Bits and Pieces

Swansea Town, as our opponents were known until February 1970, were formed around the turn of the century. When Southern League membership was increased after the First World War, Swansea, along with South Wales neighbours Merthyr Town and Newport County, was among the clubs elected.

The club won the Third Division South championship in 1925 and 1949. Until 1965, only seven out of thirty-eight seasons had not been spent in the Second Division. In that year Swansea and Swindon returned to the Third Division together. In 1967 Swansea failed to avoid the drop into the Fourth.

Swindon's visit to Vetch Field on a Thursday in September 1948 attracted a thirty thousand gate, nine times Swansea's average for last season. Swindon went down 0-4. In the return game on the last Saturday of the season, the Welshmen, by then divisional champions, drew a 21,390 crowd to the County Ground. This time a secondhalf Maurice Owen goal gave Swindon the points.

Last Saturday saw the third meeting of the two clubs in the Football League Cup and prior to then honours were exactly even. The first encounter on Tuesday 22 September 1964 resulted in a 3-1 win for the Swans, Ken Skeen scoring for Swindon. That scoreline was reversed on Tuesday 2 September 1969 in Swindon's first League Cup tie after the Wembley victory. Peter Noble scored a second hat-trick within four days, this following one against Charlton.

Among players leaving Swindon for the Welsh club have been full-back Arthur Tonner (1939), Welsh International forward Billy Lucas (1948), who went on to make 200 League appearances for the Swans and former Swindon skipper at centre-half, Mel Nurse - also an International. He returned to the Club where hald begun his League career ten years earlier.

Travelling in the opposite direction have been full-back Terry Elwell (1952), forward Sid Lowry (1935), top scorer for Swindon in 1935-36 with 14 goals, centre-half Brinley Humphries (1927) and the prolific goalscorer Harry Morris in 1926. No player has scored more League goals for Swindon than his 216, which included seventeen hat-tricks, one on his debut and another in his second game.







Spotlight on League Cup

Wimbledon, who have thrilled the World with some fabulous Cup performances in recent times when eliminating First Division Burnley and drawing with Leeds and Middlesbrough in the F.A. Cup, this week join the Establishment. Newly-elected to the Fourth Division this year, Wimbledon switch from the role of giant-killers to the business of establishing themselves as a League club.

The Don's first appearance in the League Cup this week sees them visit Gillingham for what looks like being a tough introduction and they must be wondering if they are destined to follow in the footsteps of other famous F.A. Cup minows who failed to make much impression in the League Cup.

Hereford United, for instance, gained their League place in 1972 as a direct result of knocking Newcastle out of the F.A. Cup and drawing with West Ham. Since becoming a Football League Club, however, Hereford have never beaten a club of a higher Division in the League Cup. Their best feat was in reaching the third round in 1974/75.

And, incredible as it may sound, another new League club Cambridge United would equal their best League Cup achievement if they reach this season's second round. Though they have been a member of the Football League since 1970 --- and twice gained promotion to the Third Division --- they didn't manage to record their first League Cup victory until last season!

The League Cup has, of course, now established itself as one of Europe's top competitions, with a EFFA Cup place the winners. Current holders Aston Villa have now won both English Cups more often than anyone else! Their victory over Everton gave them the League Cup for the third time and, though their last

F.A. Cup success was back in 1957 their seven wins is a record for that competition.

Villa's Brian Little was the League Cup's highest scorer for ten years with ten goals in last season's success. He was followed by Tony Evans (Cardiff) and Neil Whatmore (Bolton) with six and Bob Latchford (Everton) and Andy King (Everton) with five each.

The League Cup record is 11 goals shared by Gerry Hitchens (A. Villa), Tony Brown (W.B.A.), Geoff Hurst (West ham) and Rodney Marsh (Q.P.R.).

It now seems certain that, in spite of the competition's popularity, the record attendance — apart from the Wembley final — will never be broken. Only one stadium in the country could now beat the 63,418 for the Manchester United v Manchester City semi-final in 1969/70.

With new safety regulations for First Division grounds being introduced this season, the largest --- Manchester United's --- is being limited to around 57,000. So only Second Division Charlton Athletic --- with a 66,000 capacity --- would be able to top that record. Alas, it is a long, long while since a crowd of that proportion converged upon the Valley and, if they should threaten to fill it again, it is likely that the local police would recommend something in the range of 50,000 today.

Last seasons League Cup final was the first ever to go to a replay. For several years since the competition's inception in 1960, the final was played on a two-legged basis on the ground of the clubs involved.

The first Wembley final was in 1967 when Third Division Q.P.R. shocked W.B.A. --- and it has always been a complete sell-out.

History of Swindon Town

This year marks the 96th, in the history of the Swindon Town Football Club. The nucleus of the early playing staff was provided by a team known as the Spartans, the captain of which was Prebendary W.B. Pitt. With a collection of players from the local amateur side of the day, he formed a team and friendlies were organised, home games being played at Bradford's Field - where railings protected spectators from a quarry at one end of the pitch. Unfortunately, at least one fan is known to have fallen into the quarry whilst a game was in progress!

Fourteen matches were played in the 1883-84 season, ten being won with a goal average of fifty-three against eight. The venue for home matches was switched to Vickery's Field for a short while until the move was made to the Croft. The club became the first holders of the Wiltshire Senior Cup in 1886-87 and held the trophy each year until 1892-93 when Swindon Athletic claimed it. In 1894 Swindon Town became a found member of the Southern League, but at the end of the first season finished at the foot of the table. The club turned professional in February 1895 and the first professional player to be engaged was believed to be James Munro, from the Burton Swifts club. The County Ground was used for League matches from September 1895. Under the guidance of captain Dick Jones, the club gradually climbed the table until reaching fifth place in 1899-1900. However, two seasons followed as wooden-spoonists of the division. The green jerseys used until this time were changed in favour of white - but in 1902-03 a further switch was made to the red of today.

Swindon gained exemption until the first round of the F.A. Cup Competition for the first time in 1907-08, the season that Harold Fleming - later an England International - was signed. The Town first gained recognition in the football world when Burnley, Tottenham and Manchester City were all defeated in the cup run of 1909-10. Swindon fell to Newcastle United in the semi-final. This stage was reached again only two years later when Barnsley won through to the Final at the second attempt.

Sandwiched between, in 1911, was the first of two Southern League championship wins, giving the club the right to meet the Football League champions, Manchester United, in the Charity Shield. Swindon was defeated by eight goals to four. First place was

attained again - on goal average this time - in 1914. With the entire Southern League First Division, Swindon Town was elected to the Third Division of the Football League in 1920 and started with a bang! Luton Town was defeated in the first match by nine goals to one, a margin of victory the club has been unable to surpass in League games to this day.

In 1926, Harry Morris joined the club and netted 47 goals in his first season, amassing 216 in only 260 appearances before joining Clapton Orient in 1933. It was in his last season with the club that Swindon finished in bottom place and thus had to seek re-election for the first time.

After a post-war boom assisted by the consistent goal-scoring of Maurice Owen, the club fell upon hard times in the mid-fifties applying for re-election to the League in two consecutive years 1956 and 1957. When Bert Head took over as manager towards the end of 1956, he began a youth policy which produced such talent as Ernie Hunt, Don Rogers and Mike Summerbee. Blended with the experience of players such as Sam Burton and Maurice Owen- each playing for fifteen seasons Swindon Town reached the Second Division for the first time in 1963. After an impressive start in the higher sphere - nine games without defeat the Town ended the 1963-64 season in a modest 14th place and when Danny Williams arrived in 1965, he found the club back in the Third Division. In four years he moulded a side which brought about the finest achievement in the history of the club - the winning of the Football League Cup at Wembley on March 15, 1969, coupled with the regaining of Division Two status less than two months later. Swindon secured fifth place at the end of 1969-70 - the highest League position ever attained - and became the first winners of the Anglo-Italian Cup by defeating S.S. Napoli in Naples by a 3 - 0 margin After making his 400th League appearance for the club in October 1972, Don Rogers left Swindon for a club record fee. In 1974 the Town was left stranded at the bottom of the Second Division when Danny Williams returned. Peter Eastoe, brought to Swindon for another club record fee after a loan period late in 1973, notched 26 League goals in 1974-75. But efforts to regain a Second Division place at the first attempt fell short of the target by just two points.
