Our recent displays have enabled us to claw ourselves back into contention for promotion and with the 3rd Division leaders showing signs of inconsistency it is now up to us to do our utmost to string together a good run of results.

At Rotherham we well deserved our point but here again it was a match which we could easily have won. I was very pleased with our display against Gillingham and delighted at the form Jeff Bourne is showing. He has added a lot of life and opportunism to our attack.

Last Wednesday week there were some good results at international level. England's 5-0 victory over Luxembourg was a good result: but the outstanding result had to be the 3-0 victory which Wales achieved against the reigning European Champions Czechoslovakia by a 3-0 margin — a success in which our own lan Evans played an integral part.

While one cannot argue that a 5-0 win such as England's was a success I think that most of us who saw it would say that we were looking for more from the England side. We persisted in playing 100 miles per hour football and I don't think that is going to get us very far against Italy.

Against the Luxembourg players we were lacking in control in the last third of the game and the goals we got, I thought, we scraped in rather than created. We weren't able to create where it matters and while the goals, when they came, were well taken, there weren't too many sparks flying round the area.

Personally, I don't think we are any further forward as an international side. I appreciate the problems Don Revie has had but after two years in the saddle he should by now have formulated something like an established squad. Which is something he hasn't got.


If you look at most of the teams which have won the honours over the last decade you will see that they have all had settled squads and that a pattern of play has been formulised — and then continued and improved upon. The basics have stayed the same.

A settled squad creates its own spirit, togetherness and understanding. Perhaps Don has made too many changes and tried too often to pick the side for the game. As he said on T.V. afterwards he could have picked a very good side from the injured players he had named.

All the same there was a lack of subtlety about our play on the edge of their box. I sympathise with the players about this because I know how bloody hard it can be to go out there and take on underdogs who are prepared to defend until they drop and who consider a 3-0 defeat something of a triumph (which their captain admitted).

But it does seem strange to me that while England laboured before ramming home their superiority, Wales were doing a very workmanlike job of demolishing the Czechs. I'm told that Leighton James and Brian Flynn were magic in this match in their ability to create something out of nothing.

Perhaps Mike Smith, the Welsh team manager, has an ace in the hole in that he doesn't have so many players from which to select a side. I would say, however, that Don Revie must make his mind up before next Autumn's matches if we are to dust off our passports and travel to Argentina.

As well as being Commercial Manager of our Club, Tony Shaw is also very much involved with football away from Selhurst Park. He has recently been appointed Chairman of the Football League Commercial Manager's Association after holding office as Vice Chairman for the past

three years.

In this capacity he led the recent campaign for Lotteries and together with many others activated the House of Commons, the Minister for Sport and the Home Office into alerting the Government and Gaming Board of the wishes of the majority of the public. Along these lines, he also joined a specially formed Sports Action Group as the representative for Football Commercial Managers.

Through his position within the Association he has motivated the London Area Commercial Managers to become the best supported group in the country, no mean feat when one considers the large number of clubs

throughout England and Wales.

Significantly, when the British Programme Club decided to enlist outside help in organising the 'Programme of the Year Awards' it was Tony whom they contacted and he has now organised a committee which in conjunction with the British Programme Club and Commercial Manager's Association, will shortly announce the awards.

Obviously, Tony's first duty is to Crystal Palace and in this object he certainly spends considerable time at Selhurst Park. His duties cover a wide range of fund raising and facilities including the Social & Glaziers Clubs, the Ground Catering, Souvenirs, Programmes, P.A. System, Ground

Advertising, Bingo and Golden Goal Sales.

Apart from this he initiated and controls the ever increasing Palace Guard Club which now has over 700 members, and Tony certainly keeps the members in touch through the General's page in the programme. (It is interesting to note that we are the only Club to devote a full page in the programme to our junior supporters and to have five junior supporters

football teams in a Sunday League).

Tony says "when I agreed to come to Palace it was during the First Division days. However, before I had time to hang up my coat I found we were in the Second Division and now, of course, it's the Third! Obviously, in view of this, the grand ideas which I held when signing my contract had to be shelved for the time being. I and the rest of my staff had to turn to the hard slog of 6 days a week, 50 weeks of the year in order to help keep Palace afloat. In fact, a heartening result was shown in our last Annual Report when the Chairman made special mention to the Commercial Department and the tremendous work which we had achieved during the previous 12 months.

"Fortunately, by nature I am a person who likes a challenge, although I must admit that in a better financial climate I would love to see the monies raised on the commercial side, which is considerable, being used for improving our facilities, rather than just maintaining them as at

present.
"High on my original list of ideas was improving the Holmesdale Road end, a separate bar in the Social Club for use by the returning away supporters, the renovation of the Glaziers Club and a special enclosure for Pools Agents. A Commercial Manager in the lucky position of being

able to fulfil these ideas would be a very popular man indeed.

"However, it must be said that Palace already have a ground far superior in facilities to the majority of Clubs. Our ground-bars, Glaziers, Social & Vice Presidents Clubs are the envy of other clubs, especially those in the Third Division. Consequently our fans are already more involved than at most clubs and in this respect I must pay tribute to all my full time staff, in particular the key posts of Assistant Commercial Manager, Social Club Manager and Ground Bar Manageress, together with the Voluntary Stewards of the Glaziers Club, matchday assistance from the Social Club Committee and John McNichol's Bingo Agents.

"You can take it from me we are all pulling as hard as we can in the

right direction.



The "Millionaire Men" from Everton and George Best & Co. from Fulham are among the big names who have had cause to respect Swindon Town's crusade for attacking football this season.

The Wiltshire side held Fulham to a 3-3 draw at Craven Cottage in the third round of the FA Cup and then "blitzed" the opposition by 5-0 in the replay. Bigspending Everton also had to go through a two-match ordeal before coming from behind at Goodison Park to save their First Division pride with two goals in the last ten minutes.

Swindon's high-scoring Cup exploits produced 22 goals from seven games and earned the Club a very useful profit from a total attendance of 120,000. The only puzzle is why a team of such obvious potential failed to launch a promotion challenge.

Manager Danny Williams has developed one of the best attacking formations in the division, only for the adventurous policy to rebound with the number of goals conceded. On the credit side, they have turned in five-goal home performances against Sheffield Wednesday, Northampton Town and York City, but, on the other hand, they were walloped for four goals apiece by Reading, Rotherham United and Brighton.

At the start of the season, Swindon were optimistic after taking ten points from seven games and they were equally productive in an unbeaten spell of eight matches by the end of March. In between, however, all hopes of promotion were dispersed while they won only five times from September to mid-February.

Perhaps the best way to illustrate the "give and take" pattern of Swindon's season is to study a sequence of 23 League and Cup games stretching from November 13th to March 29th. They piled up 55 goals themselves, failing to score only once, but kept only half-a-dozen "clean sheets" while conceding 36 goals.


It has made for excellent entertainment, of course, and, not surprisingly, Swindon have comfortably reached their "break even" attendance figure of 7,000. This target was arrived at by a committee of Directors who studied ways of trimming expenses to a realistic level.

As a result, Swindon are relatively free from any financial pressure after a three-year team-building programme by Danny Williams. The Yorkshire-born boss is in his second spell at the County Ground, having previously steered the club to its finest hour with the League Cup and promotion double in 1968-69.

He left them securely placed to meet the requirements of the Second Division, but relegation was almost a certainty by the time he returned in March, 1974, following management spells with Mansfield Town and Sheffield Wednesday.

Mr. Williams was involved in a major transfer on his return. With the £80,000 previously received from Derby for Rod Thomas, he bought Peter Eastoe from Wolves. Eastoe scored 43 goals for Swindon before departing for QPR last season. While it was a blow for the supporters when they lost such a dangerous striker, the gap was more than filled. Trevor Anderson, the Irish international winger

from Manchester United, is teamed up with Dave Syrett, an England Youth international from Swindon's junior ranks, and Dave Moss, a talented winger who was snapped up from Oxfordshire non-League club, Witney.

This combination is worth more than 50 League and Cup goals this season — an excellent record which is backed up by the midfield contribution from Ray Mc Hale, who was signed from Halifax Town last September.

London-born Kenny Stroud, a former England Schools international, is also a useful marksman from midfield, while another Londoner, Will Dixon, who came from Reading, can also be relied upon for a goal or two.

Defensively, Swindon have a settled lineup. Inverness-born goalkeeper Jimmy Allan, who made his debut as a teenager in 1971, is now the regular choice in preference to Jim Barron, who has commanded several sizeable transfer fees on his moves between Wolves, Chelsea, Oxford, Nottingham Forest and Swindon.

The central defensive partnership is formed by Steve Aizlewood, a former Welsh Under-23 international signed from Newport County in March, 1976, and Colin Prophett, an experienced player who was under Danny Williams' management at Sheffield Wednesday and later re-joined

his old boss in a move from Norwich to Swindon in September, 1974.

At left back, Swindon have one of the great clubmen of modern times in John Trollope. The club's longest-serving professional, he signed professional in August, 1960, and has broken all appearance records for Swindon. He is now on the brink of his 700th League game and coming up towards 800 matches in all senior football. He was a member of promotion sides in 1963 and 1969 and the League Cup-winning team in 1969.

Trollope's full back partner is usually John McLaughlin, a costly signing from Colchester United in December, 1973. The former England Youth international from Edmonton can also play in midfield and, in fact, has quite often switched roles with Will Dixon.

Although Swindon make fewer changes than most teams in the division, Mr. Williams is quite satisfied with quality of his reserves and says it's the first time in his two spells as manager that the club has had cover for every position.

The most senior player in Swindon's "back-up" squad is our old friend, Tony Taylor, who moved from Southend on a free transfer last August. He has proved valuable to Swindon with his ability to step into all the defensive positions.

Among the other players brought in to

strengthen the squad over the last year are: Gerry O'Brien, a Scottish midfield man signed from Southampton in March, 1976; Howard Goddard, a free transfer forward who moved from Bournemouth on his 19th birthday last May; Wynne Hooper, a forward from Newport; and Mickey French, another forward signed from Brentford in February this year.

From their own ranks, Swindon have local-born full back Geoff Chalklin and Abingdon-born midfield player John Gilligan, who has been with Northampton on loan.


They have also called on Frank Burrows, now the club coach but still available to take the No. 5 shirt which he wore in more than 400 League games with Scunthorpe and Swindon.








PALACE WIN THEIR FIRST HONOUR

There had been great disappointment at the newly formed Crystal Palace Football Club when the Southern League authorities announced that Palace were not to be admitted to the 1st Division of that League for the season 1905-06. This meant that we would be playing mainly against Reserve sides or little known clubs in Division 2. However the challenge was met with resolution and skipper Birnie put it this way "If we win all our matches they'll have to have us in the 1st Division."

Palace didn't quite manage a 100% record. We actually lost our first Southern League fixture but

soon settled down into winning ways and by Christmas had the look of potential champions of the 2nd Division.

Our great rivals were Leyton from the East end of London. They led the table for most of the season by virtue of a point gained in an extra match played, but we overhauled them in the Spring and by early April the clubs were level on points with Palace still holding the advantage of a game in hand.

No other club was in contention by this time so when, on April 7th 1906, Palace travelled to Leyton for what was obviously the decider for the Championship of the 2nd Division enthusiasm and interest knew no bounds. Indeed the local newspapers pointedly remarked upon the hundreds of Palace supporters who travelled to the game and and cheered the team onto the arena.

Palace lined up as follows: Hewitson, Walker, Edwards, Innerd, Birnie, A. Wilson, Wallace, Harker, Woodger, Needham, Roberts.

Palace appeared to be in no mood for slip-ups. Three times early on we came close to taking the lead but in spite of good headwork by Woodger we couldn't make the breakthrough. Then Leyton came at our defence but, as ever, Birnie, Hewitson and company were in excellent form. Then in a sparkling move, itself worthy of a Championship, Palace pounced. Edwards won possession and sent a long ball up the left wing. Needham controlled it, ran to the by-line and slid a precision pass back for Roberts who centred to Wallace for the outside-right to slash the ball home. A picture goal. Oh! If only we had a picture of it! It had cut the Leyton defence (second only to our own in the Division) to ribbons and the psychological advantage it gave to the Palace side must have been enormous.

Leyton tried hard to regain lost ground but they could never seize the advantage, although Hewitson had to deal with a siege of five corners before half-time.

Ten minutes after the break Palace did it again. A rapier-like ball out of defence found Needham unmarked 40 yards from goal. He beat two defenders in style and from some 25 yards let fly with an unstoppable shot. These goals always look so spectacular; this one perhaps the more so since it as good as clinched the Championship.

Leyton pulled a goal back but Palace defended strongly and well in spite of an injury to Edwards that hampered his mobility. We were seldom in

When the final whistle blew the Palace fans went wild with delight and cheered their men (and ours) with a great roar. No one could stop us now: we had won the title. The top three places in the table looked like this:


PALACE VOUCHERS
