accommodation for lads who have to stay overnight or for trial sessions.

We have lads that are recommended to us through our scouting systems from the North of Scotland to Lands End.

The percentage of boys who finally make this grade is obviously low, but we know from experience, that all this hard work is worth everything spent on it.

Loyalty to Swindon Town is something that grows up with people, and on this note I wish to thank all of our loyal supporters, and hope that we can supply the pleasure you all deserve.



Bury reaaly gained promotion by adopting an attacking policy Derek Spence, George Hamstead, John Murray, and Billy Rudd got unto double figures in the scoring totals. During August sow seeds of spring cabbages, sow lettuces for early winter use.

Take and root cuttings of shrubs, heathers, hydrangeas, geraniums and fuchsias.

Inspect and decide which areas of your lawn need renovation in readiness for September seeding.

Remove rose blooms as they fade, cease applying fertilisers but continue spraying.

Disbud Chrysanthemums where large blooms are wanted, leaving one bud per stem. Water once a week in dry weather. Apply fertiliser to fatten buds. Keep plants well supported and prevent earwigs entering flowers by smearing vaseline round

Mulch, water and feed Sweet Peas, hoe regularly if no mulch has been applied. Cut blooms regularly to prevent fromation of seed. Spray monthly with a systemic insecticide against sap suckling insects such as aphide.

Complete any outstanding bulb lifting. Plant Daffodils.

Continue to trim fast growing hedges and hoeing and weeding hedge bottoms.

Cut gladioli for indoor decoration when the first flower on spike is just opening. Cut into the stem with a sharp knife above the fourth or fifth leaf, jerking the stem gently each way and twisting until snaps.

Continue to spray Dahlias against pests. Inspect plants for symptons of virus infection and mark for later destruction. Feed with liquid fertiliser and keep plants tied to their as they grow.

Pick early apples and pears while under ripe. Summer prune restricted forms of apples and pears. Pick loganberries, cut out fruited shoots and tie in new shoots. Spray black currants and cherries. Protect September fruiting raspberries against birds and wasps. Plant rooted strawberry runners.

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FISH WITH WINE & MUSHROOMS 4 servings

Ingredients:

- 1 shallot, very finely chopped.
- 8 ozs. mushrooms, wiped clean and thinly sliced.
- 2 lb. white fish fillets i.e. cod or haddock.
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice.
- ¼ teaspoon white pepper.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 12 fl. oz. dry white wine.
- 2 ozs. Beurre Manie."
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Preheat the oven to 400F (Mark 6) Place the chopped shallot and sliced mushrooms in a shallow ovenproof dish. Add the fish fillets, sprinkle over the lemon juice, pepper and salt and then pour in the wine. Tightly cover the dish, firstly with a sheet of buttered greaseproof paper and then with a lid. Place the dish in the oven and cook for approx. twenty minutes, depending upon the thickness of the fish. The fish should flake easily when cooked. Remove the dish from the oven and place the fillets on to a warmed serving dish. Keep hot.

Pour the cooking liquid and vegetables into a small saucepan, place the pan over a moderate heat and stir in the Beurre Manie, a little at a time, stirring constanly, until the sauce is thick and smooth. Remove the pan from the heat and pour the sauce over the fish, sprinkle with the parsley and serve at once.

* Beurre Manie - Blend equal parts butter and flour with a wooden spoon and form into a ball with finger tips.
