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NEWS&VIEWS

This afternoon we welcome, for their first ever League game at the County Ground, Hereford United. They last played at Swindon in the First Round of the F.A. Cup on 26th January 1955.

Hereford were members of the Southern League, and came with a fine record, but were defeated by four goals to nil. The Swindon team at that time was:—
Sam Burton, George Hunt, Geof Fox, Jimmy Cross, George Hudson, Tony McShane, David Gibson, Andy Micklewright, Maurice Owen, Bob Edwards and either Jasper Johnson or Jimmy Brennan.

In the Second Round we defeated Peterborough (Midland League) 2 - 1 after a 1 - 1 draw at Swindon. In the Third Round we defeated another Midland League team Worksop Town 1 - 0, but in the next round, Swindon was drawn away to Charlton, then in Division One and after a great fight lost 1 - 2. Bob Edwards scoring first for Swindon.

Season 1955 - 56 was one of our worst ever. Finances were at a very low ebb, in fact there was a distinct danger of having to close down. The club had no manager, Geof Fox was acting player/manager, and to cap it all Swindon had to seek reelection to Division 3 South by virtue of having finished in bottom position with a

total of 30 points from 46 games. The following season 1956-57, was a little better, as again we had to seek re-election, this time second from bottom, one place above Norwich City.

Fortunately, the following year saw a great improvement, and Swindon ended the season in fourth position.

Earlier this year we visited Hereford and lost 1 - 2, so today we look for a win, not only to repay that score, but also maintain our league position.

The cup draw against West Ham United, will revive many memories for our supporters no doubt they will remember season 1963-64 when Swindon entertained West Ham in the Fourth Round of the League Cup and after a thrilling struggle the match ended in a draw 3-3. The return game produced a 4-1 victory for the home team. Then in February 1964 we met them again at Swindon in the F.A. Cup. A record attendance of 28,582 iammed the County Ground (all ticket). A great game, but again a win. 3-1 for West Ham United who went on to defeat Preston 3-2 in one of the best of Cup Finals. Two people who will have vivid memories of the 1964 games are Maurice Owen and Mrs. Moss.

RECORD-SMASHING HEREFORD by Tony Pullein

Hereford United are ideally placed to substantiate their claim for a place in the Second Division and, if they do achieve promotion, they will break all records for the quickest rise from non-League football to Division Two, through the Fourth Division. Hereford were admitted to the League as recently as 1972.

In a bid to boost his club's promotion bid, manager John Sillett recently signed that experienced striker John Galley from Nottingham Forest. Galley, who also spent a few weeks on loan to Peterborough this season, began his League career with Wolves in 1962/63. Rotherham signed him in 1965 and he was their leading scorer in 1965/66. He moved on to Bristol City in 1967, topping their scorers in his first two seasons. Forest signed him in 1972.

Galley in fact, is only one of several very experienced players in the Hereford side.

They don't come more experienced than Terry Paine, the former England player, who was signed as player-coach. He has well over 700 League appearances to his credit. Other recent signings included Republic of Ireland International Tony Byrne, striker Dixie McNeil and midfield player Fred Kemp. Peter Morgan has also been signed on loan.

Paine, who won 19 England caps and holds both the League appearances (713) and goalscoring (160) records for Southampton, is a player who can still take complete control of a game in midfield. In this department he is sometimes accompanied by Welsh international

Brian Evans, who totted up some 400 games for Swansea prior to his transfer last season.

Dudley Tyler, David Rudge and Kemp are all in contention for places in midfield. Tyler, a one-time hole-in-the-heart case, helped Hereford hold West Ham in the F.A. Cup while they were still in the Southern League. He was later snapped up by the Hammers and played 29 First Division games before re-joining Hereford for £11,000 last season.

Rudge had several seasons with Aston Villa, moving to Hereford in 1972. Kemp began with Wolves, signed for Southampton in 1965 and later served Blackpool and Halifax before his latest move in the summer.

Dixie McNeil is yet again one of the country's leading goalscorers, his tally of 19 including two hat-tricks. For the past two seasons he had been one of the Fourth Division's leading marksmen while with Lincoln, hitting 21 goals in 1972/73 and 19 last season. Earlier in his career he played for Leicester, Exeter, Corby and Northampton.

Eric Redrobe, late of Bolton and Southport, is now in his third season with Hereford. He, too, has an impressive scoring record. Another striker is John Ritchie, a former Arsenal reserve who made his League debut after transferring to Hereford last season.

Paul Lee, a youngster who made his League bow with Hereford last season had been playing in attack in recent Goalkeeper Tommy Hughes is a former Scottish under-23 international who began his career at Chelsea where he was usually understudy to Peter Bonetti. He moved on to Aston Villa and spent a short loan period with Brighton before switching to Herefored last season.

Colin Lee, David Rylands, Billy Tucker, Peter Morgan, Tony Byrne and Stephen Emery have all been appearing in defence.

Lee is currently on loan from Bristol City, where he had been a reserve player. Rylands didn't get into Liverpool's First Division side but got his League chance with Hereford last season. Tucker, a local discovery, has been in the team since its Southern League days.

Morgan grew up with Cardiff, joining Hereford this season.

Byrne, who made one League appearance for Millwall, joined Southampton in 1964 and, while there, won 14 caps for the Republic of Ireland. Hereford paid £18,000 for him in the summer.

Emery is another Hereford discovery who came into the team last season.

Hereford United have been living a dream these past three or four years. At Chirstmas time in 1971 they were doing quite well in the Southern League, not daring to expect that entry into the Football League might be offered them within six months.

Then came that fabulous F.A. Cup victory over Newcastle United, followed by a draw against West Ham. That just

Hereford celebrated their election to the Football League by gaining promotion to Division Three at the first attempt.

Now they have a chance to jump into Division Two!

Hereford gained all those fabulous successes under manager Colin Addison who was surprisingly dismissed last season to provide one of only a few rare cases on record of a club deeming to sack a successful manager!

Now John Sillett, the former Chelsea player, is carrying on Addisons' good work.

Hereford's progress from junior football to League status is quite remarkable. The club was founded in 1924 and played in the Birmingham League until gaining admission to the Southern League in 1939. It wasn't until after the war that they could properly take their place in this competition and they finished runners-up in the first post-war campaign.

Hereford never won the championship of the Southern League but they were runners-up again in 1951 and 1972.

They knocked Millwall out of the F.A. Cup in 1965. Northampton fell to Hereford in 1970 and then came those amazing games with Newcastle and West Ham. This all led to their election to the Fourth Division in June 1972, on a second ballot after they had tied on 26 votes in the first vote.

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
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Third Division Scene-Cup Successes

Three Third Division clubs won their way into the fourth round of the F.A. Cup at the first attempt. Biggest upset was Plymouth's 2 - 0 defeat of Blackpool, a particularly satisfying result for Argyle manager Tony Waiters.

Waiters spent most of his playing days with Blackpool, winning five England caps. Last season, Waiters led Plymouth to the semi-final of the League Cup. If they win their next tie - - - at home to Everton or Altrincham - - - Plymouth will equal a club record. They have only once before as far as the fifth round.

If, as expected, Everton won their replay with Altrincham, Toffees' boss Billy Bingham will be returning to his former club. Argyle sacked him because they disagreed with him also managing the Northern Ireland team.

Peterborough, who knocked our Tranmere, and ourselves, were the only others definitely into round four.

Walsall recalled glories of 40 years ago when they so splendidly held Manchester United to a 0 - 0 draw at Old Trafford, a ground where only two other visiting sides Nottingham Forest and Orient - - - have avoided defeat this season.

Walsall won F.A. Cup fame in 1933 when they beat mighty Arsenal 2 - 1. They had

ground advantage then and, in many ways, their performance last Saturday was even better.

Southend also did well to earn a replay. They were 0 - 2 down to First Division O.P.R. but recovered to draw 2 - 2.

Brighton's defeat by Leatherhead was their third knockout at the hands of a non-League side since the war and their second in successive seasons. Last term they were whacked 0 - 4 by Walton and Hersham.

Huddersfield Town now face the unenviable prospect of becoming the first former League Champion club ever to drop into Division Four. Three times Champions in the 'twenties, Huddersfield slipped into second - from - bottom place after their home defeat at Blackburn. Now, with only one victory in nine League games behind them, their immediate future looks rather dismal.

Attendances generally boomed over the Christmas period. Both Plymouth (18,027) and Colchester (7,790) reported their highest crowds of the season whilst Gilligham's 14,555 - - - for the visit of Crystal Palace - - - was their best for almost ten years. Allan Gauden, a £7,000 signing from Hartlepool, completed a happy day for the Gills by hitting the third goal in a 3 - 1 victory which ended

The Chairmans Column

With 1975 with us we face the remaining part of the season with confidence, and from the many letters that I have received it seems that our style of play is certainly encouraging to our supporters.

We are pleased with our cup draw with West Ham, although we obviously would have preferred the game at home. At the time of writing these notes we are expecting to have our allocation of tickets in time to sell at this match. We feel that this will give our country supporters an equal chance and save them the extra cost of travelling to Swindon an another day.

Our allocation of seats is approximately 2,000 and these will be on sale today if West Ham have supplied.

We are obviously pleased that our attendances are keeping around the 10,000 mark, and hope that we shall be able to improve on this to enable us to keep our heads above water financially. I do not want to keep on about finance all the time, but so many people are under the impression that this figure enables us to break even, but 14,000 is our present break even number with the additional income that we receive from our competitions etc. Obviously the more that we can do to improve our competitions and other forms of income will enable us to get by on our smaller gates, but with higher attendances we shall have more for team improvements. It has been said that the official attendance given out over the tannoy and in the press causes surprise to many people who feel that these numbers do not tally with their estimation, and wonder how these figures are arrived at. May I assure everyone that the figures given are correct, and that we are not trying to deceive anyone. The figures given on normal match days include season ticket holders whether they attend or not, as well as people passing through the turnstiles. Each turnstile mechanism is sealed by the Company auditors preventing any interference. On cup tie days when season ticket holders pay for entry, the figure given is the

actual attendance.

I have had requests for our Fan Fare publication which is always available at our Club Offices if you miss out when they are distributed monthly.

As you may have seen in the local press, David Munks has gone to Exeter on a months loan, and Mick McGovern to Brighton, also on a months loan, but we have agreed with both clubs that we will negotiate terms if they wish to do so after the period of loan. David has already had one game and received very favourable reports in the Daily Press.

After the very good performance by the non-league clubs in the F.A. Cup on Saturday last, many people are asking whether the standard of league clubs is deteriorating or whether the standard of non-league is improving, and also will these performance strengthen the claims to league status that at the moment is so hard to attain.

Whilst not wanting to detract in any way from the performance of the non-league clubs, I personally do not feel that one can judge standards by the odd performance, and I know that someone will point out that some non-league clubs have not only drawn at home, but repeated the performance on their opponents ground a few days after. Every year this sort of thing happens, only this year more nonleague clubs have had success than is usual. The question is also being asked, as to whether this is any guide to the future formation of some of the struggling league clubs who cannot afford to pay full time staff from their gate receipts.

I think that it is inevitable that some league clubs will be forced to rely on a very small pool of full time players, made up with part time professionals. It is not a position which I would like to see happen, because I am sure that the standards of play must suffer in the long run. One of the answers to the problem is that we must increase, if only slightly,

More recently, supporters will remember the game at West Ham on Saturday 28th January 1967 when Swindon drew 3-3 at Upton Park. The replay on the following Tuesday caught the imagination of the whole area, and a great crowd turned up and many were locked out with all gates closed. Official attendance 25,789. A fantastic game, with Willie Penman scoring in eighteen minutes. Sissons equalized in seventy-eight minutes, but Swindon won 3-1, with goals by Don Rogers, eighty-four minutes and Ron Skeen eighty-nine minutes.

It was a wonderful victory as our opponents contained such great players as Burkett, Peters, Moore, Brabrook, Sealey, Boyce, Byrne, Hurst and Sissons. Three of these of course were members of the World Cup winning team.

We look forward with confidence to the game on 25th January, 1975.

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West Ham United are our opponents in the next round of the F.A. Cup but this is not the first time that our clubs have met of course. We have had some hard tussles against the Hammers but the games have always been entertaining. West Ham are a good footballing side and we prefer to play against such teams as this gives our lads full scope to display their individual skills.

First Division sides generally give their opponents more room because every man does his own job of work. Whilst in the Third and Fourth Division players work harder to help one another to make up for the skills they lack.

As you know, Ron Potter has been out of action for a number of weeks and last week he went into hospital for an operation to the tendons of his right leg and we hope that this will now put him right.

Many of you will know of our old servant, Mr. Bert Davies, ex international, secretary, bar steward - you name it and Bert has done it. It was just sixty years ago this month that he played his first Football League game, playing outside left for Middlesbrough against West Bromwich and Bert still takes an active interest in us.

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CLUB HISTORY

The two men were responsible for bringing Hereford United Football Club into existence, Dr.E.W.Maples O.B.E., and Mr.H.K.Foster. In those far off days of the early 1920's they felt that the city could support a better class of football than was being staged and called a meeting of four of Hereford's leading amateur clubs to discuss this. Hereford City and Hereford Thistle decided to remain as independant clubs, but R.A.O.C. (Rotherwas) and St. Martin's amalgamated and called themselves, appropriately enough, Hereford United. Dr. Maples became the club's first chairman.

Hereford United celebrate their 50th anniversary this season and though the youngest club in the Football League, they have made tremendous strides since being elected in 1972. They won promotion from the Fourth Division at their first attempt and last season finished four points short of a place in the top half of the Third after losing only one of their last 10 League matches.

Formed in 1924 they originally competed in the Birmingham Combination but switched to the Birmingham League five years later and were elected to the Southern

League in 1939. During their non-league days they never won a championship at top level but finished runners-up four times in the Southern League.

Their forte was cup football and they set a non-league record by reaching the first round of the F.A. Cup 23 times in 24 years before their election to the Fourth Division. They fought their way through to the second round 13 times during that period, the third round and the fourth round once. In 1971-72 they were named Sunday Mirror Giantkillers after elminating First Division Newcastle Unted in a replay and then holding West Ham United to a goalless draw.

Last season they maintained their first Cup record when they were paired with West Ham United for the second time in three years and gained a 2 - 1 revenge after drawing at Upton Park. Before their election to the League they won the Southern League Cup three times, the Southern League Charity Cup and also reached the Welsh Cup Final before losing to Cardiff.
