## Manager's Viewpoint

At this time of the year we are all looking forward to the Season ahead and the press as usual has been filled with predictions from sports writers, players, managers and even supporters on how teams will do in the Season. Last year I joined the list of predictors with a fair amount of success, if I may say so, I tipped Liverpool to win the League and Derby to win the F.A. Cup. As far as this year is concerned it seems unlikely that the top spots will go to teams outside last year's elite. I feel Liverpool are so well equipped with a tremendous depth of talent that they have every possibility of holding on to last year's championship with their rivals coming again from last year's leading bunch i.e. Q.P.R., Manchester United and Derby. If I have to back an outsider to reach the fringe I think Leicester, who play such good football and need only to have a little more consistency in their play to make their presence felt.

As far as the F.A. Cup is concerned I feel that Derby could go one step better this year and get to the Final, but it is always difficult to predict F.A. Cup finalists as so many good teams knock each other out on the way and it is not really a matter of form as a matter of, at times, the luck of the draw. The European competitions should see teams from England reaching the final stages in the European Cup and the E.U.F.A. Cup. I feel that Southampton will find it difficult in their venture into Europe to get the away results needed. European Cup Ties are completely different from domestic matches and experience of this type of football is so vital.

Here's wishing The Saints and all our other Clubs success in the European Ties this year.

Though Don Rogers has netted over 200 League and Cup goals in over 500 appearances and has in his first spell with Swindon helped them to a remarkable Third Division Championship and League Cup Winners' double, his place in the team does not seem assured at the time of writing and so we turn our attention to a young man, who may ultimately help to bring as much glory to Swindon as Don had done.

We refer to DAVE SYRETT, a native of Salisbury who joined Swindon as an apprentice professional in July 1972. During his first full season he made rapid progress and before he was old enough to sign full professional forms he had made his first team debut, going on as substitute for Rod Thomas at Preston in August 1973 and then playing his first full game at Nottingham Forest a month later. By the time he signed full professional forms he had won a regular position in the front line, alternating between a number 8 and a number 10 shirt and soon he was opening his goalscoring account in a 4-2 defeat at Crystal palace.

He played in both games against us that season and though he failed to score in these he had netted five times by the end of the season. These goals were not sufficient, however, to save his side from relegation and so he kicked off 1974/5 in Division Three.

Last season, however, he really 'ARRIVED'! After a quiet start he was loaned to Wolves and after finding the net in a couple of reserve games and creating a fine impression with the fans the latter were clamouring for him to go straight into Wolves' First Division side. Before this could happen, however, he was recalled by DANNY WILLIAMS to the County Ground to help a side that was in serious relegation danger.

Dave now began to find the net regularly and after PETER EASTOE's move to Q.P.R. he took over the number 9 shirt, celebrating almost immediately with two goals in a game for the first time — and at Crystal Palace of all places. He also got two at Halifax and in the last home game against Wrexham and his tally of 14 League goals played a major part in his side's reaching a safe position in the table by the end of the season.

At 5ft. 11in. and nearly 12st. he is the ideal build for a mobile striker and he made a good start to the season with the winning goal in the first leg of the League Cup tie against Northampton. This brought his tally to 24 in 75 League and Cup games though of course he was not playing specifically as a striker in a fair number of these.

# Welcome... Swindon Town

After not meeting them for two seasons we renew our tussles today with Swindon Town, wondering whether the remarkable sequence of results between the clubs will be maintained. For in both 1970/1 and 1971/2 they did the double over us; then in 1972/73 both games were drawn, while in 1973/4 it was our turn to win both games.

Since being relegated in 1974 they have had mixed experience of Third Division football, just missing promotion two seasons ago and then fighting a fierce rearguard action against relegation last season. As late as the end of March they were in bottom position, but then they won three games in a row, drew the next and finally survived with just one point to spare.

O'BRIEN Gerry (midfield): Height 5'6", weight 9st. 9lb, bom – Glasgow. First played for Clydebank, but moved to Southampton in 1970. He made a total of 67 League appearances for the Saints and also played 3 games on loan to Bristol Rovers at the end of the 1973/1974 season. Transferred to Swindon in March 1976, making his debut at Halifax on 13th March, 1976 with 12 appearances to the end of last season.

ANDERSON Trevor (forward): Height 5'9", Weight 10st. 8lb, born-Belfast. Began his career with Portadown, but transferred to Manchester United in October 1972, making 13 League appearances before moving on to Swindon. Following his debut for Swindon against Chesterfield on 5th November 1974, he made 70 League appearances to the end of last season, during which he was an ever present player, and he was voted player of the year. He also has seven international caps for Northern Ireland. A fast and skilful player he was joint leading scorer last season with 15 goals including a hat trick of penalties against Walsall.

**BARRON Jim** (goalkeeper): Height 6'0", Weight 12st. 3lb, Born-Tantobie, Co. Durham. Although making his league debut for Wolves (8 League Games), and moving to Chelsea, he first gained a regular place with Oxford United (152), and later with Nottingham Forest (155). Signed for Swindon in July 1974 making his debut against Bury on 17th August 1974, and has been first choice since making 76 League appearances to the end of last season.

**DIXON Will** (midfield): Height 5'8", weight 10st. 6lb, born – London. Originally with Arsenal he made his League debut with Reading for whom he played 150 League games. Transferred to Swindon in September 1973, playing his first game at Bristol City on 23rd October 1973. He gained a regular place later that season and had made 96 League appearances to the end of last season, mostly at full back. Switched to midfield last season with considerable success.

McLAUGHLIN John (full-back): Height 5'8", weight 10st. 10lb, born – Edmonton. Started his career with Colchester for whom he made 66 League appearances during which time he was capped for England at Youth Level. Joined Swindon on 3rd December 1973, making his debut against Orient on 22nd December, 1973. Originally a full back he moved to midfield for many of the 99 League games played for Swindon to the end of last season, but has since reverted to defence.

**MOSS David** (forward): Height 5'9", weight 11st. 3lb, born – Witney. Signed from his local non-league Club as an apprentice and on full forms in 1969, he made his debut against Watford on 25th April, 1972 and has made 129 League appearances to the end of last season. A true orthodox winger who can play both sides of the park and scores as well as makes goals.

**PROPHETT Colin** (defender): Height 5'11", weight 12st. 2lb, born – Crewe. Played for Crewe Alexandra as an amateur, but his League debut came for Sheffield Wednesday in 1968. After 113 League games for the Owls he moved to Norwich City in 1973, making 34 appearances in the first division before his transfer to Swindon on 30th September 1974. Made 67 League appearances for the Town to the end of last season, including 45 minutes as emergency goalkeeper against Sheffield Wednesday.

**ROGERS Don** (forward): Height 5'10", weight 12st. 10lb, born – Poulton. A former apprentice he made 401 League appearances for the Town and scored twice in the 1969 League Cup final victory over Arsenal at Wembley before transferring to Crystal Palace for £150,000, in November 1972. After 69 League games for Palace he moved to Q.P.R. in October 1974 but made only 13 full appearances prior to his transfer back to Swindon in March 1976. He made a further nine appearances before the season ended mostly in a midfield role, but when played forward showed that the attacking skill remains.

**STROUD Ken** (defender): Height 5'11", weight 12st, born-London. Joined the Club as an apprentice in 1967, signed professional in 1970 and had made 78 League appearances to the end of last season, during which he became established in the first team. A very strong player both in the tackle and on the ball, he prefers a central defensive role, but has played equally often in midfield.

**TROLLOPE John** (full-back): Height 5'10", weight 12st. 3lb, born – Wroughton. The Club's longest serving professional, he served his apprenticeship with the Club and signed professional in August 1960. Has since broken the Club's appearances record making 662 League appearances to the end of last season, and 750 appearances including cup games. A member of the promotion winning side of 1963 and 1969 and the League Cup Winning side in 1969. An ever present at left back for the past two seasons, he is the Club Captain and one of the most loyal and hard working players in the game.
