# THE STADIUM WELCOMES

### SWINDON Town

Formed in 1881 Swindon turned professional in 1894 and until 1896 used a ground called The Croft from where they moved to their present ground. In 1910 while still a non-League side they reached the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup losing to Newcastle, and again in 1912 when they lost to Barnsley at the same stage. Around this time Harold Fleming played 11 times for England, while Swindon were still a non-League side. In 1925 the Robins defeated Farnham United Breweries 10-1 in the F.A. Cup, their record score to date. In 1926-27 Harry Morris scored 47 goals in the Third Division (S) and between 1926-33 he notched a total of 216, a club record. After drawing at home in the F.A. Cup to Manchester City, they were beaten 10-1 in the replay on January 25th, 1930. After the War the Robins remained in the Third (S) where they twice finished fourth in 1947 and 1949. 1954 saw Swindon finish 5th from bottom, the season after fourth from bottom, and in 1956 bottom. The next season they finished next to bottom. A revival in 1958 saw them finish fourth from top and ensured that they stayed in the newly formed National Third. 1962-63 saw them finish second behind Northampton. In their first season in Division Two the Robins obtained a mid table position. But the following season they finished next to bottom and were relegated. 1968-69 saw Swindon shake the football world when they beat Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley to take the League Cup to Wiltshire. On the way they beat Burnley in the semi-final and Derby County in the fifth round who then went on to become Division Two champions that season. The teams in the final were - Swindon: Downsborough; Thomas, Trollope; Butler, Burrows, Harland; Heath, Smart, Smith, Noble, Rogers (sub. Penman). Arsenal: Wilson, Storey, McNab; McLintock, Ure Simpson; Radford, Sammels, Court, Gould, Armstrong (Sub. Graham). Smart and Rogers (2) scoring for Swindon and Gould for Arsenal. That season they also finished second in the Third to Watford. The playing records of both were identical: Won 27, Lost 9, Drawn 10, goal average giving Watford the championship. As League Cup winners they played Roma in the Anglo-Italian League Cup Winners Cup and triumphed 5-2 on aggregate. In

the next season in Division Two they finished fifth only three points behind second placed Blackpool. They also won the Anglo-Italian Tournament when after leading 3-0 against Napoli the game was abandoned after 79 minutes. The next three seasons saw the Robins finishing in mid table, but in 1974 they finished bottom and were relegated. They only just missed an immediate return when they finished fourth just two points behind Charlton in third place. But last season saw the Robins always in the danger area but missed relegation by one point and they were put out of the F.A. Cup by Tooting and Mitchum.

Due to the consistency of JIM BARRON last season, Inverness-born JIMMY ALLAN played only ten times last season, but has established himself this season in the number one shirt. Veteran Barron has made nearly 400 appearances since beginning his career with Wolves, he has since been at Chelsea, Oxford and Nottingham Forest. Ever present at leftback last season was JOHN TROLLOPE, a member of the League Cup winning side of 1969, he has made over 650 appearances, a club record. A regular in the centre of the defence is COLIN PROPHETT, born at Crewe he was signed from Norwich, whom he joined from Sheffield Wednesday. Alongside him this season has been former Welsh Under-23 international STEVE AIZLE-WOOD, who joined the Robins from Newport late last season. Utility man JOHN McLAUGHLIN made 44 appearances last season, in eight different positions. Signed from Colchester he has made over 100 appearances for the Town. London-born WILL DIXON, his first club was Arsenal, but after failing to get into the first team he joined Reading where he played over 150 games, he can play in defence or midfield. GORDON TAYLOR broke into the team in the middle of last season and made 19 consecutive appearances, mainly at right back, and will be out to obtain a regular position this One-club man KEN STROUD played 39 games last season and scored five times from midfield. Scots-born FRANK BURROWS started his career with Raith Rovers, came south and joined Scunthorpe, he has completed over 300 games for the Robins and has also been on loan to Mansfield. Early season signing was former Halifax Town captain RAY McHALE, where he was top scorer last season. Sheffield-born, his first club was Chesterfield where he scored 27 goals, one of his partners up front this season will Irish international be TREVOR ANDERSON, who joined the Robins from Manchester United, an ever present, he was also top scorer with 15 goals. Glasgow-born GERRY O'BRIEN joined Southampton from Clydebank, and after being on loan to Bristol Rovers, joined Swindon last season and played

in the last 12 games. DAVE MOSS scored one of the goals in the 2-1 victory over Chester, at the County ground, played over 100 games for Swindon, his only club. Hero of the 1969 League Cup winning side DON ROGERS returned to Swindon, after leaving the Robins to join Crystal Palace, he went on to Q.P.R. before returning to his first club. He has gained two England Under-23 Caps. Fourteen goals from 28 games made Salisbury-born DAVE SYRETT a firm favourite with the fans, and he looks a good prospect. A free transfer from Bournemouth took HOWARD GODDARD to Swindon in the close season, he scored 18 goals in 64 appearances for Bournemouth, his only other club.



### F.A. CUP Shocks Shocks !

Last week saw the dreams of most of the non-League sides vanish until next year, with Nuneaton being soundly beaten 6-0 at Lincoln, Enfield losing 4-0 to Crystal Palace, and although leading 1-0 at half time, Hillingdon going down 2-3 at home to Watford. Pride of place to the surviving non-League sides must go to Premier League side Goole who earned a replay with Wrexham after drawing 1-1 at the Racecourse with a last minute goal from 38-year-old substitute Kelly. Isthmian Leaguers Hitchin earned another chance by drawing 1-1 at home to Swindon. Although these notes are written prior to the draw for the Third Round it is certain that the two non-League sides will pull out all the stops to obtain the chance of a plum draw in the Third Round. With the news that Debenhams, the Super Store Chain, have put proposals forward of a trophy plus a large amount of cash to the two teams from the Third or Fourth Division who go furthest in the Cup, there is more than glory at stake in a Cup run this season. The two sides will meet to decide

who wins the Cup and the biggest share of the cash. Last season Crystal Palace from the Third, reached the semi-finals, so who knows, who will be the giant killers this season? The weather badly affected last week's Cup ties, with five games called off and two abandoned. Of the games played, York gained a creditable 0-0 draw at high-flying Rotherham, two other Third Division sides clashed. Chesterfield and Walsall drawing 1-1. Of the non-League sides left in the Cup, one of the teams most sides would like to avoid are Derek Dougan's Kettering who beat Tooting and Mitcham 1-0, and are currently in the middle of a long unbeaten run. One of the saddest results of the round must be the 3-0 defeat of Newport at Southend. Newport badly needed a good Cup run to help stave off their cash crisis. The highest attendance of the round was at Portsmouth where 14,089 saw Pompey beat Minehead The Enfield/Crystal Palace tie, which was switched to Selhurst Park, attracted 13.670, the second highest crowd of the round.



### Cabaret Nite a great success

The Cabaret Nite held at The Celebrity Club on Monday, 29th November proved a real winner. Over 350 supporters and agents were treated to a great evenings entertainment. Chester F.C. Manager Alan Oakes along with Coventry City director and former England and Manchester City manager Joe Mercer were interviewed and questioned by members of the local Press. Questions were varied and interesting and both Alan and Joe were ready for anything that was asked. Alan was asked if problems had arisen during his first three months, he said

everything was starting to tick and all concerned at The Stadium were 'pulling their weight' and targets for the future looked very rosy, the only thing giving problems to Alan was his golf—this has had to take a back-seat since his new position at Chester.

Joe Mercer could have talked all night and proved a really interesting character. He was asked if Alan gave him any problems as a player at Manchester City -Joe's answer was that he was the perfect professional and that he was like Joe Shaw the former Sheffield United player, extremely unlucky not to be capped for England. Questions concerning Joe Mercer's period as care-taker manager of the England team, commercialism in the modern-day game, the amount of games top players were expected to be involved with in today's era, the true value of top-class commercial and public relations men took up the major part of the talk-in, every minute was enjoyable.

After 40 minutes the 'chat-show' was drawn to a close when Joe was asked if he could give Alan any tips which may prove valuable in future years. answer . . . always remember that your team is only as good as it's worst player, and most important be natural, but most of all be Alan Oakes. Very influential words from a very influential man.

The musical entertainment was provided by 'The Merseybeats' who were on stage approaching an hour—playing old Liverpool favourites from the early and middle sixties and general reliving

the 'Cavern Sound'.
