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NEWS&VIEWS

In this seasons programmes, we frequently refer to meeting up with old friends in Division 3 matches. Today in this First Round F.A. Cup we welcome probably our oldest, and closest friends Reading Football Club.

The two clubs were friends and rivals in Southern League days and, of course, became founder members of Division 3 (South) in 1920. Many can still remember those stirring "Local Derbies", and how our opponents in their dark blue and white stripped shirts, and dark blue shorts, appeared such strong sturdy players. Many names come to mind of those games between the wars. Messer, a big strong centre half. Tommy Tait, W. McConnell, J.T. Palethorpe. Later years we recall such players as Marks goalkeeper, Brice - centre half, Blackman - centre forward, Dick Spiers.

Writing of personalities, mention must be made of that charming gentleman Jimmy Carter, for many years the Chairman.

The last games between the two clubs were in season 1968-69. The home fixture was played on Tuesday, 27th August 1968, before a gate of 16,765. The match itself was poor and scrappy, and produced a 0-0 draw. The return game on 9th October, played before an

even bigger attendance resulted in a Swindon win by the only goal scored.

Most of the Swindon team are still in football, but only Butler and Burrows, remain with the club.

The clubs have met on two previous occasions in the First Round of the cup. In 1957-8, when Reading won one goal to nil. It was the year of a 'flu' epidemic and Swindon had been badly hit by illness. The teams met again in 1962, the result a win for Swindon by 4 goals to 2.

This was, of course, the year when we gained promotion to Division 2 for the first time. When the match was played on 3rd November 1962, Swindon occupied ninth position in the League table, with 19 points from 18 games, 6 points less than Northampton in first place. Strange to relate Carlisle was bottom of the league and Crystal Palace, one place higher. How fortunes in football change.

Reading Emphasis on Attack by Tony Pullein

The first round of the F.A. Cup has added impetus for us as we are drawn against our closest rivals Reading who, while not setting the Fourth Division alight this season, are hot on the promotion trial. So today's Cup clash will come as a refreshing diversion and recall the many past meetings we have enjoyed in the Football League.

Manager Charlie Hurley has only a limited squad of professionals so, consequently, the team has now got a settled look about it. The most exciting aspect of the current Reading side is its accent on attack, spearheaded by two of the Fourth Division's most successful strikers — Dick Habbin and Robin Friday.

Habbin was playing for Cambridge United in the Southern League — some while before that club's elevation to League status — when spotted by a Reading scout. He was Reading's top scorer in 1970/71 and he has already scored 14 times this season. That includes a hat-trick against Rotherham in the League Cup.

Friday was still an amateur when introduced to Reading's first-team last January but he made a sensational start, scoring four goals in his first five games and was very quickly offered a professional contract. He, too, has a hat-trick to his credit this season — against Southport — and his tally so far is ten.

Les Chappel, Reading's top scorer for the past two seasons, hasn't always been able to get into the side this term. Last season he scored 28 goals — including three hattricks and a four-goal hit against Torquay. Initially Les was a smash hit in Rotherham's attack and was Blackburn's top

scorer in his solitary season there before joining Reading in 1969.

One unexpected contender for a place in attack is former West Bromwich Albion and Lincoln player, Percy Freeman who gave up soccer at the end of last season but made a recent come-back.

Alan Taylor and Bruce Stuckey have both had turns on the left wing. Taylor, a former Chelsea reserve, joined Reading this summer and made his League debut against Rotherham in August. Stuckey began his career with Exeter City and moved on to Sunderland in 1967. Four years later he returned to Devon to link with Torquay and he was transferred to Reading last season.

Possibles for midfield places include Barry Wagstaffe, John Murray, Brian Carnaby, Gordon Cumming and Bob Lenarduzzi.

Wagstaffe played over 100 League games for Sheffield United, most of them in the First Division, before joining Reading in 1969 and he has always been a regular in the Elm Park club's senior team.

John Murray was signed just in time for the opening match, celebrating with a penalty goal in the 2-0 victory over Cambridge. But in his next game against Brighton — he had a spot kick saved by Peter Grummitt. John opened his career with Burnley and had a year with Blackpool prior to his transfer to Bury in 1971.

Carnaby had been on the books for several League and non-League clubs but at the age of 24 was beginning to give up hope of playing League football. Reading was probably his last hope but he did so

well in trial games that he became a regular first-teamer two seasons ago.

Cumming joined Reading from Arsenal in 1969 and was on one occasion, in 1971/72, their leading scorer. Lenarduzzi turned professional in May last year, got a few runs in the senior side last term but has distinguished himself this term both in midfield and defence.

The defence had settled with Stewart Henderson, Steve Hetzke, Tommy Youlden and David Moreline in the back four, but an injury to Hetzke now seems likely to cause a switch around.

Henderson didn't get into Chelsea's League team but he got his chance after signing for Brighton in 1965. He made over 200 appearances for the Sussex club prior to his move to Reading last season.

Youlden opened his career with Arsenal but didn't get into their League team. He joined Portsmouth in 1968, completing 88 League games in his four years with them. Hetzke made a solitary League appearance two seasons ago but won a regular place last season.

Moreline arrived this season from Fulham for whom he made more than 50 first-team appearances.

The Reading club was formed in 1871, turned professional in 1895 and moved to their present ground a year later. For several years they played in the Southern League until becoming a founder member of Division Three (South) in 1920.

Six years later they gained promotion to Division Two and in 1927 they reached

12 Armstrong Street Swindon Wilts Telephone 4593 the semi-final of the F.A. Cup, falling to Cardiff City when Wembley was in sight.

They returned to Division Three in 1931 and have never again aspired to the heights of Second Division football. They made several spirited bids immediately after the last war, twice finishing runners-up, but they couldn't quite make it. In 1958 they became founder members of the newly arranged national Third Division and, until their relegation in 1971, were the only club remaining that had not moved either up or down.

They have made several bids to regain their Third Division place but this season, though still suffering from inconsistency, they have looked good enough to achieve their objective — when in the right mood.

F.A. Cup Scene Prepare for Shocks!

The first round of the F.A. Cup is, in many ways, the most fascinating of all, bringing as it does an intriguing mixture of minnows and giants. Up and down the country there are strange-looking ties, some of which we can be sure will throw up surprise results.

Tranmere Rovers made an official complaint about the suitability of Throstlenest, home of Yorkshire League Farsley Celtic, and the F.A. sent an official to view their 5,000 capacity ground. Tranmere maintained that it was not in a fit state to stage an important cup-tie.

Problems, too, for Slough Town who were drawn at home to close rivals Brentford. Slough had moved to a new ground only a month before the game was due but they still turned down a request to play at Brentford — just some 15 miles up the M.4.

Most exciting derby tie is probably the meeting of Tooting & Mitcham with Crystal Palace. Police limited the crowd to 12,000 which meant an awful lot of people have been disappointed. Palace have been drawing up to 20,000 this season and all would have made the short journey given the chance.

By one of those strange twists of fate, Tooting are managed by Roy Dwight who was a member of the Nottingham Forest side which ended Tooting's most famous Cup run of all in 1959.

Tooting beat Bournemouth in the first round and then knocked out Northampton at the next stage. What's more, Tooting led Forest 2-0 at half-time in round three but in the end had to settle for a 2-2 draw. They lost the replay.

It's perhaps sad to note that only one former Football League club has qualified for the first round this year — Gateshead, who visit Crewe.

The F.A. Cup does, of course, provide a fine opportunity for ambitious non-League clubs to press their claims for admission to the Football League. Peterborough and Hereford, in recent times, both got in following outstanding Cup performances.

One club hoping to enjoy a good run this season was Wigan Athletic who have several times been within a vote or two of the Fourth Division. But the Lancashire club has one of the toughest draws of all, away to successful Fourth Division side Shrewsbury Town. If Wigan win this one they will indeed win considerable support.

Kettering and Bedford, two other leading contenders for a place in the Football League, had the misfortune to meet in the fourth qualifying round. The winners had to visit Swansea where it was quite possible they might spring a surprise.

Bobby Charlton was none too happy about Preston's draw away to amateurs Blyth Spartans who have pulled off some outstanding giant-killing feats in the past.

Matlock Town quietly fancy their chances at home to Blackburn Rovers. They had a huge new mound built behind one of the goals to increase their capacity from 5,500 to 7,500 so they could have as much vocal support as possible.

It speaks well for our back room boys who train and encourage these youngsters that the skills, stamina and spirit is so high.

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


