HAMMER Editorial

The ties which bind a football fan to a particular club are multifarious, and from time to time we receive correspondence which revives old memories of the Hammers and the reasons why the writer attached himself to our team.

Yet over the years soccer followers can change their affinity, and once again this is often coincidental to circumstances in life which make it difficult to regularly follow the original choice.

An illustration of this was very aptly given in a letter from Mr. Frank Rowland, a Colchester United fan who lives at "Potash," Newton Green, Sudbury, Suffolk.

Mr. Rowland says: "I recently came across an old scrap-book which I kept as a very small boy during the 1923-26 seasons, when my whole life revolved around West Ham United (especially Jimmy Ruffell and Vic Watson, who were my especial favourites amongst a team of God-like creatures!)"

Some of the pieces I kept have crumbled away with age (and presumably, constant reverential contemplation f), but it did occur to me that some of you might find interest in these old relics. I recall bitter tears when my parents (fortunately as it turned out) would not let me go to Wembley in 1923; but every home match was an event, as I paid my sixpence and stood at the front of the old 'Chicken Run.'

My parents eventually moved away from Barking where we then lived, and in 1937 business took me back to my present address. When I arrived here both Ipswich Town and Col-chester United had just entered the Southern League, and it was a question of which I should support. I saw a newspaper cutting that said Colchester had signed Jimmy Collins, one of my old West Ham favourites -so that was the team for me!

From then on I was a Colchester fan, and have remained so ever since, being on the Supporters Club Committee for some years.

However, my 'second team' is always 'The Irons' (as they were always called then), and my spirits still rise or sink with their results."

Mr. Rowland forwarded several interesting extracts, including cartoons, players' photos (carefully coloured-in with red and blue crayon) and reports of matches. He has now donated these to the Club, and they provide a nostalgic memory of those events of fifty years ago.

This particular letter was only one of a multitude of interest-creating missives. The increased space available in a magazine-style publication now provides the opportunity for us to occasionally include some of this correspondence; but in the smaller editions that previously prevailed it was not possible to expound at any length on topics other than those of immediate urgency.

Such closer contact can only be for the good of the club and its fans. We have always enjoyed a high standard of loyalty from our followers, and it is not unusual for this to extend individually over a period of fifty years or more. But even if you are a late joiner" the true Hammers fan will always be pleased to welcome you.

THE ROBINS

There must be many here today who recall our previous Cup meetings with Swindon Town. These five clashes were spread over two seasons—1963-64 (in the Fourth Round of the League Cup and Fifth Round of the F.A. Cup) and 1966-67 (Third Round of the F.A. Cup).



As Swindon won the most recent of those engagements it is obviously that one which is most easily remembered, particularly so because it was among those "giant killer" episodes which are brightly scattered among the history of the F.A. Cup.

At the time, the Wiltshire club was —as now—in the Third Division. The score-chart shows that with a quarter-of-an-hour to go they were within reach of a sensational win on our ground, being 3—2 ahead at that time. But they made no mistake in the replay, and crushed us out with two goals in the final six minutes.

Naturally enough, we prefer to recall the aftermath of the 1963-64 meetings—when Swindon were members of the Second Division. Our victory in the League Cup replay helped us to reach the Semi-Final of that competition, but the subsequent success in the F.A. Cup was a vital step en route to a Final triumph v Preston North End at Wembley.

When the draw was made for this season's Fourth Round both clubs obviously looked back on those past occasions and considered the possibilities of what might happen this afternoon. Naturally enough, it is the Town's ambition to repeat this head-line-making performance; and on our part, we must regard this tie as an omen for a further trip to Wembley.

But from whatever angle it is inspected, the fact remains that the teams participating today are — with one possible exception—completely different from those of over eight years ago. But that sole survivor

among the present First Team squads of Hammers and Robins played in all five of those previous ties, and we congratulate John Trollope on his splendid record of service with his only League club.

The present Swindon team has revived hopes that Second Division soccer will soon be back at the County Ground, for they are in strong contention among the leading clubs of Division III. However, their task may well be rather more difficult than at first appears, for of 26 completed fixtures to date, 15 have been played at home and only 11 away (last Saturday's at Colchester was abandoned after 56 minutes).

Nevertheless, things have definitely taken a turn for the better, and the 11,781 attendance for the match v Hereford United a fortnight ago was the best League gate this season at the County Ground. The First Round F.A. Cup tie also drew 13,365 to the Wiltshire enclosure, and the Third Round fixture v Lincoln City another 11,791.

Inevitably, today's mutual greeting from both sides must be "Hail, and farewell," for only one can go forward to the last 16 clubs left in the competition—even though replays may be necessary. But no matter who survives this latest meeting, both can offer their best wishes for the remainder of the season, with success of one kind or another as the reward for a high standard of performance in their respective spheres.

TREVOR ANDERSON. Born in Belfast. Played in the Irish League for Portadown before signing for Manchester United. Whilst at Old Trafford he was capped for Northern Ireland in 1973, and has made half-a-dozen appearances for his country at full international level. After a score of Div. I games for United, he transferred to Swindon on 1 Nov. 1974.

JIM BARRON. Born at Tantobie, Co. Durham. His first pro club was Wolves, for whom he had eight League appearances. Transferred to Chelsea, he played only once in their First XI before moving to Oxford United. After 152 League appearances with them he became Nottingham Forest's goal-keeper, and during 155 League games for the Foresters appeared at Upton Park. Signed for Swindon Town last July.

FRANK BURROWS. Born at Larkhall, Scotland. After signing pro for Raith Rovers he moved south to Scunthorpe United and made 106 League appearances for the Irons. Following three seasons with the Lincolnshire club he transferred to Swindon, and won several medals as a member of the successful sides. Had half-a-dozen games on loan to Mansfield Town, but is now approaching his 250th League appearance for the Robins.

JOE BUTLER. Born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Signed pro for his local United club, but made only three appearances in the Tynesiders' League side as a youngster. Moved to Swindon in Aug. 1965, and progressed through the youth section to the senior team, gaining Cup winners' and promotion medals. Has played in nearly 350 League games for the Robins.

WILF DIXON. A Londoner. Became a pro with Arsenal, but never played in the Gunners' First XI. Transferred to Reading, and made 153 League appearances before joining Swindon Town in Sept. 1973.

PETER EASTOE. Born at Tamworth, Staffs. Joined Wolves as a youngster, but made only six League appearances for the Midlanders before transferring to Swindon on 13 March 1974. Became the Robins' top scorer with eight goals in the final 19 League games of last season, and is among the leading Division III net-finders this season.

TERRY HUBBARD. Born at Newport, Joined Swindon as an apprentice professional in 1969. Reached his half-century of League appearances at the end of last season. First capped for Wales Under-23 in 1973, he was in the squad for last Tuesday's match against England at Wrexham.

TOMMY JENKINS. A Londoner. Has played for several clubs, including a brief spell with the Hammers and the Southern Leaguers Margate. His first pro club was Orient, for whom he made a solitary League appearance before moving to Reading. He netted five goals in 21 senior games for the Biscuitmen and four in 84 League games for Southampton, before transferring to Swindon in Oct. 1972. Has played over 50 League games for the Robins.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN. Born at Edmonton, London. Had 66 League appearances for Colchester United, and won England Youth honours. Transferred to Swindon on 3 Dec. 1973, and is now a regular in the back four, after making 16 League appearances last season.

DAVID MOSS. Born at Witney. Was spotted by the Robins when playing in junior soccer, and signed pro in 1969. Scored ten goals in 61 League appearances up to the commencement of this season. Missed only two League games in 1973-74.


RON POTTER. Born at Wolverhampton. Signed pro for W.B.A., but after nine League games for Albion he transferred to Swindon in Nov. 1970. Now on his way to a century of League appearances, of which 27 were made last season.

COLIN PROPHETT. Born at Crewe, Played for the local Alexandra club as an amateur, but joined Sheffield Wednesday as a pro in 1968. After 119 League appearances for the Hillsborough club, he moved to Norwich City in 1973 and had 34 Div. II games last season. Went to Swindon on a month's trial at the start of this season, and transferred on 30 Sept. 1974.

KEN STROUD. A Londoner. Signed as an apprentice in 1967 and full pro in 1970. His 17 League games last season proved him a contender for a regular First Team place.

DAVID SYRETT. Born in Salisbury. Signed for the Robins as apprentice in July 1972 and full pro in Nov. 1973. During last season he was capped for England Youth, and made his League debut, scoring five times in 27 games.

JOHN TROLLOPE. A "local," being born at Wroughton, near Swindon. Joined the Town club from school, and is its longest-serving professional, having signed in Aug. 1960. Has now made well over 600 First Team appearances, including five against the Hammers in previous cup-ties, and missed only six League matches last season.

DANNY WILLIAMS played for Rotherham for 19\(\) years, during which time he appeared 621 times in their First Team. For the first ten years he was a part-timer, putting in a full shift in the mines each day in addition to training and playing. He eventually became manager of Rotherham, and remained there for three years before resigning and moving his home to Bournemouth.

It was from Bournemouth that he joined Swindon Town as manager in 1966; he stayed with the Robins for four years, during which time the Town gained promotion to the Second Division and won the League Cup Final in 1969.

Following these achievements, Danny then moved to Sheffield Wednesday as manager, but only remained with them for sixteen months. His next club was Mansfield Town, where he worked most successfully for two-and-a-half-years before being invited to rejoin Swindon Town in March 1974

MEMORIES FOR JOHN AND DANNY

An interesting sidelight to this afternoon's clash is the connections of the two Team Managers with previous F.A. Cup meetings,

Hammers' John Lyall was on the injured list during the 1963-64 season, with a knee injury which subsequently ended his playing-career. However, in company with Tony Scott (also injured at the time) he contributed to our success by a preview of the Swindon team and summarising their play, so that the Hammers' line-up could be briefed in advance.

Swindon's Danny Williams was in charge of the team that beat us in 1966-67, and we quote his remarks to the press after the 3—3 draw at Upton Park: "There never was any deep plan; if we'd sat up all night trying to figure what tactics they'd use against us we'd have been beaten before we started. We settled for man-for-man marking. We might be Third Division, but if there's a fellow in my side who can't understand that and play his guts out accordingly, then he's no right to call himself a professional footballer."

A very outspoken comment from a man who has known hard times as well as the more glorious moments.

Match Review

CONFIDENT RANGERS

Although we had hopes last Saturday of completing our first double of the season, pre-match comments by Q.P.R. players indicated that our opponents were undaunted by the fact that we had won on their ground a few weeks ago.

This confidence eventually proved to be well-founded, and was underlined by the fact that Rangers twice drew level to earn a half-share.

The downpour which commenced around mid-day and continued uninterrupted for several hours threatened to cause a postponement of this local derby, but some three-quarters-of-anhour before kick-off time the referee decided that there was sufficient chance of the match being completed to make The players overcame the handicaps imposed by the weather in highly-commendable fashion, and provided top-rate entertainment thoroughly enjoyed by nearly 30,000 fans-many of whom also braved the unfriendly elements on the terraces.

Two controversial penalty decisions (one for each side) were major talking points in the after-match discussions and dissections; but there were other interesting aspects in the TV runthrough on Sunday afternoon—particularly the sequence which showed how Rangers found the "hole in the wall" that brought their first equaliser. Nevertheless, our opening counter certainly came from the sweetest move of the entire 90 minutes, and could not have been bettered on a first-rate surface.

The sharing of the points was in the long run the fairest result, but although we dropped one we still remained four points behind the current leaders in this most enthralling of championship races . . . and there is still quite a way to go!

FOOTBALL COMBINATION

The match v Crystal Palace Res. at Selhurst Park on Jan. 15 provided an opportunity for Billy Jennings to have a try-out after recent injury; in addition we were able to include Tommy Taylor, who was also available after missing two First XI games. The Glaziers did well to keep the score-sheet blank at half-time, but a second-half goal by Yilmaz Orhan was sufficient to win us full points.

Last Saturday's re-arranged fixture v Arsenal Res. was postponed, as the pitch at Highbury was declared unfit.



OLD HAMMER



PHIL WOOSNAM was born at Caersws, Wales.

His scholastic career took him to University, and after obtaining his degree as a Bachelor of Science he decided upon a school-teaching career. However, Phil's ability also extended to the soccer field, and he was capped five times for Wales as an amateur.

Phil became a member of the staff at Leyton County High School, and also turned professional for Leyton Orient (then in the Second Division).

He attracted a lot of attention whilst with the O's, and our manager Ted Fenton agreed on a figure of £30,000 for his transfer to the Hammers. Phil made his debut v Arsenal at Upton Park on 8 Nov. 1958 in our first League meeting with the Gunners since 1932; 38,250 saw the game which ended in a goalless draw, but Phil did well in a team that eventually

ended in sixth place in our first season back in Division I.

Whilst at Upton Park, Phil was capped 15 times for Wales at full international level, and in his 134 League games he netted 25 goals.

However, after a spell of just over four years in our colours he transferred to Aston Villa in Nov. 1962, and was twice more honoured for his country.

Phil went to the United States in 1966 as player-coach for the Atlanta Chiefs, in company with other Brit'sh coaches including Vic Crowe, Freddie Goodwin, Gordon Jago and Bobby Robson. The Chiefs won the North American Soccer League title two years later, and Phil was offered the post of Commissioner of the League. His comment on this was: "There was only one good job left, and I happened to get it."

It is a position which carries considerable responsibility for the professional game in the U.S.A. In this autocratic position Phil is called upon for on-the-spot decisions, but his fairness of judgment has very much impressed those responsible for the progress of the game across the Atlantic.

In an interview during January with Colin Malam of the Sunday Telegraph, Phil gave an intelligent insight into soccer in U.S.A., and with 18 clubs at present in the N.A.S.L. professional organisation plus a sound foundation at schools level, he is confident of the future.

Hammers' History

10 years ago . . .

23 Jan. 1965. Although the weather was mild for the time of year, the muddy conditions underfoot caused by snow and frost earlier in the week led to some mistakes by both sides. However, there was plenty of good soccer for the 25,490 fans. Ron Boyce put us in front (17 mins.), but in the 13 minutes before the interval there were three more goals; Andy Lochead and Willie Irvine made it 2-1 for Burnley before John Bond levelled the score. Johnny Byrne netted on the hour, and the game ended 3-2 in our favour for us to occupy fifth place in the table.

20 years ago . . .

22 Jan. 1955. Two attendance figures on this day are worth contemplating. Our Second Division fixture v Bristol Rovers at Eastville attracted 28,000 fans—and both teams were only holding middle-of-the-table positions! It was a good day for the Hammers, with John Dick netting a hat-trick in the 4—2 victory. Our team:

On the same afternoon there was a 3,000 attendance for a Reserve Team game v Norwich City Res. at Upton Park.

30 years ago . . .

27 Jan. 1945. Bad weather caused a postponement of our war-time Football League South fixture v Luton Town. However, around that time there were some interesting items in our programme in respect of other matters. There had been a suggestion to form a new reserve team competition called the Home Counties League to supersede the London Combination, but after some discussion the proposal was vetoed, and the Combination resumed its long history in the following season.

Our repeated requests to the Government Department concerned for permission to repair the East Terrace "chicken run" met repetitive negatives. Combined with the damage on the South Bank this limited our accommodation to just over 21,000, so we had to close the gates on soccerstarved fans when we met Spurs in a cup-tie.

Today we include the third in our series of Hammers' season-by-season statistics. The 1919-20 details were in our issue of 25 Sept. 1974 (v Birmingham City) and 1920-21 in that of 14 Dec. 1974 (v Manchester City). Season's Review

Although our points total was the same as in the previous season, we ended one place higher in the table — a steady progress to promotion which was to come at the end of the following campaign.

It was Syd Puddefoot's last season with the Hammers; our leading scorer in the first three years of Football League membership was transferred to Falkirk in February 1922 for £5,000-a record fee for a player moving from an English to a Scottish club. How-ever, we had an "ace in the hole," and Vic Watson's 16 goals presaged his emergence as the Hammers' highest-ever scorer.

An interesting point was that we met Swansea Town (now City) three times in the F.A. Cup before they emerged victorious.

The players' appearances and name of our goalscorer are not available for the Cup matches, owing to a gap in our records.
