We shall certainly be looking for two points to-night to finish the season in a respectable league position and then look forward to progress for next season.

These new prices compare with present day prices of Division III and IV of this season without taking into consideration the new increases that Clubs will have to make.

We do try to keep our prices low in the hope that our support will merit it, but any speculation or team building depends in the end on the income the Club receives.

It was very satisfactory to be told that we, Swindon Town, had been placed third for our Everton Programme lay-out. This was for outstanding publications for the season in a National ballot. I would like to say that our programme layout and contents is the work of our Bob Jefferies and I am sure that everybody who buys our programme will join me in saying 'Well done'.

On Thursday evening we play our last game at the County Ground against the British Police Amociation. This is their final warm up game before competing in the European Police Championship to be held in Norway in July. This should prove to be an entertaining evening and I hope that you all will try to support this game. As you know Don Rogers has had to postgone his Benefit Match against Queens Park Rangers which had been arranged for next Minday because of a re-arranged League game to which Queens Park Rangers are committed.

Don is now having his Benefit Match in the very early part of next season and I am sure that we shall look forward to the new date and give it our full support.

The month of June is full of meetings of importance to the future of football, including the Annual General Meeting of the Football League when the final decision of League Clubs will be known on the controversial subject of freedom of players to move to other Clubs on the completion of existing contracts and the method of compensation to the selling Club. The Football Association also holds its Annual General Meeting in June and the Associate Member Clubs of the 3rd and 4th Divisions are hoping to see a rule changed which will allow greater representation for their members than is allowed under the present rules.

Talking of changes, I read in our local paper in a letter written to the Advertiser, that the writer although seemingly approving of our interest in Astro turf said that I had never shown interest in the balloon type cover for football pitches such as that at Leicester. I would like to point out that several Directors visited Leicester City when they first introduced this form of cover and of course envied them, but apart from the cost it has proved to have many snags. One of the snags is the problem of ventilation depending upon the type of soil that one has. Another snag is the man-handling costs when a quick decision has to be made to erect or otherwise. We have very close contacts with Leicester City and they say that although it has many advantages, it also has so many snags that it is not used as often as one would like it to be. Many big Clubs such as the Arsenal and Everton have tried underground heating without 100% success and Leicester's experiment has not been repeated by any other Club. I am not saying that we would not like the opportunity of such protection but at the moment we do feel that the costs would be unjustified.

As these are my last programme notes for this season may I thank you all for your support and I would ask you to try to get a friend to come with you next season and this will help us to improve our standards.

I hope you will enjoy to-night's game.

PHIL ROBERTS (Defender) Phil is a Welsh under-23 international who began his career with Bristol Rovers. Portsmouth paid £52,000 for him in 1973 and, though he lost his place this season, he was recalled when Jimmy Dickinson took over as manager.

League Record: Bristol Rov 175(1) aps. 6 gls; Portsmouth 117(1) aps 1 gl.

PAUL CAHILL (Defender) Paul has been appearing in the centre of the defence, though his old position was left-back. A former Coventry player. Paul didn't make the Sky Blues' senior side. Portsmouth signed him two seasons ago.

League Record: Coventry nil aps, Portsmouth 79(1) aps. 1 gl.

STEVE FOSTER (Defender) Steve began as a centre-forward and was given his chance in Pompey's League eleven last season, He didn't make a tremendous impression, however, until switching positions and now he is a commanding figure in the centre of the defence.

CLIVE GREEN (Midfield) Clive won his chance in Pompey's League eleven this season, quickly making an impression with some powerful displays in midfield.

PETER DENYER (Forward) Peter, yet another of the young players blooded last season, has scored seven goals this season and is now Portsmouth's second-highest scorer.

DAVE KEMP (Forward) Dave is Pompey's top scorer with 14 goals. He made an explosive start to his League career with Palace, hitting nine goals in his first 11 games last season. A former Chelsea junior, Dave played for Maidenhead, Wembley and Slough before joining Palace in 1975 and Pompey this season. League record: C. MICK MELLOWS (Forward) A player of considerable experience, Mick is a former England amateur international. Once with Sutton United, Mellows played League football as an amateur for Reading in 1970/71 but then went back to non—League football until Pompey signed him in 1973.

MAITLAND POLLOCK (Forward) Maitland began with Walsall but moved on to Luton in 1974 for £10,000. Portsmouth signed him last summer and he has been holding down a position on the wing.



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
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Who'd be a Manager?

When Portsmouth decided to suspend their manager Ian St. John they took the number of managerial changes in the last year up to a remarkable 38! That's coming up to almost half the League clubs making a switch within a year.

Who gains by all these changes is still not clear. Very rarely does a club sacking its boss at a critical stage of the campaign reap any dividends and it is something of an indictment upon the way football is run that the great majority of managerial changes place among the unsuccessful clubs in the Third and Fourth Divisions.

Mr. St. John, who had achieved near miracles with his young players at Fratton Park, can take some consolation from the fact that his hero, Bill Shankly, was considered a failure as a manager after ten years in the lower Leagues. After moving to Liverpool he becomes a legend. If Mr. St John decides to keep in the game he may find equal fame one day.

In the policy of sacking the manager immediately anything goes wrong really had any long-term value then the clubs who changed bosses most often should be the most successful. In fact, exactly the opposite applies.

Darlington, who recently went through five managers in about two years, were always struggling yet, now that they have found some stability in this department, they have enjoyed one of their best seasons in years, finishing on the fringe of the Fourth Division promotion race.

Southport have had four managers since last May! Consequently, they are about to apply for re-election for the second successive season and gates at Hall Avenue have been down to the 800 mark in recent weeks.

Though the vast majority of managers are sacked, a few go of their own accord. Johnny Giles (West Bromwich) resigned because he doesn't like the way English League clubs are run and, studying the list of managerial casulties this season, one can scarcely blame him for getting out while he retains his sanity.

Only one of the clubs who sacked their manager within the last twelve months has won anything this term - Wolves, whose Sammy Chung retained the team created by his predecessor Bill McGarry.

If we look around at the truly successful clubs we find they are the ones whose managers have been excused the various bad runs all must expect - - - Liverpool, Manchester United, Aston Villa, Leeds, etc.

There's a moral there somewhere, surely? Some clubs seem to make a habit of sacking really outstanding managers. Which club in its right mind, you might ask, would boot out such managerial giants as Malcolm Allison and Billy Bingham? The answer is Plymouth Argyle who recently sacked another good man in Tony Waiters and now find themselves back in Division Three.

When virtually half the members of the League decide to change managers within a year one wonders what they hope to achieve. Only one club can win the League Championship and only one can win the F.A. Cup.

Building a successful team is a long-term project, three years being the absolute minimum of time required to start from scratch. Yet so many clubs fire their boss when he is on the point of finding a successful team simply because he may not in three years have won anything.

If the policy of firing the manager had proved successful there would at least be some reason for understanding the attitude. But it has proved conclusively over and over again that this system just doesn't work. One allegedly failed manager is inevitably followed by another. Why?

Because it is not the managers who are wrongit is the clubs, who make a habit of putting the boot in, that have their heads in the sand. In hoping most sincerely that a great club like Portsmouth avoids the drop into Division Four this year, one cannot help but point out this fact that the great former England wing-half Jimmy Dickinson is their fourth manager in as many years. During that time they have plummeted from a potential First Division side to one that is currently on the brink of the Fourth That's scarcely progress.

No man is more steeped in tradition of Portsmouth than Jimmy Dickinson. He still holds the all-time record for the most appearances for one club (764 League for Portsmouth) and he later became their public relations officer and secretary.

If anyone can haul Pompey out of trouble it is Dickinson. But, when he looks around at what is happening at so many clubs around the country, even he must wonder if his 32 years of unstinted services to Portsmouth F.C. will ultimately be judged, and remembered, by what he may, or may not, achieve in a few months as their manager.

Those of you who read our Everton programme will have read the Secretary's advice to those of you who wish to be recognised as regular supporters - be a Season Ticket Holder and be recognised. No doubt many of you will tell me what to do with our season tickets but remember the Cup events of this season the same thing could well happen next season. We cannot afford to give away unforgeable vouchers; to put vouchers into the programme is unfair to the family supporters because each member of the family must buy a programme so the obvious solution is to buy a season ticket. There are advantages of course in that you have free entry to three League matches and all reserve matches and of course you are guaranteed a ticket to all home cup ties.

And now a word to those of you who stand on the terraces, you too can purchase a season ticket and these tickets do not, as many believe, restrict you to one part of the ground. With such a ticket you can enter through the turnstile of your choice and although I am not aware of the price next season at this time the savings will be enormous if you are indeed a regular supporter. This season such purchasers

saved as much as 11p per match. Finally on this subject the office is open throughout the summer months to enable you to purchase your season ticket by easy payments - either weekly or monthly - by post or by personal calls.

Now a big thank you to Mrs. G. Holloway of 83, Goddard Avenue, Swindon, Mrs. Holloway has been supporting us year in and year out since 1915 - a magnificent achievement. Thank you Mrs. Holloway.

As this is the last game of the season I would like to offer the thanks of all the Club for their support throughout the season - the police, gatemen and stewards, members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, catering staff, souvenir shop staff, programme sellers, the Swindon Town Girls, ballboys and in case I have forgotten anyone, all those without whose help the games would not be possible. But most of all thanks to you, our loyal supporters, thank you for following us throughout a very mixed and finally disappointing season and let us all look forward to a more successful season in 1977/78.
