This evening we have the pleasure of entertaining Aldershot Football Club, after a lapse of 16 seasons. I remember my first visit to the Recreation Ground on Tuesday 26th December, 1950. Yes it was Boxing Day, and with the Tannoy System booming out "Sleigh Bells". Swindon reserves took the field, with such characters as Sam Burton, Mick Page, Harry Sunn, Jack Court etc. The result was a 0 - 1 defeat for Swindon, so it was not a happy Christmas but I will always have fond memories of "The Shot".

Many of our supporters will remember some of the outstanding players of that period A. McCullough (father of Andy McCullough, Oxford United). Bill Lacy, Alex Cropley (another name now in the news) Charlie Mortimore, Paddy Lowden (assistant at Blackpool) Ron Reynolds (Spurs) etc.

Former managers of this grand little club include Bill McCracken (well in his eighties scouting for Watford) the man who exploited the offside rule, and caused it to be changed. Gordon Clarke (now at Arsenal) Harry Evans (late assistant manager at Spurs) Dave Smith, Jimmy Melic (now manager at Crewe, Cliff

Huxford, one of the football family from Stroud

Aldershot Football Club was formed in 1927 and turned professional the same year. It joined Division 3 (South) in Season 1932/33 along with Newport County, and took the places of Thames and Wigan Borough (who resigned from the League in October 1931)

Aldershot finished that first season in 17th position, with Swindon in bottom place yes the first time in the history of the club it had to seek re-election (Unfortunately it was not the last).

Swindon played Aldershot in the League on January 18th, 1958, the season when the league had decided to dispense with geographical divisions. The top half of each Section was to stay in the Third, and the bottom half to form the Fourth Division. This was the testing time Swindon finished in fourth place, a remarkable feat, because in the two previous seasons 1955/56 and 56/57, Swindon had to seek re-election. Credit must go to the manager Bert Head and the players for that change of fortune in the club.

ALDERSHOT SUFFER AWAY

Aldershot's away form so far has been a cause of some concern for manager Tom McAnearney - - the Shots lost their first two away League games at Hereford (0-2) and Tranmere (0-2) and they were also knocked out of the League Cup at Fourth Division Brentford (0-3).

We must assume, however, that when former Swindon striker Jack Howarth gets back into his stride the situation will change. Jack, holder of the club scoring record with 173 goals, was their leading marksman with 28 last season. This included a hat-trick against Cambridge. Howarth began with Chelsea and served Swindon before going to Aldershot in 1965. He has now been top scorer on seven occasions.

Aldershot have four players challenging for the two remaining striking positions - - John Sainty, Dennis Brown, Terry Bell and Murray Brodie.

Sainty was signed in the close-season from Bournemouth where he was top scorer with 15 goals last season. He began his career with Tottenham but did not get a chance in their League eleven. He moved on to Reading, quickly winning a first team place and Bournemouth signed him in 1970. Two seasons ago he spent a short period on loan to Mansfield.

Dennis Brown is another former Swindon player. He opened his career with Chel-

sea and spent almost three years at the County Ground before moving on to Northampton in 1967. Aldershot signed him in 1969 and he has now played in all four divisions of the Football League.

Terry Bell made a triumphant return to the side, after a spell in the reserves, with a hat-trick against Rochdale last season and a goal in his next game, form that naturally kept him in the team. Terry had been freed by local rivals Reading the previous summer after three years at Elm Park. Earlier he had played for Hartlepool where he was on two occasions top scorer.

Murray Brodie was surprisingly ignored by Leicester after scoring twice in his first three League matches for them. He moved to Aldershot in 1970 and was on one occasion their leading scorer.

Midfield players include Ronnie Walton, Bobby Wallace, Roger Joslyn and Malcolm Crosby.

Walton is in his second spell with Aldershot. After odd games for Northampton, Carlisle and Crewe, he won a regular place with Aldershot in 1966. For two seasons he was with Cambridge, but returned during the summer of 1973.

Wallace was a 1973 close-season signing from Chester for whom he converted nine penalties in his last season, two of them

in one game against Colchester. It was his only campaign for Chester. He had previously been with Halifax for just over five years and, earlier, had turned out for Huddersfield.

Joslyn transferred to Aldershot from Colchester in 1970. Crosby was discovered by Aldershot, being eased in for his first League game as substitute in 1971/72.

Now that Tony Godfrey's career has been terminated by injury, Glen Johnson has taken over in goal. Johnson earned England youth honours in his Arsenal days though he never got the chance to play in the Gunners' senior team. He made his League debut for Doncaster in 1970/71 and was for two years their regular 'keeper. He spent a short while on loan to Walsall and then transferred to Aldershot in 1973.

The most likely combination for the back four is Joe Jopling (or Richard Walden), Ray Dean, John Richardson and Len Walker. But Richard Harley is now on the fringe of regular selection.

Jopling began his career with Aldershot but they sold him to Leicester in 1970, for £30,000 plus two players. He was unfortunate to suffer injuries at critical moments, though, and meanwhile, David Nish and, then, Dennis Rofe established themselves in the left-back position and he spent most of his time in the reserves.

Walden, an Aldershot discovery, has been a fixture for seven years. Len Walker has an even longer association, being a

regular since his transfer from Newcastle in 1964. Ray Dean took his place in 1969, after leaving Reading, while John Richardson, a former Millwall and Brentford player, joined the club from Fulham last season.

Harley joined Aldershot last season on a free transfer from Reading after making over 70 senior appearances for the Biscuitmen.

Aldershot made history by winning promotion for the first time in 1973 - - thanks, in the end, to a brilliant save by goalkeeper Tony Godfrey in their last match. It was as close as that.

Aldershot F.C., founded in 1927, were elected to the Third Division (South) five years later. This gave them a tremendous boost and, in the first season as a League club, they enjoyed their best-ever F.A. Cup run to the fifth round. Derby County finally halted their progress.

Aldershot never made much of a hit in League games - - it wasn't until 1962 that they managed to climb any higher than tenth in the table! - - and they had to apply for re-election in 1937 and 1949. When the Fourth Division was formed in 1958 the Shots, having finished in the lower half of the Southern section table the previous season, became a founder member - - and were forced to apply for re-election at the end of the first season.

They remained in the League's basement until pulling off promotion last year.





Third Division Scene

Southend striker Chris Guthrie was in scintillating form against Halifax when he scored three goals in 20 minutes - - all with his head. It was the first hat-trick of the season by a Third Division player and it was only his second hat-trick in League football. He previously netted three in a 5-0 victory over Port Vale on Good Friday in 1973.

Wrexham's midfield player Arfon Griffiths had to wait a long, long, while for his first full international cap but he celebrated the occasion by opening the scoring for Wales in their European Championship tie in Austria. It is more than ten years since he won his under-23 cap and it came in his 16th season as a League player.

Griffiths, who moved to Arsenal for £14,000 early in his career but then returned to his original club, gained three under-23 caps while with the Gunners. But he had long since abandoned hopes of a full cap. He was recalled by Wales' new manager Mike Smith. Unfortunately, the occasion did not have a happy ending as Austria recovered to win 2-1.

Watford recently pocketed a cool £110,000 by selling a player they only signed originally by accident. Billy Jennings went along to see a friend have a trial for Watford, was invited to take part and then signed on the strength of his surprise appearance.

Last season Jennings was Watford's top scorer with 29 goals and, on the eve of this season, had been set a target of 30 by manager Mike Keen. Now he has joined West Ham - - Ron Greenwood's first signing as general manager - - for £110,000

and, if he achieves that tally of 30 in the First Division he would prove a tremendous sensation. Only one player, Francis Lee, has topped 30 in the First Division over the past eight seasons. And many of his were penalties.

Jennings made a magnificent start with the Hammers, scoring within 18 minutes of his first game. But Sheffield United recovered to win 2-1.

Grimsby's Jack Lewis maintained his scoring record with the equaliser at Bury. Lewis scored in each of his club's opening four games - - the only Third Division player to achieve this.

Plymouth's Bill Rafferty registered the first hat-trick of his League career in the 4-1 victory over Tranmere. One of his goals came from a penalty.

Bobby Charlton finally achieved his double century of goals in League football - - a milestone he believed he would never pass, when helping Preston to maintain their 100 per cent home record when beating Bury 3-0.

Aldershot can do little wrong at home, even though their fans are describing their away form as diabolical. The Shots lost their opening three away games by an aggregate of 0-7 but they maintained their 100 per cent home record in spite of trailing 1-3 to Plymouth at half-time. Then Aldershot hit back with goals from Brodie and Brown by the 65th minute and Walton flicked the winner seven minutes from time. The Shots' 100 per cent home record eventually went when Preston beat them 2-1.

The Chairmans Column

The uncertainty of the football world is something that keeps the interest of football minded people wondering from day to day what is going to happen next! The number of people that turn to the sports pages before ever reading the front headlines, I am sure would be surprising if really known. How many people would have believed that Leeds United would have sacked Brian Clough after seven weeks and after all the controversy with Brighton.

Many Managers are dismissed if they fail to get success for their clubs after a season or so and in my humble opinion I cannot see how any new manager can expect to get instant success, it must take at least a season before he can build his side even if he is lucky enough to be able to obtain the kind of players he is looking for. This is what is happening with us at the moment and behind the scenes Danny has been negotiating with clubs and players to try and strengthen our side, Unfortunately the players concerned in these deals have declined to move to us because for one thing they have been with first division clubs and do not wish to move into the Third Division. It is always our hope that such players may prefer to be in the first team in preference to the reserve side of the First Division.

The public are being kept informed of these negotiations, but I am afraid that sometimes it causes frustration when the final result is negative. Some people may feel that it is just promises that keep falling down but I can assure you that all are genuine attempts to try and make progress in the way that Danny needs.

The second edition of our Newsheet will soon be distributed and this time will have a name, chosen from the competition for this purpose. We had well over two hundred entries, which brought forward many interesting and original names. A small committee eventually whittled the selection down until they decided on the winner.

Another innovation this season is to be a penalty competition which will be for boys under 14 years of age on the 31st August. This competition will be organised through the schools locally and also in the country areas. We are fortunate that in Swindon there are many school teachers who take an interest in the sporting activities of the lads and Mr. Greg Walters has already agreed to organise in the local area. This will mean eventually 11 boys from each school that is interested, being chosen to partake in the competition at the County Ground.

At each home match before the start of the game, schools will match themselves against one another until the finalists are chosen.

Come along a little earlier to the next home match and see how the youngsters shoot them in who knows, we may be looking at some of the future stars of the game, because this is where they all start. The game owes a lot to the interest and dedication of school teachers who have given so much of their own time in providing fun for lads after school hours.

We in Swindon have been especially fortunate in this respect and I am sure that all our followers can remember their first contact with their organised games at school and to mention names would only mean forgetting some.

Unfortunately that season Aldershot finished in 18th position and were placed in the Fourth Division. They remained in that Division until season 1972/73 when they were duly elected to Division 3 along with Southport, Hereford U, Cambridge United.

Last season in Division 3 they finished in 8th position with the following record: Played 46 Home: won 13, drawn 6, lost 4, goals for 47, against 22. Away: won 6, drawn 5, lost 12, goals for 18, against 30 Points 49.






