This afternoon we welcome once again Wrexham to the County Ground. It seems only a few months ago they were here in the last game of the season. Now after only one week we entertain them again, and having already played four matches.

The new season began with few surprise results, and not a great deal of interest, but disappointment (including our own) at the number of spectators present at the games although the total was up naturally the fine spell of weather, and holidays had a bearing on attendances. Another factor is of course the cost, added to other matters of expense.

Some of the leading figures in football, frequently speak of higher admission charges. With the economic outlook of many, and the threat of unemployment, would it be wise to ask for more money at the turnstile! Attendance figures are already very low.

Now comes the cry to industry for Sponsorship. Is that possible?

With many firms striving to keep viable and maintain employment, with Industry seeking more investment for expansion, will it support various sporting organisations, including Football.

There are some people even in football today, who feel it would be better, if it stood on its own. In fact some maintain the game would be better without any outside support - no supporters clubs - no fund raising etc. Clubs would run on the money from the turnstile, and would have to organise their affairs on that basis. Would that work out? I wonder. Clubs are so involved in other sources of revenue now. However, I cannot really see large firms and industry coming forward with money for sponsorship. I do hope clubs will get down to the real object of the exercise - namely playing football, real attractive, skilful football. The kind to bring back the crowds.

Our visitors today, enjoyed what was probably their best season ever last year. They had a magnificent run in the European Cup Competition, and for a long period looked likely candidates for promotion to Division 2.

No doubt the extra games, with the travelling entailed took its toll and Wrexham did not quite make the top three places in the League Table. They were in sixth place with a very fine record.

This season they have begun quite well, and last Saturday defeated Portsmouth 2 - 0. We of course visited that club on Tuesday, but as we do not know the result of that game, at the moment, we are unable to draw any conclusions as to the form.

We are quite sure however that Wrexham will provide stiff opposition, and today's game will be a hard; fought one,

On Saturday last we succeeded in breaking the hoodoo of winning our opening match of the season and we all hope that this is to be a good omen for the season.

Our visit to Portsmouth on Tuesday evening, although disappointing in result, provided an exciting game with our lads pressing for at least the equaliser, but it was not to be.

The injury to Steve Aizlewood in the first half of the game, gave another opportunity for Phil Harris to show his talents and it was to his credit, and to the rest of the team, that we fought back so magnificently in the second half. If the lads maintain this standard away from home during the remainder of the season we shall reap the benefits in away points.

The fact that Phil Harris has shown so much talent when in the first team, must be an encouragement to some of our other young players.

The performance of our young side at Tottenham on Saturday last was an encouraging start for Jack Smith who is producing new faces it seems every week. This is obviously why we spend so much time and money on our Youth programme, but it also means that one cannot expect too much success right from the beginning, because new trialists are bound to take time to fit into the pattern.

Mel Nurse our centre half for many years recommended a young defender to us, he played at Tottenham and Jack Smith was delighted with his performance. If this young lad whose name is Russell Lewis moulds his play as Mel Nurse then he will be a good player indeed.

Jack also introduced a sixteen year old by the name of Banks from the Bristol area and he also looked very promising and when we are comparing the standard of our new players on trial against the standard of such teams as Tottenham then it must be a fair comparison.

Jim Barron was the only senior professional in this game and of course his influence on such a young side is invaluable. Jim has a flair for the coaching side and this of course is such an important part to play in a youngsters progress.

With such a dry season, we have been unable to produce a decent playing surface on our Shrivenham Road Ground. We are unable to get any water for seed on this ground even when times are normal, and now with the water shortage this is of course out of the question especially with our need at the County Ground.

With the start of our Midland Youth League Programme it means either using the County Ground or trying to borrow a pitch for these matches.

The playing surface at Portsmouth was excellent and their groundsman is Duggie Reed, their former playing centre half for many years. What Duggie has done over the years I am sure Maurice will for us in time.

The local newspaper threw up the headline of "Swindon Town Soccer Stars Transfer Shock", which must have sold them a few extra copies, when in fact it is a story of an ambitious desire to play in the first division if at all possible, and while we all sympathise with their feeling, we hope that we can keep them happy with us and perhaps attain that ambition with our Club.

For the information of our supporters who use the seats in the balcony of the North Stand we apologise for the disappearance of those seats at the present moment, but we are going to replace them as soon as possible with some bench type seats. Our maintenance staff are stretched to the limit at this moment of time owing to the damage which is frequently around after match days.

Our supporters were very well behaved on Saturday last against Port Vale and away at Portsmouth, and we hope that they keep this up.

For all our loyal supporters of our competitions we have news that we are changing to a 10p ticket commencing 13th September.

This will naturally increase the value of the weekly prizes and with a variation of the ticket, fresh interests we hope will be aroused.

Doug Buswell informs me that there is a very good response for this new venture. Very few Clubs operate a 5p ticket today and we feel that the time has come for us to change over.

While at Portsmouth this week we found that they were making a draw for a car, we have done this kind of draw in the past and it may be an attraction to try again.

BRIAN LLOYD (Goalkeeper)

Brian took over as Wales' first choice goalkeeper last season when he played against Austria, England and Scotland. Brian, who began with Stockport, ealier won two under-23 caps after transferring to Southend in 1969. Wrexham signed him two years later.

League Record: Stockport 32 aps: Southend 46 aps: Wrexham 219 aps.

MICKY EVANS (Defender)

Micky is another former Welsh under-23 international. He learned his game with Wolves but didn't play in the League until moving to Wrexham in 1966. Now he has played over 300 League games.

League Record: Wolves nil aps: Wrexham 303 (10) aps: 18 gls.

GARETH DAVIS (Defender)

Gareth was capped on four occasions for the Welsh under-23 side. He was discovered by Wrexham and introduced to the League eleven in 1967/68.

League Record: Wrexham 282 (6) aps. 6 gls.

JOHN ROBERTS (Defender)

Wrexham paid a club record £30,000 to Birmingham for John this summer. Capped 22 times by Wales, John kicked off with Swansea, moved to Northampton in 1967 and to Arsenal two years later. Birmingham paid £150,000 for him in 1972.

League Record: Swansea 36 (1) aps, 16gls: Northampton 62 aps, 11 gls: Arsenal 56 (3) aps, 4 gls: Birmingham 61 (5) aps, 1 gl.

ALAN DWYER (Defender)

Alan came through Wrexham's junior sides to make his League debut in 1974/75, winning a regular place last season when he played both in defence and in midfield.

League Record: Wrexham 31 (5) aps. 2 gls.

GRAHAM WHITTLE (Midfield)

Graham initially joined the club as an amateur, forcing his way into the first-team in 1970/71. He scored ten goals last season, including the one which knocked Djurgarden out of the European Cup-Winners' cup.

League Record: Wrexham 172 (9) aps. 37 gls.

MEL SUTTON (Midfield)

When Mel joined Wrexham from Cardiff in 1972 the £15,000 fee involved was a Wrexham club record. Mel began with Aston Villa but transferred to Cardiff in 1968.

League Record: Aston Villa nil aps: Cardiff 135(3) aps, 5 gls: Wrexham 159 (2) aps 15 gls.

MIKE THOMAS (Midfield)

Mike, another Wrexham discovery, was introduced to the Welsh under-23 side last season. After developing in Wrexham's juniors, he made his League debut in 1971/72.

League Record: Wrexham 115 (11) aps. 14 gls.

ARFON GRIFFITHS (Midfield)

Arfon rose to international fame late in his career but he now has 15 Welsh caps. He has also established a new club record for appearances He left Wrexham for Arsenal in 1960 but returned to the Racecourse within a couple of years,

League Record: Wrexham 42 aps, 8 gls: Arsenal 15 aps, 2 gls. Wrexham 485 aps. 112 gls

MICHAEL WILLIAMS (Midfield)

Michael was given a couple of runs in the senior side early last season and was re-introduced for the final game of the season. This season he could be pressing for a regular place.

League Record: Wrexham 3 aps.

JOHN LYONS (Forward)

Another Wrexham find, John was promoted to the first-team two seasons ago and was given further opportunities to develop his play last term.

League Record: Wrexham 19 (5) aps. 6 gls.

STUART LEE (Forward)

Wrexham signed Stuart from Bolton last season and he quickly settled down to his job of scoring goals, finishing last season with nine to his credit. Stuart made his first senior appearances for Bolton in 1971/72

League Record: Bolton 77(8) 20 gls. Wrexham 27 aps, 8 gls.

BILL ASHCROFT (Forward)

Bill was Wrexham's leading scorer with 17 goals, including two which beat Stal Rzeszow to put Wrexham into the quarter-finals of the European Cup-Winners Cup. A Wrexham discovery, Bill was also top scorer in 1972/73.

League Record: Wrexham 153(23) aps 51 gls.

BOBBY SHINTON (Forward)

Wrexham signed Bobby from Cambridge this summer. Walsall first spotted him playing for Lye Town and Bobby earned his goalscoring reputation with Walsall who received £22,000 when he went to Cambridge in 1974.

DID YOU KNOW?

A new season kicks off with high hopes all round. If the encouraging swing back towards attacking football continues, fans will be sent home happy and cheerful again; if we maintain our tremendous club record in Europe we shall see at least one more European trophy brought back to England again this season and, if Don Revie's plans develop soundly we could see the England side well on the way towards a place in the Argentine World Cup finals by the time this new season is out.

Prospects are good, then. Yet there is at least one very grave, niggling doubt still to be resolved before even more stay-at-home fans haul themselves out of their armchairs, and return to the terraces.

It concerns the conduct of players on the field.

The Football League's clamp down and the referees' purge of a couple of years back had its effect; the game has been rid of great deal of pettiness. Crowds are no longer frustrated by players mauling a referee each time a decision goes against them. Most players now accept a referee's faults, and his decisions, without question for they realise there is no point in arguing.

If players would more readily accept the ten yard rule for free kicks a considerable further amount of wasted time would be saved, spectator frustration avoided.

Managers have it in their hands to solve this problem, just as many managers have virtually eliminated the childish infringement of dissent by fining players within the club. These problems were always the preserve of strong team managers and it was regretable that the Football League had to introduce, and referees obliged to enforce, the embarrassing clamp down measures of a couple of seasons back.

One serious problem remains, however - the behaviour of one professional footballer towards another on the field.

In which other walk of life do you find grown and mature? - men taking calculated blows at each other during working hours? Where also do you find colleagues in the same profession spitting at each other - and before huge crowds? Where else do we suffer the embarrassment of watching grown men grapple like children, offering V-signs to the public and generally making themselves look silly?

Is there not a strong case for the PFA to bring its own code of conduct for members?

The majority of footballers take pride in being described as "professional" in their approach to their work. So, to take the matter to its highest ideal, could we not adopt the sort of responsibility among players that medical men display in their chosen professionals?

The greatest ignomy for a doctor is to be found guilty of unprofessional conduct. It leads to his dismissal, at least temporarily, from his profession. It's the gravest crime he can commit.

While not advocating that professional footballers should be "struck off" for several years though, in the case of one calculatingly causing the expiry of a colleague's playing career, such severe action might be felt desirable by some it is time all professionals were imbued with the sort of responsibility doctors display in their day-to-day lives.

Football being a physical game it does, of course, tend to raise temperatures from time to time. A natural, immediate, reaction by any human being - after having been cracked on the cheekbone by a rival elbow - is to rise rapidly in revenge. Yet, a moment's cooling off enables the rational man to appreciate that the collision was most probably an accident. And he will walk away to continue the game.

The case of vicious intent, where two players develop a running argument throughout the game, developing into increasingly violent physical contact, to fisticuffs and hacking, is an entirely different matter.

It is not a matter for Football League legislation to sort out; in the long term it is not even the business of the referee - though firm handling can often cool down explosive situations - or managers.

It is for the players themselves to realise their responsibilities, as professional people constanly in the public eye. Threats of fines and suspensions will never serve any useful purpose unless the intent to rectify an unsavoury situation comes from within the minds of those concerned; in this case, the players.
