ONE OF THE GREAT NIGHTS! City's victory over Third Division leaders Hereford United on Wednesday evening provided not only a marvellous evening for Welsh football but an occasion that will never be forgotten by anyone in the immense Ninian Park crowd.

When manager Jimmy Andrews moved out onto the pitch after the 2-0 victory and applauded, it was his personal gesture to the crowd - "their support was out of this world: they added five yards to every Cardiff player," he commented.

It was the hope of the City directors that 30,000 would be at the game: when the tally soared past -35,000, it underlined the belief and conviction that they had shared when they had taken control: that the club possessed the potential to maintain First Division football.

But, to the players, it meant something else. The early crowds at Ninian Park were around the 6,000 mark: now the figure is more than five times that of last August and September. "We have earned these crowds on merit," insists Jimmy Andrews.

The displays of the side; their climb up the table - this has all been achieved by offering the public outstanding football. It is not just success. It is entertainment. People feel proud to be associated with a club that can play as we play."

Now comes today's game against Swindon. Equally important as the Crystal Palace and Hereford matches - because the reward for victory is just the same: two points. Another victory today will hoist City's tally to 55 points - leaving them to win just two from the final away games against Peterborough and Bury to be certain of promotion back to the Second Division.

WEST HAM'S "ACADEMY" CLICKS FOR CITY

THE NAME OF ALAN SEALEY went round the football world in 1965 as he scored the two winning goals for West Ham in the final of the European Cup Winners' Cup. Shortly after that triumph against Munich 1860 at Wembley came total disaster . . . "I broke my leg playing cricket three days before the start of the following season."

From that moment until a few months ago, the talented Sealey was out of football: then he bumped into Clive Charles in London. "I just happened to mention to him that if Jimmy Andrews wanted any help at Cardiff in scouting or watching other

sides, I'd be delighted. Jimmy was on the phone next day!"

It was the second chapter of the association between Cardiff's manager and the man who, two years after Jimmy left West Ham, followed him into the winger's place in West Ham's first team. "I'd been in the junior sides at Upton Park when Jimmy had been an entertaining player in the first team. I'd always admired his play and picked up a good deal from him."

Says manager Andrews: "One of the vital things I've learnt about being a manager is the necessity to delegate. And the second thing is having the right people to delegate to. Alan was in that category. He had experienced a good education in football — as I had — with West Ham and he would tell me exactly what I wanted

in exactly the right terms."

So the link between the two former West Ham wingers was forged again after 12 years. "I don't think I would work for anyone else," says Alan. "He doesn't want me to say 'yes' because it is the convenient thing to say. He wants me to voice my opinions."

"That's right," confirms Jimmy. "Alan, for instance, was given a particular brief to watch Alan Campbell before we bought him. After four visits, he rang me and said 'this fellow will get you promotion'. That was the kind of definite decision I

wanted. So we went in and signed Alan Campbell from Birmingham.'

The other part of Alan Sealey's work is to act as City 'front runner'. He assesses opponents immediately before they are due to face Cardiff, particularly in the London area. "I'm out at games every night of the week," he says. "It's great to be back in football again and I'm delighted by my association with Jimmy once again and with such an enterprising club."

Wales challenge by Phil

PHIL DWYER is on the verge of winning his first full cap for Wales. He is in the squad named by manager Mike Smith to play in the British Championship — and Smith forecasts that he expects to use almost every selected player in the games coming up shortly.

"It would be a tremendous finale to an exciting season," says 'Joe' as he is known in City's dressing room. "I have enjoyed all my Under 23 games for Wales and all the time I've tried to make the right impression to take me through to my ambition

of a full cap.

"I'm not really bothered whether it is at full back or as a central defender. I'm quite happy to play in either position for Cardiff — as, of course, I would be for Wales."

There are congratulations from manager Jimmy Andrews: "Phil has thoroughly deserved his chance. He is the kind of player essential to every side: as a competitor and a battler, his contribution is every bit as valuable as that of the highly skilled player.

"There are many players who just want to 'play': there are others, like Phil, who want to win. That is the whole point of the game and why Phil will, I'm sure, come

out of any international with credit."



Swindon bid to pull clear of trouble

Grimly, gradually and with great determination, Swindon Town are edging away from the alarming prospect of the Fourth Division. In the nine matches before the Easter programme, Swindon lost only three times — picking up enough points from the remaining six to give themselves real hope of avoiding the drop that has threatened all season.

Two results last week went a long way towards establishing the Wiltshire club's Third Division status: a 3-0 home victory that ended the promotion prospects of Shrewsbury and a 2-0 away success at Colchester which — just as much as City's game against Crystal Palace at the top of the table — was a 'four pointer'.

A few games previously, Swindon had done themselves another great favour by winning on the ground of another threatened club, Halifax Town, also by a two goal margin. Both goals at Halifax and one of those at Colchester were scored by the highly promising former England Youth player Dave Syrett.

His career total was eight goals before the start of this season: now he has more than doubled it with 13 this campaign, most of them coming since Christmas. The fine form of Syrett certainly helped manager Danny Williams to allow Peter Eastoe, 31 goals last season, to move to Queen's Park Rangers just before last month's transfer deadline.

AIZLEWOOD MOVES

In the same deal, former Swindon hero Don Rogers returned to his native Wiltshire — and, one day later, manager Williams signed Newport County's Wales Under 23 centre half Steve Aizlewood.

Swindon's other away victories have come at Rotherham and, highly significantly in view of the current struggle at the bottom of the table, at Sheffield Wednesday — again by a 2-0 margin and again with Syrett finding the net. Draws have come from trips to the grounds of three leading clubs: Walsall, Millwall and Crystal Palace.

None of these facts, however, overshadow the one that is in the forefront of the minds of City's players today: their Boxing Day 0-4 defeat at the County Ground was the heaviest they have encountered thi sseason — and Swindon's most clearcut win.

* STAR VISITOR: DON ROGERS, HOME AGAIN

The talent of Don Rogers became one of the most feared attacking skills in British football in recent years. Many still argue that had Swindon's high-paced, massively-gifted winger been given his chance by England, he would have been a brilliant competitor at international level.

That chance never quite came. Don played three Under 23 internationals, two against Wales and one against Yugoslavia but — probably because he was playing for an 'unfashionable' club outside the First Division — never took that final step into the Full England side.

It seemed that his chance might come at last when, four years after the last of those Under 23 caps, he moved to Crystal Palace in October 1972. Palace paid Swindon Town the biggest fee that they had ever received for a player, £150,000, to at last bring his talent into the full spotlight of the First Division.

At that time, however, Palace were on the start of their slide from the First to the Third Division. It was not the situation that enabled Rogers to strike that flowing, lethal form which had so vitally assisted Swindon's cause, particularly in that memorable 3-1 League Cup Final win over Arsenal at Wembley in 1969 when he scored twice.

He sparkled for a while but later moved to Queen's Park Rangers in an exchange deal which brought Terry Venables, now the Palace coach, and Wales centre half lan Evans across London. Don made just 18 appearances for Rangers and then dropped into the Combination side.

It was only a few weeks ago that Swindon manager Danny Williams, who had done so much for the Wiltshire club and the career of Rogers, re-signed him and brought him back to the County Ground. In his first game, Rogers responded with a typical 'magical' goal to earn a point against Rotherham.

JAMES ALLAN

Position: Goalkeeper

Born Inverness. Signed as an apprentice professional from Brora Rangers in October 1970 and became a full professional in July 1971. Made his debut in the first team in September 1971.

JIM BARRON

Position: Goalkeeper

Born Tantobie, Co. Durham. Signed in July 1974 from Nottingham Forest. Formerly with Wolverhampton, Chelsea and Oxford United. Involved in keen competition with Allan for the regular first team place.

JOE BUTLER

Position: Full back

Born Newcastle. Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the club's junior team. Regular member of promotion winning side of season 1968/69; played in League Cup winning team of 1969, and in the Anglo Itialian Inter club competition winning team of season 1969/70.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN

Position: Full back

Born Edmonton, London. A former England Youth international. Joined the club from Colchester in December 1973, and has made the left back position his own.

JOHN TROLLOPE

Position: Full back

Born Wroughton, near Swindon. Joined the club from school and has become its longest serving professional, signing in August 1960. Since his League debut at the age of 16 he has made over 600 appearances for Swindon.

COLIN PROPHETT

Position: Defender

An experienced, reliable and powerful defender who joined Swindon from Norwich City. Formerly with Sheffield Wednesday, he uses his height effectively to command penalty areas.

STEVE AIZLEWOOD

Position: Centre half

A £15,000 signing from Newport County just before the transfer deadline. This tall and talented Wales Under 23 centre half has settled in impressively for his new club and is already

demonstrating that command which marked him as one of the outstanding young Welsh defenders of recent seasons.

FRANK BURROWS

Position: Central defender

One of Swindon's great servants. Born in Larkhall, Scotland, and came to Swindon after spells with Raith and Scunthorpe. A key player during the successful seasons as a promotion side from the Third Division, League Cup winners and during their Second Division seasons.

GERRY O'BRIEN

Position: Midfield

Signed from Southampton just before the transfer deadline. This Glasgow born player with high creative talent has been purchased by Swindon to provide extra graft and experience in the 'engine room' of the Wiltshire side.

DON ROGERS

Position: Midfield/Winger

One of the most publicised matchwinners of recent years. An attacking player of devastating skill and control. Has recently returned to his local club after spells with Crystal Palace and Queen's Park Rangers and already providing that familiar dazzling form in the battle to keep Swindon in the Third Division.

DAVID MOSS

Position: Inside right

Born Witney. Was spotted playing in local junior school soccer and signed professional in 1969. Developing into a clever attacking player.

TREVOR ANDERSON

Position: Forward


Born Belfast. Signed November 1974 from Manchester United. Had First Division experience at Old Trafford and his clever attacking play has won him a place in Northern Ireland's squad.

DAVID SYRETT

Position: Striker

CRUNCH POINT!

There can be no better way for the last Crunch Point feature in a League programme this season to be highlighted than by a goal from Tony Evans and a goal from Adrian Alston. Both came at critical moments of critical games: both provided two points each from the games against Preston North End and Crystal Palace.

Manager Jimmy Andrews: "Tony's match-winner against Preston was the typical goal of a born goalscorer. It was little more than a half chance; and, maybe, it was not even the best shot of the game. It was essentially quickness — but the kind of goal that Tony is always likely to provide.

"Preston's goalkeeper had pulled out some superb saves, particularly from Tony, in the first half, but we set about the second half in exactly the right way by scoring within a minute of the re-start."

Tony Evans: "The move went all the way from the kick off. I touched the ball to Adrian and he slipped it to Doug Livermore. He, in turn, gave a pass to Alan Campbell who found Phil Dwyer moving up along the wing in an attacking position.

"Phil gave Alan a return pass and he beat a man before playing the ball square to me. I had followed the build up all the way and arrived level with the six yards area. The ball came to my right foot and I had the choice of shooting straight for the near post or at an angle for the far post.

"I went for the latter by hooking at the ball and it caught the top of my boot. The contact was not 100 per cent 'clean' but it found the target well enough with just one bounce."

Jimmy Andrews: "Adrian's winner against Palace was worth four points to us. I must confess that I was delighted to see it go in because we had played all the football, controlled the match but had not been able to force in the goals that we were worth.

"There is always a danger in that situation that opponents can sneak a goal themselves — and if they had our promotion prospects would have been dented. Then, with time running out, there was this quick move on the right and the head of Adrian Alston on the far post."

Adrian Alston: "My most important goal of the season? I'll tell you that when the season is over — but it could be!

"Really it was quite a simple one. Alan Campbell slotted across a free kick, Tony was there as always to flick on and I was placed perfectly on the far post. Certainly the relief when I headed in was tremendous!"

The response to that Adrian Alston goal flashed around the world and set the scene for a marvellous finish to the season. From Woodland Hills, California, City supporter Warren Gilmore fired off the longest range congratulations of the season. His cablegram read:

"Congratulations on your great win over Crystal Palace. All of us in Los Angeles are getting the champagne ready. Keep up the fantastic promotion effort . . . and try to win by two goals instead of one!"
