manager. At one time he was almost transferred to a First Division club but preferred to remain a Port Vale (then in Division 2) player. His loyalty has been well rewarded, but richly deserved.

This year 1976 Port Vale celebrate their "Centenary Year', and we wish them every success.

Like most clubs they have had their "ups and downs". Enjoying success, and then failure. They have enjoyed several spells in Division 2, and also in Divisions 3 and 4 but like ourselves, never quite made the First Division. Our gate last Saturday was the Fourth highest in the Competition, and we look forward to increasing numbers of spectators in the ensuing matches with every confidence.

With the start of the football season so early these days, we know that many of our followers are still on holiday, but our crowd of over six thousand last week compared very favourably with other gate returns, and we hope that today we shall have attracted a few thousand more of our supporters.

I would like to appeal to our younger supporters to try and convert the unruly element to support us vocally as much as they can whilst restraining their desires to unsettle everyone around them. When we are asked who causes all the trouble we instinctively look to the opposing supporters, but we also have a selection of over-enthusiastic members.

Many people have asked me why our programme cover is in green and white and the only answer is that we were looking for a fresh design. Very few programme covers are printed in the Club colours, and we thought that a change would be interesting.

While on the subject of programmes I would like to thank Mr. Paul Ploughman for his intensive research into individual performances which will be collated into an interesting centre page each week. Jack Smith has been busy over the last few weeks playing trial games against such teams as Garrards, Highworth Town, Chippenham Town and Cirencester Town (The Herd), and also private trial games. These teams have been selected to enable Jack to see for himself what talent there is in our folds and although we may not be able to make everyone happy, I am sure that Jack will keep in touch with the most promising of these boys who come for a trial game or two.

Jack will always be pleased to give a youngster a chance and now the season has started, he will be able to play newcomers in his Midland Youth squad which play in mid-week games.

Last we were honoured by the selection of both Mark Thompson and Gus Gilligan in the representative team playing on the Wolves Ground against last seasons champions of the Midland Youth League, who were the Wolves Youth squad. The result of the game was a win for the representative side by four goals to two and both our lads were a credit to this side.

Last season we invited sponsors to become what was known as 'Director for the Day' and it proved very popular indeed and this season we are doing likewise. We took part unsuccessfully in a tournament held at Pontings Camp at Brean Sands and the winners of this tournament, the Arsenal, met Leicester the winners of a similar tournament held at Southport.

The proceeds of the Charity Shield Game and for this occasion afterwards, generously supported by Sir. F. Ponting, is devoted to very deserving causes and thousands of pounds are distributed this way every year. John has enjoyed a colourful, and varied career so far. He set out with Manchester United, getting the ocaasional first-team game for the Reds. While at Old Trafford he was loaned out to both Halifax and Torquay before being transferred to Sheffield United for £20,000 in 1973. Vale signed him in 1974. League Record: Man.Un. 3 aps., Halifax (Ioan) 3 aps., Torquay (Ioan) 22 aps., Sheff.Un 12 aps., Port Vale 89 aps.

NEIL GRIFFITHS (Detender)

Port Vale signed Neil from Chester in 1973 and last season he performed with distinction at both right-back and left-back. League Record: Chester 89 (1) aps., 4 gls., Port

Vale 68 aps. 1 gl.

JOHN RIDLEY (Defender)

John graduated through the juniors to take his place in the League team three seasons ago. Last season he maintained an ever-present record for the first-time.

League Record: Port Vale 68 (6) aps. 2 gls.

TERRY LEES (Defender)

Terry spent his early years with neighbours Stoke City, making a number of First Division appearances following his debut in 1970/71. He took the short journey over to Vale Park on the eve of last season. League Record: Stoke 17(7) aps., Crewe (Ioan)

DAVID HARRIS (Defender)

David came through the junior ranks to make his League debut against Rochdale in November 1973. Last season he held a regular place in the centre of the defence.

GARRY DULSON (Defender)

Garry developed with Nottingham Forest without getting into their League team. It wasn't long after his transfer to Port Vale two seasons ago, though, that he took over at left-back. League Record: Nottm. For. nil aps., Port Vale 61(1) aps. 1 gl.

JOHN BRODIE (Defender)

John's first League club was Carlisle, for whom he made his League debut in 1967/68. Bradford P.A. signed him in 1969/70 but they lost their League status at the end of that campaign when John moved on to Port Vale. League Record: Carlisle 8(1) aps., Bradford P.A.

IAN OSBOURNE (Defender)

Ian joined Vale during the summer from Birmingham City where he developed as a junior and made his first League appearance last season. League Record: Birmingham 10 aps., Port Vale nil aps.

COLIN TARTT (Midfield)

Colin rose to first-team status in 1972 and has been holding his place for much of the while since, turning out at right-back and in midfield. League Record: Port Vale 146(4) aps. 4 gls.

TERRY BAILEY (Midfield)

Terry enjoyed a highly successful first season in League soccer when he finished joint top scorer with 14 goals in 1974/75. His output wasn't quite so prolific last season but he still netted nine times.

League Record: Port Vale 86(1) aps., 21 gls.

KEVIN KENNERLEY (Midfield)

Kevin developed in Burnley's nursery and achieved his ambition last season when introduced to their First Division side against Liverpool in December. Port Vale signed him during the close-season.

League Record: Burnley 6 aps. 1 gl., Port Vale nil aps.

KEN BEECH (Midfield)

Ken is one of Vale's younger players who was initially introduced to the side for one game two seasons ago. He got another chance during the closing matches of last season. League Record: Port Vale 8 aps. 1 gl.

MIKE CULLERTON (Striker)

Mike returned to League soccer last season after six seasons in non-League football. He began his League career with Vale in 1965/66, topped their scorers the next season but was freed, after a loan spell with Chester, in 1969. In 1974/75 he was the Northern Premier League's top scorer with 30 goals for Stafford. He scored 21 last season.

League Record: Port Vale 95 (2) aps. 22 gls., Chester (Ioan) 5 (2) aps., Port Vale 41 aps. 17 gls.

RAY WILLIAMS (Striker)

Ray arrived from Stafford Rangers in 1972 for £5,000 and was top scorer in his first season. Two seasons ago he was level top with 14, but last term he notched only 3. League Record: Port Vale 146 (6) aps. 37 gls.

TOM McLAREN (Forward)

Tom is one of Vale's most experienced players, having made his League bow back in 1967/68. A versatile player, Tom has also operated in midfield and for a short while last term he turned out at right-back League Record: Port Vale 266 (32) aps. 28 gls.

KEITH CHADWICK (Forward)

Keith is yet another product of the club's youth scheme. He made his senior bow as substitute against Aldershot in March 1974, winning a regular place the following season, though he was not always in the side last term. League Record: Port Vale 29 (12) aps. 7 gls.

ATTACK IS NOT THE COMPLETE ANSWER

The trend towards attacking football has been heralded as the salvation of the English game. Teams like Manchester United, Derby, Bolton, Hereford, Lincoln and Northampton breezed through the game like a breath of fresh air last season, winning aclaim from a wide audience. Yet, a continuance of this worthy trend this season does not mean that England will win the World Cup in 1978 or that crowds will necessarily come swarming back to the game.

While it is true that the public will initially be attracted by the promise of more goals, in the long term it is only attacking football, allied to success, that will hold them.

In Manchester United's case it was a definite policy decision to play attacking football that made them so popular yet, in the case of the other clubs listed above, it can be argued that they might have drawn similar support playing a defensive game had they still attained the sort of results they did.

It's a sort of chicken and egg situation. And a difficult one for a manager to face. Should he fall overboard to attack and hope results follow? Or should he first see his side into a position of safety and then change his emphasis to attack? His job could depend upon which course of action he opts for.

Without detracting anything from what Tommy Docherty and his magnificent team have achieved over the past couple of years, in a sense he was aided by the state of the English game at the time. It had become drab, lacking in characters and the successful teams were the robot like sides which, in many cases, were boring the fans back to their armchairs.

The English game was crying out for adventure when Docherty took his bold decision. English fans willed United to succeed because they could see in their success a general move back to entertaining football.

Yet if all 92 League Clubs went bezerk this season, opting for new and adventurous 3-3-4 or 2-3-5 combinations, would crowds necessarily arise?

Would Workington's meagre crowd of 1,276 (last season) rise substantially to see them lose 3-4 every week instead of 0-1? Will Manchester 12 United still be packing in 55,000 for every home game should their admirable policy back-fire this season and relegation once again threaten them?

The men in the most difficult position are the managers. Crowds generally are crying out for more excitement. Yet in the end, when the thrills have died down, the fans really only want to see their own side succeed by attacking.

Swindon fans witnessed 63 goals in League games last season, 42 for us and 31 for the other guys. Now, should the goals rate be doubled this season to 110, you wouldn't get too excited if we got 55 and so did the opposition.

In short, fans only want attacking football if it leads to success in the same way that, in the recent past, they were prepared to suffer a certain amount of boredom provided there was a cup or two on the end of it.

For if all 92 clubs opted for attack, ten are still going to be relegated and four will apply for re-election.

That's why football, from the playing and financial sense, can never properly be compared with any other business. You can have 92 tobacconists all making a handsome profit and 92 public houses all bursting at the seams with customers waiting to be served.

In football you may introduce all the gimmickry you can dream up, you can have all 92 clubs scoring huge totals every week - you can even field a few little green men to add colour if you wish - but in the end, only 11 will win Championships or promotion.

The other 81 will be termed failures.

Exactly the same result is obtained if all clubs field 11 defenders.

So, from the spectator's point of view, it is better to attack and fail than to defend and fail.

The point is that fans should not be conned into believing that the new wave of attacking football will solve all the game's ills. What it is doing, however, is to make it far more interesting to watch. And that's a mighty important step in the right direction.
