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NEWS&VIEWS

Welcome, once again, for our real old friends from Grimsby Town, a club renowned throughout the football world for its wonderful hospitality at Blundell Park. How we all enjoy a visit to that seaside town.

Like us, here at Swindon Grimsby were founder members of League Division 3 (South) in Season 1920-21. That year, we finished in 4th position with 52 points from 42 games, and our visitors today were in 13th position with 39 points from 42 games.

The following season Division 3 N came into being, and a little reorganisation took place. Crystal Palace, League Champions were promoted to Division 2 and Grimsby Town was transferred to Division 3 N, their places being taken by Aberdare (I wonder how many present today remember that club), and Charlton Athletic.

Since that time Grimsby has had a most varied career, spending periods in the various divisions of the league. Probably their most successful time was from 1934 to 1939 when they were one of the strongest teams in Division 1 of all the games between the two clubs, the one of which I have the most vivid memory was played in 1938. Swindon drew 1 - 1 at Grimsby in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup having defeated Gillingham

and Queens Park Rangers in the previous rounds. The replay the following Wednesday, played in the afternoon (no floodlights in those days) went to extra time, and I well remember Alan Fowler scoring the winning goal to make the score 2 - 1 at the Town end a few minutes from time. Grimsby was a great side, with such English Internationals as G. Tweedy (an outstanding goalkeeper) Jackie Bestall, and Harry Betmead. The Swindon Team also had some great characters Alan Fowler (a grand inside forward) killed in the war George Morrall (centre-half and captain) Ben Morton (from Torquay) "Peg Leg" Hetherington, Frank Wilcockson, & not to mention Harry Cousins.

The last game between the two clubs was played on 27th February 1968. We were just running into form, and were in twelfth place with 31 points, from 29 games, but sorry to say our visitors occupied bottom position with 20 points from 29 games. The result didn't help them as Swindon won by 5 goals to nil before a gate of 12,791 scorers were Rogers 2. Terry 2, and an own goal. Although in the return fixture the result was a draw. two goals each, Grimsby was relegated to Division 4 at the end of the season. More evidence of the vagaries of football. In February 1968, Torquay United were top of Division 3, with 40 points from

GRIMSBY MOVE UP

A run of three wins in four games halted Grimby's slide towards the foot of the table, after a poor start to the season, and recent weeks have seen them make a steady rise up the table.

During their unsettled run, Grimsby's team underwent several changes and manager Ron Ashman went into the transfer market to sign Sheffield Wednesday's Northern Ireland international midfield player Roy Coyle. Roy joined Wednesday from Glentoran in 1972 and, during his two years at Hillsborough, he won four international caps.

Frank Barton, David Boylen and Phil Hubbard are among the other likely midfield players for today.

Barton, a former England youth international, began his professional career with Scunthorpe United, making his League debut in 1964/65. He was the club's top scorer in his last full season before moving on to Carlisle in 1968. Blackpool signed him for £20,000 in 1972 but he was on the move again a year later - - - to Grimsby.

Boylen worked his way through the junior teams to make his senior bow in 1966/67 and he has been a regular for the past seven seasons. Hubbard, a striker in his Lincoln days when he twice led the club's scoring list, joined Norwich for £20,000 in 1971 and moved on to Grimsby a few months later.

Grimsby's top scorer is Jackie Lewis, with 10 goals. He, too, is a former Lincoln player, spending two years as a regular prior to signing for Grimsby in 1970. Last season he was top scorer with 13 goals.

Rod Fletcher, Jim Lumby, Mike Hickman

and Keith Brown have all played in attack this season. Fletcher has a long record for consistent scoring, topping Lincoln's scoring list in 1969/70. After transferring to Scunthorpe he was on two occasions their leading marksman. He linked with Grimsby last season.

Lumby, a local discovery, made a sensational entry into League soccer last season, hitting eight goals in his first nine games!

Hickman is a former Brighton player who has been at Blundell Park since 1968 and had been absent since on only very rare occasions until losing his place a few weeks ago. Brown, a former Nottingham Forest reserve player, joined Grimsby last season.

Neil Freeman recently took over in goal from Harry Wainman. Freeman grew up with Arsenal and spent a few weeks on loan to Northampton but it wasn't until last season, following his transfer to Grimsby, that he got his chance in League football. Wainman had held fort in Grimsby's goal for much of the while since making his debut in 1965. He spent a period on loan to Rochdale two seasons ago.

Mike Czuczman, Clive Wiggington, Stewart Gray, David Booth and Don Beardsley are contenders for defensive positions.

Czuczman learned his game with Preston although he didn't get into their League eleven. Grimsby signed him in 1971 and he began to play regularly last season.

Wiggington is a Grimsby discovery who made his first League appearance in 1968/69. David Booth joined Grimsby

for a £12,000 fee in 1972 after spending four years as a regular member of Barnsley's defence. Stewart Gray was signed from Doncaster four seasons ago. He served his apprenticeship at Belle Vue, making his first League appearance in 1967/68.

Beardsley spent his early years with Hull City, moved on to Doncaster in 1972 for a loan spell and transferred to Grimsby last season.

Grimsby's manager is Ron Ashman who took over at the beginning of last season. Earlier he spent six years in charge at Scunthorpe, yet many older fans continue to associate him with Norwich City. In 19 post-war years with them he lived through some of their toughest days then, as captain, led them to happier times.

He joined Norwich as an amateur centreforward in 1944 but after a run in the firstteam in this position he was so severely barracked by the home crowd that he was dropped and played at left-half. Later he switched to his most successful spot at left-back.

During his stay at Carrow Road managers came and went, the entire board of directors resigned and the club almost went bankrupt. Still Ron Ashman played on. But in 1959 circumstances changed: dramatically. Under Ashman's captainship, Norwich fought their way all the way to the semi-final of the F.A. Cup as a

Third Division side - - - - and their Wembley dream was only smashed after Luton, then in the First Division, had beaten them in a replay.

A year later he achieved his greatest ambition — to lead Norwich into the Second Division. And in 1962 he was a member of their League Cup winning team.

When his playing career finally came to an end in 1964 he had built a club record of 590 League appearances. And, after a spell as acting manager, he was given complete control of the club. But as often happens when familiar faces have to run the show, things didn't go well for him in the managerial chair.

He left in June 1966 but just over a year later he was back in the managerial game, with Scunthorpe.

The Grimsby club was founded in 1878, joined the Football League initially in 1892 and were on two subsequent occasions voted out of the competition! They have played in all sections of the competition, their last spell in the First Division ending with relegation in 1947.

Since then they have moved regularly up and down through the bottom three section without ever making a serious bid to return to Division One. At the moment their main concern is to continue their recent improvement and untangle themselves from yet another relegation battle.

CRIPPS' CAREER BES'

Harry Cripps has been playing League soccer for almost 14 years. He created a Millwall Club record of over 400 firstteam appearances, yet he had never before achieved what he did at Bournemouth last Saturday when he scored Charlton's winning goal.

Having scored in each of their previous two games, Harry made it three in a row for the first time in his long career. His effort ended Charlton's dreary run of five consecutive away defeats so that now, confidence repaired, they can have a crack at knocking the top clubs off their perch.

No shortage of goals last week end, particularly at Chesterfield where Watford swept into an early lead. Then the home side fought back to go 3 - 1 up and, later, 4 - 2. But goals from Jenkins and Morrissey in the closing ten minutes earned Watford a 4 - 4 draw.

Another thriller at Huddersfield where it all happened after the interval in out match, were all in contention in the First Division. Syrett and Eastoe, the division's top scorer, put us 2 - 0 up. Then Gowling struck back with two goals in two minutes.

Gillingham's dismal run of eight games without a win ended on Saturday when George Jacks hits a last minute winner against Brighton. The Sussex club had held the lead from the 11th minute when Paul Fuschillo, the former Blackpool player, hit his first ever League goal. Peter Feely equalised for Gillingham with 12 minutes to go.

That was a vital win for Gillingham because, with Aldershot above them gaining a suprise point at Peterborough, it kept them within a point of the Shots even though they were still in bottom place.

Aldershot failed in their appeal against the Football League's decision to deduct a point for playing an inelligible player. Now, as relegation threatens, they carry the additional burden of knowing that, in the end, it could well be that administrative error---- rather than anything they do on the field ---- which could ultimately cost them their Third Division status.

Bobby Charlton was on target again for Preston, netting his third penalty of the season in the 2 - 0 win over Grimsby.

A glance at the top of the Third Division table these days is like taking a step backwards into the past. Preston top Blackburn Rovers second Charlton not far behind. A few years ago they And it's not beyond the realm of possibility that all three could take a step back up towards the top this season.

The Chairmans Column

With a third of our league matches played we find ourselves in a very good position in the league table, and hope that the remaining results will be as productive for points.

We found that travelling a long distance on a Monday, after a hard game on the Saturday was not to our liking at Tranmere, and I felt that the heavy going on our own ground seemed to sap some of the energy which we needed on the Monday. After this disappointment we travelled again to Huddersfield and here we put up a very spirited display in spite of having two players injured, with David Moss having to leave the field and Joe Butler hobbling about, remaining on the field rather than leave us with ten men. Joe with his usual tenacity played in some pain and more than justified his presence on the field.

Again we had a coach load of supporters at Huddersfield with of course our regulars. Not only do they give us vocal support but again another match ball has been donated from a Mr. Andy Fitzgerald and Mr. Paul Plowman who came from Brighton and Tonbridge respectively.

A lot of publicity has been given to our football playing surface, and after my former remarks on how successful our efforts have been, it was a blow to find that my remarks had been premature, due to the results of our continual rainfall, and we were not helped by having to play a County game in mid week which churned up the turf into a sea of mud.

After expert advice we have been told that although our draining efforts have been very good the turf which was placed down the centre of the pitch contained a clay substance which stopped the water from getting to the drains. We are working on this, and in spite of dramatic headlines appearing in our local paper, we shall get it right.

If costs were not the problem there are

alternatives to our troubles, we could either keep our ground protected by an air filled cover which is blown up like a balloon when required, this is a method used successfully by Leicester City, and another alternative, and to my way of thinking the real solution, would be to lay an Astro Turf surface, which although is a synthetic turf, has recently received the official approval of F.I.F.A. This governing body, whom control world football, have given its blessing to be used in the Olympic Soccer Competition, where pitches can be improved by this method. One has only to see the state of some pitches abroad to understand this, and already in Algeria two stadiums have been laid in this synthetic turf. Earlier in the year, as was reported in our local paper my fellow director, Mr. Charles Day, and I, attended a demonstration of the turf laid down on a London County Council school playing field, and we were more than impressed. Like all new inventions we in this country are cautious to adopt at its early stage, and the biggest critiscism at the moment is the fear of leg burns from physical contact with the synthetic grass, although this has proved negative against our injuries sustained over a season in comparison.

In the United States where the pitches are being used extensively they have made a study of this factor and a prominent Orthopaedic Surgeon, Dr. William McColl M.D. and a former football player with the Chicago Bears, has been made Chairman of a special committee set up to look into these aspects.

As I said money is the problem, and we feel that priority number one is to provide a team that gives entertainment to our public, and with this in mind we the Board are committing ourselves to the limit hoping that the support will return and give Danny the chance to build the side to success.

With an away game at Tranmere on the Monday, Huddersfield on the Saturday,

Joe has his leg in plaster, or in a 'pot' as we say in the game, but we hope that he will be fit for our visit to Brighton. Having reduced our first team pool this season through financial necessity the last thing I wish for is a crop of injuries but that is the situation and, as I said earlier, the players who have deputised have responded well.

You will no doubt notice that two fences have been erected on the terraces but I would emphasise that we are not expecting a re-occurrence of misbehaviour by our younger supporters, in fact we are extremely pleased with the way they are supporting the team this season. The fences are to comply with the recommendations of a working party formed by the Minister of Sport following crowd disorders at certain grounds. Unfortunately when such an incident occurs all clubs are tarred with the same brush whether or not they experience this kind of involvement.







- 5. In the event of the League match being postponed because of weather or condition of the playing surface, that day's Heat will also be postponed and will be held on the re-arranged League match day.

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
