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Chairman's Notes

A memorable week was concluded most unfortunately on Tuesday night at Halifax with another of those away results which we shall be pleased to forget at the end of the season. How many times have we now lamented the dismal away record which has cost Town a positive chance of promotion to Division 2? Certainly more than I, and most other people, would care to recall, but surely the fault is excusable when one considers the remarkable strength of the Mariners' home statistics.

Halifax presented a much less formidable opposition than many of those teams which Town have disposed of at Blundell Park, yet both points again went begging, with the deciding Halifax goal going in frustratingly from the penalty spot. It must be said in partial mitigation of Grimsby's away form that fate, as in this case, has not been a particularly faithful companion on the Team's travels.

Of course, even the matches at Mansfield and Halifax came as something of an anti-climax for many people, amidst the events which surrounded them. A good deal of opinion has been expressed already on what became known in this area as the "Joe Waters Affair." I think little advantage would be gained by anyone from any further comment which I could make. Suffice it to say, however, that the Board responded to one of its basic guidelines — that wherever it is sensibly possible there will be a sincere effort to serve the interests of the people who have faithfully supported Grimsby Town.

Indeed one aspect of the whole business was particularly gratifying; the depth of concern and interest surrounding Joe Water's transfer illustrate clearly that the Football Club still has a substantial reservoir of support, though obviously it would be even more pleasing, and of direct financial benefit to the Club if that support was always readily identifyable with the level of regular support for home games.

In any event, once the dust has settled Joe was a member, and a welcome one too of our staff at Blundell Park. Everyone, I know, will wish him well in his return to the Town colours this afternoon.

Swindon will be seeking to help themselves away from the relegation area of the Third Division in much the same way as we are still trying to open up a more comfortable gap between ourselves and the danger positions. It is these games against apparently struggling sides which Town have often found most difficult to win.

Nevertheless, with a performance approaching either of those in the last two home matches against Peterborough and Hereford we should see the Mariners underline their remarkable consistency in front of their own supporters.


GERRY TAYLOR (Full back). On loan from Wolves, Height 5ft 10inches. Weight 11stone 6lbs.

Bob's main ambitions are to be a regular member of the league side and to play in the First Division.

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
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

ONE WAY TO SOLVE THE CLUB V COUNTRY PROBLEM

At some time or other most of us have wondered if England or any other country might find it easier to succeed in international competition by fielding an outstanding club side instead of trying to strike a blend with players from many teams

While, for obvious reasons, this is something that England may never be able to do, we shall soon be able to see how that theory works out in practice for the final stages of the current European championship and in the coming World Cup qualifying series.

For one of the biggest threats to other top nations now comes from an accomplished club side — Dinamo Kiev, Russia's first-ever winners of a major European trophy when they carried off the Cup-winners' Cup.

It took a 3-0 defeat from the Republic of Ireland to shock the Russians into what might have appeared at the time to be a bold experiment. They decided to stake their international future on a club team that already had the blend, the cohesion and the understanding that they had not managed to achieve with multi-club representative sides. First of all, however, they did something that neither the F.A. nor England manager Don Revie could hope to do, for in a country where there are no transfers as we know them the Russian Federation drafted two outstanding players from Rostov to the Kiev team to bring it to what they regarded as international strength.

And they went into their next three internationals games with an all Kiev team and won them all.

Admittedly, in Russia's last two matches they have introduced two stars from other clubs to stiffen the defence, but this club side of Kiev not only continues to carry the standard for the Soviet Union, but their manager, assistant manager and coach have all been appointed as the men in charge of the national team.

Following the European domination of West Germany's Bayern Munich and the rise and fall of Holland's Ajax, there can be no doubt that Kiev are an outstanding club side. When, in the European Super-Cup play-off, they as Cup winners' Cup holders, were matched with European Cup holders Bayern they won both the nome and

away legs without allowing the Germans to score. And, as quarter-finalists in the current European Cup series and representatives of their country in the Nations Championship they are bidding for a double that would not only be unique if they should achieve it, but also quite astonishing.

Among their other accomplishments Kiev have also produced Europe's Footballer of the Year in the devastating striker, Oleg Blochin.

The enormous advantage of having a club manager, his entire staff and his own players to represent a country is obvious, for Russia don't need the periodical get-together sessions for which Don Revie has had to plead in order to work out tactical moves.

But it only needs a glance at the names of the players in most of our leading club sides to see why England cannot do this, for they include, Scottish, Welsh or Irish stars who are needed by their own countries.

This in its own way, might provide more ammunition for those who argue that we should pool our strength and take on the rest of the world as Great Britain. That, however, is another argument, and the point I am attempting to stress is that, whether we can do it or not, other countries are thinking more and more in terms of staking their international future on the prowess of one or maybe two top-class club sides.

West Germany, who had no fewer than 6 Bayern stars in their World-Cup winning side, have now switched the base for their international build-up to Borussia Moenchen-Gladbach. Holland had 10 men from Ajax or Feyenocrd among the 13 who appeared in the World Cup final. Italy who are England's toughest rivals in the World Cup qualifying series, now regard Juventus as their base and they recently had six men from that club in the international side.

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POLICE PARKING RESTRICTIONS NEAR BLUNDELL PARK

No parking will be allowed in Harrington Street -

- (a) from Manchester Street to the Police Box outside the rear of Blundell Park.
- (b) from the Police Box to Blundell Avenue no parking outside the houses.
- (c) from Blundell Ave. to Park Street single line parking only outside the houses BUT 'no waiting' signs will be placed alongside the wooden boards bordering the railway lines to allow normal traffic flow until one hour before the scheduled kick-off time. From that time a police officer will be in attendance and he will allow single line parking only alongside the boards, placing the 'no waiting' signs on the outside of this line of cars.
 - In addition the Police make the following requests to persons, particularly drivers, attending Blundell Park or passing through the area before or after a match -
- (a) Latecomers should not attempt to park near the ground as it is obvious this area will be filled by early arrivals.
- (b) Before parking your car consider your homeward route. Attempt to park facing the direction you wish to leave and plan your route so as to filter into traffic thereby causing fewer holdups than by attempting to cross streams of traffic.
- (c) Be patient when leaving. The police are just as anxious to get you home quickly as you yourselves are.
- (d) 'No waiting' regulations will be strictly enforced' Emergency services, I.e. fire service, ambulances, etc., must at all times have easy access to the ground and surrounding area and the positioning of the 'no waiting' signs have ensured this is possible.
- (e) drivers are advised to lock their vehicles (doors and windows) and keep valuable items out of sight, i.e. in boot, under seats or covered with a rug, etc.
- (f) The Police finally wish to make it clear that they are interested only in ensuring that all who attend the matches are able to do so with as little inconvenience as possible, with the thought 'HELP US TO HELP YOU'.



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
