

NEWS&VIEWS

So to the last game of the season, probably one of the most difficult ever. After just missing promotion by one point, everyone had high hopes of success, and possibly promotion. Sadly it was not to be. Instead our thoughts all year have been - the way to avoid relegation. At the time of compiling this, the last programme. We are not really safe, although in sixth position from the bottom. When you read this, we trust and pray, all will be well. Thus everyone can enjoy a bright open game, without the added tension.

Our visitors today have enjoyed a wonderful season, and all connected with English football were very sorry to see their exit from the European Cup Competition.

Apart from their cup achievements Wrexham, for the greater part of the season, has been in contention for the top three places in the League Table. I'm afraid their hopes of promotion have disappeared, although last Wednesday they won at Shrewsbury (another club which just missed promotion) to bring their total number of points 56 from 44 games.

They will undoubtedly wish to continue in their winning vein, to gain as many points as possible so tonight's game will be keenly contested, one interesting fact emerges from their record. In away games they have won 7, drawn 5, lost 10, Goals For 26, Goals Against 32. Swindon has in away games won 5, drawn 4, Goals for 20, Goals Against 44, yet we have 37 points against Wrexham 50 points. Home matches, don't appear to be such a great advantage as hitherto.

Wrexham record is quite remarkable, as after selling David Smallman to Everton and Joe Jones to Liverpool, they made a most unimpressive start for the first eight games. Since then they almost flew up the League. Whilst the team still has several experienced players, such as Arfo Griffiths and Brian Tinnion, it is mainly composed of young players brought to the club by Manager John Neal. No doubt you remember John as right-back for Swindon, at the time of such players as Walter Bingley, Jack Fountain, Jimmy Gould.

Last Season we defeated Wrexham at home by two goals (Moss, Butler) to one, and in the return game played on the last day of the season we won again by two goals (Eastoe 2) to one. A similar result today, and we here in Swindon will be very happy.

Unfortunately we have to record the death of another of our former players. Older supporters, those of the 1920's will remember that great goalkeeper Fred Hinton, who was transferred to Tottenham Hotspur for what was then a great record for Swindon. Later he played for Bolton, but had to retire from the game, because of a serious injury. He was a near neighbour of another Swindon man Mr. William (Bill) Plyer, brother of ex Director Frank Plyer(unfortunately still in Stratton St. Margaret Hospital) Many will remember Bill as a Football League Referee for several years. It was a pleasure to welcome him at the Annual Football Club Dinner last week. He is extremely fit and well and although 78 years of age is secretary of a local club. He asked after many of his friends connected with the "North Swindon" F.C. the "Corinthians" and Swindon Thistle.

This being the last programme of the current season, may I thank you all who have supported the club, during a most disappointing season. May we next season expect better things. A special thank you to all who have purchased the programmes, and trust you have found some-

Today we meet Wrexham, managed by our former player Johnny Neale, for our last league fixture of the season. We shall know now whether we have to win one point to stay in the third division.

Our match against Walsall was unusual because of the number of penalties, but goals are what the spectator comes to see and I hope that today's match will end on a happy note.

We note that our sports writer is very critical of Danny's job and by the comments in the Football Pink, it seems as if they have all the answers to our problems.

What a pity that people with no experience of football management or of the professional playing side have to be so unhelpful.

The criticism that Danny had only fifteen experienced players, plus his young lads, failed to mention that the Board sanctioned the signing of two experienced first and second division players to help out during the injury periods.

I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the Board, to thank our generous supporters who sponsored our away trips, sponsored players kits, paid for match balls or advertised around the ground and in the programme. This kind of support has enabled us to maintain a standard within the Club which might otherwise have been curtailed. In meeting these friends we feel that we are creating a closer liaison between us all.

Our annual dinner dance held last week at the Blunsdon House Hotel was another occasion when our supporters were able to meet one another in very pleasant surroundings and I am sure that these social events in the Club's diary help to make it a happy Club.

The 'Race Night' held in our new Club premises proved very popular although the attendance was affected by the enforced closure of the premises for a couple of evenings prior to this date but now that the licence of the premises has been resolved we shall be able to plan ahead.

The appointment of Jack Conley to take charge of the new premises has meant a big change for

Jack who has spent most of his life on the playing and administrative side of football. His new job will not mean that we shall lose his experience entirely because he and Danny are very close friends and I am sure that they will be in close contact about the game when necessary.

The question of playing League matches on Sundays has been brought to the fore again at a group meeting of League Clubs, many of whom considered that it should be the Clubs right to be able to play their home fixtures either on Saturday or Sunday. Some Clubs felt that changing from a Saturday would enhance their gate potential. Surely the Football Management Committee must consider these views seriously with so many Clubs failing to attract sufficient crowds to pay their way. I know that there will be much opposition to this idea but a trial period would soon prove whether this idea is viable or otherwise. One of the objections will be that the football pools would be affected and my answer to this is that the pools should re-arrange around football and not vice versa. It took many years for the Football Association to give it s blessing to Sunday games but now that it has local league all over the country function on Sundays and provide much pleasure for thousands of people. Our way of life has changed over the years and I feel that as long as people have a freedom of choice then we can live our lives as we think fit.

Tomorrow evening we are travelling to Trowbridge to play the second leg of the Wiltshire County Shield of which we are the holders. The first leg was played at home on Monday evening but of course I cannot comment on the result of that game as these notes were written before the game was played.

I would like to pay tribute to Pinehurst Youth Centre upon their magnificent performance in winning the County Cup, beating Devizes Town the Western League team in the final.

There are a lot of good players in and around Swindon and we are always prepared to give trial games those promising youngsters who are ambitious to Swindon Town.

John Neal (WREXHAM'S MANAGER)

This has been John Neal's finest season — the former Swindon player led Wrexham through to the quarter-finals of the European Cup-Winners' Cup and kept them in the hunt for promotion. Strange to think that he has twice in the past turned his back on League football.

He started with Hull City just after the war and eventually gained a regular place in 1955/56 at full-back. But, after losing his form, he was placed on the transfer list and went into non-League football with King's Lynn.

"I thought I had finished with first-class foot-ball then," he said. But within a year he got the chance to join us here at the County Ground where he missed only one game in two seasons. Joe Mercer, then Aston Villa's manager, came along with a good offer and he moved on to play in all but one of Villa's matches when they won the Second Division championship in 1959/60.

Mr. Neal then enjoyed three seasons of First Division football before another move took him over to Southend. And it was there that his playing days drew to a close in 1965.

Then he turned his back on football again to take a job in industry. But when Wrexham advertised for a trainer he applied for the post

Later he was appointed manager and five seasons ago, in his first full campaign in charge, he led them to promotion to the Third Division.

Prior to this one, season 1973/74 was his best. Wrexham looked as if they might take the Second Division for the first time in their history ---- though they eventually got pushed into fourth place ---- and they also progressed to the fifth round of the F.A. Cup, a club record.

MICKEY EVANS (Defender) Mickey is a former Welsh under-23 international who began his career with Wolves without being able to get into their first team. Wrexham signed him in 1966 and he has been in their senior squad for most of the time since.

DAVID FOGG (Defender) David has been with Wrexham since signing as an amateur. He made his first appearance in the Football League in 1970/71 and has been a regular for the past four years.

GRAHAM WHITTLE (Midfield) Graham has been coming forward to score some important goals this season and currently has ten to his credit. He started as a Wrexham amateur and graduated to the first-team in 1970/71. His brother Alan is with Crystal Palace.

MEL SUTTON (Midfield) Wrexham paid a club record £15,000 to sign Mel from Cardiff in 1972. He had spent four seasons at Ninian Park after starting his professional days with Aston Villa.

Third Division Scene

Tension right to the end

Though most issues in other divisions sorted themselves out after last Saturday's games, the tension in the Third Division looked likely to continue until the last ball is kicked. Hereford, of course, were already guaranteed promotion though neither Millwall nor Cardiff could breath freely in case ----- just in case ----- Crystal Palace suddenly came good again to win their final two matches.

If Palace manage to do that they will go above Millwall, who have completed their fixtures, on goal-average and the Lions' hopes of promotion will have depended upon Cardiff losing their final game. Cardiff, whose goal-average is also superior to Millwall's, needed the single point to make absolutely certain of returning to the Second Division at the first attempt.

We sincerely hope that our own future in the Third Division may have been guaranteed by Wrexham beating Southend on Tuesday evening. If, however, Southend took both points we shall probably need both points tonight to make absolutely sure of escaping.

In any event, we shall still be very much concerned with the Sheffield Wednesday v Southend game taking place at Hillsborough tonight. A club even more concerned about that one is Aldershot, who completed their fixtures last Saturday. For it could well be that a win for either side could put the Shots down.

No one can say that we haven't experienced a few thrills in these closing days!

Looking back on the season we find that Brighton, who so narrowly missed promotion, ran up the two best victories in Third Division Football by beating both Chester and Colchester 6 - 0. The three best individual match scorers were Dixie McNeil (Hereford), who scored four against Chester, Peter Silvester (Southend), with four against Brighton, and Alan Buckley (Walsall), who netted four times against Rotherham.

Trevor Anderson's remarkable hat-trick of penalties against Walsall on Saturday almost made him the division's top spot kick man. That took his number of conversions to six - - one short of Chesterfield's Malcolm Darling.

Mansfield Town's remarkable escape from what had looked certain relegation gave them the longest unbeaten run of the season in the Third Division. No one beat them in their final run in of 19 matches. Sheffield Wednesday, who suffered one run of 11 games without a win, hold the record at the other end of the scale.

It has been an unhappy return to English football for Alan Ball senior who returned from abroad to take over Halifax Town shortly before this season's transfer deadline. In spite of signing several new players, he could not bolster them sufficiently to escape the clutches of relegation.

There is a chance that the Third Division could include four former League Champion clubs next season. Portsmouth's disastrous season sees them relegated back to the Third Division, while Huddersfield still held a slight hope of creeping into the Fourth Division's last available promotion spot.

If Sheffield Wednesday escape the drop, they will join Preston North End in this section for next term.




