So once again we meet those doughty opponents - Crystal Palace, friends and rivals of ours over many years. Results have not been very good for Swindon. Last season Palace won at Swindon by 2 goals (Swindle-hurst 2) to 1 (Moss), but in the return fixture at Selhurst Park played 4th February 1976, we came away with a draw, 3 goals (Stroud 1 Syrett 2) after at one time being arrears 1 - 3. A great fight back.

It was the previous season we suffered a very heavy defeat 2 - 6 away, but in the home game, played almost at the end, we drew 1 - 1.

The Palace enjoy wonderful support; their average attendance last season was 20,123 the highest in the Division. Our average was 7,713 There is no doubt there is great potential with that kind of support, and the 'set-up' at the club is of First Division standard. At the moment they seem to be trying to reduce their bank overdraft, but are still ready and anxious to obtain new players.

This year they are settling down into a strong sound team, and to date have one point less than Swindon, but with one fewer game played. Their goal average is 13 - 10 which gives some indication of the strength and weakness of the team.

Almost everyday we read of certain football clubs in financial difficulties, and there is no doubt that the running of a Professional Football Club, is a complex and most expen-



sive business. The expenses are far greater, than would appear on the surface. For instance, if a game is postponed on the day it is due to be played, the expense incurred is far greater, than if the fixture had been fulfilled.

Then there are a hundred and one small items involved but the biggest expenses are wages and salaries - rent- rates - tax - ground upkeep - repairs - stewards and police.

It seems almost certain that one or more clubs, will be forced to close down, and yet we still hear talk of transfers amounting to £200,000 or even more. Wherever can clubs get that sum of money especially when many have to save every £ possible and what's more to the point, is any player worth that fantastic figure? More important still, will he bring success or even add to the attendance numbers?

There is not the interest in football that there was in the fifties and sixties. Maybe the standard has deteriorated, but people have many more interests and activities, and we shall never again see the large gates, except for a very few clubs.

Whatever happens here in Swindon, I don't think we shall see the return of the 20,000 etc we experienced in the early sixties, when almost every home game produced over 20,000, and they even cheered when we won the toss.

Talk of the Town

By the Chairman

After our very pleasant trip to Bury on Tuesday last we find curselves with two home games, but having to write these notes before our home fixture with Tranmere, I can only hope that we have earned another two points.

Tonights game with our friends from the "Palace" will revive memories of the many hard tussles that we have had in the past. The following of Crystal Palace is fantastic as support goes today and I know that if we were as fortunate in this way, we would expect to go places as they surely do.

Many Football Clubs playing in the football league live on a shoestring, because of the small support that they receive and subsequently they never get the opportunity to improve their facilities let alone their playing staff. The result of this generally speaking is a small income, a small outlay and a comparatively small overdraft. The more successful clubs have high overheads with good facilities, larger playing staffs with higher wage bills and of course the inevitable higher overdraft.

We have the right facilities, a good staff of players, but unfortunately a dearth of support at the present time. The potential is here for larger numbers and I know that if we can produce results, the support will increase. On Saturday we travel to Brighton, and this is another club that enjoys prolific support.

The average home gate up to last week for Crystal Palace was just over 14,000 while Brighton average was nearly 17,500. Those gates are what we were enjoying a few years ago.

I know that if we could see the crowds again, it would give us the opportunity to expand where now we have to be cautious. One of the departments which could benefit from increased revenue is our youth policy. As you know we

nave engaged Jack Smith to look after this side of the club for us and Jack is doing a great job in not only coaching the youngsters, but also organising trial games home and away and scouting himself whenever the opportunity arises. The scope of his work is unlimited, but there is a limit which the club can afford. For instance we have connections as far away as Scotland and sometimes the recommendations are so good, that we feel that we must bring the lads to Swindon for a trial and this means staying for a week, to give us the chance to compare the standards with our own youths and also to give the boy a chance to settle into his own natural game.

The wealthy clubs can afford to spend unlimited cash on this kind of exercise, which is so important for the future of any club. While we are prepared to do this, it has to be limited and we have to economise on such things as travel etc. Our youngsters travel to away games usually in a mini-bus, with Jack Smith as the driver except of course to the longer journeys like Plymouth. Our youth side beat Birmingham City 1 - 0 last week in the Midland Youth League and this followed up our victory over the Wolves the week before. Because of the small size of the Midland Youth League this year with only nine clubs competing a cup competition is being run on the basis of three sections A, B and C being Birmingham Cityand Leicester in Division A, West Bromwich, Northampton and Bristol City in Division B and Coventry, Wolves and ourselves in Division C. The winners of each division play for position 1, 2 and 3 while the three clubs second and third in their sections play off for final places. We are top of our section at this time of writing and hope to be in the play-off of the top positions.

Here's hoping that tonight's game is enjoyable and that we shall still keep your support.

CRYSTAL PALACE

PAUL HAMMOND (Goalkeeper)

Paul firmly re-established himself in the Palace side following his recall in September last season. He has been a Palace professional since September 1971 and made his League debut at Wolverhampton in October 1972.

League record: C. Palace 102 aps.

PETER WALL (Defender)

Peter enjoyed his most successful season last term, particularly shining during Palace's F.A. Cup run. Since going to Selhurst Park in 1970 he left for one loan spell at Orient. His previous clubs were Shrewsbury, Wrexham and Liverpool.

League record: Shrewsbury 18 aps.; Wrexham 15(7) aps.; Liverpool 31 aps.; C.Palace 155(7) aps., 3 gls.; Orient (loan) 10 aps.

IAN EVANS (Defender)

lan's towering performances at the heart of the Palace defence last season earned him a regular place in the successful Wales' team and he now has seven caps. Expert in moving up for deadball situations, Ian scored eight goals last season, including a fentastic match-winning hat-trick against Colchester. Ian joined Palace from Q.P.R. in 1974.

League record: Q.P.R. 39 aps., 2 gls.; C. Palace 94 aps., 12 gls.

STEWART JUMP (Defender)

Versatile Stewart played in both full-back positions, and in the centre of the defence, last season. Stewart is now into his fourth campaign at Crystal Palace after joining them from Stoke for a £70,000 fee.

League record: Stoke 36(8) aps., 1 gl.; C. Palace 74(1) aps., 2 gls.

KEN SANSOM (Defender)

Ken was an apprentice when he made his League bow for Palace on the final day of 1974/75. He turned professional last December and was brought back into the side for the closing matches last term. Now he is the regular left-back.

League record: C. Palace 18 aps.

NICKY CHATTERTON (Midfield)

Nicky developed the knack of hitting some vital goals last season, six of his nine being either winning goals or earning a draw. A regular in midfield for the past two seasons, Nicky is the son of Palace groundsman Len Chatterton.

League record: C. Palace 74(5) aps., 14 gls.

PHIL HOLDER (Midfield)

Phil earned himself a regular place in League soccer last season when he played 31 times for Palace. At Spurs he was generally a reserve player, though he did play a few First Division games for them.

League record: Tottenham 9(4) aps., 1 gl.; C. Palace 47(2) aps., 1 gl.

PAUL HINSHELWOOD (Midfield)

Martin has won himself a regular first-team place this season, and has been holding his place since September. He got his first change in 1973/74. His brother Martin was also a first-teamer until he was injured this season.

League record: C. Palace 23(4) aps., 5 gls.

JIMMY CANNON (Defender/Midfield)

A young Scot who has made enormous strides over the past two seasons, Jimmy initially came into the side for a few games in 1972/73. For the past two seasons he had been holding the left-back position but recently he has been playing in midfield.

League record: C. Palace 101 (3) aps., 8 gls.

RICKY HEPPOLETTE (Midfield)

Palace recently signed Ricky from Orient for £15,000. An Anglo-Indian, Ricky began his career at Preston, making his League debut in 1962/63. He won a Third Division Championship Medal in 1971 and the following year moved on to Orient in a £40,000 deal.

League record: Preston 149(5) aps., 13 gls.; Orient 111 aps., 10 gls.; C. Palace 2 aps.

DAVID SWINDLEHURST (Forward)

David was Palace's leading scorer with 19 in League and Cup last season, including the one which sensationally knocked Leeds out of the F.A. Cup on their own ground. With 14 goals in 1974/75 David has now established himself as one of the game's leading strikers.

League record: C. Palace 92(8) aps., 34 gls.

BARRY SILKMAN (Midfield/Forward)

Barry, disappointed when getting a free transfer from Hereford at the end of last season, has made a tremendous impact at Selhurst Park with his hard running and shooting. He scored a spectacular goal with a long, curving shot against Bury recently.

League record: Hereford 18(19) aps., 2 gls.; C. Palace 4 aps., 1 gl.

STEVE PERRIN (Forward)

Steve recently scored on his League debut against Mansfield when he came in for the injured Silkman. Palace signed him from Wycombe Wanderers.

League record: C. Palace 5 aps., 1 gl.



FROM OUR TAME STATI



Those who have read some of my articles in previous seasons will know that I am the statistician guy who makes forecasts from time to time of the number of points the team can expect to have at the end of the season if they maintain their existing form. The method takes into account the performance of all teams that the town have still to play and the forecast is shown as a diagram which fans may like to keep up to date as the season continues. Well to cut a long story short I've been at it again. If the form shown so far this season is maintained for the rest of the season we can expect to collect 53 to 54 points at the end of the season. The diagram shows the team's performance so far (up to last Tuesday's match) and a dotted line wandering off into the future ending in the region of 7 to 8 points above one per match or in other words 53 to 54 points at the end of the season.

I have just re-read some of my articles for previous seasons and I notice something extraordinary. Whenever I make a prediction the team does just a little better than I predict. Two seasons ago my predictions varied from 50 to 52 points and the team collected 53 points. Last season my highest prediction was 39 points and they collected 40 points. I feel tempted to predict 60 points and sit back and watch them collect 61 points. However the mathematics of my forecast predict 53 to 54 points at the end of the season. This is made up of 37 points from home matches and 16 to 17 points from away matches. Fans are invited to draw on the diagram what the team actually achieves. Let us hope that as in previous seasons the actual performance is above that forecast. Danny usually reckons that something like 56 points normally sees a team into Division 2. The Forecast is not that far from 56. The extra 2 or 3 ponts required spread over the remainder of the season require but a small extra effort. The excellent home record has little room for improvement so inevitably that extra must come from the remaining away matches. The Bury result was just right.



The Trials And Tribulations Of Don Revie

Don Revie really is on to a hiding to nothing Criticised for being "too defensive", "unimaginative" and "lacking in courage" after England had struggled to draw 1-1 with the Republic of Ireland at Wembley, the England manager went over-board to attack against Finland. He picked four forwards for the first time and instructed all outfield players to attack when given the opportunity. Yet, at the end of a disappointing game, the same critics slated England for being weak in midfield and poor in defence!

Everyone agreed before the important World Cup tie with Finland that Revie had picked the right sort of team. There was talk of England scoring six, seven or eight goals to boost up our goal difference.

Alas, it is an accepted fact of football life that, however many people might have selected a similar team, only the manager has to answer for its shortcomings afterwards. And Revie, as always, was honest enough to accept that his team had had a real off-day and apologised to the crowd for their performance.

While everyone at Wembley had to agree that England were poor, few stopped to think that Finland were in some way responsible!

The Finns had put in a lot of practice following England's 4-1 victory in Helsinki in the first game. They learned to cope with England's long crosses to the far post, they marked up tightly in the penalty box and didn't commit themselves to the tackle in midfield. And, when England did get in some telling shots and headers, goalkeeper Enckelman's safe hands seemed to be everywhere they were needed.

Finland were no mugs, bearing out Don Revie's earlier contention that "there is no longer any such thing as an easy game in the World Cup".

While he was preparing for the World Cup, Don Revie told me: "Everyone keeps telling me that Italy will be our most difficult opponent and, of course, they will be a very difficult side to beat - but I'm taking Finland very seriously indeed. You have to. Though their players are amateurs, they have been expertly coached and are well organised. Their aim will obviously be to spring a surprise on England".

After the Finland game he added: "What the average fan doesn't always appreciate is that a World Cup tie is very different to a friendly international. If you place too much emphasis on attack you must leave gaps behind and even Finland showed that they were very good indeed at exploiting them".

"After we had failed to add to our early goal, the Finns grew in confidence. They began to realise that they had some sort of chance and they went out to try and score goals. When they equalised it caused concern to our players and transferred the pressure to us."

"In the long run I think the crowd would prefer us to play defensively in the World Cup - so long as we qualify for the finals - rather than see us go out into attack but make mistakes in defence which might ruin our chances".

Upon the question of playing England's matches on one of the major club grounds, Revie is equally as adamant.

"The Wembley crowd is the best in the world for England", he maintained. "We have wonderful supporters. The 92,000 who turned up for the Finland game was way beyond my expectations."


"While it is true that England have suffered some set-backs at Wembley in recent years, I don't think it would help to play anywhere else. Much as I admire the tremendous supporters at places like Liverpool and Manchester United, I think the Wembley crowd is the best of all for England".

After all that has already happened in this World Cup competition, England's task is now clear. Three points from Italy - provided we get the expected four points from Luxembourg - will guarantee our passage to Argentina for the 1978 finals.

The next game is against Italy in Rome on November 17th where the aim must be at all costs to avoid defeat. Revie MUST play a defensive formation for this game for, if England lose, it would mean we would have to beat Italy in the return and score sufficient goals against Luxembourg to improve upon Italy's goal difference.

Italy's failure to beat Luxembourg by more than 4-1 gave Revie heart for it left England with the best goals difference in the qualifying group:

DANNY'S DESK

It is a pleasure to welcome the players, officials and suporters of Crystal Palace this evening and of course, their Manager Terry Venables who took over the vacant chair of Malcolm Allison. Last season Palace looked as though they were going to Wembley and win promotion as we did in 1969 but Lady Luck passed them by. Now Terry has to try to do the same again this year, but in this Division attaining ones target is very difficult. I consider the Third Division to be the hardest of the League so if we and Palace go up Terry and I will be very happy men indeed. Frank Burrows and Terry Venables were at Lilleshall together during the summer and Frank has a message for him "Terry, you are a rotten five-a-side player". I hope that they both did not absorb all the same teachings on the course or today's match will be a bit of a stalemate. Seriously though, Terry Venables is a very hard worker for this game of football and as a P.F.A. official, has worked very hard for the betterment of the conditions of his fellow players.
