Southern Junior Floodlight Cup


It has been arranged to play Crystal Pal-

Within minutes of their 3-1 home defeat against Bury the Reading board of Directors sacked manager Charlie Hurley—the man who had steered the Elm Park club to promotion from the Fourth Division only last season. Club chairman Frank Waller made a statement to the effect that it had been mutually agreed that Hurley would leave at once and, until a new manager is appointed, that coach Maurice Evans would be in charge.

Last October, Reading met Swindon at Elm Park and beat them 4-1 with two goals from Murray and a goal apiece from Cumming and Carnaby. This win took Reading into the top three in the division and their record then read: P 9 W 5 D 2 L 2 F 16 A 10 Pts 12. In the 22 games since then Reading have managed just two wins! Their record during this time is worse than any other club in the Football League:

P 22 W 2 D 4 L 16 F 17 A 46 Pts 8.

Chesterfield ended their run of 11 games without a win last week when they entertained Sheffield Wednesday in a local derby. But, in many ways it could be said that they paid for it. £51,000 to be precise. In the past eight days Chesterfield made three new signings. First they signed striker Stuart Parker from Southend United for £15,000 and immediately followed that by signing another striker, Ricky Green, from Scunthorpe United for £20,000. Finally they captured the signature of Ricky Heppolette for a modest £16,000 from Crystal Palace! Young Ricky Green immediately made his presence felt by banging home both the goals—one in each half.

Today's opponents Swindon Town have enjoyed a money-spinning run in this year's F.A. Cup and were unlucky to be finally hustled out of the competition in a replay at Goodison Park against the might of Everton. Trevor Anderson's goal not being enough to stop Everton going through by a scoreline that read 2-1. The Robins' best results this season have all been at home. A crushing 7-0 victory over non-leaguers Bromley taking pride of place.






