


Incidentally, that was Steve's first League goal since 1st January, 1974; when he scored at Crewe.

TO START YOU TALKING!

One often hears the phrase at this stage of the season, "out of the cup, no hope of promotion and therefore nothing to play for", and at times teams with the problem of avoiding relegation or re-election seem almost to be envied because they have an incentive that mid-table teams lack.

Statistically, of course, it is true that in recent years in particular gates have tended to drop in the last few months of the season if teams have had no tangible rewards at stake and one wonders just how much the assumption of the media that interest will automatically decline has contributed towards this.

Logically the advent of a longer day should, other things being equal, bring more people to the terraces, particularly the less hardy ones who are likely to be most affected by icy winds, rain or snow and a dark journey home. What's more the question of team selection should have its own inbuilt interest. If the team remains unchanged there is a fair chance that it is staying the same because it has struck a winning run. If there are frequent changes then it is an equally fair

assumption that the manager is trying out all the talent at his disposal in the hope of finding a winning combination in time for the new season in a few months time.

This is of particular interest where young players are concerned for one can be quite certain that a "new boy" getting his first chance in League football will be doing his very best to establish himself in the game and how readily supporters respond when they see a "discovery" making good. Players who are now household names all began somewhere, all made their début at some time or other, and how people who were there on that particular day enjoy recounting that they were amongst the first to see the newly arrived talent.

It is, of course, a truism that the attitude of spectators is reflected on the field of play and just as a crowd which cheers madly from the moment their favourites first appear from the dressing room can often inspire them to that vital extra effort when it matters, so a largely deserted stadium with apathetic scattered watchers can transmit a "what's it all matter" attitude to the field.

Perhaps most important of all, a team without any immediate cut-throat involvement in promotion, relegation, championship or re-election issues is ideally fitted to reveal their skills. If this happens then there's nothing more calculated to put new heart into a club's players, management and supporters as they look forward to a new season with all its hopes.

SPOTLIGHT ON DIVISION THREE

NO EMPTY ALLISON BOAST

Malcolm Allison's boast, "we are the best side in the Division" was no empty threat at Plymouth. Down went Crystal Palace to Home Park and jolted Argyle with a tremendous 1-0 win.

Dave Swindlehurst got the goal that lifts Palace right back into a promotion race in which seven clubs are in with a real chance.

These notes are written before last week-end's important programme, so who knows, the lead might well have changed again.

No disputing the talent at Selhurst. There's Mike Holder of Spurs and a gifted campaigner such as Terry Venables is not in the side. In fact, it's reckoned that Terry, top coach on the staff, has maybe played his last League game.

The F.A. Cup success of Walsall and Peterborough may have cost them vital ground. Both after their fifth round exits lost at home, Walsall going down to Charlton Athletic for whom Arthur Horsfield got the winner,

was maybe not such a surprise. But Peterborough, who went out in the Cup so gallantly to Middlesbrough, were tipped over by lowly Chesterfield—and that was a shaker.

Gloomy days for Port Vale and Watford—and their goalless draw was a little predictable. At the time of writing Vale have yet to win a match this year. And Watford seem to have lost all their early sparkle. By the way, chairman Elton John, does not seem to bring them much luck when he views them, he's yet to see them win.

This 0-0 draw that Vale played marked the début of their new £6,000 signing from Liverpool, Derek Brownbill.

Market activity has been practically dead but there is plenty of loan business and one wonders if the 13th March deadline as it nears will bring any big deals.

One big target is Peterborough's Dave Gregory whom Sheffield United have had under constant review. Derby and Spurs, too. Spurs are also keeping tags on Walsall's Alan Birch and Norwich City eye Gillingham's Dick Tydeman.

Talking of Gillingham, what a revival there's been at Priestfield under Len Ashurst. They took, last week, a second refresher course at Bisham Abbey. The last visit there in November worked wonders says Ashurst.

Clubs in the lower half who have had some good results of late are Brighton and Aldershot. Brighton seem to have a winner in Tommy Towner who, after he had robbed us of the extra point here, got the winner against Hereford. And who popped up with Aldershot's late point saver against Blackburn? None other than ageless Jack Howarth.

Grim times for Huddersfield Town though. The local derby with Halifax Town boosted the Leeds Road gate to 7,931, but Halifax pirated the points with a 2-1 win and it's really beginning to look like Division Four for the once famous Huddersfield club.

Introducing SWINDON TOWN

Much has happened since our encounter with Swindon at Layer Road on 18th January, which was abandoned at a stage when we led 3-0 and were obviously well on the way to victory.

Swindon haven't had much good fortune since then. After their F.A. Cup exit to West Ham they have lost League games away to Grimsby, Preston and Gillingham. They had a vital game at Blackburn last Firday and a good result there will have kept them very much in the promotion chase.

Swindon last season, came down with a rock bottom 25 points, their fate virtually settled long before the final match. But under Danny Williams, who previously managed them and then took over at Sheffield Wednesday, they have become one of the best equipped squads in the lower Divisions.

Primarily it has been slick teamwork and the striking activities of Peter Eastoe, ex Wolverhampton Wanderers, and local Witney born David Moss.

Powerful Eastoe scored only eight goals last season in 19 games while Moss collected a mere seven. So far in League, League Cup and F.A. Cup games Eastoe has got 23.

Moss, attracting plenty of club scouts down to Wiltshire, is not far behind and he hit a hat-trick in our 4–1 eclipse at the County Ground on 30th November.

Since the season began Swindon have also added Trevor Anderson, the

former Irish international, to their squad and this gifted midfield performer, who cost big money when signed from Manchester United, has been a further uplift for a side who have an imposing home record. They have scored 11 wins and suffered but two defeats.

Away, while Town have had only two victories, their five draws have produced useful points.

An opening day defeat to Bury and then another at home to Portsmouth in the League Cup had local supporters dubious, but there have been plenty of good results since, Blackburn, Preston and Plymouth have been defeated at the County Ground.

The one away success was at Chesterfield and constantly Swindon have proved themselves one of the most prominent attacking outfits.

Also in their squad are John Mc-Laughlin, such a popular figure here, Terry Hubbard, Joe Butler (ex Newcastle defender) and Frank Burrows, who was snapped up from Scunthorpe.

McLaughlin, in his first full season with the Town, has done well in a midfield role.

BRIEF CLUB HISTORY

Formed in 1881, Swindon's bestever seasons have been in the late 1960's. In 1968–69, when in Division Three, they caused a major surprise by winning the Football League Cup, beating Arsenal at Wembley 3–1—a match well remembered for the brilliant display by Don Rogers, now with Queen's Park Rangers.

That same season they gained promotion to Division Two for the second time (they were runners-up and promoted in 1962–63) and in the 1968–1969 campaign finished 5th in Division Two.

Way back in 1910 and 1912 they had some glory moments too, twice reaching the semi-final of the F.A. Cup.

Coming up to date again, they were the 1970 winners of the Anglo-Italian Inter Clubs competition.

Previous managers have included Fred Ford, Bert Head and Louis Page.

Record gate at the spacious County Ground is 29,106 for a League game against Watford in 1969. In 1970, when they met Leeds United in a Sixth Round F.A. Cup tie, they grossed £10,327 receipts.

THE SQUAD

James Allan (Goalkeeper). Born Inverness. Signed as an apprentice professional from Brora Rangers in October 1970 and signed professional in July 1971. He made his début in the First Team in September 1971.

Joe Butler (Full Back). Born New-castle. Joined Swindon from New-castle United in August 1965, where he graduated to the senior ranks through the club's Junior Team. A tenacious player whose speed and ability amply make up for his lack of inches. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968–69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning team of season 1968–69. Played in League Cup Winners Cup winning team of 1969, and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition winning team season 1969–70.

Frank Burrows (Centre Half). Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the club from Scunthorpe United for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968–69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning team of season 1968–69. Played in League Cup Winners Cup winning team of 1969 and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition winning team season 1969–70.

Ken Stroud (Midfield). Born London. Signed as an apprentice in 1967 and signed professional forms in 1970. This skilful player is rapidly becoming a contender for a regular first team place.

John Trollope (Full Back). Born Wroughton, near Swindon. Joined the club from school and has become its longest-serving professional. signing in August 1960. Since his League début, at the age of 16, he has made over 600 appearances for Swindon.

Terry Hubbard (Inside Forward). Born Newport. Joined club as an apprentice professional. Signed professional 1969. Has now established himself as a regular first team and Welsh Under 23 player.

David Moss (Outside Right). Born Witney. Was spotted playing in junior soccer and signed professional 1969.

Tom Jenkins (Winger). Born London. Signed from Southampton in October 1972 after Swindon had sold Don Rogers to Crystal Palace. Formerly with Orient and Reading he also had a spell with Southern League Margate.

Mick McGovern (Forward). Born Hayes. Signed from Queen's Park Rangers in February 1973 and formerly played in London amateur soccer.

Ron Potter (Left Half). Born Wolverhampton. He started his career with West Bromwich Albion as a centre half, where his opportunities were limited. Transferred to Swindon November 1970.

Ray Clarke (Forward). Born Hackney. Signed from Tottenham Hotspur 24th May, 1973. Ray was a leading goal-scorer in the Spurs Football Combination side.

David Syrett (Forward). Born in Salisbury. Joined the club as an apprentice professional on the 13th July, 1972 and as a professional on the 8th November, 1973. During the past season he became a member of the first team squad and was also a member of the England Youth Team.

Peter Eastoe (Forward). Born in Tamworth, Staffs. Signed from Wolverhampton Wanderers on 13th March, 1974 having joined Wolves as a boy. Played only 19 games last season, during which time he became the club's top goal scorer.

John McLaughlin (Right Back). Born Edmonton, London. A former England Youth International. John joined the club from Colchester on the 3rd December, 1973 and has made the left back position his own.

Wilfred Dixon (Full Back or Midfield). Born London. Signed 20th September, 1973, from Reading.

Jim Barron (Goalkeeper). Born Tantobie Co. Durham. Signed 22nd July, 1974 from Nottingham Forest. Formerly with Wolverhampton, Chelsea and Oxford United.

Hugh Maclean. Born Stornaway. Joined the club on 22nd July, 1974, from West Bromwich Albion.

Trevor Anderson (Forward). Born Belfast. Signed 1st November, 1974, from Manchester United. Is a Northern Ireland International.

Colin Prophett (Right Half). Born Crewe. Signed 30th September, 1974, from Norwich City after a month's trial. Formerly with Sheffield Wednesday.

In Retrospect

Up until this season we had met Swindon on 28 occasions in League matches, initially in 1950–51 and then, apart from two short breaks, up until 1967–68.

This season, at the County Ground, we went down 4-1 so the overall clashes total 29.

At home: played 14, won 8, drawn 4, lost 2; goals for 26, against 13.

Away: played 15, won 2, drawn 4, lost 9; goals for 15, against 36.



NEXT IN TOWN

BURY ON SATURDAY

Of the clubs who came up from Division Four Bury have so far proved the least successful.
